

## SENIORS

We have to fight for these ideals, established in part by Mr. Strong, one of our first principals, whose picture hangs beside the office door. But if we give them up, we feel that our school is betrayed. We can't be traitors to Central, for it is our school and we love it.

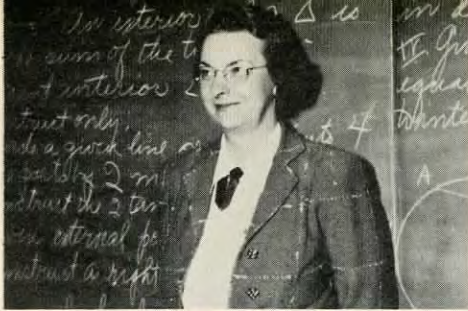

"But things slowly get better-----?"

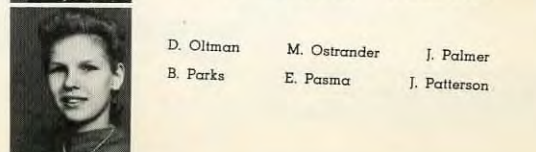
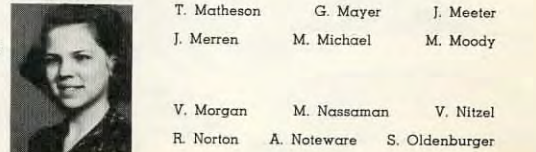
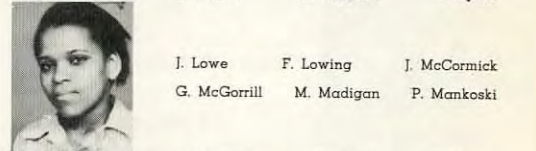
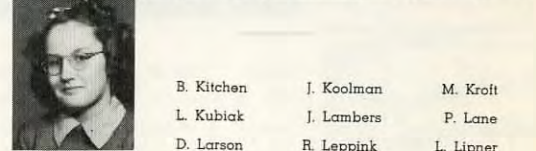

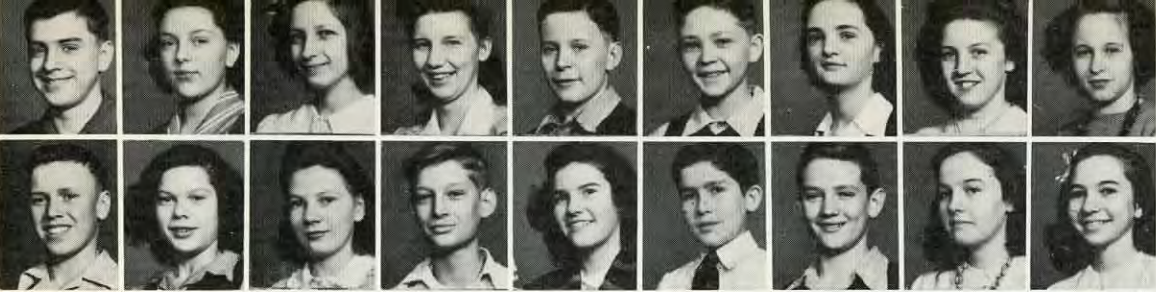
"Oh, phooey! These things will just have to be dumped in my locker." She ran to catch the elevator. As I followed, she mistook me for one of her friends.

