Q. I had a CPR course about a year ago and would like to know where I can take a refresher course without going through the day-long course again? -

A. The local chapter of the American Red Cross has a CPR class scheduled for Sept. 15 at the chapter headquarters, 807 Carol St., that may meet your

Enrollment **Figures** At FTI Down

Enrollment is slightly down, but the number of faculty is up at Fayetteville Technical Institute, the FTI Board of Trustees was told Monday

The board also was told that more than 88 percent of the students who graduated from FTI during the 1983-84 school year are employed, with more than 77 percent working in the field in which they were trained.

FTI President R. Craig Allen told the board that fall curriculum enrollment at FTI is down by 532 - from 5,473 to 4,941 - compared to last year. The decline is the equivalent of 205 full-time students for an overall drop of about 3.8 percent, Allen said.

Despite the overall drop, enrollment at FTI's Ft. Bragg campus is at an all-time high this year, up the equivalent of 218 full-time students since last year, Allen said.

Allen attributed some of the enrollment drop to "a better economy, which allows people to go directly to jobs." He said a decline in enrollment at community colleges is a nationwide trend, and pointed out that the decline at FTI was smaller than the statewide drop of about 5 percent.

While the number of students declined, however, the number of faculty at FTI expanded by about 4.3 percent - up eight to 192. Allen said 13 faculty members were hired in eight departments, but that five were replacements for leaving personnel.

Also on Monday, FTI Dean of Student Development John T. Fernald told the board that 385 of the 437 graduates from 1983-84 who are available to work have found employment. Of the 46 subject areas in which students graduated, 24 had perfect employment records and in 16 of those areas, all the graduates were working in their field of study, Fernald said.


About 30 percent of the working graduates found employment in Cumberland County, Fernald said. The average salary of the graduates who reported was \$14,844 a year, he said. Also on Monday, the board:

· Voted to allow FTI to apply for a Title III Endowment Funding Program grant which would match up to \$50,000 raised by the institution.

• Approved upgrading the former machinist and air condition, heating and refridgeration curriculum from a diploma to an associate degree program. FTI Dean of Instruction Larry B. Norris said the move means an increase in requirements for the program, with the updated version having begun this fall.

 Approved a student activity fund budget of \$45,500, which represents a \$1,175 or 2.5 decrease from last year.

 Named Pat Hickmon as FTI's Director of Institutional Resource Development. Mrs. Hickmon previously served as director of arts and crafts, home economics and gerontology in the Adult Continuing Education department at FTI. T. 10-25-84



When Ute Burgess got to be a second grader, her German teachers insisted that she write with a fountain pen. No ballpoints, no pencils, no cheating. Second graders wrote with ink and a fountain pen or they wrote with nothing

at all — so Ute struggled with the ink. "All the way through the first four grades I got D's in writing," she says with a wry smile. Like good ol' Charlie Brown, she was besieged with ink blots and smears as she fought to control the feisty fountain pen.

But she's got it under control now. Ms. Burgess, a teacher of calligraphy classes for the Fayetteville Art Museum and Fayetteville Technical Institute, has turned the subject she once hated into an important part of her career as a commercial artist.

"It's a discipline," she says. "It's a skill that you can learn, and once you've mastered it, it's an art. But it's also a discipline."

And the artist must be in control. "The hand has to be steady and the mind has to be in a perfect state - or the piles of scrap paper get bigger and bigger and you don't get anything

done," Ms. Burgess says. The art of calligraphy — the word itself means beautiful writing - dates back many centuries. According to the Smithsonian News Service, the ancient Chinese believed there were only three true arts - poetry, drawing and

calligraphy. Poetry and drawing have never lost their popularity, but the advent of of beautiful writing aside. In the last decade, interest in the art of calligraphy has experienced a rebirth all over America — and Fayetteville is no

Calligraphy supplies are readily available in any stationery shop, classes are being sponsored by the Fayetteville Art Museum and Fayetteville Parks and Recreation, and people of all ages and occupations are signing

For the latter, which requires artistic talent as well as a practiced hand, Ms. Burgess charges \$15 an hour. The going rate for addressing envelopes varies, from 50 cents an envelope up.

"If you have good training," Ms. Burgess says, "You can do acceptable and sellable calligraphy ... but if you have artistic ability, you can do very creative calligraphy that is not like the

styles in the books." Books are good guides, she says, but a scribe should not be limited to copying someone else's style. "Every book and every teacher is different,' she says. "Nobody is the same." But although she encourages creativity and experimentation with the pen, she is adamant about the work being legible.

"If you can't read it, what's the point of writing it?" she asks simply. "I feel that calligraphy is to be read — it's a form of communication and if you can't read it, why do it?"

She is just as adamant about the discipline of the art; she practices for an hour or two each day. Often, she uses her practice time to write a letter to her mother — if she makes a mistake

at that, mother understands, she says. Monroe takes a less structured view of the art; he doesn't pick up his pen every day, but he says that's not a problem for him. After a practice session of an hour or so, he's warmed up enough to start with the serious

Alumni Group **Formed**

In Fayetteville Technical Institute's 23 years of existence, the school has never had a homecoming, a reunion or any other event for graduates who wanted to find out about former classmates or revisit their college experiences. But it wasn't school pride that

FTI's 6,500 graduates lacked. It was an alumni association. Well, 1985 will be the year FTI alumni find a home, says Fayette

ville businessman Doug Fellows, who recently was chosen president of the institute's first alumni

Officials began organizing the alumni association in August, and by the time

the group plans its first activities

this spring, it will have more than 800 members, Fellows says. "This is a school like any other," Fellows said. "People come here and get attached to it. It's meaningful for people to have some way of staying close to an institution that has meant so much

Fellows said now is the time to start such a group for two reasons - graduate interest and administration support.

"The interest was at a high, FTI graduates wanted a group like this," Fellows said. That interest was fueled by the fact that, after 23 years, FTI has a "good pool" of graduates in the Fayetteville community, he said.

"I think that an organization like this will be as strong and successful as its members want it to be," he said. "And if the administration supports it, it can hardly miss. And this administration is very interested in this organization.

Efforts to form the group began with former FTI Director of Placement Jon Hockaday, who in August sent out letters with return post cards to about 3,000 graduates. Hockaday said then that creation of an alumni group was "overdue."

Complicating matters was the fact that FTI had valid addresses for fewer than half of its former students. But within weeks, Hockaday's goal of 400 members was overshadowed, as more than 700 former students joined.

The effort since has been continued by Catherine Barkley, who recently assumed Hockaday's former post. She said many of the cards recently returned are from distant states and overseas.

"They were everywhere," she said. She attributed much of the far-reaching distribution to FTI's large military enrollment.

Fellows, a 1981 business administration graduate, said he was 'glad to jump right in," when he heard about the project.

"I've got some very strong feelings about FTI," Fellows said. "I felt the institution gave me a good, solid amount of practical education. So when I was asked to be come part of the project, I was glad to do whatever they wanted

The members formed a 20member steering committee for the group, then chose a 14-member board of directors and officers last month.

Among the group's first goals is printing a newsletter, which will be sent to all members, and planning an annual "homecoming" type event.

"The main objective of the organization, really, is to provide support for the institution in the community," Fellows said. "Having support means having a whole core of goodwill ambassadors to say what FTI is all about. We're not being set up to be a fundraising organization.'

Members pay no dues, he said. "FTI is an extremely important part of this community," Fellows said. "It touches hundreds and hundreds of people every day. Many of its graduates are involved in business - in positions to help influence preceptions of the

Fellows said critics often cited the continuing education courses at FTI "and say things like 'you can learn to make a basket there.'

"But I think that's a fine thing the school does, in addition to all the fine programs it offers. The fact is that its graduates find

The organziation will hold its next board meeting on Jan. 7, and by then, we'll be able to sit down and start doing things,' Fellows said. New members are welcome, he said.

"The nice thing about FTI is the vast variety of skills and academics it offers," he said.

Board Begins Quest For FTI Funds

Fayetteville Technical Institute's Foundation Board of Directors met for the first time Monday and began discussions on how to raise the \$400,000 a year in supplementary funding that a consulting firm says it can.

The 17-member board, made up of business, media, civic and community representatives, will supervise the foundation, which was begun late last year to secure grants and other resources for the school.

FTI Foundation Board Gets Started In School's First Fund-Raising Effor

Fayetteville Technical Institute Monday introduced \$400,000 a year in supplemental funds. the FTI Foundation Board of Directors, a new fund-raising arm expected by a consulting firm to raise \$400,000 yearly for the school.

The 15-member board met for the first time Monday with FTI officials to begin discussions on how to raise supplemental funds. The Foundation, formed last January, is the first money-raising organization for the school.

Members of the board include local business and civic leaders. Pat Hickmon, FTI's director of institutional resource development, said eight to 10 more members should be joining the board by

Henry Bernhardt, a consultant with Institutional Development Associates of Salisbury, told board members the school will never be able to hire a fund-raising staff and instead would have to depend on the volunteer help of its foundation board to raise

Board members will have to contact other community leaders and businesses to raise funds, said Bernhardt. "We're not talking about going door-todoor, we're talking about encouraging them, cultivating them and their interests," he said.

"This is the first step on a journey of thousands of miles and millions of dollars," said Bernhardt. "It ... will enable FTI to do many things it could never do on tax money alone.'

Living The Good Life

Fayetteville. It's a city with an international flavor, a temperate climate, fine schools, diverse cultural events, world-famous military neighbors and a newly rekindled spirit

That's what the people of this area have to say about their city. As one of 17 finalists in the All-America City competition, Fayetteville already has received status and recognition for the efforts that have been made to

The city's leaders are convinced that Fayetteville will go one step further. They're sure that when the winners are announced in early 1985, Favetteville's name will be called.

The residents of Fayetteville already are proud of their city and the progress that's being made to make it better. When The Fayetteville Observer-Times asked readers to tell why they like living here, the newspaper received letters from people ages 16 to 87, male and female, civilians and military, working and retired, newcomers and long-timers.

Most of the letters were from this area, but one Army wife wrote from California to say how much she missed Favetteville. "The people after all they make the town - are the nicest and warmest people I've ever had the pleasure of knowing,"

Joanne Strong wrote. Many of the responses mentioned the people - their diversity, their warmth, their neighborliness, their commitment, their energy. Other assets also were named again and again: the spirit of rebirth; the proximity to two military installations; the educational, cultural and economic opportunities; the city's size, location and climate; the spirit of community and concern; the availability of quality health care; good shopping and dining facilities; and the legacy of a proud history.

Here's a sampling of what the people of this area said is great about

"They enhance our cosmopolitan image and enrich our community, as demonstrated in the annual Folk Festival.

A Legacy of Renewal "Since the County of Cumberland was established, records have been preserved so one can research back to that year (1754)," wrote Lucile Johnson, a local historian.


Those records are important, she wrote, in examining the area's past and in recognizing its proud heritage. That proud heritage is one of rebirth and renewal, as Fayetteville's representatives at the All-America City

competition told the judges. The people of Fayetteville have historically faced setbacks head on, overcoming disasters and tragedies. The city was rebuilt after a massive fire in 1831 left a third of the population homeless, only to be ravaged again by General Sherman's army during the Civil War.

In recent times, the representatives said, the city was plagued by a deteriorating downtown district, inadequate library facilities, a neglected state university and a lack of pride and community spirit. Characteristically, concerned and active residents joined forces for yet another comeback - one which has now gained national recognition through the cities competition.

Residents believe in their city again. Harvey, who is 16, wrote: "We've just always been a great city, except we fell and now we're picking once-recognized heritage. We're a great city — with great people."

And Jones, 87, agreed. "I'm very glad," she wrote, "to call Fayetteville my home!"

ACS now serves more as an information and referral service to such spouses, directing them to other agencies that can help, Tilley explained. Assistance with the language can be more effectively supplied through Fayetteville Technical Institute's program on English as a Second Language (ESL).

'99.9%' Army wives There are now 154 people enrolled in FTI's English program for the foreign born, according to Yvonne Stohlman, head teacher in the ESL program, "almost 99.9 percent of

them Army wives." In addition to referring foreign-born spouses to FTI for language instruction, ACS can offer other assistance, including helping them find others of their nationality in the Fayetteville area, directing them to books and tapes in their native languages, and locating translators to assist them during stressful situations such as

hospitalization. Foreign-born wives are often brought to ACS through 'onestop' in-processing, and if he attends new personnel briefings, he will probably hear about our committee," Tilley

said. "The majority of time, the service member wants his foreign-born wife to quickly become self-sufficient, so he will encourage her to attend classes," Tilley continued.

(Continued from page 1C) right in" to the ESL program, said Stohlman. Born in Germany, Catron married a Fort Bragg soldier in August, and enrolled in the language program in September.

Independence was, again, the motive. "I'm here in the class because I don't read and write English, and I'm tired of having my husband explain everything to me," Catron said.

Instruction within the ESL is highly practical. In a basic class, teacher Hattie Bryant chanted repeatedly with her students, "I am from Korea. I am a Korean."

She then approached the students individually and asked, "Where are you from?" Often the answer was, "I am from Korean."

"No, 'I am from Kore-AH,' " Bryant corrected, and the student repeated, "I am from Kore-AH."

I am Korean

"What is your nationality?" Bryant asked each student, and each answered, in turn, "I am Korean."

In another class, taught by Heidi Terlep, a group of Korean and Vietnamese women are role-playing a job interview. One student reads aloud from a script: "Good morning, may I help you?" and a second student answers, "Yes I am looking for a job."

The script calls for some screening on the part of the receptionist, to determine the applicant's skills, before she is referred to the person in charge of hiring.

"I can sew. I can wash dishes. I am a good cook," the student explains, describing her own unique skills. "Good," says another student, posing as the receptionist. "Take this to Mrs. Williams in the next room. She will help you."

Terlep recently brought standard job application forms to class for each student to fill out.

Goal has 'go'

In Stohlman's class, students who have been enrolled in the ESL program for the longest

time learn more complex aspects of the American economy, such as using manufacturer's coupons to reduce grocery prices.

