## Coordinator System Installed at East High

Starting this year, there will be three counselors and three coordinators, one for each respective grade level, as opposed to previous years when there were just two counselors at East High to take care of the problems of some 1,450 students.
The coordinators hope to create a more personal atmosphere for the school by coming in contact with as many students, faculty members and parents as possible.
Directive in scope as well as supervision, the coordinators are available to help the students in scheduling and guidance. They are directing the student offices and are accountable for attendance of students and extracurricular activities.
Students having aspirations or problems should try to see his or her coordinator about them; an appointment is not necessary.
Frank Sanders, the senior coordinator, is located in rooms 112-113. Sanders, previously an
industrial arts instructor at Carey Jr. High School, has 14 years experience in the educational field.
Jack Iverson, a civics teacher from Johnson Jr. High School, is the junior coordinator. Iverson can be located in the junior offices in rooms 124-126.

Carl Wisroth has had eight years experience in the Cheyenne school system and is serving as the sophomore coordinator. He is located in the office complex near the lobby.

These coordinators will be working hand in hand with the three counselors: Mike Micek, seniors; Beverly Cowing, juniors and Jack Bryant, sophomores.

The coordinators said they all enjoy working at East and with both faculty and students. They said they feel this new system is working out well and will try to improve on it as the need arises.

Both Sandy Sanchez and Mike Garmon are thinking No. 1 and there's a good chance that both are likely to see their respective medias reach the No. 1 spot in Wyoming.

Miss Sanchez, editor of the 1972-73 Wahina, and Garmon, this year's editor of 1 the THUNDERBOLT, are looking forward to what may be the best year for East High concerning the yearbook and the newspaper and both agree that they have the best staffs ever at the 11-yearold school.

Miss Sanchez says that her staff of 17 is "willing to work. They all seementhused about it."
"I don't think they are in the class for a grade," MissSanchez said. "They're devoted. They go out of their way to keep busy. Sometimes they get me mad, but that's typical."

Martin Sample is the sponsor of the Wahina and in his first year.

Although Garmon has a small staff of four or five to help put out the 15 issues of the THUNDERBOLT that are expected this year, he says that through the help of club reporters and other outside assistance, the students can expect a topnotch paper.
"I have a very small staff,"

Garmon said, "but they all have big ideas. I think by the end of the year, we can make this paper No. 1 in the state.
"I have a very fine sports editor, Dwayne Zobell, that knows what he is talking about when he writes a story. He himself is involved in the sports program here at East. My three newsmen, Bob Campbell, Joe Braly and Becky all look to be good writers," Garmon added.
Garmon then spoke of THUNDERBOLT business manager Randy Child.
"He will probably be the best business manager in the history of the THUNDERBOLT. I got him started kind of late but once he got going he was selling ads like mad. Without him, I doubt that the staff and I could put out an eight page paper this first issue."

## Summary of '73



## AUGUST

The 1972-73 school year began on Friday, August 25. Sophomores were not only the new faces around East High School; Mr. Roy Troyer, principal, was also an addition. Several changes had been made with the administration. Each class had its own office, coordinator, and counselor. This was the year school began at 8:00 and the students were released for an hour lunch. The sophomores were not allowed to pick their teachers at registration; but were given first choice of classes, to the dismay of some seniors.

## SEPTEMBER

The school year got well underway with the first football game on September 8, against Douglas County. Jeff Scheurmann, president of Student Senate held the first meeting on September 23.

The first big social event of the year was Homecoming, October 13. Something new added was the wienie roast, held at Lions Park. This function was initiated to replace the bonfire held in previous years. Other events of the occasion were an assembly, a parade, a football game and a dance. "Cartoons" was the theme. cheerleader elections were held for wrestling, swimming and basketball. Breaking the monotony of classes, Planning Days were held on October 17. This day was set aside to help familiarize the juniors and seniors with the colleges and universities in the area. An assembly was provided by the Navy Glee Club on October 18. The last football game was against Central on October 31. Thus, the month of October passed ending the football season and cross country. The cross country team finished with second in state.

## NOVEMBER

Girls' sports started going full speed ahead with the Girls' Volleyball Team. On November 4, the team won the district tournament and continued on to state on November 11th. Key Club Ball, one of the two formal events of the year was held at Little America on November 10th. The theme was "King Henry the Eighth." The senior class play, Dark of the Moon was held November 18-19. The play was a fantasy dealing with witches and the occult. The week of November 1219, the Exchange Club journeyed to the wilds of Kiel, Wisconsin. Traveling by bus, the group consisted of juniors and seniors. This group was spurred on by their valiant leader (?), Bob Strasheim. Chaperoning the club were Judy Enquist and Don Morris. It would not be until April 23-27 that Kiel students would discover Cheyenne, Wyoming truly does exist. November was broken intermittently with vacations. First was IOTA which was followed by Thanksgiving. November was well enjoyed.


DECEMBER
December 1 was the date the wrestling and swimming teams began their well-founded attempt at victory. The East High Speech officially began their competition with the Harrison High Invitational Speech Meet at Colorado Springs. This was the first of approximately 12 meets throughout the school year. Coached by the illustrious Jim Albro, the team sought after and found success at many Colorado and Wyoming meets. As the season to be jolly approached, Taendas set up a tree in the lobby and many rooms were bright with festive cheer. To send off the holidays and end the 1972 school year East High saw its first Christmas "Bash". The event was co-sponsored by Student Senate and the Senior Class. Student Senate provided the idea and the muscle, while the Senior Class provided the money. Presumably, it replaced the sophomore reception which was not held. Thus, ended the 1972 school year.

## JANUARY

School resumed on Tuesday, January 2. The beginning of the end for the seniors occurred when they were measured for caps and gowns on January 9. Orders for announcements soon followed. Mid-January found many students cramming for semester tests and trying desperately to complete term papers as the first semester drew to a close, on January 20. State Basketball Tournament commenced March 15, in Laramie and continued through March 17. The Future Farmers of America Convention was held in Cheyenne on March 22-24. The East High Speech Team proceeded to Greeley on March 23 for the NFL District Tournament. With the theme of "Alice in Wonderland", Taendas held their annual turnabout dance on March 24. Another giant step for women's lib (?). Monday, March 24, was the first meet for the track team.


## APRIL

As the school year began to wane, it seemed that East High would still continue next year, the nominating convention for school offices was held on April 11. The elections were held April 18. The final speech fling of the year was the State Meet held at Casper College. Math students "set" out to win when they participated faithfully in the state Math Contest on April 17. With the coming of Easter was also the coming of vacation. School was out from April 19 until April 23. The tone of April 26 and 27 was that of the Music Festival. April 28 was the date chosen for the first AF-ROTC Military Ball. Finishing off girls' sports for the year was the Girls' State Track Meet at Lander.

## MAY

The last major social event of the year was the JuniorSenior Prom held on May 12, at the Hitching Post. For a final run to victory, the East High Track team ventured to state on May 18-19. With mixed emotions, the seniors' last official school day was May 18, 1973. Baccalaureate was held on May 20. Thursday, May 24 the class of 1973 stepped up to receive their diplomas. Three years at East High School was now something to be marked a memory. That night the traditional Senior All-Night Party was held. For junior and sophomores, the 1972-1973 school year ended May 31.