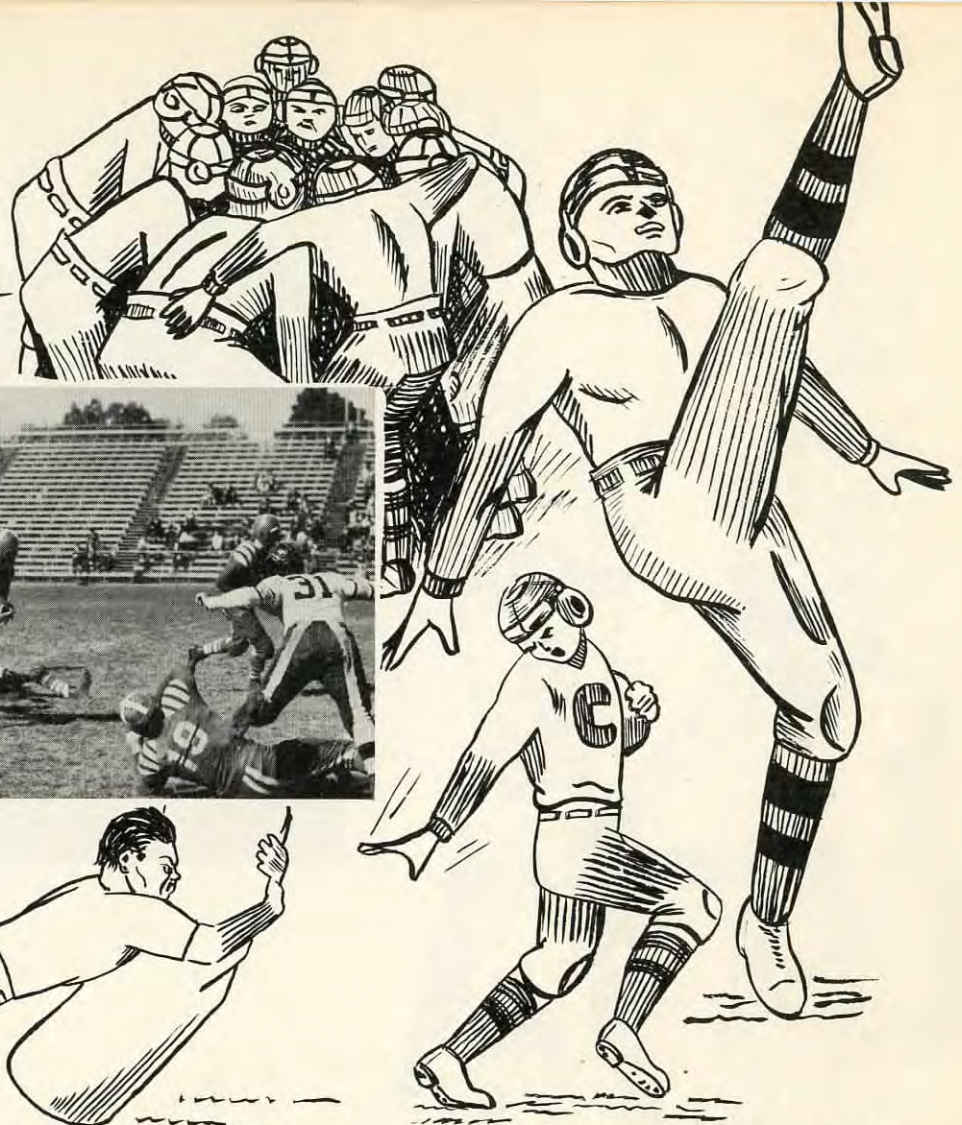
Now in this last game, they were a striking example of determination and will power.

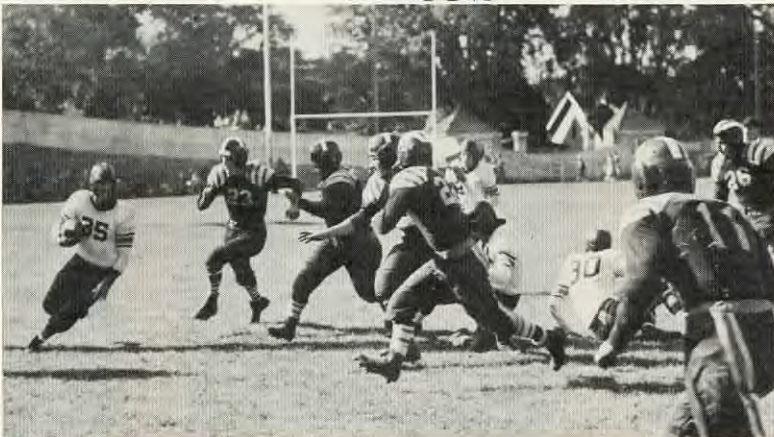
"I know those yells mean a lot to you boys," I said, "but don't tell me you get scared!"

