The original copy of Dr. John's Minutes  
was hand-written (by him) and is owned  
by a granddaughter, who lived in  
Charlotte, N.C. I believe. Several had  
copied from it before I even knew it  
existed (this was 1952). I was so excited  
I offered to print it, just to preserve it—  
(with proper footnotes added.) The owner  
didn't want this done so I gave it  
up. However, her brother, who lived  
in Johnson City (has since died)  
gave his permission — I am truly  
sorry that I gave up so easily —

a grand-niece of Dr. Abraham Joke - he was a brother of my grandfather, Lipton Joke — one of the founders of Johnson City, Tenn.

Dr. Joke practiced medicine for many years, around Elk Park, Spruce Pine, Burnsville, N.C. Later, he moved to Elizabethton, Tenn.

He had four daughters and one son. His oldest daughter, Hattie, was married first — to Nathaniel W. Taylor, brother of the famous Bob & Alf Taylor. Her second husband was Nathaniel E. Harris, Ex-gov. of Georgia. Other descendants include many prominent names in Tenn. history — the Millers, Hunters, Jokes, etc.

Dr. Joke was a man of unusual capabilities, varied interests, excellent personality, popular and well-liked. He had many business interests but made little money — always lending, helping others — serving his Master and his fellowman — and always serving his beloved country <sup>but sure making</sup> <sub>(money was not very important)</sub>

He came from a distinguished ancestry who came to Watauga settlement from Shenandoah County Va. 1777 - He had four grants of land from N.C. His mother, Ruth Lipton Joke, was a granddaughter of Col. John Lipton, famous in early Tenn. history.

Dr. Abraham John was always deeply interested. II  
in the welfare of the Indians, as you will see by reading  
this. In 1836 - aged 19 - he volunteered to protect whites and  
Indians - and to help remove them, safely, to Okla.  
(However, this is a dark blot on U.S. history.)

Graduated from Transylvania University -  
Lexington, Ky - 1849. Served 31 years as special  
agent for post office in N.C. + S.C. Was at bedside  
of Andrew Johnson when he died, near Elizabethton -  
Note what he says about a picture made of scene - this was  
a Currier + Ives print (made them of prominent people,  
but usually from imagination or photographs - Uncle Abe's so good,  
must have had photograph. I now own two of these but he  
never saw one.

Practiced medicine wherever he was and whenever  
needed. Spoke three Indian languages fluently -  
Cherokee, Creek (spent 2 yrs. with Creek, I wonder why?)  
and Chippewa. Was sent to northern Minnesota to  
make treaty with Chippewas for U.S. Gov't. Interesting  
account here - detailed one in Washington.

My mother and father used to give me a  
compliment years ago (they did not consider it one!)  
when they found I was so interested in so many  
things - they would say, "you are just like Uncle  
Abe" Bless his heart! I hope I am. I am  
deeply grateful -
