







Morning and mist and autumn, and a tan on our noses, alone, one in the midst of many, still one, a silhouette against a backdrop of an expectant people.













To start the downswing, undefeated Lovett downed Hapeville 14-0. Arch-rivals—

Headland and College Park—
thumped Hapeville for the Hornets' only sub-region losses, and the Lakeshore Lancers powered past the Hornets 41-13.

The Russell game

marked a turnabout in Hapeville's football fortunes.

Brilliant line play and precise timing resulted in a 20-0 victory.

Hapeville treated an appreciative Homecoming crowd to a 70-6 rout of Briarwood, then closed out the season with a 35-0 victory over Pebblebrook.


The 1968 Hapeville football team finished 3-2 in the region and 5-5 overall, their best record in five seasons.




















The Wrestling Team