When Stohlman asked the students to describe her personal goals to a visitor, she prodded them by saying, 'Remember the word 'goal' has 'go' in it. Where do you want to go?"

Some of the students were hoping to enter the high school completion program offered through FTI. Students from 29 nationalities have completed the ESL program, Stohlman said, and gone on to perform as honor students in the high school program, to complete an FTI two-year vocational program, to join the Army, or to work in local businesses and industries.

Not all foreign-born spouses need formal education beyond the language instruction, Tilley said. "Some are very well educated, and have been highly efficient in their own countries. All they need is help with the language."

He cited a recent example of an Army wife who was a paralegal specialist in Honduras. Since she could speak no English, she was virtually unemployable -- even as a dishwasher -- in the Fayetteville

ACS generated help from a number of sources, including the ESL program, and was instrumental in finding the woman a job, Tilley said.

Highly motivated ESL classes meet five mornings a week at the Methodist

College building in the COSCOM area (Building Number 31-10); or three evenings a week -- Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday -- at Spring Lake High School in Spring Lake, or at Albritton

Middle School on Fort Bragg. A high degree of motivation is required to successfully complete the advanced ESL program, Stohlman said. Several of her students work night shifts that end at 2:00 or 3:00

wives to keep attending. "My husband gets me up and makes me come to school," Song Veal said with a laugh.

ACS social worker Tilley said that arrangements are being paid to pay the child care fees for any Army wife enrolled in the ESL program.

The agency also is setting up an outreach program using a bus that could circulate among the Fort Bragg housing areas, and perhaps some off-post neighborhoods, to provide individual assistance to foreignborn wives.

Child rearing differs

For instance, "Child rearing is very different in the U.S. than it is in many countries," Tilley explained. "Quite severe corporal punishment may be acceptable where she came from."

The outreach program using the bus could address such issues. "A similar program is in effect at Fort Hood, in Texas," Tilley said. "They've found it to be very effective."

Army Community Services at posts throughout Korea has a "culturization" program, Tilley said. When the Army learns that a soldier plans to marry a Korean, the couple is asked to attend sessions that explain American culture to the dependent, and Korean culture to the soldier.

"We hope to follow up with a continuation of that program here," Tilley said.

And there is no doubt that such a service is needed, he continued. "Three-fourths of our single people get sent overseas," he said, "half of them to Korea. A lot of them bring back wives. Sixty percent of the foreign-born Army spouses are Korean.'


Tilley said that without a knowledge of English and without help from the community, such wives can easily become prisoners in their own

home. "We're looking for volunteers who can help prevent that from happening," he







Psychic To Teach Course In Parapsychology At FTI

better than others. But we consciously and respectfully (if we're smart) use electricity, whereas psychic "power" scares us some because it springs from the subconscious.

When you dream, you're having a perfectly natural psychic experience. When you experience a sense of deja vu, or "sense" something's going to happen and it does, you've been on the receiving end of mental telepathy - ESP - or indulging in a little precognition, says Sammye. It might seem strange, because parapsychology is still not fully understood. Scientists are working on that, along with practicing parapsychologists like Sammye.

FTI Takes Step To Fund Expansion

The Fayetteville Technical Institute Board of Trustees on Monday took the first step toward funding a \$14 million improvement plan, announced in July, to increase the institute's size by 65 percent by 1990.

The board gave unanimous approval to a capital improvement needs survey, which FTI President R. Craig Allen said will "be the basis for our (capital improvements) request from the state General Assembly for next year." Allen also said FTI officials soon will begin talks with Cumberland County commissioners "to see if there is any possibility of getting the kind of money we're talking about."

Allen said the talks with commissioners will come before the next session of the General

Assembly, which begins in February. A capital improvement needs survey is developed annually by FTI officials for the State Board of Community Colleges but needed

approval of the board of trustees this year

because it will be the used in the funding

The long-range plan would add four buildings or nearly 200,000 square feet of space to FTI's 309,426 square feet. FTI already is the largest

technical institute in the state. The needs survey approved Monday includes only the portions of the plan expected to need funding during the next fiscal year completion of a \$3 million student activities center, addition of parking space, equipment and personnel and possibly some ren-

The board on Monday approved a construction contract with McMillan & McMillan Construction Co. of Fayetteville for the center, for which FTI already has received \$1 million from the state General Assembly. The board also voted to pay the construction firm \$3,170 for preliminary work.

The long-range plan also calls for building a vocational building in 1986-87, a general classroom building in 1987-88 and an adult

education center in 1988-89. For the overall project, the long-range plan estimated capital outlay needs in excess of \$6 million each from the state and county. The construction schedule, the plan says, "is contingent upon

allocation of funds.' FTI officials have said that county funding would likely come from a bond issue. Allen declined to say how much FTI will ask from the county for the next fiscal year.

The long-range plan said that "(FTI) should be near the top of the list to receive state capital outlay money" because of its need. FTI officials said the current building space at FTI represents less than 50 percent of that required by the Department of Community Colleges for an institution of FTI's size, and that FTI will need the four buildings before 1990 "just to meet needs."

Also on Monday, the board approved 21 people as members of the FTI Foundation Board of Directors.







Concert Clarinetist Mario Hunter Began Playing On A Wrong Note

For Clarinetist Mario Hunter there's nothing more exciting than a smile and a warm handshake after a performance. "To me that beats playing in Carnegie Hall or being on 'Solid Gold,' " he said with

Hunter, visiting artist at Beaufort Community College in Washington, N.C., will have a chance to play music that makes Fayetteville-area residents smile at 3 p.m. Sunday when he performs in a free concert at the Spring Lake Town Hall on Ruth Street. The concert is part of the Visiting Artists Program, a project of the N.C. Arts Council and the N.C. Department of Community Colleges, sponsored locally by the Arts Council of Fayetteville/Cumberland County, Fayetteville Technical Institute and the Spring Lake Parks and Recreation Department.

Hunter will be accompanied by pianist Jane Weeks Townsend of Fayetteville, director of the Community Music Program at Methodist College. The Hunter-Townsend program includes selections by Mozart, Ravel, Von Weber, Debussy and Scott Joplin. They will be joined on the program by Fayetteville

mezzo soprano Janice Funk, accompanied by Fayetteville Symphony Orchestra Director Harlan Duenow on piano. A Greensboro native, Hunter, 26, has two music degrees and has toured Europe as a musician, but he

started his career on a flat note. Like many parents, Hunters' introduced him to music as a child. "My grandfather was the musician of note in my family. He was choral director for a prominent church

group in Wilmington, and my mother plays piano and sings in the church choir at St. James Presbyterian in Greensboro," he said in a telephone interview. When Hunter was 8 years old, his parents brought home a catalog of woodwind instruments and

fascinated by its shiny keys looking at it in the catalog. I wanted to play it desperately, but I was too small, even up on a stool," he said. He settled for the clarinet, and hated it. "I wanted to be outside playing football and baseball, not trying to play an instrument that

told him to pick one. He chose the bassoon. "I was

squawked," he said. The clarinet is a difficult instrument for beginners because its mechanical makeup allows for embarrassing squawks and squeaks, according to Hunter. "I really detested the instrument and the whole

thought of becoming a musician," he said. As much as he hated music, his friend Andre Cameron, who has since played with the La Scala Orchestra in Milan, Italy, loved it.

"Andre found out I had an instrument and was weekends," Hunter said.

It was Cameron who suggested that Hunter try out for the Greensboro Youth Orchestra. At the time, it seemed like a horrible idea, Hunter said. "After all, it

would cut into my sports time "I played a horrendous audition of music with notes I had no idea existed," Hunter said. But during breaks between auditions he noticed that the young people rehearsing were having fun. "It was live, and it sounded beautiful," he said.

"It was the first time I have ever heard groups of musicians playing together, live. The idea of ensemble and the intensity of sound was overpowering. Of course I didn't make it, but I came back to rehearsals every week until I literally begged myself into the

After much pestering, youth-orchestra conductor Raymond Gariglio gave Hunter a chance. "He gave me the music and told me to play only when it said 'loud'," Hunter said, laughing. "I was ecstatic because I got to be a part of this group. I had never experienced anything like it in my life.'

Suddenly, the despised clarinet was an obsession. The next year, Hunter auditioned for the orchestra and was appointed first-chair clarinet. In the 11th grade, Hunter was accepted by the North Carolina School of the Performing Arts in Winston-Salem and became principal clarinetist in its

The summer after he graduated from high school, Hunter toured Europe with the International Festival Orchestra. "That did it," he said. "I had a chance to share artistic ideas with others and began to get in touch with the aesthetics of music. I decided then to


He attended the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music for a year before returning to the North Carolina School of the Performing Arts where he earned a

bachelor's of music in clarinet performance in 1980. In 1982 he earned a master's degree in music from the University of Michigan, where he was put on fellowship to play co-principal clarinet with the Interlochen Sinfonietta Orchestra at the National

Music Camp in Interlochen, Mich. "That fellowship was a very prestigous award. I got a chance to play in master classes for some of the greatest clarinetists in the world," he said, naming Richard Stoltzman and Anthony Gigliotti.

Hunter returned to Greensboro and, for a time, managed a chamber-music organization called the Ariel Wind Trio, "I had a great time traveling around the state playing at weddings and country clubs, but I also got to see what it was like to support yourself as a musician. It didn't pay the bills, so I had to start thinking about the future, and income.

The Flip Side

Commercial Artists Show Diversity In 'Aside From The Boards' Exhibit

A Review

Commercial artists do many different things. Some are strictly designers while others sit all day to produce intricate drawings to perfection. Some work with type or photographs only; others do all these things and more.

Wild imaginations characterize some artists while others skillfully use someone else's ideas to fit their

The amazing diversity of local commercial artists is illustrated in "Aside From the Boards," now on view in the Arsenal House Gallery in an exhibit sponsored by the Arts Council of Fayetteville/Cumberland

The 28 pieces of work by 11 artists range from wildly creative to mundane and run the gamut in skill from ultra-polished to a little ragged. But it is definitely worthwhile viewing. And a few of the pieces are for sale.

The star of the show is Fayetteville Technical Institute art teacher Raymond Perlman. He shows his painting skill in a watercolor of boats along the Morocco coast colorfully rendered in dense colors. Another one of his works is a warm-colored

serigraph of a harbor scene at Fisherman's Wharf in San Francisco. The same medium was used in "Scorpio," a portrait of a young girl with flyaway hair stretched out on a multi-colored Oriental rug. It was taken from a color slide of the artist's daughter who was born under the sign of Scorpio. The flat patterns in rich colors are set off by a metallic gold. A fourth serigraph print, titled "Mining Town," uses

abstract patterns of earth-colored rolling hills contrasted by insets of realistic trees and houses. Greg Hathaway of Greg Hathaway Graphic Design exhibits a stunning abstract piece painted in luma dye and hand embossed. Surrounded by a rust-colored border, the round shape suggests a moon with a sun-yellow, round shape inside. It is airbrushed in

colors fading from indigo blue to light sienna. Hathaway calls it "Fraud II" because it seems to be an etching, but it's actually a one-of-a-kind painting. In another work, Hathaway used tiny dots of magic marker to render a pleasantly loose drawing of a

"Beauty and the Beast" is one of the more innovative works. The large mixed-media painting by Fayetteville Publishing Co. artist Mark Iffert shows a large, beady-eyed white rat peering menacingly across a wall filled with graffiti. On the other side of the canvas is a perfectly proportioned female figure staring out of the canvas with vacant eyes. It is set against a dirty, smoked-filled skyline. "Nuke Russia," "Chico Was Here," girls' names and some common obscenities are samples of the graffiti

"It's a question," says Iffert with a mischievous smile. "Which is the beauty and which is the beast?" The setting of the piece is his former home, Gary, Ind., he says, and in it he worked out some personal frustrations. Like his "Pink Marble," it is loaded with symbolism such as an eye in the sky, giant mushrooms and a nude female figure clawing the bank of an abyss.

In "Frustrations of Leonardo," a rapidiograph drawing of a bearded man sitting on a stone, Iffert



Reading, Writing **And Retail**

The 15 students in Suzannah Tucker's Douglas Byrd Senior High School classroom are discussing horizontal and vertical lines, but this isn't a geometry class. The pupils are learning what styles of clothing best suit various body shapes - knowledge that will help them in the world of fashion merchandising.

Tucker and Joann Pearce are teacher-coordinators at Byrd in the marketing and distributive education (MDE) program, in which students gain on-the-job as well as classroom training.

Pam Lineberger, the manager of D.A. Kellv's at Cross Creek Mall, believes so strongly in providing students on-the-job experience that she has hired two MDE students to work in her clothing store. And why shouldn't she? The 1979 graduate of

Douglas Byrd is a product of the cooperative training program. "Everything they've done in class, they get to physically do here," said Lineberger, who holds a college degree in home economics. "I was really

interested in fabrics and the clothing area, and I've been in retail since high school." Today marks the beginning of National Vocational Education Week. To coincide with this observance, the National Distributive Education Clubs of America (DECA) has declared this DECA Week, using the

theme "Creating partners for excellence." In MDE an agreement must be signed by the student, employer, parents and school coordinator — a cooperative effort. Should a problem arise on the job, the employer talks with the coordinator, who will work with the student to improve the performance.

Lynn Jernigan, the district store supervisor for Winn Dixie, has served on the county's MDE advisory committee for six years. "Most of our managers, I'd say 75 percent, come from this program," he said from the office of the Hope Mills store. "We can start in-training early, and certainly when they finish school they are ready for a position.

"They get a taste of the grocery business early and can decide if they want to settle down in it.'

To some students the program is a way to find a job - an aspect the coordinators have accepted with the justification that the students are also earning a grade while they work. One of the rules of the program prohibits a student from working if he was absent from school that day.

Robert Lundberg, a Byrd junior who works at J.C. Penney, had never considered merchandising as a career; he wants to join the military. "My main reason for joining was to get a job. I never thought of

Nonetheless, he said, he has developed marketable skills, which are tested on the job and in class, and is becoming more independent.