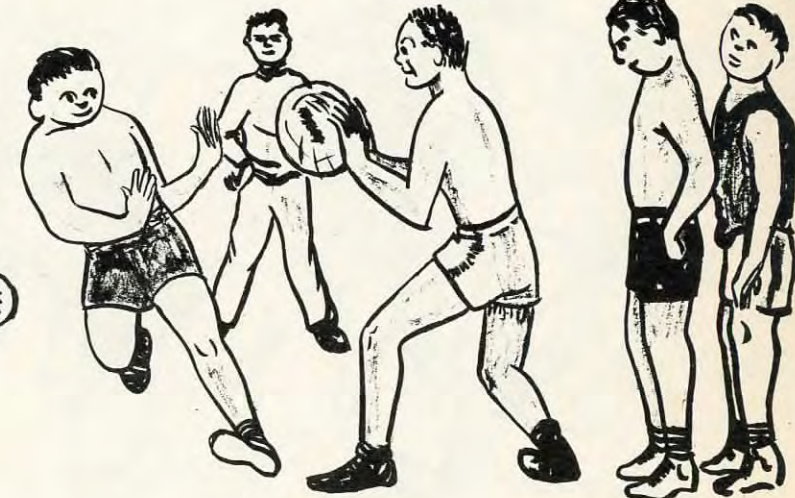
"Are you a sports writer?"

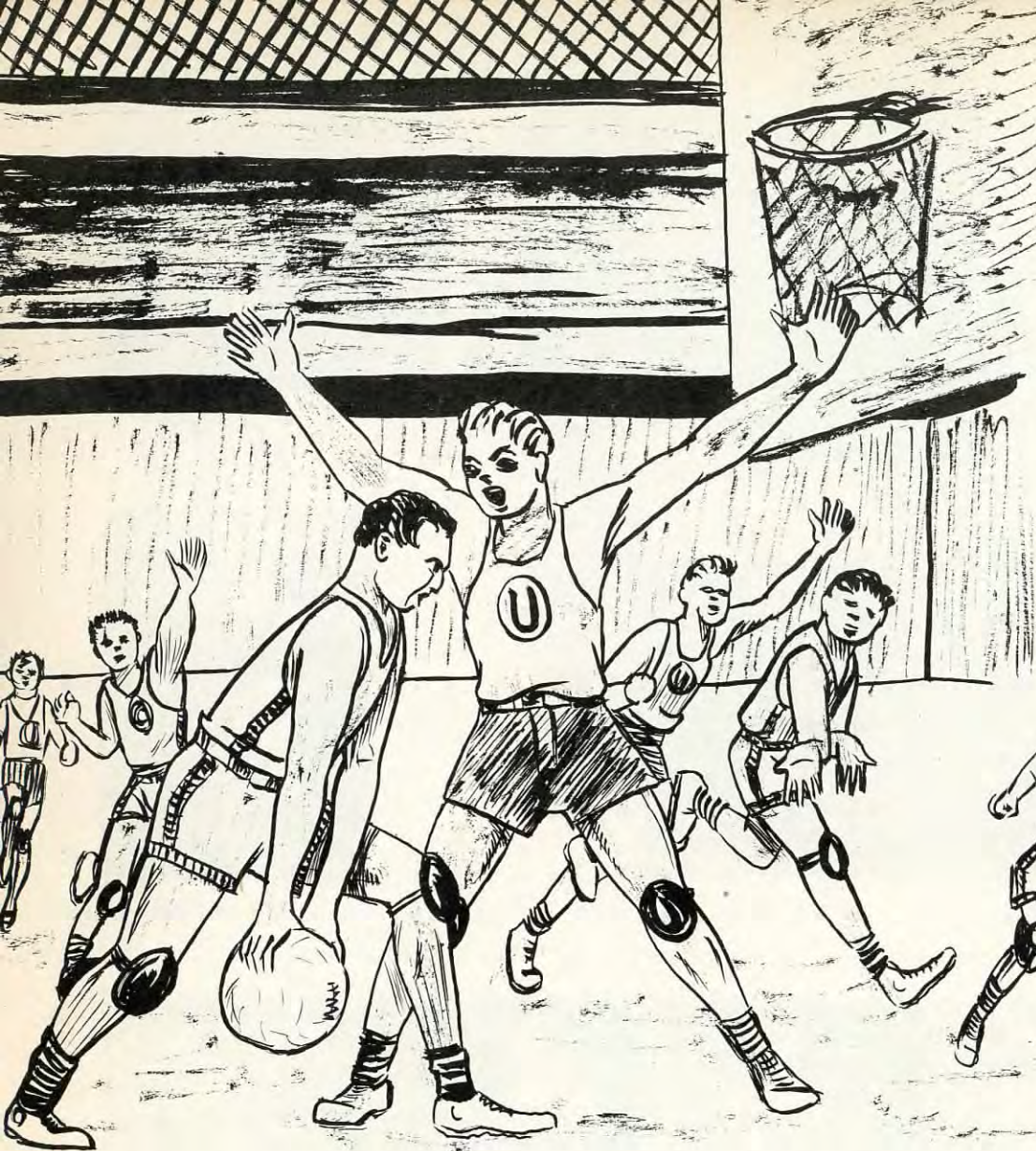
"Steps, well maybe so--but you don't have to be so emphatic, Mr. Referee. You don't have to cut the air with your hands so fiercely!"

