
In answer to your query of December 24th,
I am writing giving the corrections necessary to make your
formulae correct.

Centrifugal force which you denote as f
is given by the expression $\frac{w v^2}{gr}$ where w is the weight

of the airplane, V is the velocity in ft. per. sec. g is
the acceleration of gravity and is equal to 32.2 ft.sec.sec.
and r is the radius of turn. You are quite correct in
equating this force to $W \tan \theta$, but the equation for the
radius becomes $\frac{v^2}{g \tan \theta}$ instead of $\frac{v^2}{\tan \theta}$ as you have

written it.

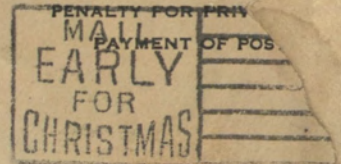
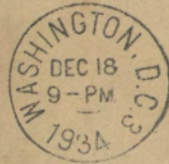