The program is for any student, Jernigan said, "who wants to start out early in life - to find out early if that's what he wants.' Brenda Strickland, a senior at Douglas Byrd, wants

to study fashion merchandising and marketing in college next year. To prepare for her future, she is working in the accessories department part time at J.C. Penney at Cross Creek Mall.

every nine weeks. In the marketing classroom, the students cover sections on job seeking, survival skills, private enterprise, selling and promotion.

Tucker and Pearce see increased self-esteem in the students as they begin earning their own money, many

for the first time. Last school year about \$850,000 was earned by 247 cooperative marketing students in Cumberland County. That's money reinvested into the county's economy to make car payments, buy clothes and establish some independence from Mom and Dad. Students interested in vocational education pro-

grams must file an application with the county in the spring for the next fall's program. Those wishing to students are in class until lunchtime, then leave to work in retail - marketing, fashion or merchandising - are forwarded to the MDE coordinatior at the respective high school.

The career objective of the student is the key to which program the student will be placed.

program are numerous. Students have graduated from high school and entered the job market, later to become managers of the businesses. Others, like Lineberger, worked to pay college expenses and then remained in the industry.

Lisa Hood, a senior at Douglas Byrd, is employed at Winn Dixie in Hope Mills. She was working at the grocery store before joining the MDE program. But her attitude toward the job, she said, has improved since participating in the class. "You learn situations in class and when you are faced with it on the job you are better able to handle it," she said.

In January, DECA held its District 4-A Competitive Event Conference at Fayetteville Technical Institute Terry Sanford, E.E. Smith and all six county high schools participated.

The winners, including Hood, from this event will compete in Asheville for state titles in March. Written and performance skills are judged in the various categories. For her performance, Hood was asked to sell a customer on the idea of buying a fruit drink over

While there are monetary benefits to working part time during school, there are also sacrifices. "Because they are in retail, they are working when their other friends are out playing," said Jernigan. Their peers may be envious of the students who leave school early, but Hood said, "They don't think about the work part of it?"

There's also the MDE students' lack of time to participate in other school activities. "They work hard," said Jernigan. "And the people of Cumberland County and all the merchants ought to



Lopping Or Chopping, Rose Pruning Is Thorny Work

The first warm days of late winter can bring fear and trembling to the grower of roses, for it is time to perform the annual rites of pruning.

Whether one lops, chops, crops or simply snips, rose pruning is a thorny project. But with the right tools and a pair of sturdy leather an abundance of long-stemmed roses, if bushes are

given reasonable care. The first task is to select good, sharp tools. Pruning shears of the type held in one hand can do most of the work. Select shears with cutting blades that cross. Don't use the types that have one flat surface upon which a cutting blade rests. This type of tool tends to mash canes rather than cut them cleanly. Such contraptions also result in straight, rather than the desired slanting cuts across the stems.

Large, old canes that appear to be losing vigor may need to be cut with long-handled loppers. Don't be tempted to wear shorts, even if the day is warm. Wear jeans. Denim helps protect legs from

The first cuts should be made to shorten long canes topped by many small, branched shoots. Next, remove all lower spindly growth, leaving the two to four most vigorous canes. Finally, cut the two to four strong canes back to within 8 to 20 inches of the ground. Be sure to cut back all diseased and cold-damaged canes gloves, anyone can do a pruning job that will produce to healthy tissue, even if that means cutting out a cane entirely. Diseased canes will produce inferior growth

and flowers. Cutting the canes short will result in fewer but larger flowers on longer stems. Taller pruning will result in more, smaller flowers. But pruning high also allows the plant to retain vigor by making more

The final cuts should all be made just above buds that face to the outside of the plant. This will produce open growth, allow more light to reach leaves, and result in more flowers. Cutting to an inward-facing bud will result in stems growing into each other and Wear muleskin or suede gloves and long sleeves. creating a mass of twiggy growth on the interior of the

Further pruning is needed only to head back dead blooms throughout the season and to remove ungainly shoots or diseased growth. Sharp scissors may

accomplish most of this work. For readers who remain uncertain about how to prune, there is help. The Fayetteville Rose Society offers an annual clinic



Funding For Proposed FTI Expansion Discussed

By JOHN J. MOSER

Fayetteville Technical Institute officials received a "receptive" response from county and state officials regarding funding a proposed \$18.6 million expansion at the school, FTI President R. Craig Allen told the institute's board of trustees Monday.

He said members of the FTI executive committee recently met with county commissioners and state legislators concerning funds for the project, which would increase the institution's size by 65 percent by

"I thought they were very good meetings," Allen said. "We told them what we visualized as our needs in the next several years and asked, basically, that as they plan for the county to remember that we are

The plan would add four buildings or nearly 200,000 square feet of space to FTI's 309,426 square feet. FTI lready is the largest technical institution in the state. "Presentation of Major Needs," prepared for county and state officials, says that 58 percent of the

departments (at FTI) report inadequate facilities. The report, noting that no major building projects will be completed (this year), stated that "this is a problem that only time and considerable financial resources for capital building projects can remedy." The document updated a five-year, long-range plan released by FTI officials last July.

In addition to the buildings, which would cost \$11.9 million, the updated plan calls for \$4.4 million in additions and renovations, \$2.1 million in curricula materials and \$150,000 for additional parking space. On Monday, the board was shown preliminary plans for the first building in the expansion — a student development center for which construction will begin in December. FTI already has received \$1 million from the state General Assembly for the center and expects to receive the remaining \$2 million in the coming biennium, Allen said. In addition, FTI has about \$421,000 available for construction, he said. If the money does not come as expected, Allen said



The Gift Is Free, But Precious

Blood Donors Keep A Lifeline Flowing

By MARY GREENE

They call it the gift of life. Yet most donors never know who is helped by their precious pint of red blood cells, plasma and

platelets. They never know, and it doesn't matter to them. Some willingly roll up their sleeve every eight weeks - as frequently as they're allowed. Less zealous donors give blood when there's a call out for their type or when it's convenient for them. But they're all unselfish - they don't get paid for their time or their blood - yet most keep coming back to give.

And when asked why, most just shrug their shoulders. "No particular reason," said Kerry Dodson, 20. "Family tradition, I guess."

to get them to." The Blood Assurance Plan and the Red Cross operate under different systems, but their goal is the same: to provide muchneeded blood for the people of


Cumberland County. The BAP, incorporated in 1963, recruits donors for the Cape Fear Valley Medical Center blood bank. The Cape Fear Valley blood bank also supplies blood to Highsmith-Rainey Memorial Hospital and the Veteran's Administration Hospital in Fayette-

Under the BAP membership plan, if one member of a family donates blood to BAP at least once a year, the family is covered for all its blood needs. John Strickland, blood bank supervisor at Cape Fear Valley

Medical Center, said that when a family member receives BAP blood, he will only have to pay for the processing and administrative costs of \$30 per unit. If a patient is not a member of the BAP, he must have friends or relatives donate to the program in his name to replace the blood he receives or pay a replacement fee - \$32 at Cape Fear Valley -

in addition to the processing and administrative fee. The Red Cross, which began holding blood drives in Cumberland County in 1983, does not operate on a membership basis. The Red Cross does not charge a fee for its blood, but it does charge a processing and administrative fee. "The Red Cross philosophy is that it (providing blood) is a community responsibility - not the individual's responsibility, or the family's responsibility," said Joel Jenkins

But Strickland said while people can request Red Cross blood and be charged the Red Cross processing fee of about \$50 per unit rather than the BAP charges, they actually will receive BAP blood. "It's just a paper transaction," Strickland said. Today, he said, the only Red Cross blood used in Cumberland County is in the form of plasma proteins, such as serum albumin and gamma globulin. Breaking down the plasma is a sophisticated process for which the blood bank is not equipped. But when the Red Cross made the decision to start collecting blood in Cumberland County, it was supplying more than plasma

proteins - it was also supplying

platelets each month. "At that

time, our studies were showing

an increasing number of units of

that we were providing a large chunk of the blood component parts being used in Cumberland County," Jenkins said. "We decided that it was time for the Red Cross to start soliciting

blood donors locally.' The Cape Fear Valley blood bank started producing its own platelets in June 1983 after it signed a contract with Highsmith-Rainey to supply it

with blood. When asked if it was less expensive to manufacture platelets at the blood bank than to get them from the Red Cross, Strickland said, "The Red Cross makes a good profit on these things - I shouldn't say the hospital is making a profit on them now — but the hospital gets the money now.'

He said the biggest advantage to the program is that physicians - and their patients - don't have to wait for blood to be shipped in from another city's blood bank.

But for most donors, all that matters is helping someone whether it's with red cells, platelets, plasma or plasma

"The needs are growing with the population," Jenkins said. "More importantly, with the advent of the more sophisticated medical procedures coming into Cumberland County - heart operations, cancer treatments we're requiring more specialized blood products. We're seeing a greater need for and greater use of blood in Cumberland County." And donors are meeting that need. The BAP, which collected

3,750 units of blood in 1979, collected 7,900 units in 1984. "The donors are so important," said Mary Fisher, executive secretary for BAP. "If we tell them it's critically needed, they're over here (at the hospital's blood bank). There's no way we could do it without that fantastic support."

While some people are wary of donating blood since the AIDS scare, Ms. Fisher and Strickland said that's an unfounded fear. "It's impossible to get AIDS from donating blood by the practices we use," Strickland





FTI Seeks 33 Percent Hike In County Funding

Fayetteville Technical Institute trustees on Monday adopted a \$24,386,197 budget for 1985-86 that calls for \$3,179,832 in county funding, a 33 percent increase over last year's \$2,126,120.

Capital outlay accounts for most of the increase, rising from last year's \$224,494 to the current request for \$1,084,000. Of that amount, \$750,000 is earmarked for a contingency fund to help pay for a building program in the event state funds are unavailable. In July, 1983, FTI officials

unveiled a five-year expansion plan expected to cost \$18.6 million. Included were four buildings that would add nearly 200,000 square feet of space to the institute's completion, and that amount is current 209,426 square feet.

The first of those buildings proposed for construction is a student development center, on which construction is scheduled to begin in December.

Dr. Craig Allen, FTI president, said Monday the General Assembly allocated \$1 million in construction funds last session, "and we are hoping for \$2 million

But Cumberland County Commissioners were asked to allocate \$750,000 this year and next as contingency funds for the center's reflected in FTI's budget approved

Allen said the new student development building would house the school's food service, book store, a quiet study area, a board room and multi-purpose space. Also included would be offices for student counseling, job placement, recruitment and financial aid.

"Then we can turn the space

where these facilities are located back to classrooms," Allen said. He said the cafeteria now takes up part of the library space, and students have no place to study between classes except on the

The capital outlay request also includes \$8,000 for equipment. The remainder is for building alterations and additions (\$100,000) and site improvements and grading (\$227,000).

Major increases in the current

1984-85 - are in operations and maintenance. The local portion of the budget is subject to approval by County Commissioners. State funding is allocated through the legislature and the N.C. Department of

Community Colleges.

In other business Monday, the trustees adopted a policy forbidding the reproduction of copyrighted computer software by students or employees except in cases of licensed agreement. A U.S. Copyright Law makes offendexpense portion of the budget - ers subject to civil damages of approximately 10 percent over \$50,000 or more and criminal

penalties of fines and imprisonment, FTI officials say.

Trustees also voted to drop two programs including dental laboratory technology and agricultural business technology. The dental lab program, though approved earlier, was never started because the \$100,000 needed to equip the laboratory was not available.

FTI Asks For 33 Percent County Funding Increase

A \$24.3 million 1985-86 budget approved by the Favetteville Technical Institute Board of Trustees Monday asks for a more than \$1 million hike in county funding over last year's budget.

A large part of the 33 percent rise in the proposed \$3,179,832 in county funding is \$1.085 million for capital outlay, said Bob Carter, FTI's vice president for fiscal affairs. Of that money, \$750,000 is contingency funding to go toward a \$3 million student development center

if funding is not obtained from the state. The budget asks for about a 10 percent increase in current expense funding from the county - \$2,094,832, up \$193,206 from last year - to cover a 5 percent center. Last year the school got \$1 million for the ground improvements and \$8,000 for equipment.

and equipment, said Carter,

FTI is also asking \$15,466,832 for current expense funding from the state Department of Community Colleges. All requests are tentative upon approval by Cumberland County commissioners and the Department of Community Colleges for each body's share of the budget. The total budget is \$24,386,197.





FTI-Methodist Agreement Aids Transfers

By CHRIS NELSON

A new program at Fayetteville Technical Institute this fall may allow general education students there to earn simultaneous credit at Methodist College.

The FTI Board of Trustees Monday unanimously approved the program allowing students to have their general education courses recorded on a transcript from Methodist, With the Methodist transcript, general education credit earned at FTI will be more easily transferred to four-year institutions, FTI

The program, which must be approved by the state Department of Community Colleges. is optional and will have to be requested by the student at the start of general education studies at FTI. There is no extra cost to the student, said FTI spokesman Barbara

Copeland said FTI students in non-technical

curricula have had trouble transferring credit to four-year universities. Credits from Methodist College, a private four-year institution.

transfer more easily, she said. The transfer option includes 65 semesterhours of general education classes such as English composition and literature survey courses, history, biology, and art and music appreciation. Methodist College instructors will teach classes FTI has no instructors for.

Each student's record will contain transcripts from both FTI and Methodist College with the general education courses credited, said Copeland.

FTI has transfer agreements with several universities, said Copeland, and 14 technical institutes in the state have programs similar to the Methodist College agreement.

Copeland said FTI tried to get the transcript program initiated with Fayetteville State University, but FSU declined, Instead, FSU will continue to accept general education

credits from FTI toward a four year degree

In other business Monday, FTI President Craig Allen told trustees the school will probably not get \$750,000 in capital improvement funds requested from the county. Allen said County Manager Cliff Strassenburg told him the cost of city-county school merger and other request outweigh FTI's request. The school's current expense request for 1985-86 of \$2.09 million will probably be granted, he said. The \$750,000, out of a request for \$1.08 million, was intended to begin a \$3 million student development center - one of several buildings proposed in an \$18.6 million expansion plan.