"Oh--oh, and it's the end of the half. I'll bet the boys are glad for a rest, and I am too. I wonder what they are saying to each other."

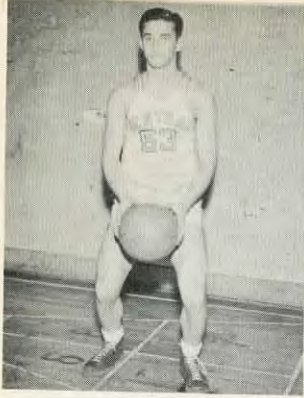

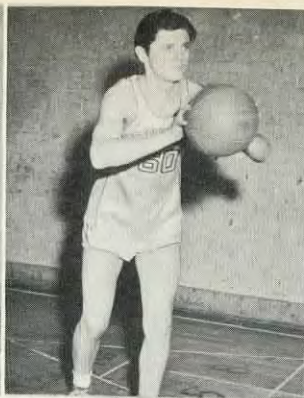
As I saw these boys on the floor again, I kept thinking of what was in each mind and I began to realize all the things a player must know and must keep ready for use.

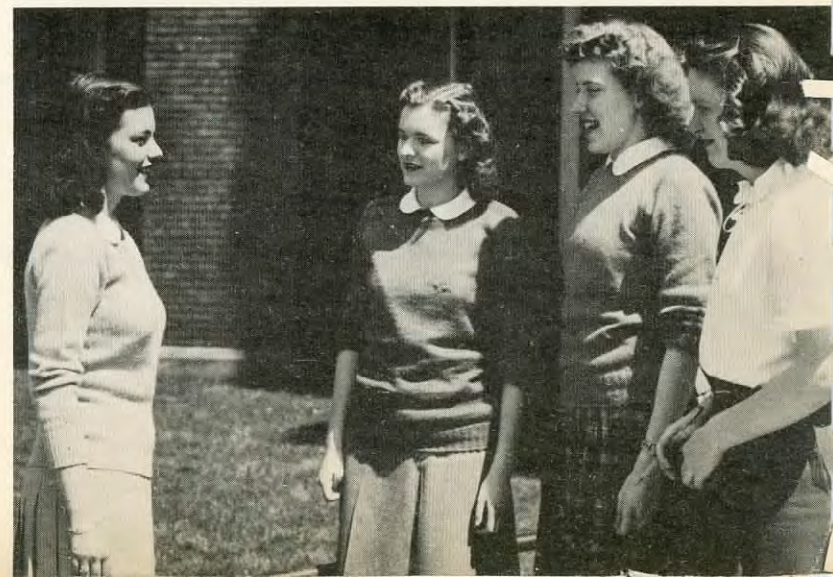
"Naturally, naturally, we Hi'Y's won first prize."

