



Tazewell County, One of America's Beauty Spots, Where the Valleys and Hills are Carpeted With a Luxuriant Growth of Blue Gross



Tazewell County is distinctively a grazing county. The blue grass comes spontaneously and is overlasting. The cattle are fattened in the pastures for the market. The limestone soil supplies the necessary fertilizer for a continuous growth of grass from season to season. Dairying is fast becoming a major industry in the county. The steep mountain sides afford pasture for thousands of sheep. Corn, wheat, potatoes, tobacco respond quickly to the limestone soil. The county is not only famous for its blue grass and fat cattle, but the northern section of the county supplies thousands upon thousands of tons of coal annually to the utility and manufacturing industries of the nation. High and low volatile coals are produced by the mines, unsurpassed for domestic and steam purposes.

The county has a population of approximately 34,000. The altitude is 2,000 to 2,500 feet, with towering mountains reaching 4,000 feet above sea level. Six flourishing banks, with resources of three and a half million dollars, have stood the test of the depression, and are growing and broadening their activities by virtue of the development of coal properties in the territory.

Tazewell's tax rate is low, and the county's financial affairs are in good shape, being wisely administered by a board of three supervisors, the present members of which are H. W. Bane, Chairman, and J. F. Litz and R. C. Anderson.






A Dynamite Blast at Plant of Pounding Mill Quarry Corporation, Pounding Mill, Virginia.




Left—On a Mountain Plateau, 3,000


The mines are equipped with all the latest scientific machinery for safety and ventilation, as well as for the careful and efficient production of the high grade coals marketed in Canada and the United States.

The Jewell Ridge Coal Corporation is at present giving employment to over 1,300 persons, with an annual payroll of over \$1,500,000.00. These figures will be more than doubled when the new mines, now being developed on the Dismal River, are brought into production.

The Jewell Ridge Coal Corporation was founded by Mr. George W. St. Clair, and was operated until 1910 as a partnership composed of the founder and Mr. Thomas M. Righter. Present officers are George W. St. Clair, president; Dr. Huston St. Clair, vice-president in charge of operations; Mr. Robert H. Moore, treasurer; Mr. C. R. Brown, secretary, and Mr. T. T. Rees, general superintendent.

The exclusive sales agent of the company is the Virginia Smokeless Coal Company, of Bluefield, West Virginia, and is owned by officers of the parent organization.




A Good Place to Live


And, the people of Richlands are a kindly, hospitable people, ready to extend a true Southern welcome to the newcomer, and to make him feel at home, a neighbor among friends.





NORTH TAZEWELL

North Tazewell, Virginia, enjoys the distinction of having the largest volume of retail trade in Tazewell County, and of being the largest livestock shipping center in the state. The first is attested by the retail license tax, based on annual volume of business, and the latter is too well recognized to require buttressing by figures.

The town is ideally situated on the banks of the Upper Clinch River, and has excellent railway facilities. It has many advantages to offer new industry and business firms seeking locations. North Tazewell has an altitude of 2,650 feet, and every modern facility of a town several times its size. Efficient police and fire departments, pure mountain water, with adequate system, paved streets and sidewalks.

C. D. Peery is Mayor, and the Board of Aldermen is composed of J. W. Whitley, J. W. Jones, O. K. Nelson, W. W. Peery, Jr., R. S. Jones and W. W. Barnes. The tax rate is a nominal one, and the affairs of the town are wisely administered.



POCAHONTAS, VIRGINIA, is one of the largest and most progressive towns of Tazewell County. It has a population of fully 3,000 persons in the city limits, and is a prosperous industrial and commercial center. Water for the town is supplied from the subterranean stream of Abbs Valley, and a modern filtration plant, owned by the Pocahontas Light and Water Company, further purifies it for use.












The Retail Shopping Center for the Counties of Tazewell, Russell and Buchanan.





Beautiful reproductions of rare Colonial Coverlet patterns, as produced by the Clinch Valley Blanket Mills, of Cedar Bluff, Virginia, may be found in some of the best known homes of America and foreign countries. Yet, the prices at which these beautiful, all virgin wool coverlets are sold make them available for any home of taste and discrimination, no matter what the household budget limitations may be. The mills are operated by the four sons of the founder, C. O. Goodwin, who himself came from a family of English hand loom weavers which took up the handicraft as early as 1632. They are steeped in all the lore, skill and traditions of hand weaving, and today their beautiful products may be found in Alaska, Holland, Australia, Japan, England, and many other foreign countries.

In addition to the famous Colonial Coverlets, the Clinch Valley Mills manufacture Virgin Wool Blankets, Homespun, and Serge Materials for Ladies' Wear.

The mills, picturesquely located on the banks of the historic Clinch River, in the mountains of Tazewell County, Virginia, are visited each year by thousands of tourists attracted by the fame of their products.





The Pocahontas Fuel Company, Inc., of Pocahontas, Tazewell County, Virginia, is the largest producer of bituminous coal in the United States, having twenty-three major operations in Virginia and West Virginia.

Over ten thousand persons are employed by this company, four thousand at the operations in Tazeweil Gounty, which are located at Pocahontas, Bishop, Amonate and Boissevain. At least fifteen thousand persons live in the communities of this company in Tazewell County. This company's great tonnage is sold in the United States, with millions of tons going to Italy, Greece, Holland and South America. The company maintains its own fleet of steamers for carrying its sea-borne tonnage.

The many communities of this coal company, in Tazewell and West Virginia, are modern centers, with schools, churches and all modern conventences. Hospitalization is given at a very nominal cost, with comfortable, up-to-date ambulances serving every colliery.



The Chicago House Furnishing Company, of Bluefield, Va., is not only one of the largest retail furniture companies in the Virginias, but is one of the pioneer business concerns of the section, as well.