The school has already received \$1 million toward the center from the General Assembly and is "still looking very hard to the state" for another \$2 million, said Allen. Construction is

to begin by the end of this year.
A study last year showed FTI has less than 50 percent of the building space required for a technical school with its enrollment 5-21-85 F.O.

County Expected To Turn Down FTI On Building Fund

Fayetteville Technical Institute's Board of Trustees were told Monday not to expect \$750,000 in county funds requested for 1985-86 capital projects, but were given better news concerning state and federal funds.

FTI officials also announced Monday that they will form a contractual arrangement which would allow students to gain credit at Methodist College for FTI general education courses and would make it easier to transfer FTI credits to other four-year colleges and universities.

The program, which will require some of the FTI courses to be taught by Methodist instructors, was given unanimous approval by the board of trustees. Though aproval must come from the state Department of Community Colleges, FTI hopes to institute the program next fall, starting with about 14 courses, officials said.

The county money was to be the first installment of a contingency fund used to pay for a \$3 million student development center, on which construction is scheduled to begin in December. FTI already has received \$1 million for the center from the state General Assembly and expects to receive the remaining funds in the coming biennium. But the county money would have allowed FTI to continue constructing the center in phases if the state money did not

come as expected. FTI President R. Craig Allen quoted Cumberland County Manager Cliff Strassenburg as telling him the county "didn't expect such a (large) funding need for the (scheduled city-county) school merger."

"But we are still looking very hard to the state for that \$2 million," Allen said.

Better news in regards to funding came when Allen told the trustees that \$133,000 in federal and state grants recently had been received by FTI.

Allen said that a \$93,000 in federal funds were received earlier this month as the third installment in a five-year cooperative assistance grant and that the North Carolina Department of Community Colleges has approved a \$40,000 grant - the largest amount allowable - for FTI's automotive mechanics program.

Under the course transfer arrangement, students taking general education classes at FTI could opt, for no additional cost, to have credits count toward a transcript from Methodist College, FTI officials said.

The program would allow FTI students to accumulate credits for transfer into a four-year program at Methodist or other four-year institutions.

Transferring FTI general education credits has been difficult because some schools would not accept credits for non-technical studies taken at a technical school, FTI spokeswoman Barbara Copeland said. Fourteen other technical institutes across the state already have such transfer

programs. FTI has an agreement with Fayetteville State University which allows such credits to be accepted there, but FSU declined Allen also said Strassenburg told to extend the program to him that FTI's current expense transcripts for use at other



Fellows has worked for a number of local radio stations since graduating from FTI and now owns his own media marketing firm here.



Commissioners Question School **Budget Request**

By BOB FENTRESS

The Cumberland County Board of Commissioners took a hard line on school merger funding Monday, deciding at a budget workshop meeting to seek explanation from school officials on why they need a 31.3 percent funding increase for the 1985-86 fiscal year.

"Did school officials go over the budget line by line?" Commissioner Virginia Thompson Oliver asked. "I'd like to know specifically what the requests are for; (how much) is for administration to run the two systems.'

Commissioners, County Manager Cliff Strassenburg and Finance Director John Nalepa met in a three-hour workshop session mentary Schoool). Monday to go over the proposed \$84 million 1985-86 county budget item by item. Education, a proposal for an additional county attorney and requests for new library positions provoked the most discussion.

Commissioners agreed after some discussion to ask school officials at a scheduled meeting on Wednesday for more information on their budget request. "It's been a concern of mine," Mary McAllister said of the school

seriously there's been any delving (into the budget by the board)."

The interim school board requested a 31.3 percent increase in local monies to fund the first year of city-county school merger. That figure included \$32.5 million in local current expenses and \$4.3 million in capital outlay.

But the proposed county budget recommends only a 13 percent increase in local current expenses. with \$2.2 million of the \$19,135,346 figure to replace city school district taxes lost with merger. The budget recommends \$1.15 million for regular capital outlay, plus \$1.78 million for the new Loyd E. Auman Elementary School (to replace the old Seventy-First Ele-

A \$650,000 contingency fund is also recommended for the schools to match anticipated state salary increases for locally paid employees.

Interim School Board Moving To County

By JOHN J. MOSER

Cumberland County school officials on Wednesday voted to vacate the city schools' administrative buildings after July 1. The board also let \$2.65 million in contracts to build an elementary school which had been projected to cost \$3.25 million.

The county Interim Board of Education voted unanimously to use the present county Board of Education buildings and the county office building annex along U.S. 301 as the base of operations for the merged city-county school administration. That will free the city school system's Neill A. Currie building and Honeycutt Center, both along Hull Road. Merged system Superintendent Jack Britt said that

that "we would certainly hope the schools would derive some compensation for them." Britt confirmed that there has been discussions about the buildings being used by Fayetteville Technical Institute, but he said that "would be up to the county to decide."

Britt told the board that the merged system has been promised three more offices in the annex building, which also houses county Agricultural Extension Service, but that space "will be real

A report last year said that 95 of FTI's 193 offices are located in unsuitable areas that are meant to be short-term solutions to space shortages. The city

the buildings could be turned over to the county, but school buildings, located next to FTI, contain 33,000 square feet of space.

> In a separate meeting, the county Board of Education voted to accept bids totaling \$2,650,265 for construction of the proposed Loyd E. Auman Elementay School in the Seventy-First area. Projected cost of the building had been \$3,256,000.

Cumberland County Sets Budget Hearing Tonight

The Cumberland County Board of Commissioners is scheduled to hold a public hearing tonight on the proposed \$83 million fiscal 1986 budget that includes no tax increase and holds school expenses at current operating levels.

The recommended budget, which County Manager Cliff Strassenburg describes as "tight," would maintain the current property tax rate of 85 cents per \$100 of

property valuation. The proposal represents a \$5.8 million or 7.5 percent increase over this year's \$77.2 million spending plan. The commissioners must adopt a budget by July 1. Tonight's public hearing begins at 7:30 in the Commissioners' Room on the first floor of the Cumberland County

Courthouse. The 1985-86 budget is divided into a two parts: a \$67.2 million

general fund and a \$22.8 million separate fund earmarked for projects and programs. Strassenburg projects general

fund revenues to be \$61.2 million next year, an increase of 6 percent over current receipts. To balance the budget, he recommends a \$6 million appropriation from the fund reserve.

And if the federal revenue sharing program is eliminated after the first quarter of the fiscal year, which now seems unlikely, Strassenburg recommends drawing another \$2.7 million from county reserves. The county receives about \$4 million annually in

revenue sharing funds. The recommended budget contains \$1.8 million for the county's 1,350 employees to receive 5 percent raises. That amount also includes funds for up to half the employees to get 5 percent merit pay increases. A study by the state Department of the Treasurer's Local Government Commission, recommends increasing the percentage of employees eligible for merit raises from the current 25 percent to help reduce employee

Also recommended is hiring 51 employees, including 10 workers for the county property revaluation project, nine social service staff, two Rescue Squad emergency medical technicians, four Health Department workers and an additional assistant county attorney. Also recommended is \$37,000 to purchase \$1 million of liability insurance because of concern over the recent \$900,000 judgment against the city of Fayetteville in a police brutality case.

Of the proposed budget, the largest amount is for education. The county manager recommends allocating \$19.6 million to the merged city-county system including \$1.7 million for con-

struction of the Lloyd E. Auman Elementary School and \$2,2 million to replace funds lost when the city's special schools tax is discontinued with the merger. The school systems are scheduled to merge July 1.

Strassenburg's proposal represents a 13 percent increase over what the county gave the systems to operate separately in 1984-85, but no increase in the school systems' current operating budget. The interim school board re-

quested \$27.5 million. Ralph Barber, chairman of the interim school board's budget committee, said the merged system needs next year a \$3 million increase for ongoing budget expenditures and \$3.2 million to equate programs in the city and county systems. That would include \$997,000 to hire 47 teachers to reduce elementary combination classes and expand programs in the county, \$420,000 to equalize teacher salary supplements and \$285,000 to fund a 5 percent salary increase given but not funded last

In another education recommendation, Strassenburg proposed that Fayetteville Technical Institute receive \$1.7 million for operating expenses from the county and \$225,000 for capital outlay. That is \$930,000 less that FTI officials requested.

Capital improvement projects total \$7.3 million including \$1.9 million for completion of the Little Rockfish interceptor which revenue sources, Strassenburg extends sewerage lines to the western portion of the county; The proposed budget contains a \$826,945 to complete construction

Senate OKs \$2 Million For FTI

RALEIGH - The state Senate on Monday approved \$2 million for Fayetteville Technical Institute, the second largest share of \$32.8 million worth of capital improvements slated for the state's community and technical colleges.

The largest share, \$3 million, went to the Asheville-Buncombe Technical Institute. Other schools received amounts ranging from \$75,000 for Rockingham Community College to \$1.5 million for College of the Albemarle.

The General Assembly allocated FTI \$1 million in construction funds last session for a proposed student development the \$2 million approved Monday will ensure completion of the center, FTI president Dr. Craig Allen said.

The new student development center will house the school's food service, book store, a study area, security offices, a board room and multi-purpose space, according to Allen. The building also will be used to house offices for student admissions, student counseling, job placement, recruitment and financial aid, he said.

The facilities being used for those purposes will be converted back into classrooms, Allen said.

"We're in the process of designing the building," Allen said. "We've got the basic schematics in Raleigh for approval at this particular time."

Bids should be let in December for construction of the center, Allen said. He said construction should begin in the early 1986 and be ready for occupancy in the summer of 1987.

leges approved a \$319.9 million biennial budget Thursday with about \$41.5 million appropriated for seven Cape Fear Region schools for fiscal 1986 plus about \$5.5 million in building funds.

Fayetteville Technical Institute, with the second largest enrollment in the system, was appropriated a \$15,812,153 base budget for 1985-1986 and an additional \$2 million requested for building funds, according to Mark Van Sciver, a spokesman for the board.

The largest base budget went to Central Piedmont Community College in Charlotte, \$21,982,295. Guilford Technical Institute in Jamestown, the third largest technical institute in the state, received an appropriation of \$12,244,309, according to Van Sciver.

The largest building fund appropriation, \$3,001,000, went to Asheville-

The state Board of Community Col- Buncombe Technical Institute in Asheville. The board uses spending formulas to

distribute the funds to the state's 58 institutions, Van Sciver said. Operating expenses are determined to a large extent by full-time enrollment figures, he said. Capital building funds are matching funds, Van Sciver said.

"We took a reduction in our base budget of 4 percent (of what was requested)," Van Sciver said. "The General Assembly reduced our base budget by \$7,274,045, which gave us a base budget of \$249,178,736 for 1985-1986. And for 1986-1987, we started with \$256,882,791, and they will reduce it by \$13,216,156, which will bring the base budget to \$243,666,635 ... bringing us in line with actual enrollments.

"Our full-time enrollment is down and part-time enrollment is up," he said.

The babysitting really wasn't that big a deal to Mrs. Carriger. She had already raised 11 children. Of them, only one son had finished high school and college.

"It's something I would do all over again just for them to get a diploma," said Mrs. Carriger. "I think education is a good thing. I think this country needs reeducation and I'm real proud of what North Carolina has done." Mrs. Carriger said the family was unfamiliar with FTI's high school diploma program until a

friend of Sughrove's told them about it. Though the three sisters had been good students in high school, various family problems kept them from finishing school, said stepfa-

ther Wayne Carriger. He also played a big role in the young women completing school at

"One of the reasons they did this is because they wanted to please him," said Mrs. Carriger. "He's been a real nut on education."

And, yes, he's proud, too. "We all worked together on it," he said. "It's super that they could all do it - and to have the desire to please

"That's why I did it - to please you," said Sughrove. "And I'm going on to please myself." Each of the sisters has plans to

further her education at FTI. Carringer will go into nursing, Sughrove into drafting and Reaser has already started classes toward a

computer programming degree. The three agree it was fun to go back to school, and laugh when they compare it to their earlier days. The trick to going back, they said, is to decide you want it bad enough.

"You can get into a routine of running a house and raising your kids, and a lot of the times the teachers are younger than you. But you have to dedicate yourself and decide you're going to get up every morning," said Carrie.

Fayetteville Technical Institute has turned down a \$67,000 state grant to start a child day center for needy students because it doesn't have room for the center, officials said Monday.

The space which FTI officials expected to use for the center when they applied for the grant last month will - due to a record-high enrollment which surged nearly 13 percent over last year - be used for classrooms, officials said.

"It's certainly a disappointment," said Linwood Powell, FIT president's assistant. "Not a disappointment because we have an increased enrollment, but





Family 'Hunter' Plans To Teach FTI Classes

Company Moves Engineering Division Here

By EDDIE YANDLE

Purolator Products Inc. is transferring its Engineering Division from Rahway, N.J. to Fayetteville - a move that includes about 45 white collar positions, mostly engineers — officials have confirmed.

The new jobs will be phased in at Purolator's Filter Division plant on Natal Road over the next 12-18 months, said company officials. When complete, the move will add \$1.25 million to the Cumberland County

payroll.

The addition of high-paying, white collar jobs was welcomed as a boon for the local economy by Patty Lee, executive director of the Economic Development Division of the Fayetteville Area Chamber of Com-

"We on the economic development board, along with the chamber board ... and county officials are both pleased and excited with Purolator's decision to move its engineering division from New Jersey to Fayetteville," Lee said. "These are high level white collar individuals that

will greatly enhance our corporate citizenship. This decision speaks well of our city, county and its quality of life," she said. The transfers are part of a decision to consolidate the company's manufacturing and engineering offices.

according to Doug Sheeran, who heads Purolator's human resources office at the company's division headquarters in Rahway.