"Hey, one thing at a time!"

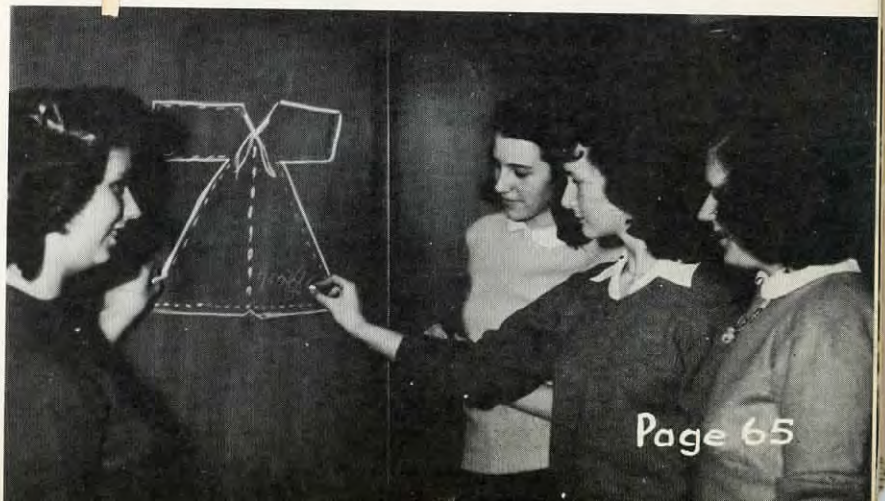
"Of course, you're going to join us, aren't you?"

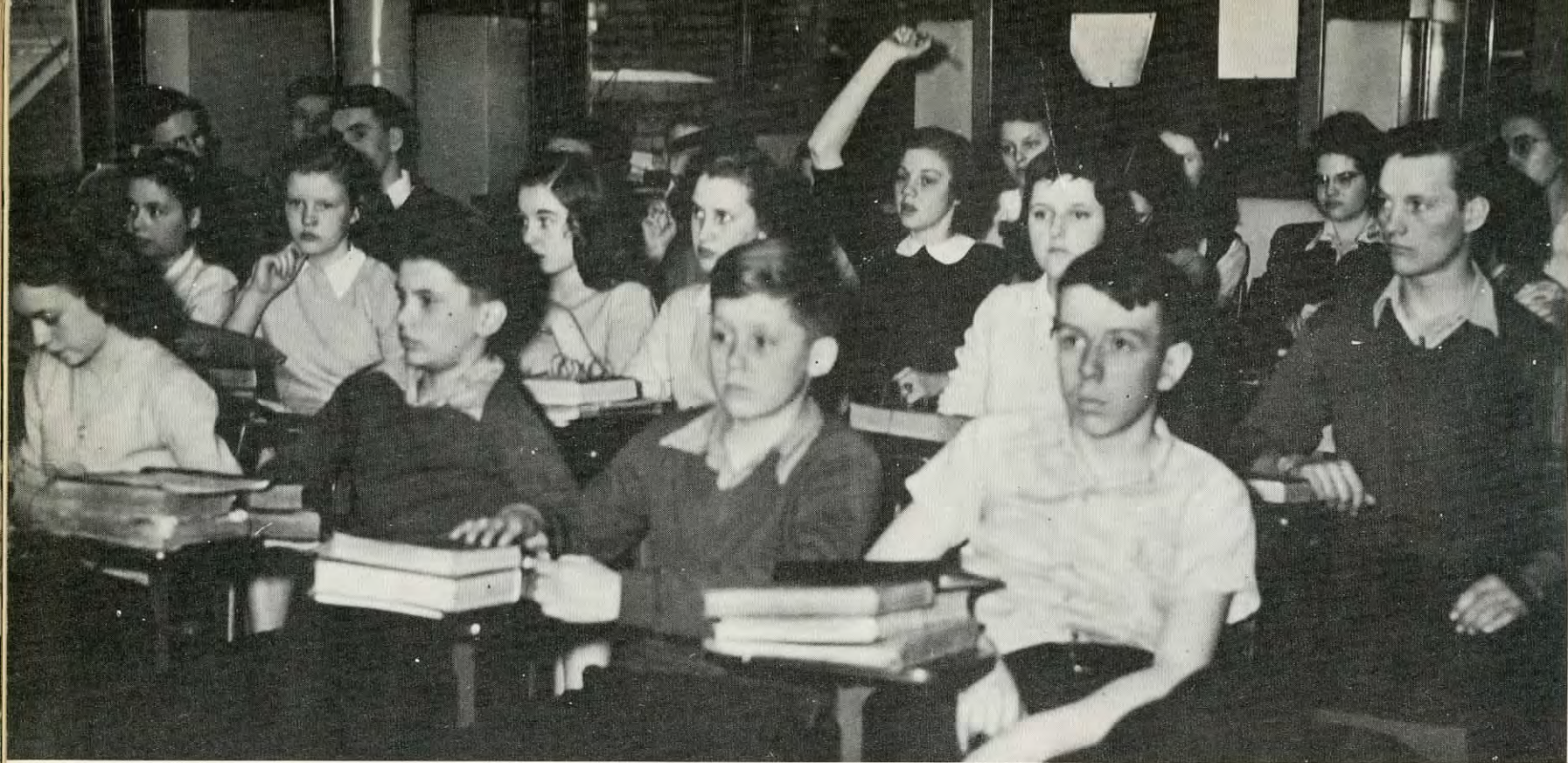
"I'll try my best to see that you have the best one, captain!"

