CHAIRMAN OF STATE BOARD OF EXAMINERS.

To Examining Board: Require each applicant to read these instructions before entering upon the examination.

Instructions Tennessee Uniform Examinations

The State examinations shall be under the supervision of the State Board of Examiners. Examinations shall be conducted in each County of the State at the County Seats, and also at the following points, on May 14 and 15 and July 16 and 17.

East Tennessee—Johnson City, Knoxville, and Chattanooga
Middle Tennessee—Murfreesboro, Nashville, and Cookeville.
West Tennessee—Memphis, Jackson, Paris, and Savannah.

BOARD

1—The examination in each county shall be conducted by a board consisting of three members: County Superintendent of Schools, Chairman of County Board of Education and a third person appointed by the State Superintendent.

TIME AND MANNER

2—It shall be held at such place as the local board may select and shall begin not earlier than seven A.M. nor later than eight A.M. each morning, and in a manner hereinafter set out according to the Uniform Examination Law.

APPLICANT MUST PAY FEE

3—The applicant must pay the fees prescribed by law: \$3.50 for high school examinations, \$2.50 for elementary examinations, and \$1.00 for reading circle examinations, before entering into examination, and it shall be the duty of the local examining board to see that each person in county examination applying for admission to the hall where the examination is to be conducted has a receipt filled out and signed by the county trustee showing that he has paid the fee and this shall be his ticket of admission into the examination hall.

DIPLOMAS FROM STATE

4—Applicants who present Diplomas from institutions recognized by the State Board of Education and are granted license to teach without examination shall pay the regular fees, and graduates of State Schools recognized by law shall pay the regular fees, except graduates of such state schools shall be required to pay no fees for the year of their graduation.

COUNTY TRUSTEE 2 PER CENT COMMISSION

5—The county trustee is furnished with a triplicate receipt form which he will fill out, giving one to the applicant, retaining one for himself and sending the other with one-half of the funds collected from this source, less his commission of two per cent, to the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, S. H. Thompson, Nashville, Tenn.

STATE EXAMINERS

6—At points where the state examinations will be conducted the Chairman of the examining committee will be furnished with a triplicate receipt form which he will fill out, giving one to the applicant, retaining one for himself and sending the other together with all funds collected from this source to State Superintendent of Public Instruction, S. H. Thompson, Nashville, Tenn.

- 7—The applicant must finish the examination at this sitting in order to get a certificate, as no grade made in this examination may be included in the next.
- 8—The seating arrangement shall be under the direction of the local examining committee. The fine for giving information in any form, whatever, shall be not less than \$100 and in extreme cases the transgressor may be imprisoned.
- 9—The chairman of the local examining board shall, after all applicants are in the hall and seated, give to each person a number to be used instead of his name throughout the entire examination. Of course no two persons must use the same number as the grading committee will know the examination papers only by number.
- 10—After all applicants are numbered the chairman will then distribute the cards to be filled out by each applicant.
- 11—On a blank sheet furnished by the state the local committee will keep a complete record of all persons taking the examination as to number and name and address and color. This record shall be mailed to the State Superintendent, together with the cards.
- 12—The applicant should be careful in filling out the card to give his number, name, address, color, county, date, and kind of examination. He must also sign the statement as to moral character, age, habits, etc.
- 13—It shall be the business of the local examining committee to see to it that all cards are properly filled out and that the number placed on the card by the applicant is the same as the number given the applicant by the chairman of the board, and further that this number corresponds with the number on the record sheet kept by the committee.
- 14—The cards shall then be assembled, and together with the sheet, enclosed in an envelope and mailed to State Superintendent S. H. Thompson, Nashville, Tenn., where they shall be kept on file for reference in filling out certificates.
- 15—Remember your number and use it instead of your name throughout the examination. See that it is on the heading of each paper.
- 16—All applicants shall use regulation paper furnished by the state. They shall number answers in the middle of the page and write legibly. The number of each answer must correspond to the number of the question.
- 17—The Examining Committee shall open the questions in the presence of the applicants and give each a copy. At the expiration of the time designated on each list of questions the examining committee shall take up the papers of all applicants—shall see that these papers are properly headed and numbered, and shall then place them in an envelope prepared for this purpose, seal and mark as to subject and county.
- 18—No communication of any character shall be allowed during examination.

- 19—The examining board shall receive no papers unless these papers bear the number of the applicant and the county in which the examination is being held.
- 20—At the close of each day all envelopes containing papers on the different subjects shall be assembled, boxed, and mailed to S. H. Thompson, Chairman State Board of Examiners, Nashville, Tenn.

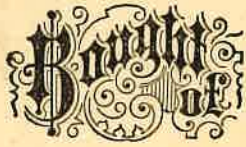
