Fall Term begins Aug. 7th, closes Dec. 24th, 1877. Second Term begins Jan 10th, 1878; closes May 29th, 1878.

## Expenses.

Tuition per term of 5 months in Higher English, Mathematics and the Languages, \$12 50. Tuition per term of 5 months in the Intermediate Department, Common English, \$10 00. Tuition per term in the lower grade, \$7 50. Music at the usual rates. Each student will pay \$1 00 per annum for fuel and incidental expenses.

At the time of entering students will be examined as to the grade of their studies, and the amount of their tuition will be given them. On presentation of a receipt, for one half of their tuition from the Treasurer, or notice of a satisfactory security given him, of the prompt payment of said amount, the student will be enrolled and admitted to recitation.

Boarding can be had in pleasant families at from \$2 00 to \$2 50 per week. Students living in the dormitories can procure meals at \$1 50 per week.

Dormitories can be had, rent free, where students can board themselves at one half the expense of boarding in families.

The following is a Practical Scientific Classical Course of Study.

The first is designed to fit students for practical business life, or for teaching. The Classical Course, in addition, fits students for college.

### General Statement.

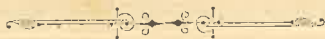

# MONUMENT

FOR PROF. JOSEPH H. KETTRON, A. M.,

Of Bloomingdale, Tenn.



DEAR FRIEND—

At the urgent request of many students and friends of the late Prof. Joseph H. Ketron, A. M., principal, Kingsley Seminary, Bloomingdale, Tenn., deceased Nov. 1, 1901; a meeting of his students and friends was called Nov. 18, 1901, and discussed plans as to the erection of a suitable monument in memory of the said Joseph H. Ketron, as a last tribute of respect, of those who held him in the highest esteem, giving his time, energies and life for his students and friends; therefore the following resolutions were offered and unanimously adopted by all present:

RESOLVED, 1st. That we do earnestly desire to erect a monument in honor of Prof. Joseph H. Ketron as a last tribute of respect costing from \$500.00 to \$1000.00.

2nd. That the inscription shall be, "IN MEMORY OF PROF. JOSEPH H. KETRON, BY HIS MANY STUDENTS AND FRIENDS."

3rd. In order that the committee on purchase and erection of said monument may know what priced monument to buy, all donors are urged to report at once and pay same between this and April 1st, 1902.

4th. It is desired that the said monument be erected and dedicated with appropriate services not later than September 1st, 1902; notice thereof being given in the secular and religious papers previous thereto.

5th. That this is to be a voluntary offering, the gifts of each being recognized; furthermore it was not suggested, nor asked, nor expected by the immediate relatives; but will be highly appreciated and liberally contributed to by them.

6th. In view of the forty-one (41) years of labor and sacrifice as a teacher; twenty-four (24) years of which he spent in Kingsley Seminary, in which one thousand and four (1004) were students; we believe every student and friend will regard it a privilege and an honor to contribute, as liberally as his circumstances will admit, to this worthy cause.

7th. A record of the names and amounts of all donors shall be kept and names of said donors read (but not the amount) on day of dedication; thereby recognizing all alike, making it possible for every one to pay a tribute of respect to this man of God.

8th. Please to enclose the amount you are willing to contribute to this worthy cause and send to Rev. J. C. Hodge, Sec'y and Treas., Joseph H. Ketron Memorial Monument, Bloomingdale, Tenn.

9th. The officers whose names appear below have been duly elected and are authorized to act in their respective positions.
