Change Announced In Campaign Plans For College Chapel

The drive for a Greene County War Memorial Chapel to be erected on the Tusculum campus has been ended.

In lieu of the combined college-county chapel a drive is being carried on to acquire capital to build a wholly college-owned building which will be dedicated fully to student service.

In a recent interview President Davies stated that the desire and drive for a new chapel will continue at Tusculum and that operations will be carried on until one is secured. Outside officials, who up to now have helped with the drive, have been relieved of their duties as the college has decided not to spend more school funds by employing others to head the drive.

The Greene County Citizens Committee, which had been cooperating in the drive, has transferred all authority over assets and liabilities to Tusculum. Donors and subscribers to pledges will have the option of transferring their subscriptions or pledges to the development program of the college, which includes the chapel, or having them returned.

All money that has been previously given is being held in the funds for college development.

College Enrollment For Semester Is 320

The total Tusculum student body enrollment for the spring semester, 1949. is 320, six students less than the fall semester. Twenty-one students, seven who were graduated and 14 who left for various reasons, did not return for the second half. Seven of the 14 not returning transferred to other colleges, one joined the Army Air Corps, one enlisted in the Navy, four left because of finances, and one because of illness.

The seven students, all of whom were men, graduated at the close of the fall semester are: Jay Brooks of Greeneville, John Cavett of Oak Ridge, Tenn., Allen Clark of Syracuse, N. Y., King Cox, William Lady and Sam Roller of Kingsport, and George Westbrook of Hasbrouck Heights, N. J.


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BISHOP DIA RECEIVES DEGREE AT SPRING CONVOCATION

Soon after the Americans returned he worked with other interested Christians in organizing the United Church of Christ, called the United Evangelical Church.

In his talk, Bishop Dia praised the contribution of the United States to the Philippine Islands.

At the close of the service, Dr. Davies bestowed the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity upon Bishop Dia.

The classes are being held at Tusculum with access to the College Library. Classes began on February 18. Courses being offered are: Arithmetic Content for Teachers, American History, and Children's Literature.

The Tusculum basketball team is gradually getting the name as the "scrappingest" team in the Smoky Mountain Athletic Conference. Three straight games, all of which were won by the Pioneers, were won primarily because the boys displayed plenty of determination and fight from the opening whistle until the final gong. The Pioneers do not have the natural ability that some of their opponents have but they have substituted fight for the lack of ability and emerged with triumphs over Cumberland University 69-54, L. M. U. 56-54 and Asheville Biltmore by a score of 59-46 at the City Auditorium in Asheville.

The Pioneers are using only 10 men at present. Bill Caton is the only "regular" from last year's squad but he is ably assisted by Lew Welt, sophomore from Ogdensburg, N. Y., at one forward position and Charlie Pierce, Mosheim, Tenn., junior, at the other forward. At center is six-foot-three-inch Earl Blake from Logan, Ohio. Earl is coming around in great style and with another year of experience will be the "Alex Groza" of the Smoky Mountain Conference on a smaller scale. Bob Bingham rounds out the starting five at the other guard position opposite Caton. Bingham is handicapped somewhat by a guard that he must wear over his glasses which cuts down his vision considerably. Sometimes though, he can even shoot them blind.

Helping the "starters" are Tony Rathosis, a freshman from Plainfield, N. J., and Herman Poritzky, Peekskill, N. Y., at the forward positions, Harold Waddle, Tusculum, center and Stanley Boatright and Bob Sheeler at the guard positions. To date the Pioneers have won seven and lost 13. They will enter the Conference tournament to be held at L. M. U. on March 11 and 12.
