

day of September 1849, for which his notes
under seal have been this day executed to me,

WIDOW'S PENSION.

I Certify That, in conformity with the Law of the United States, approved March 9, 1878, Fannie Thompson, widow of George W. Thompson, who was a Private of Captain William Hill's Company Virginia Militia, is inscribed on the PENSION ROLL of the Knoxville Agency, at the rate of eight dollars per month, to commence on the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, and to continue during her widowhood.

By Act of Congress approved February 28, 1883, section 4745 of the Revised Statutes was amended to read as follows:

Any pledge, mortgage, sale, assignment, or transfer of any right, claim, or interest in any pension which has been, or may hereafter be, granted, shall be void and of no effect; and any person who shall pledge, or receive as a pledge, mortgage, sale, assignment, or transfer of any right, claim, or interest in any pension, or pension certificate, which has been, or may hereafter be granted or issued, or who shall hold the same as collateral security for any debt, or promise, or upon any pretext of such security, or promise, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in a sum not exceeding one hundred dollars and the costs of the prosecution; and any person who shall retain the certificate of a pensioner and refuse to surrender the same upon the demand of the Commissioner of Pensions, or a United States Pension Agent, or any other person, authorized by the Commissioner of Pensions, or the pensioner, to receive the same, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in a sum not exceeding one hundred dollars and the costs of the prosecution.