"It was very obvious we needed to get our engineers close to our manufacturers," Sheeran said. This is not the first move of personnel to the Fayetteville plant. Last year, when two of Purolator's plants in Pennsylvania and New Jersey closed, many jobs were created here. Sheeran attributed that switch to the cost effectiveness and quality of worksmanship at

the Fayetteville facility, which employs 960 people. The plant here manufactures nearly 90 percent of Purolator's automotive filters - a major portion of the company's business. Purolator also operates a one-day courier service, and builds radiator caps under its Stant Manufacturing organization, headquartered in Connorsville, Ind.

Both Sheeran and Lee confirmed that while some of the 45 positions will be filled by engineers and technicians transferring from New Jersey, several will

"It's difficult for people to make a major, major move like this," Sheeran said. "We expect a large number of these jobs will be filled from the Fayetteville

That kind of local assistance was a key in the company's decision to pick Fayetteville for the Engineering Division, according to Sneeran, who admitted that Purolator was considering a location in the Research Triangle area.

Sheeran said that after conversations with local officials, they became convinced they could find the people they needed, and at the same time keep their engineering personnel adjacent to each other. The relocation must be done in phases because of

physical restrictions, according to Sheeran. He said the

company is considering either adding on to its existing facility or constructing a separate building.

According to Jim Clark, Purolator's personnel director here, the jobs will be split between product and equipment engineers, along with several technicians and a few clerical posts.

The engineers are charged with designing the products Purolator manufactures. Technicians are then asked to determine if the designed products function properly and if they can be manufactured in an assembly-line setting.

Clark said there is no specific timetable for completing the relocation.

The move also was praised by Thomas Plocinik, senior vice president and general manager of Purolator in New Jersey, who said it was all part of Purolator's sleek new image.

Gift Of Offices To FTI Advances

A committee of the Cumberland County Board of Education on Monday recommended that the former city school administration buildings be declared surplus if temporary space is provided for school programs which need housing.

The vote is the first step in formalizing an agreement under which Fayetteville Technical Institute will be given the buildings by the county, while the county allows the merged system more space in its annex office building

along U.S. 301. FTI has been using 13 rooms in one of the buildings, the Honeycutt Center, since it began classes earlier this month. The FTI Board of Trustees voted to "accept" the center and the Neill Currie building last month, even though a donation was not formally made. School officials said FTI is using the Honeycutt building "on a

County schools Superintendent Jack Britt said that county Manager Cliff Strassenburg is preparing a "memorandum of understanding" on transfer of the buildings, and that the document will be presented, with the school committee's recommendation, at the full board's meeting

Discussions about the buildings have centered on them being given to FTI since the merged Board of Education voted in June to use the county schools office and the annex building for its administration. The county hopes to build a new Agricultural Exposition Hall for the Agricultural Extension Agency which now shares the

In other business, the committee recommended that the Kingsford subdivision, between McPherson Church Road and the All-American Freeway, be moved from the Douglas Byrd High School attendance area to that of Terry Sanford

High School. The move will affect no current

students, Britt said. The area was annexed by the city Board of Education in May at the request of developer Don Broadwell, but final approval of the move rests with the merged board. Though 121 lots in the development have been sold, no students reside in the area, Britt said.

Officials said school enrollment figures show that Terry Sanford is less crowded than Douglas

Britt recommended that the move be approved since "many people bought lots (there) with the assumption of their children going to city schools." But he advised the committee to make part of its recommendation that the move may not be permanent.

Also, the committee recommended that a 2.6-acre tract behind the Cumberland Road School and adjacent to the Borden Heights subdivision be declared surplus. The land has been appraised at \$33,000, Assistant Superintendent for Facilities Management Jerry Wood

Wood said the land was purchased in 1976 as a site for a possible Massey Hill Junior High replacement, but plans for the school were abandoned. Some residents whose homes are adjacent to the lot have expressed interest in buying extensions of their property, Wood said.

In response, he said school officials have appraised individual lots that, depending on their size, would sell for \$1,715 to \$7,500. Wood also said interest has been expressed in building apartments on the land.

Gift Designed To Help FTI 'Talk' With Deaf

By JOHN J. MOSER Delane Lee knows well the difficulties a deaf student encounters

when trying to take classes that are designed for people who can hear. So she tries to lessen those prob-Two years ago, she learned sign language so that she could expand her work at First Baptist Church in

Fayetteville to include deaf students. Later, when she learned about hearing-impaired students at Fayetteville Technical Institute, Ms. Lee used her training to become a classroom interpreter at

And when the Fayetteville Pilot Club, a woman's service organization for which she serves as chairwoman of the deaf awareness committee, decided to give a gift to FTI. Ms. Lee knew exactly what it should be.

The gift was a telecommunication device for the deaf (TDD) - a machine which uses an accoustic coupler to transmit teletypewriter signals over telephone lines. With the machine, a regular telephone can be used to hold conversations with a deaf person who has similar equipment by typing out words which are displayed on a small electronic video screen.

The club presented the machine to FTI officials Wednesday.

'The machine is vital in communicating with the deaf student, especially in the student's home,' Ms. Lee said.

Ms. Lee said an incident last year convinced her that the TDD was a device that FTI needed. She said that, as an interpreter, she was scheduled to work with a deaf student who didn't show up for class. Because FTI did not have the equipment with which to phone the student, it took school officials 90 minutes to find out why the student didn't show - finally sending a neighbor to the student's house.

"And we thought the Pilot Club should be the ones to donate the TDD, because of our work with the deaf," Ms. Lee said.

"We like to serve all students, including the handicapped," said Larry Norris, FTI dean of curriculum instruction. "The TDD will allow latitude for the deaf student, as far as communications with the

school and in programs. Norris said that hearingimpaired students (FTI has three who use interpreters enrolled this quarter) will be instructed in use of the TDD, since experienced operators use a shorthand during conver-

\$150,000 Sought By FTI Foundation

Fayetteville Technical Institute's Foundation on Monday kicked off the first community-based, fundraising drive in the school's history - a week-long campaign which officials said they hope will draw \$150,000 in contributions.

Aimed at 150 area businesses and corporations, the drive is the second of three fund-raisers scheduled this year for the foundation, which was formed late last year after a consulting firm told FTI officials that \$400,000 a year in supplemental funds could be raised at the institute.

An on-campus drive this spring drew 100 percent participation from FTI's faculty and staff raised about \$30,000, said Fayetteville businessman H.D. "Cobby" Reaves Jr., who will serve as chairman of the drive. Later this year, a telephone campaign targeted at "peo- received on-site training by FTI ple who use FTI" will be held, he

"This is the largest and most important" of the fund raisers, Reaves said. "There comes a time

in everyone's life when you have to stop talking and start doing, Reaves told a breakfast gathering held to start the campaign. "And I think that's where we are now. We've talked about where we want the foundation to go."

During the ceremony, Gregg Martin, assistant to the vice president at Holt-Williamson Manufacturing Co. presented a \$5,000 donation from the company.

Foundation Board Chairman David Wilson said "preliminary response" indicates that the drive will "meet and exceed its goal. Everyone to whom we'll be talking has had someone in his life touched

and improved by FTL" FTI Director of Institutional Development Pat Hickmon said that many of the businesses targeted for the campaign have employees who attended FTI or instructors. "We just want to go to people we feel are knowledgeable about FTI and its role in the

Tackling Illiteracy

described the plight of a 36-year-old letter carrier in Minnesota who couldn't read, even though she had graduated from high school years ago. "She got by because she had grown up in the neighborhood, knew where everybody lived, and was helped in sorting the mail by friends in the post office who knew her secret," the article

Unfortunately, her route was changed and, in the words of the article, "the street signs in the new neighborhood might have been apple trees ABE program, and if the experience of the

for all the help they were to her." The woman quickly enrolled at a literacy center, progressed rapidly and soon was thrilled to discover that she could read every street name in her new neighborhood correctly.

There are many more success stories like hers, but unfortunately, we remain a nation plagued by illiteracy. According to the 1980 census more than 22 million Americans lack an eighth grade education. In North Carolina, some 835,000 are in the same boat.

Hundreds of thousands of those can't read, write or compute at all, or else they cannot do those things well enough to avoid embarrassment

and difficulties in our society. .The embarrassments can be bad enough. It is not pleasant to go into a crowded bank and ask a teller to help you fill out a deposit slip. And the difficulties can be downright dangerous: Acting without the knowledge of what a given traffic sign indicates can be dangerous to your health, as

can a dose of medicine from the wrong bottle. Former Gov. Bob Scott, now head of the state community college system, was disappointed that after an all-out drive to recruit functionally illiterate people into the Adult Basic

An article in Reader's Digest this month enrolled only 6 percent of the 835,000 who haven't finished the 8th grade.

Yet things are looking up. In this term Favetteville Technical Institute has enrolled 2,100 citizens and 1,400 foreign-speaking people in the ABE program. They are learning to acquire or improve their reading, writing and math skills not only on the FTI campus, but also in some six or eight centers and in some 150 small organized cells away from the campus.

FTI has just obtained 30 computers for its technical institute in Charlotte is any guide, the students who use the computer will be able to increase their skills much more rapidly than through standard instruction.

This year FTI helped 650 students earn their high school diplomas, and no small number of those began as functionally illiterate students.

Fayetteville's Urban Ministry continues to draw functionally illiterate students to its small though excellent program, in which some 80 students (soon to rise to about 110) are being taught "one on one" by 70 volunteer teachers. The program's director, Mrs. Betty Emerick, says word of mouth and the non-formality of the program eliminate any need for recruiting, which is a difficulty in more formal programs.

Despite difficulties in "outreach," we believe there is room for optimism. The state is pumping more money into this cause; the community colleges and the others have a strong commitment; and innovation is showing its promising head.

If all concerned keep trying and trying hard, North Carolina may yet shed the embarrassment of ranking third in the number of its citizens Education programs in the system, the system without a high school diploma.

FTI Kicks Off Fund Drive

The Fayetteville Technical Institute Foundation this morning kicked off a week-long \$150,000 fund drive with more than a fifth of the goal already met.

'There comes a few times in everyone's life when we have to stop talking and start doing, and I think this is one of those times," H.D. Reaves Jr., chairman of the fund drive, told about 15 foundation members gathered at the school for a breakfast meeting. "All future campaigns of the foundation will be based to some degree on our level of success in this campaign."

During the campaign, foundation board members will visit about 150 individuals in the community and ask them for contributions, Reaves said. "We're simply going to people that we know are favorable toward FTI and that we know will be receptive to our request," he

David Wilson, chairman of the foundation board, said business leaders would be receptive to the drive because the school "offers people in the community the best return on their dollar of anything in the community" and urged foundation members to get to work on the campaign.

"The timing of this particular drive is important," Wilson said. "It's important to get what you're trying to get done this week before the United Way drive gets in full swing" and other fund drives get started.

Many businesses targeted for the campaign have several employees who attended FTI, said Pat Hickmon, executive director of the foundation, FTI instructors have gone into some of the businesses and trained employees also, she said.

Harry Shaw, chairman of the school's board of trustees, said the fund drive was important not only for FTI "but for the whole community of Fayetteville and Cumberland County."

Money raised during the campaign will be used for scholarships, teaching equipment and campus im-provements, Hickmon said. "The FTI foundation is here to assist FTI in any way it can, whether that be public

relations or monetary," she said.

Among the foundation board members attending the breakfast were Tony Corley, plant manager at Monsanto Agricultural Products Company, and Thorton Rose with Adams Real Estate Inc.





Two administration buildings of the former Fayetteville City School system became the property of Favetteville Technical Institute on Tuesday when the merged Cumberland County Board of Education declared the buildings surplus.

The board's unanimous vote ended months of negotiations concerning the buildings, which had been promised to FTI since June when the merged Board of Education voted to use the county schools' office along U.S. 301 as its administrative headquarters.

Discussions about giving up the Neill Currie building and Honeycutt Center, both adjacent to FTI along Hull Road, began more than a year ago. FTI's Board of Trustees in August said it would like to have the buildings, and the institute has used 13 rooms in the attendance area to that of Terry Honeycutt Center on a rental basis Sanford High School.

With Tuesday's vote, the county board added its signatures to a "memorandum of understanding" drawn up by county Manager Cliff Strassenburg. "Once signed, the buildings are given to FTI," schools Superintendent Jack Britt said.

In the agreement, the schools will get more space in the county annex building, also along U.S. 301. The county hopes to have a new Agricultural Exposition Hall built within two years for the Agricultural Extension Agency, which now shares the annex, officials said. The move "will take care of the majority of our administrative

needs," Britt said. The school system also will retain eight offices in the buildings to temporarily house its vocational rehabilitation center. The program now is housed in the county system's Ashley School, but Britt

said that school needs more space for severely handicapped students. The Currie building also houses a diagnostic center which eventually will be moved to Walker-Spivey Elementary School, Britt said.

Another condition of the transfer is that FTI will assume maintenance of a historic one-room schoolhouse between the city build-

Also on Tuesday, the board voted to move the Kingsford Subdivision. between McPherson Church Road and the All-American Freeway. from the Douglas Byrd High School

The vote pleased about 15 residents of the subdivision who attended the meeting with attorney William O. Richardson to support the move. Some of the residents said they had purchased lots in the subdivision because of a vote by the City Board of Education in May to annex the area.

Although the area contains 121 lots, 90 of which have been sold, the move affects "one or two (current students) at the most," Britt said. The city board annexed the area



FTI's New Scholarship **Programs** At \$24,000

By JOHN J. MOSER

An institutional push has brought more than \$24,000 in new scholarship programs to Fayetteville Technical Institute this year, nearly tripling the amount of funds for student aid projects at FTI, officials said. The 30 scholarships established in 1985 have added assistance programs to nine curricula areas at FTI, and has made more than \$18,000 in aid available to students entering any of the institute's fields of study Twenty-one of the new programs do not require its

recipient to enroll in a specific field of study. Prior to 1985, FTI offered 34 scholarships worth \$14,300, according to FTI Director of Institutional Resource Development Pat Hickmon. Those programs covered four subject areas, with \$9,900 in undesignated awards, but half of the scholarships were established by and funded through the state Department of Community Colleges.

