In view of the forty-one (41) years of labor and sacrifice as a teacher; twenty-four (24) years of which he spent in Kingsley Seminary, in which one thousand and four (1004) were students; we believe every student and friend will regard it a privilege and an honor to contribute, as liberally as his circumstances will admit, to this worthy cause.

7th. A record of the names and amounts of all donors shall be kept and names of said donors read (but not the amount) on day of dedication; thereby recognizing all alike, making it possible for every one to pay a tribute of respect to this man of God.
