I John Drake bind myself to pay John S. Houser the sum of Four thousand dollars. The condition of this obligation is such that whereas the said John Houser has this day purchased of me for the sum of five thousand Dollars, on the following payments, to wit. One thousand Dollars on or against the first day of September next, Five hundred dollars on or against the first day of September 1849. and the other Five hundred on or against the first day of September 1854 which last payment is to draw interest from the first day of September 1849. for which his notes under seal have been this day executed to me, a tract of land in Sullivan County (and in Civil District No 6 of said County) and State of Tennessee, containing two hundred and ninety five acres, and adjoining the lands of John Hunker, Abraham Deets and Blackamores old tract, & Peter Yeakley, and lying on Reedy Creek. Now if I should make or cause to be made to the said John S. Houser, his heirs or assigns a good and sufficient title in fee simple, with general warranty to said tract of land <sup>on making of the last payment</sup> then this obligation to be void. For the faithful performance of which stipulations above mentioned, I bind myself my heirs &c to the said John S. Houser in the penal sum of Two hundred Dollars. I Certify That, in conformity with the Law of the United States, approved March 9, 1878, Fannie Thompson, widow of George W. By Act of Congress approved February 28, 1883, section 4745 of the Revised Statutes was amended to read as follows:

Any pledge, mortgage, sale, assignment, or transfer of any right, claim, or interest in any pension which has been, or may hereafter be, granted, shall be void and of no effect; and any person who shall pledge, or receive as a pledge, mortgage, sale, assignment or transfer of any right, claim, or interest in any pension, or pension certificate, which has been, or may hereafter be granted or issued, or who shall hold the same as collateral security for any debt, or promise, or upon any pretext of such security, or promise, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in a sum not exceeding one hundred dollars and the costs of the prosecution; and any person who shall retain the certificate of a pensioner and refuse to surrender the same upon the demand of the Commissioner of Pensions, or a United States Pension Agent, or any other person, authorized by the Commissioner of Pensions, or the Pensioner, to receive the same, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in a sum not exceeding one hundred dollars and the costs of the prosecution.