"I think we're getting the word out that, even though our tuition isn't as high as UNC or other schools, our students do need financial help," Mrs. Hickmon said "We're all the time expressing need for new scholarships, and it has paid off. FTI President R. Craig Allen said administrators at Fayetteville Tech are "most pleased to have acquired

so many new programs through our financial resources program." He called some of the awards "very significant" to promoting development at FTL The new awards were established by 17 benefactors - ten social or professional organizations, four corporations and three private donations. Sixteen of the scholarships will not be implemented until the fall of

Three of the new scholarships were established through endowments, meaning the funds presented to FTI will be invested, with the interest used to fund a scholarship indefinitely. The other programs must be



It's Back To School For Colleges, Universities Across The Region

While some college students are getting in the last rays of summer at the beach or working to save money for tuition, others in the Cape Fear region are already hitting the books this week. It's back to school time, and officials at colleges and universities across the region say they expect higher enrollment this year than one

At Campbell University in Buies Creek, undergraduates register today and tomorrow, said a spokesman for the school, and classes begin Wednesday. Law students at Campbell started classes today.

At Pembroke State University registration begins Wednesday with classes commencing at 8 a.m. Thursday, according to Sharon Bin of the academic affairs office.

Favetteville State University freshmen began arriving on campus Sunday for a two-day orientation before registration Wednesday, and a spokesman said today record freshman enrollment is expected when classes begin Aug.

Eric Moore, communications director, said the freshman enrollment is expected to be in the range of 700 to 900 students, up several hundred from last year.

He said university officials don't know what is accounting for the record enrollment, but he added a similar situation is occurring at Winston-Salem State University in Winston-Salem where enrollment applications were cut off in August for the first time in the school's

Moore said last year's total enrollment was

2,666 at the predominately black state university, and he said school officials are predicting a record enrollment of more than 3,000. Tuition for FSU is \$450 per semester and room and board costs bring the total to \$1,366 to \$1,440

A fall convocation for all students is set for Sept. 12, Moore said. Meanwhile, at Methodist College, school officials are concerning themselves with the

planned graduation Tuesday of 82 students from its summer session. **FSU** expects enrollment

have 22 percent more students Lynn Sadler, vice president for academic affairs at Methodist, said the ceremonies will

up several hundred;

Methodist College will

include a flag presentation and a hooding ceremony for the graduating seniors. Sadler said fall registration at the private college will be Wednesday, with classes beginn-

ing the next day. Enrollment at Methodist is continuing to rise, and Sadler said school officials are expecting about a 22 percent jump in regular admissions this year compared to the 1984 fall session and a 10 percent hike in the number of students enrolled in the school's continuing education

Tuition costs at the college are running at \$4,700 a year, with another \$2,400 for room and board. That brings the full year's cost at the school to \$7,100 for a year. Fall registration at Fayetteville Technical

Institute will be Aug. 27-29, according to Ron Miriello, FTI's director of admissions. Classes at the vocational institute will begin Sept. 3, with school officials expecting somewhere between 5,800 and 6,000 students to be enrolled. That is up from 5,550 during the 1984

FTI is offering more than 50 curriculums this year, according to Miriello, with the cost for a full time student coming to \$53 a semester.

Incoming freshmen at St. Andrews Presbyterian College in Laurinburg won't have orientation until Sept. 7, according to Associate Admissions Director Maggie Abrams. The first day of classes for all students at that private college will be Sept. 10.

Abrams said the freshman enrollment is expected to be about 240 to 250, a slight increase from last year's freshman class. An additional 50 transfer students are expected this year, she said. Total student body number last year was

A fall convocation is set for Sept. 7 at 1:30 p.m. in the Harris Courts gym. The speaker will be Ron Bayes, writer-in-residence and founder of the St. Andrews Press.

Tuition at St. Andrews is \$5,800, and an admissions spokesman said total cost of tuition and room and board for first-time students is \$8,704. For other students the cost is \$50 less.

In 10 Minutes, They Can Show You The Stars

In 10 minutes, Jesse Waters and Jerry Ittenbach can erect a planetarium The two Fayetteville Technical Institute physical science instructors

have developed their own portable planetarium that comes in two sizes. The smaller one, at 71/2 feet tall and eight feet in diameter, can actually be assembled by one man, said Ittenbach. The two of them together have been timed at 10 minutes and 20 seconds.

The larger one, at 91/2 feet tall and 12 feet in diameter, takes two assemblers and a little more time. Once set up, it becomes a theater for projecting and viewing star constellations. The smaller one can handle about 15 adults or 20 children, and the larger one handles about 30 adults comfortably, said Waters.

The two have demonstrated the planetariums to school groups and a local astronomy club, and have had positive feedback. Cumberland County schools have purchased one and Wake County schools have purchased seven, said Ittenbach.

Waters' and Ittenbach's planetarium design is unique because of ease of use and low cost. The only other actively marketed portable planetarium is one called StarLab that sells for about \$10,000. The FTI professors' versions sell for \$795 and \$995.

"There are other systems," said Ittenbach. "But our key word is it's Fred Beyer, supervisor for secondary science instruction for Cumberland County schools, said the schools should get a lot of use out of its planetarium because it is so easily set up. He added that it takes up little

storage space when not in use. Beyer said the planetarium will be demonstrated to science department heads in September and he expects many schools will want to purchase one. In the next few years, he said he expects it will be in use statewide and

possibly even nationwide.
"There's so many positive things you can say about it, I don't see how it can not do well," said Beyer.

Waters and Ittenbach have spent about two years working on the planetariums - a project done in lieu of writing a paper for a class at Campbell University. They've been refining the design since, and have come a long way from a

wood and metal prototype that was too heavy to move easily. In the current models, polyvinyl chloride plumbing pipes make up the frames which are covered with cloth and plastic material. A white cloth is used for the viewing "screen" and a plastic cover goes on top to block out light. Eventually the outer cover will be made of a vinyl-coated fiberglass material for more durability and opaqueness, said Waters.

When disassembled, the planetarium fits into three bags. "Actually, a big advantage of this is being able to take it down, throw it in a bag and put it in the closet," said Waters. The only drawback is the projector, which Ittenbach described as "a \$25 toy." But, he laments, the next best one sells for about \$800, well out of

Because of the low quality of the projecter, the star projection is not brilliant, and the stars' shape is distorted into a crescent "moon effect." But, Ittenbach and Waters said the spatial separation is good and creates a

realistic depiction of the nighttime sky. Jan Dabrowski, former head of the Fayetteville State University Astronomy Department, was in town recently and was impressed with the FTI instructors' project. He also noted the quality of the projecter as a drawback, but nevertheless wanted to take information about the



A Lesson In Car Care

A 'Battered Bug' Gets The Beauty Treatment

This is the story of why I spend nights working on automobile bodies and how I came to be known as "the

I got into auto body repair quite by accident. The accident was one my son Clayton had when he was 15 years old and thought he could drive his

brother's 1970 Volkswagen in a rain storm. The result was a smashed front and rear with bumpers that looked like they came from a pretzel

But that was only minor compared to the earlier damage to the side caused by contact with a misplaced tree in a snowstorm. That was three times the car had been hit and there

was no insurance to cover any of the damage because it

was too old to be covered under collision insurance. The lowest estimate to fix the whole mess was \$1,200. We were't willing to junk it because of sentimental reasons. My sister, Betty High, had bought it new and years later gave it to my son Charlton on his 16th birthday. More importantly, the engine ran better than

With supreme confidence born of ignorance, I decided to learn body repair in night classes at Fayetteville

Technical Institute and fix it myself. In the spring of '84, I was a little embarrased as I drove the "Battered Bug" to the garage at Westover Senior High School for my first lesson. To my surprise, no one laughed. In fact, everyone, especially instructor Willy Freeman, was encouraging. He helped me straighten the quarter panels under the car and begin working with Bondo. Bondo is the putty-like substance that is mixed with hardener to cover up the nicks and dents in a car's body after they have been hammered

Clayton went with me to class to help with the heavy work such as taking off tires. One time he made up Bondo but accidentally mixed spot putty with it instead of hardener, which is the same color. Of course, it never hardened. It just sat on the bumper like a sticky wad of

chewing gum, and we had to scrape it all off. I learned basics in the one-night-a-week class. In the fall I began a two-night-a-week class on FTI's main

To my dismay, I had to take off every bit of Bondo I had put on in the spring because I had not sprayed it with primer to protect it from the elements over the

The instructor this time was Jerry Lewis, head of the body shop at M&O Chevrolet. He showed me how to take the old paint off using the electric grinder. This is loads of fun since the sparks fly everywhere, creating a fireworks atmosphere and giving you a wonderful sense of power. Nobody dares to interrupt you. Next, dents are taken out by lightly tapping with a hammer or by drilling holes and inserting a snatch bar. It is pulled until the metal is the desired height and gently tapped

Then a coat of Bondo is applied. After it dries a short time, it is cut off with a "cheese grater" and sanded with coarse and then fine sandpaper until it is as smooth as the underside of a baby lizard. Any remaining scratch marks can be covered with a thin layer of body putty over primer, which is then wet sanded with fine

I used gray and rust colored primer to cover the Bondo on the car. It became a multi-colored, patchwork car of gray, rust and original dark blue. My neighbors were perplexed when, late at night after class, I would stand by the car running my hands over the area I had just repaired, feeling the smoothness with the same kind of satisfaction a surgeon must feel about a perfectly healed wound.

I was taking two three-hour classes a week and making some progress when I showed my handiwork to my lifelong friend Anne Whitfield. She admired it, got into her car and backed into the only undamaged area. You can't collect insurance from your best

I worked through the winter. Then, when the car was a little over half finished, FTI discontinued the class, sending incomplete cars and partially trained students to the Skill Center at the Fort Bragg branch campus of

Again I had a change of teachers. One thing I learned is that no two body men work alike, and each has his own unbreakable rules.

So I had to take off more Bondo on the crunched-in side I thought was finished. The running board didn't fit so instructors Gene Gentry and Mario "Joe" Viamontes pulled out the side with chains. Gentry riveted on a

piece of sheet metal which I covered with Bondo. Gentry and Viamontes are the kinds of guys who go that extra mile to help a student and also manage to keep things lively and fun.

went back to the main campus to take that course, too, working on my car four nights a week.

You would think I would be making some progress but things kept happening to the car. It was as if the

gods were fooling around with me. This time it was one of my sons' friends who ran into the car while trying to move our other car. Why couldn't someone with insurance ever hit my car? It only took one night to "bump" the metal and apply Bondo to cover this accident. This is when I earned the title Bondo Queen.

The big project was now nearing completion but Charlton's high school graduation was coming up, and it was to be his graduation gift. The week I should have finished, my house caught fire and after the fire trucks and a lot of curious onlookers left, I had another bashed-in fender of unknown origin. It was the only new

part I had bought. This time, like the Bondo on the fender, I almost

We lived in a motel for several weeks while I worked furiously on the car trying to make my deadline. Finally, on May 26, I went over every inch with very fine sandpaper so that it would accept new paint.

The day of the big paint job arrived. It took two hours to tape over windows, handles and chrome. Then one more time over with a cleaning fluid and dust rag, and

Firefighter Education Cutback?

I am concerned that Fayetteville Technical Institute has chosen to "turn its back" on Cumberland County firefighters in regards to the fire service education programs the institute offered. At one time FTI was to offer a fire service course, but it too was cancelled, due to the lack of a department chairperson, so I am told.

I am certain that my concerns are shared by firefighters throughout Cumberland County. There are many areas within the fire service which need to be taught by competent and experienced firefighters and officers. The officers would not be in the position they now are if it were not for the experience and expertise that they have acquired.

This is not to say that all this training can be accomplished by the fire department itself, because it cannot. An institute such as FTI should help the Cumberland County firefighters by either continuing the training programs that they have or initiating the fire protection and administration course that it was to have in the first place. A major fire is not the place for the inexperienced firefighter to gather his knowlege of firefighting operations.

There must be many people out there that think if a person joins the fire department, he knows

everything that needs to be known involving firefighting. This is not true nor will it ever be. Even the most experienced firefighter learns something new every day. Firefighting is not an area which we should take lightly. New lessons are learned at every fire, but classroom and "hands-on" training are preferred over learning them "first hand" at a fire.

The library at FTI offers a limited coverage of all topics concerning the fire service. Most of the books that they have on hand are outdated. I'm sure one of the local fire chiefs could assist them in updating the necessary fire service books and manuals. A call to the NFPA in Massachusetts would also aid them in finding current and up-to-date books for fire service. It must be pointed out that fire is nothing to be

taken for granted. If this were not so, I would not

When Edna Pittman was in school, back in 1931 in Robeson County, the seventh grade was as far as she could go. Once she got there, she stayed for three or four years, doing some new stuff but

Beyond the seventh grade, the road led 10 miles to Fairmont, but you could only go to school there if you had private transportation, or if you moved to live with

relatives in town. The state, says Mama Pittman (that's what Sister Jessie McNeill, who introduced us, calls her, so I will, too) didn't provide buses for black

people in 1931. "White folks had them, though," she said. "Black buses started in 1933 or 1934, in time for my younger sister. She had to stay one year in town with relatives, but I couldn't do that. My mother had had three strokes, and I was the oldest. I had to stay at home.'

Too Late

By the time the buses started running, it was too late for Edna Pittman. She'd got married by then, to Gilbert Pittman, and settled down to a lifetime of raising children.,

"I've raised six of my own, four of my 12 grandchildren and now two great-grandchildren

are living with me," she said. She worked outside her home, too, in a cafe, at a rest home, in a laundry and as a domestic, but during all those years of working and raising children and going to church she always wanted one thing in particular, real bad. A high school diploma. And Thursday night, at Fayetteville

Technical Institute, she got it, at the age of 71. I had lunch Thursday with Mama Pittman and Sister Jessie McNeill and eight or nine other ladies from the Smith Chapel Church, which is in the Evans Hill community of Fayetteville.