"Mr. Vice-President, are there any assemblies scheduled?"

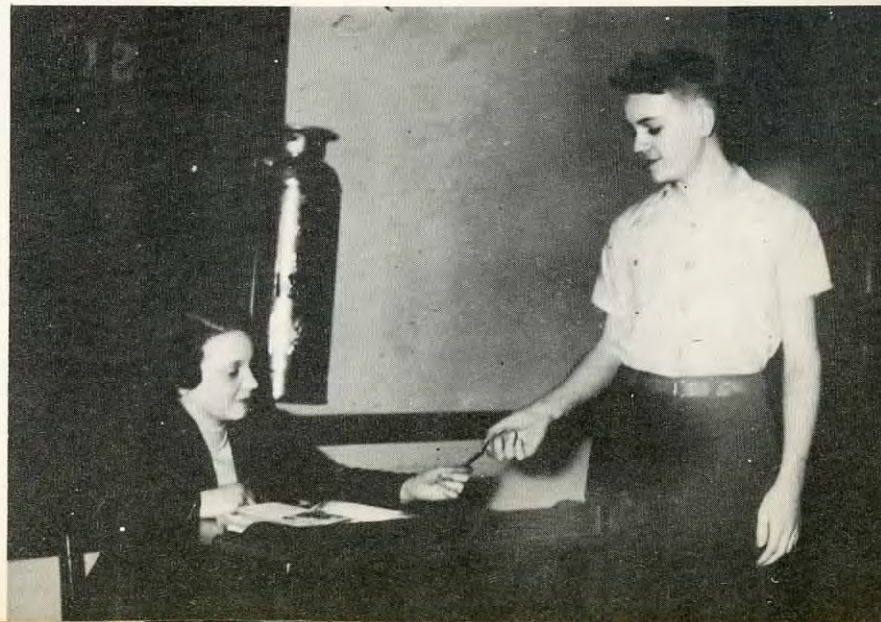
"Only the Pep assembly which shortens the classes tomorrow."