Jessie McNeill is an English teacher at Hoke County High School. She thinks a lot of Mama Pittman, and wanted to do something to show her admiration for Mama Pittman's going back to school and getting that diploma.

Some of the other ladies had brought brightly wrapped gifts, and the cafeteria had provided a graduation cake. Only Mama Pittman could barely eat at all, because she said she was too full. Too full of surprise — she didn't know there'd be a crowd for lunch - and happiness and gratitude that her friends cared so much about her, and her accomplishment.

It 'Wasn't Hard'

Mama Pittman explained to me that she had always wanted her high school diploma. I told her there were lots of folks in the world who want lots of things, but few have the determination and the character to actually go and get what they want. She said it wasn't hard, and showed me her

"They gave me a test, and started me in the eighth grade," she said. "I wanted to start where I knew something. If I'd started in the 10th, I'd have fallen back.'

This was in January of 1984. She'd attended, or attempted to attend, adult education classes at church schools earlier on, but they hadn't worked



Firefignter Education Cutback?

I am concerned that Fayetteville Technical everything that needs to be known involving Institute has chosen to "turn its back" on Cumberland County firefighters in regards to the fire service education programs the institute offered. At one time FTI was to offer a fire service course, but it too was cancelled, due to the lack of a department chairperson, so I am told.

I am certain that my concerns are shared by firefighters throughout Cumberland County. There are many areas within the fire service which need to be taught by competent and experienced firefighters and officers. The officers would not be in the position they now are if it were not for the experience and expertise that they have acquired.

This is not to say that all this training can be accomplished by the fire department itself, because it cannot. An institute such as FTI should help the Cumberland County firefighters by either continuing the training programs that they have or initiating the fire protection and administration course that it was to have in the first place. A major fire is not the place for the inexperienced firefighter to gather his knowlege of firefighting operations.

There must be many people out there that think if a person joins the fire department, he knows the most experienced firefighter learns something new every day. Firefighting is not an area which we should take lightly. New lessons are learned at every fire, but classroom and "hands-on" training are preferred over learning them "first hand" at a fire.

The library at FTI offers a limited coverage of all topics concerning the fire service. Most of the books that they have on hand are outdated. I'm sure one of the local fire chiefs could assist them in updating the necessary fire service books and manuals. A call to the NFPA in Massachusetts would also aid them in finding current and up-to-date books for fire service. It must be pointed out that fire is nothing to be taken for granted. If this were not so, I would not waste my time typing this letter. We all need the training!

A Material World

An Underexposed Past Comes Into Focus With Photographs

By SUSAN HOUSTON

In a new course at Fayetteville Technical Institute called "Photographing Your County History," the key word to remember is not "history" but "your."

Instructor Ken Robinson, archaeologist and historic resources planner for the Cumberland County Joint Planning Board, says he wants his students to follow their own interests when taking pictures of man-made features for the class - instead of dutifully snapping photos of Market House or Cool Spring Tavern, which are already overexposed.

"It doesn't have to be a prominent historical site," he stresses. "Other aspects of the community are of historic importance, even the more mundane, less well-known buildings and neighborhoods."

"Photographing Your County History: In Search of Those Forgotten Things" will meet from 7 to 10 p.m. for seven Thursday evenings, starting Jan. 16. The class is open to anyone 18 or older for a fee of \$10, which includes a roll of film and some developing costs. (Students 65 and older are exempt from the fee.)

The course will focus on the material culture of Cumberland County and the Upper Cape Fear Region, with the object of documenting man-made features and construction and relating them to the county's history. Topics of the course range from how towns and cities are planned to commercial and residential architecture to rural technology.

Students in the class will be using their cameras as

microscopes to examine Cumberland County's manmade environment and their film as notes to capture what they see more quickly and more clearly than the

"The idea is to look at a neighborhood and record that neighborhood," Robinson says. "We want to create an awareness of objects that you see every day.'

For example, students may choose to photograph neighborhoods, agriculture, river travel, commercial buildings, industry, public works or railroads. Students more interested in detail than the big picture will be able to photograph the parts of houses or buildings doors, windows or mantels, for instance — that capture their interest.

At class meetings, students will discuss the topic of the week and their contact sheets or prints from previous assignments. The class will determine where the site in the photo is on the county map and the purpose of the man-made feature in the picture. If a student happens upon a real historic find, more research will be done.

Since Robinson will be looking for photographs that are more documentary than artistic in style, students need not be expert photographers. He will give helpful pointers on photography throughout the course to the students, who should have access to a 35 mm camera.

Then at the end of the course in March, Robinson will take the best student photographs and arrange them for a local exhibit on the "Material Culture of Cumberland

The photographs capture the secondary purpose of Robinson's class. Through this shotgun-style scattering of student photographers, he hopes to increase the documentation of neighborhoods and individual sites in Cumberland County.

"The end result will be a collection of photos of all different aspects of the community," Robinson says. With all the development in the city and county, the razing of old neighborhoods for the construction of new ones, "it may be all we have left."

FTI To Beef Up Courses Offered To Senior Citizens

While senior citizens are often offered classes in arts and crafts to while away their Golden Years, officials at Fayetteville Technical Institute are trying to spur interest in more academic pursuits.

Sherry Turpin, director of continuing education at FTI, is initiating the "Institute of Lifelong Learning" at various senior citizen's centers in Cumberland County this month. She said in addition to the usual fare of arts classes, the program will offer more practical courses related to concerns of daily living and the changing lifestyles of

Classes will include courses in cardio-pulomonary resuscitation health care for the elderly, genealogy, county history and oil painting. But, she said, "This oil painting class won't be like other

art classes they've had." Courses will be taught in each senior citizen center in the county on a rotating basis, said Turpin. Places like the Blue Street Senior Citizens Center, the Cumberland County Association for Indian People center, Towers West apartments for the elderly and the Cumberland County Center for the Blind will host classes on a rotating basis, with three centers hosting

classes each week. Each course will be taught at every center at one

"In looking around, we weren't drawing enough of the over 55- to 65-type people to the campus for the more academic-type classes," said Turpin. "So we thought if we brought these classes to the places where senior citizens are, or where they go, they will enroll."

The types of classes offered were suggested by an advisory committee of senior citizens and members of senior citizen support groups in the county, said Turpin.

Four divisions of classes will be offered: personal development/esthetic appreciation, community and world affairs, consumer education, and health, home and family life, said Turpin.

Students will be able to earn "Master Citizen" certification by completing three of four classes in a division, plus 20 hours of volunteer work, Turpin said. The volunteer work may consist of teaching

or tutoring, or community service work. Turpin said the volunteer work would ideally be in the field of study, but could be time spent helping an elderly person learn to

read, for example. Master Citizen certification is the brainchild of Thaddeus Sexton, FTI's dean of continuing education, as a goal for students in the program. "It's going to take quite some time (to earn)," Turpin said. "We may not ever have anyone to complete it."

A full schedule of classes offered during FTI's fall quarter can be obtained by contacting Turpin at 323-1706. She said the brochure also contains a questionnaire on what kinds of courses interest prospective students, what hours are convenient, and if off-campus classes would be more convenient if

Classes for students age 65 or older are free; younger students will be charged from \$10 to \$19, depending on course requirements.

Community Colleges Note Decline As More Go To Work, Fewer To Class

Good economic news is spelling bad times for community colleges as the ranks of vocational students are filling jobs rather than classrooms,

officials say. Vocational enrollment is declining in part because of the large number of jobs available. But adding to community colleges' woes are increasingly older students and fewer fresh high school graduates

interested in vocational education. The severity of enrollment decline varies, but community colleges contacted in the Cape Fear region, on average, report a decline in traditional

vocational course enrollment. State community colleges offer one-year diplomas and two-year associate degrees in a variety of vocational fields ranging from welding and automobile mechanics to carpentry and cos-

Educators say part of the problem is that today's average community college student is older, at a mean age of 28, and has a family and other responsibilities. This cuts into class time because students must earn a living while learning a trade, said Jack Fernald, dean for student development at

Fayetteville Technical Institute. And a healthy economy means there are jobs available for unskilled workers. "We're sort of a reverse reaction," Fernald said. "These people will come to school if they can't get a training situation

with a job. Officials said that working students tend to take single specialized classes instead of a whole curriculum and that night classes are often more attractive. Hall also attributed the loss of preferred.

Another factor, said Marvin Joyner, president of Central Carolina Technical College in Sanford, is that high school kids don't know that vocational programs can offer skills that lead to well-paying jobs or entrepreneurial opportunities. "The employment opportunities are excellent, but young people's attitudes toward these jobs is such that enrollment is not what it should be," he said.

Among the hardest hit are the traditional automobile mechanic programs, where enrollment is declining statewide, according to educators. At Sampson Technical Institute in Clinton only seven students are enrolled - half as many as five years ago, said Roland Hall, Sampson's director of evening and vocational programs. The diesel mechanics program had 25 students in 1981 and one in 1983 and

has now been dropped, he said. Even in Fayetteville, where two military installations foster a large number of small garages that employ trained mechanics, the auto mechanics curriculum at FTI has fallen off, said Fernald. From a high enrollment of 151 students in 1981, the classes have dwindled to 58 students last fall.

Other programs are also in trouble. FTI has canceled two programs in the last three years recreational vehicle and equipment repair and water/waste-water, said Fernald.

Since spring 1984, Sampson Tech has dropped the agricultural business technology and agricultural

science programs. Hall said the agriculture programs used to benefit from veterans enrolling, but that has dropped since changes in the GI Bill make four-year institutions

enrollment to a general decline in the farm economy

in Sampson County and the nation. To combat the decline, schools in the region are engaged in intense recruiting efforts and other measures, educators said.

Fayetteville Tech has increased contact with the county's high schools, the Employment Security Commission, the Jobs Training Partnership Act program and especially the Army Education Centers at Fort Bragg, said Fernald.

"We like to get the person who's in the area, whose life is about to change," he said. "Either he's getting out of the service or leaving a job, so we want to get him into school and get him trained.'

At Johnston Tech, old courses have been modified and new ones offered. John Hobart, dean of student affairs, said the industrial mechanics program was changed to a machinist program when surveys showed it was needed more, and response has been

Johnston Tech has also started a retail floriculture program, which trains commercial florists. Though it appeals to men as well as women, said Hobart, its main appeal was intended for women. "As we look at the areas we need to serve, we see the people in need are often women," he said.

In Whiteville, Leon Fox, Southeastern Community College's associate dean of administrative services, said the school is conducting several studies to enhance its recruiting efforts.

Last week, Bob Scott, president of the state Department of Community Colleges, proposed an

initiative to foster cooperation between high schools and community colleges and increase enrollment in vocational education programs. Scott said the state Board of Education should allow students in vocational programs in high schools to enter similar programs in community colleges without loss of academic credit.

Scott's proposal is based on the decline in vocational program enrollment statewide. A study by the Department of Community Colleges shows that only 22.8 percent of high school graduates can be expected to enter community colleges. Many, 37.4 percent, either enter the military or the work force, while 33.9 percent enroll in a four-year institution. The remaining 5.9 percent go to private junior colleges or proprietary schools, the data show.

An informal survey of some regional community colleges shows the following:

 Central Carolina: Between 1976 and fall of last year, vocational education enrollment has grown from 1,723 to 2,350, said Joyner, but he added most of that has been part of the school's overall growth. Enrollment in the automobile mechanics curriculum, he pointed out, has fallen from 79 in 1980 to 45 last

• Fayetteville Technical Institute: Building trades have especially suffered through the last five years with carpentry enrollment falling from 58 students to 30, welding from 63 to 15, masonry from 38 to 19 and electrical installation from 122 to 79.

 Johnston Technical College: The school reported an increase in overall vocational enrollment, up from 272 students in 1982 to 347 last fall, but the figure has fluctuated, said Hobart. Auto mechanics enrollment is down to 11, and diesel mechanics classes have only eight students, said Hobart.

• Robeson Technical College: Enrollment in the 10 vocational education programs fell from 766 students in the 1980-81 school year to 575 in 1984-85. said Public Information Officer Bob Denham.

 Sampson Technical College: In addition to the two agricultural programs mentioned above, the air conditioning/heating and refrigeration program was dropped. The electrical installation and maintenance program has only two students and will likely be dropped, said Hall, but enrollment in the cosmetology program has risen almost steadily from 45 students in 1980 to 78 in 1984-85.

 Southeastern Community College: Enrollment in vocational fields was less than 700 for many years prior to 1982, said Fox, but it was up to 714 in 1982, dropping a little to 711 the next year, falling to 583 in 1984 before climbing to 596 last fall.

But as Fernald and others said, the population of high school graduates continues to decline while competition with other community colleges and four-year institutions gets tougher.

"Kids now are very much aware of the job market and very much interested in trainable skills," he said. "They're looking at what marketable skills will this give me (in exchange) for a year of training.

FTI President R. Craig Allen said the new report "is what we feel is a better plan. If we can get these funds for existing programs, it will take care care of our needs for the future for some time.'

"These needs were felt and documented (in the earlier report)," FTI Dean of Curriculum Instruction Larry Norris said. "But the needs have become more critical. Our space is cramped. We're to the point where we can't take any more students. We're in a very critical situation with facilities.

The new expansion would add 109,518 square feet to FTI's campus, increasing it by more than 35 percent. FTI already is the second largest school in the N.C community college system.

The 80,000-square-foot applied technology center would cost \$5.6 million and would house 31 specialized labs, 25 classrooms, 30 offices, a lecture hall and six other rooms. It would cost almost \$3.9 million to equip and would offer instruction in robotics, industrial electronics, telecommunications, automation and

Building the center would provide space needed for other programs at FTI, but expanding and renovating six facilities for those programs would require \$2.34 million, and additional equipment would cost \$263,000, the report says. Norris said all of the space which would be freed by building the center already has a

projected use. Renovations included \$1.8 million for the Horace Sisk building; \$284,184 for LaFayette Hall; \$144,340 for Cumberland Hall; \$80,000 for the Honeycutt Center; \$52,660 for the Neill Currie building; and \$36,480 for the library.

Costs for the business center are estimated at \$1.47 million - \$635,000 to buy an unspecified building and \$832,000 to renovate it. The 28,000-square-foot building would house 17 offices, 11 labs, six classrooms, two workrooms and 13 other rooms.

Send A Special Season's Greeting That's Your Own

The person who sends out homemade Christmas cards is a special type. Not always artistic, they are people who would rather bake their friends cakes or knit them sweaters than purchase a gift at a department store.

Frugality is not the issue here — depending on the complexity of the card, it may be cheaper to buy a box of Christmas cards than to make them. No, card makers believe that it's the thought that counts, and their cards send very personal season's

"When I receive a card that someone made," said Sharon Beardslee, who has made her own Christmas cards for three years now, "I always feel that somebody cared just a little bit more.'

Her job at Nationwide Golf and Printing Inc. gives Beardslee access to a myriad of techniques that make her printed cards look polished and professional yet personal, like this year's card with her pencil drawing of the Market House on green paper.

Beardslee also teaches calligraphy, stylized handwriting created with a nibbed pen - a craft she said may be the answer for those not confident

of their artistic talents. Simplicity is the key for beginning card makers. "For the cover, a very large 'Season's Greetings' would do," Beardslee said. "Keep the message fairly simple. You don't want a whole lot of

words. Colored paper and colored inks, including rich gold and silver tones, can be used to dress up the calligraphy words, as can simple artwork. Those who can't draw could buy clip art, use Christmas stencils or trace designs from sources like wrapping paper or a child's coloring book.

Art also can be cut from a sheet of colored paper and pasted onto the card or stamped in red or green ink with a yuletide rubber stamp. Even the calligraphy itself can be incorporated into a holiday design, as one of Beardslee's Fayetteville Technical Institute students demonstrated with a calligraphy alphabet formed into a

State officials say one reason Black & Decker decided to expand its Fayetteville plant instead of closing it was an incentive package that includes skills training through the state Department of Community Colleges. But company officials say that, while state interest

and assistance was helpful, they give more credit to the plant's efficiency in deciding not to include Fayetteville in plans to reduce capacity in an effort to deal with Details of the training program, which will be administered through Fayetteville Technical Institute,

Fayetteville Technical Institute's finance committee on Thursday delayed a vote on hiring a consulting firm to review the school's insurance coverage, which runs out

After discussing the proposal with a representative of Industrial Insurance Management Corp., the finance committee voted to table consideration of hiring the company until its next meeting, March

The delay came after committee chairman Thornton Rose and Cumberlnd, voiced support for hiring IIMC, a Charlotte firm that wants \$4,000 a year to handle what consultant Henry Kempton called

"risk management." The company is asking for a three-year contract, although the school would be able to get out of the contract anytime after the first

The other committee members present, Wayne Williams and Steve Satisky, said they needed more time to consider new information Kempton had given them at the

In addition to the \$4,000 retainer fee, IIMC would charge FTI for certain types of work, such as putting together specifications and seeking competitive bids from insurance companies, something committee members said they would want to have done this year.

Kempton said if the school chose to seek competitive bidding, it would not cost more than \$3,000. member Sen. Lura Tally, D- If the five-member committee recommends approval of a contract, the school's Board of Trustees will probably hire IIMC, officials said. Trustees chairman Harry Shaw said he was "willing to go with a consultant, at least for a

year on a trial basis." The committee will report to the board at its next meeting, which is

The main concern voiced by committee members was what IIMC would do after the first year of its contract, when it would work with the school on finding insurance

coverage for the next three years. A \$2 million comprehensive general liability policy was cut to \$500,000 because one company de-clined to renew a \$500,000 portion of the coverage because asbestos was found in some of FTI's buildings. Without the \$500,000 policy, an additional \$1 million policy was

IIMC works with clients in renewing insurance policies at the best possible rates, finding new companies to cover them and handling the day-to-day management of insurance programs,

"I can see you earning your keep the first year," Williams said. "I can't see how you're going to earn \$4,000 the next two years.' But Kempton said the company would be worth the money

Asbestos Problems Linger In School Building FTI Wants

By CHRIS NELSON

If and when Fayetteville Technical Institute receives title to two buildings owned by the county school system it will also be getting a built-in problem - a problem whose solution is now in limbo.

Linwood Powell, an administrative assistant at FTI, said Thursday the school has received confirmation that the Honeycutt Building at Hull Road and Devers Street contains 5-10 percent asbestos in the stucco-like material sprayed on his siding and in the

wood paneling underneath. Asbestos is a cancer-causing insulation material that is toxic if inhaled. Environmental Protection Agency rules prohibit its use and require that any already in use in public buildings either be removed

or contained. The Honeycutt Building was formerly owned by the Fayetteville City Schools but became surplus property with merger of city and county schools last summer. The county schools and FTI are in the middle of negotiations to give the building to FTI.

Fayetteville Tech currently rents the building and has held classes in 13 of its rooms since September. Powell said instructors have been told to advise students of the asbestos, and the school plans to post warning signs.

Romie Herring, an engineer with the occupational health division of the state Department of Human Resource's Division of Health Services who took samples from the building to confirm the asbestos' presence, said the asbestos poses little health risk if contact with it is

The problem is the asbestos has to be removed - a job that may cost more than the building is

Powell said FTI has done nothing toward removal of the asbestos because FTI doesn't own the building. The county schools haven't done anything because they were advised that if they left it alone, nothing needed to be done, said John Lancaster, director of plant

operations. The city schools were notified in 1981 that the siding contained asbestos. But a letter from Ralph Self, a consulting engineer with the Department of Public Instruction's division of school planning, advised only that "appropriate precautions" be taken if any renovation or


maintenance work was done on the building's exterior. Because no such work was done, nothing was done with the asbestos,

said Lancaster. The schools did spend \$2,200 to remove 1,180 feet of pipe wrapping containing asbestos in the building's boiler room and crawl space in 1983, records show. A price estimate of \$5,000 for encapsulation of the 8,900 square feet of asbestos siding was made at that

Powell has since said removal of the siding could cost in the neighborhood of \$100,000. And FTI officials are now being told the siding has to be removed.

Herring took samples of the building's siding in January at FTI's request. He later confirmed the presence of asbestos and the need to act. "His statement was that anytime there's any indication that there's any asbestos present it has to be removed," said Powell.

"Of course, we already knew that." Herring said the declining condition of the building makes the needs to be removed. removal necessary. "The exterior (when removal was not ordered)," in deteriorating shape now."

*Cellist Bringing Classical Music To Linden Area

The biggest complaint many cellists have about their line of work is the stale jokes from airline stewardesses. You can't travel on an airplane unless you buy a ticket for your cello, says cellist Carl Shugart, who presents a classical-music concert Sunday in the town of Linden in northern Cumberland County.

And there's always some smart-alecky stewardess who asks, "And what would your friend like to eat?" "All professional cellists travel with it as a passenger," said the 32-year-old Bronxville, N.Y., native. "Under Federal Aviation Administration regulations, it has to be on the front window seat, so there are only two seats you can travel with. You have to book way in advance. In Europe they let it travel for free if the flight isn't booked.

"It can be a nuisance." Shugart, visiting artist at Asheboro's Randolph Technical College, will appear at 3 p.m. Sunday with pianist Peggy Sniezek at Sardis Presbyterian Church on Main Street in Linden. She teaches piano at Randolph

Technical College. The concert, sponsored by the Arts Council of Fayetteville/Cumberland County and Fayetteville Technical Institute and the Linden Community Development Club, is part of the Visiting Artists in Concert series. Admission is free. Shugart will go into area schools Monday for three special concerts.

He said the Linden concert will feature late 19th- and early 20th-century music including impressionistic and

The concert will include some Spanish pieces, French composer Claude Debussy's "Sonata," Italian composer Nicole Paganini's "Variation for One String on a Theme by Rossini," and a tarantella, music for a fast, whirling southern Italian dance.

"A lot of the music is similar to vocal music," he said. "The music is written lyrically. It has the same tonal

range as the human voice. "I tell all my informal audiences that the composer is saying something through the music whether it's an image or an entire story. Sometimes it's just an impression or feeling. I just want them to be very open

Shugart, who practices between two and six hours each day, says he honestly can't remember why he became interested in the cello. He started violin at age 6, then began piano. At age 101/2, he started playing the

"I tell people, if they really keep asking, it's the only musical instrument you can't stand up when you play.

You have to sit down all the time.' Shugart comes from a musically inclined family. His mother is a pianist; one sister plays a violin; another sister plays the viola. He studied at the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga, Florida State University, Mannes School of Music and the Julliard School.

Shugart was a member of the Brooklyn Philharmonic and a founding member of the Brooklyn Chamber Ensemble. He worked as a free-lance musician in New York and played for Broadway productions and toured with Tom Jones, Englebert Humperdinck and Sergio

He came to Randolph County from New Haven, Conn., where he was a performer and teacher in a Suzuki music school for three years. Shugart said he has gone into schools in the Randolph County area to give performances and explain the cello during his tenure as

He said he thought he was making headway, but began to wonder when children came to his house on Halloween and cried out, "Oh, look, there's the guitar man!" Future concerts in the Visiting Artists series will be

held in Falcon, Stedman, Godwin and Wade. The Grassroots Arts Program of the N.C. Arts Council, a state agency, has provided a grant for the series. 

Program Gives Adults 2nd Chance In School

When 20-year-old Tony Williams decided to quit school two years ago, all the reasons seemed like good

He had learning difficulties and was tired of being treated differently, tired of being laughed at, tired of being humiliated.

"I quit because I was burned out. The teachers treated us like we were in kindergarten, even following us to the bathroom. The other kids made it bad too. I was in the special class, and they would stare and laugh at us when we walked into the lunchroom," Williams said.

What seemed a good decision turned sour, though, as Williams discovered a 10th-grade education did not get much attention in the

'I went down to the unemployment office to look for work, and they didn't have any for me. It ended up I just sat at home and watched TV," he said. "There was nothing for me anywhere."

needed a second chance — and that's just what he got. Williams is one of 300 students, ranging in age from 18 to 98, participating in Fayetteville Technical Institute's Adult Basic Education program, which

teaches adults to read, write and add. Taking people like Williams and giving them a chance to reach their potential is what the 24-year-old the '40s. When medical problems caused the amputation program is all about, said Eli Anderson, Jr., director of

Adult Basic Education. "The bottom line is if a person wants that second chance, they can come here and get it. That needs to be shouted from the rooftops. We want to push these people as far as we can to get a better life," Anderson said.

The ABE program has helped more than 22,000 Cumberland County area adults get an eighth-grade education since 1961. In the 1984-85 school year a record 4.075 adults graduated from the program. "We started with two classes and 20 students. In the

fall of this year we will have over 150 classes with 1,500 to 1,600 people enrolled. It goes up every year,"

Anderson said.

"By no means are these all slow students. Many are just average people who, for one reason or another, got caught in society and didn't finish their education. They dropped out to get jobs or because of family problems. Sometimes young men got into slight social problems like cutting class or smoking and they dropped out,"

promoted through school, but were not learning. Those students may have gotten frustrated with the system and just quit, Anderson said.

With more than 35,000 people in Cumberland County without high school diplomas and 20,000 of those without an eighth-grade education, finding students would appear easy. That's not the case, Anderson said. "When we first started it was easy to find them because there was this group just waiting to learn. Now it's harder because were down to the hard core," he

To fill classes five full-time recruiters have been hired. They show up anywhere there is a crowd, looking for potential students, Anderson said.





Fence Design For Post Office Suits City, Postal Officials

The U.S. Postal Service and city of Fayetteville ended a dispute over the aesthetics of a security fence at the main post office downtown on Wednesday when they unveiled plans to build a metal rail fence with brick columns designed by students at Fayetteville

Mayor Bill Hurley said the new fence design is more "aesthetically acceptable" than the chain-link and barbed wire fence first proposed by postal officials. "It will be the focal point of the intersection, I believe.

He praised postal officials and FTI students for "trying to pull together to add to the beauty of our new

The 8-foot high, 800-foot long fence will be erected around the \$4.5 million addition to the post office on Green Street near Rowan Street due to open in mid-April, postal officials said. It will face Green, Rowan and Union Streets, said Ron Spivey, a postal service industrial engineer.

The black metal fence will be supported by brick See FENCE, Page 2-B

columns, and the brick will match the neighboring offices of Brady and Brady attorneys at the corner of Rowan and Green Streets, said John Rose, a member of the Revitalization Commission.

Postmaster Jeff Martin said the new fence will cost more than the chain-link fence, but the postal service wanted to work with city officials to make it look good. "We in the postal service are part of the community and we want everyone to know that," he said.

Martin said he did not know for sure how much more the new fence will cost than the standard fence. Officials said the postal service will pay the entire cost of the fence, with the city possibly helping to maintain landscaping outside the

The new fence will "provide security for the mail and the employee vehicles and still be aesthetically pleasing," Martin

and Fayetteville Revitalization Commission objected when the postal service announced in August plans to put the chain-link fence

around the addition. Postal officials said the chainlink fence, topped with barbed wire and equipped with redwood slats, is the standard post office security

City officials objected, contending a chain-link fence would be ugly and out of character for one of the city's more visible corners. Hurley called construction of the chain link fence "like putting a \$2 frame around a \$3 million painting." Postal officials said at first they had to stay within a budget for the

fence, and claimed the city wanted one that was "gold plated." But the two sides got together at a meeting Aug. 7 and decided to let FTI architectural design and masonry students design an

Representatives of the city, Fay- FTI Associate Dean of Instrucetteville Appearance Commission tion Gerald Fulghum said design and masonry students are required to do projects similar to this. He said he was happy the project could also benefit the city. "We just look at it as a real opportunity ... to be able to provide the educational experience for our students."

Bids for the fence project are being accepted this week and will be opened March 25, officials said. Assistant City Manager Suzan Cheek said the fence should be completed 30-60 days after the contract is awarded.

She said FTI masonry students will probably build the brick columns for the fence, with a contractor building the metal rails:


