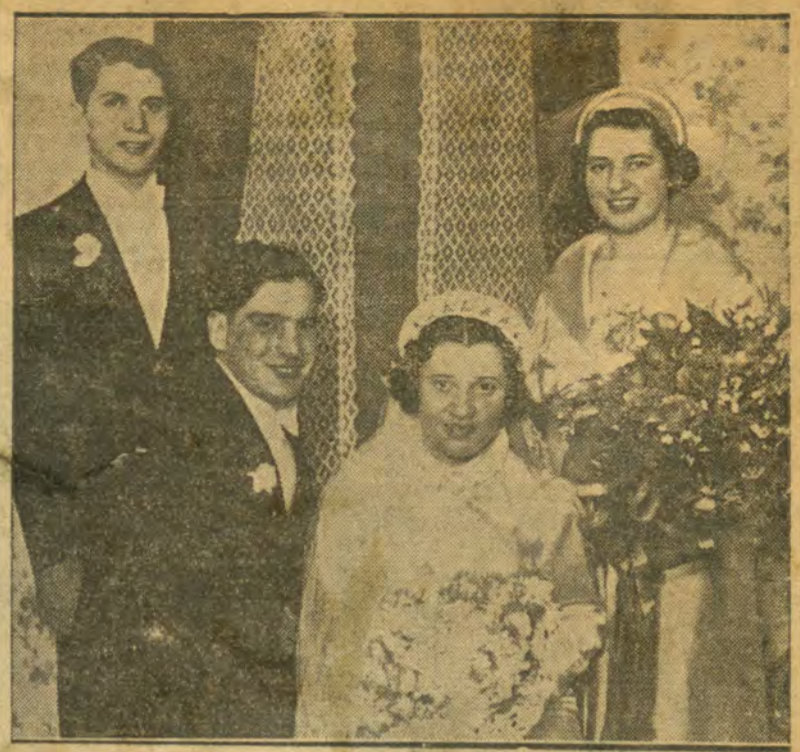

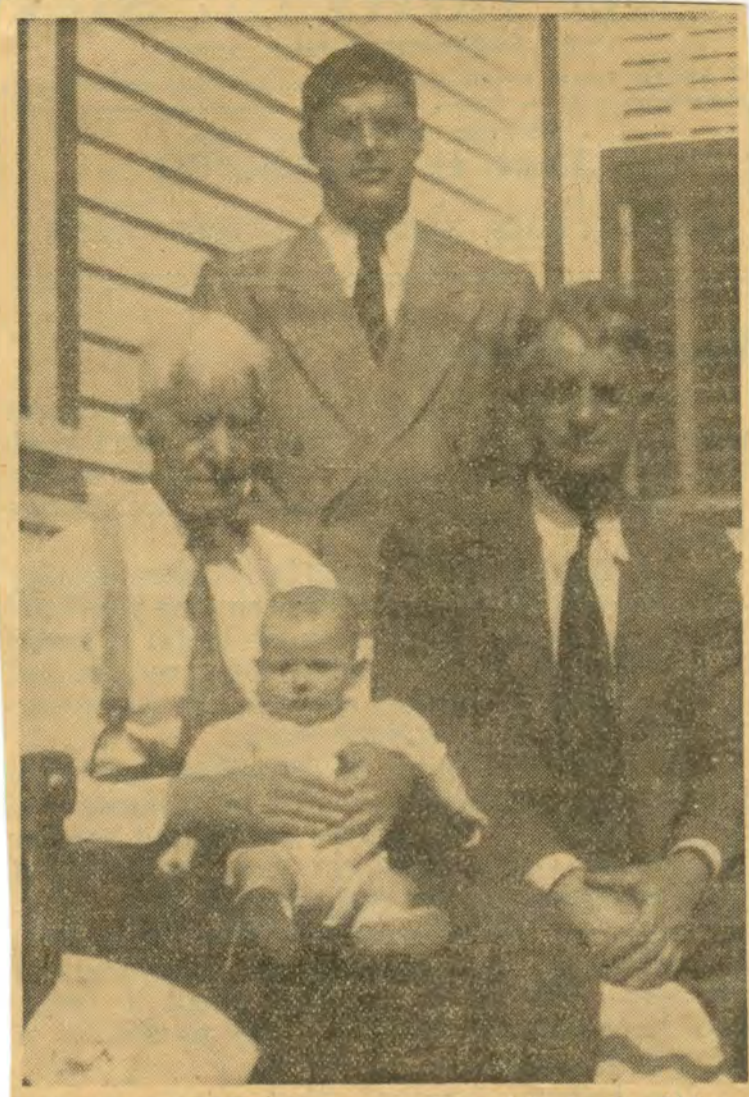

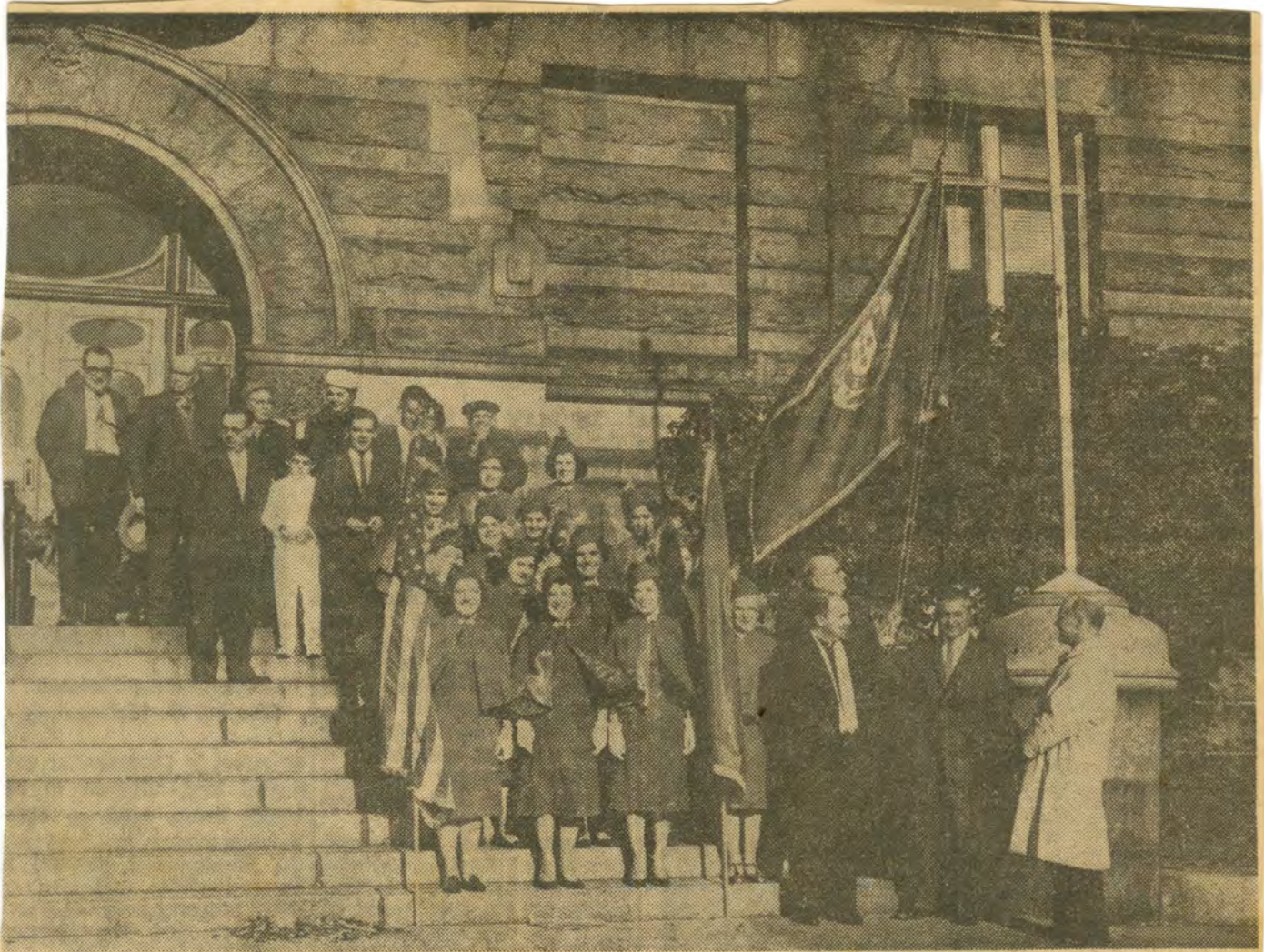

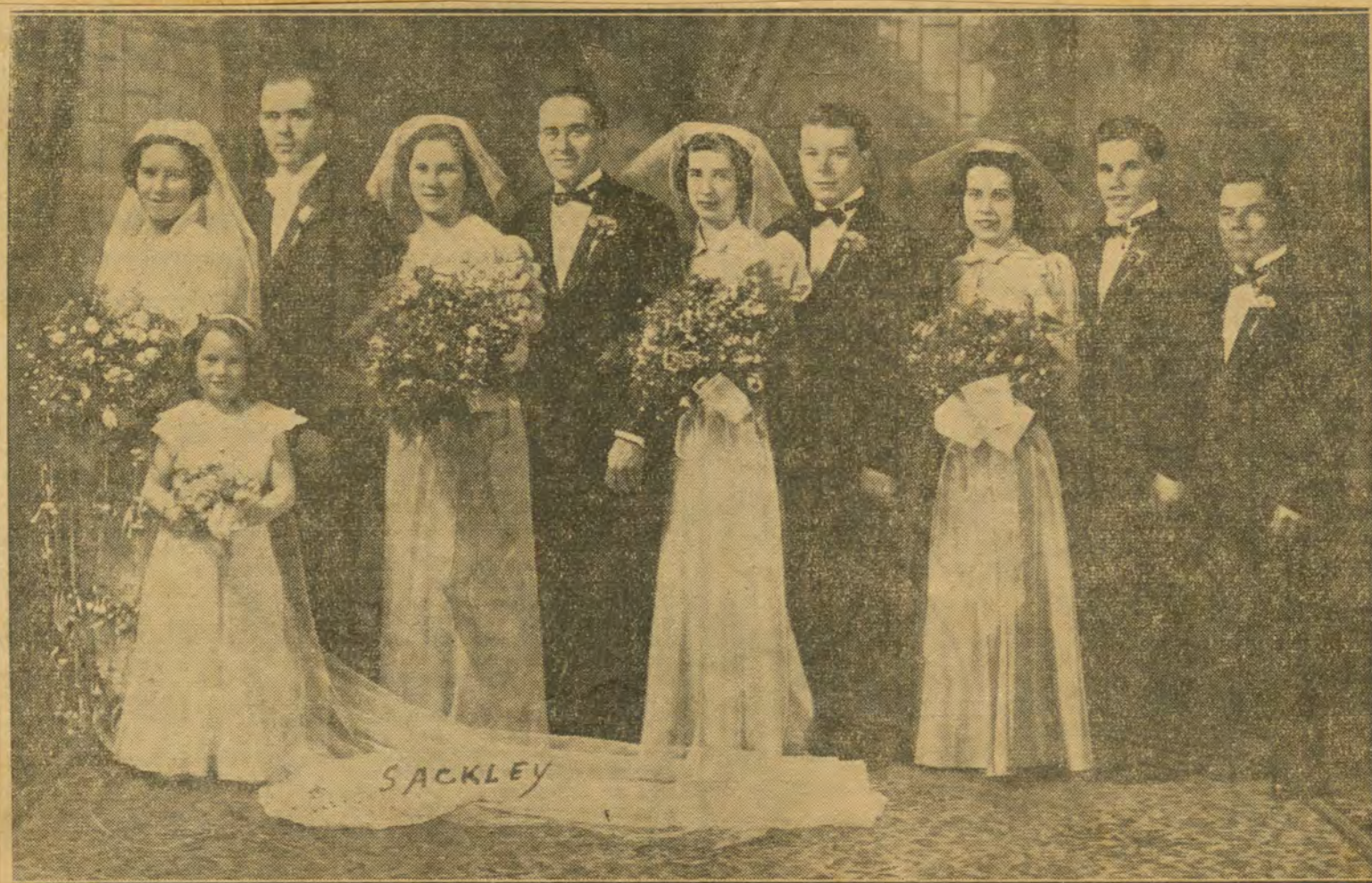

Nesta hora de genuina alegria para vós, por vos encontrardes entre conterraneos, e de supremo orgulho para nós, colonos portugueses, que jámais esqueceremos a Patria que nos serviu de berço, esse lindo Portugal das gloriosas Epopeias Marítimas, saudamos-vos com o coração a trasbordar de fé e reconhecimento—fé na vossa coragem indômita que é segura garantia da continuidade da terra lusa como nação; reconhecimento, por terdes vindo com a vossa presença suavisar as saudades que alanceiam os nossos corações de emigrantes.

Sêde bemvidos a esta cidade americana, que o génio dos portugueses, á semelhança dos seus antepassados que sob a égide do sabio Infante de Sagres levaram o nome de Portugal aos confins do mundo, tornaram conhecida atravez de todo o vasto Continente Americano graças á sua pericia e coragem na pesca da baleia; e grande, devido ás suas qualidades ingentes de ordem e trabalho, antes da crise que a avassalou como acontecera no resto do paiz Norte-Americano.

Não vos podem receber com grandes aparatos de riqueza, porque são humildes operarios de fabrica á quem a fortuna não sorriu. Receber-vos-ão contudo de braços abertos, porque são ricos de nobres sentimentos que nem o tempo nem a distancia conseguiram embotrar. 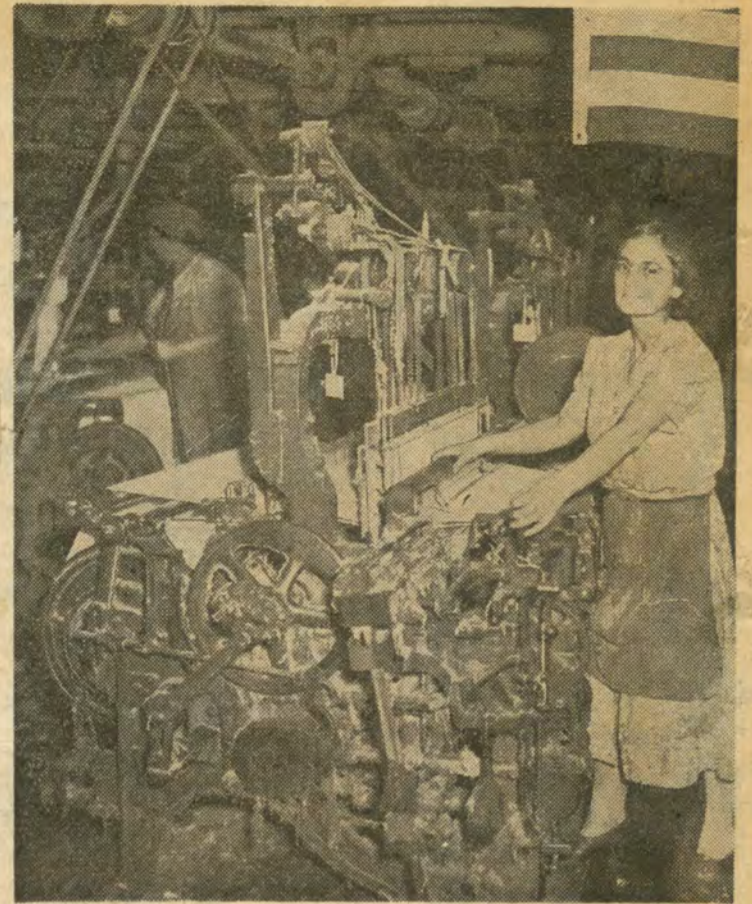

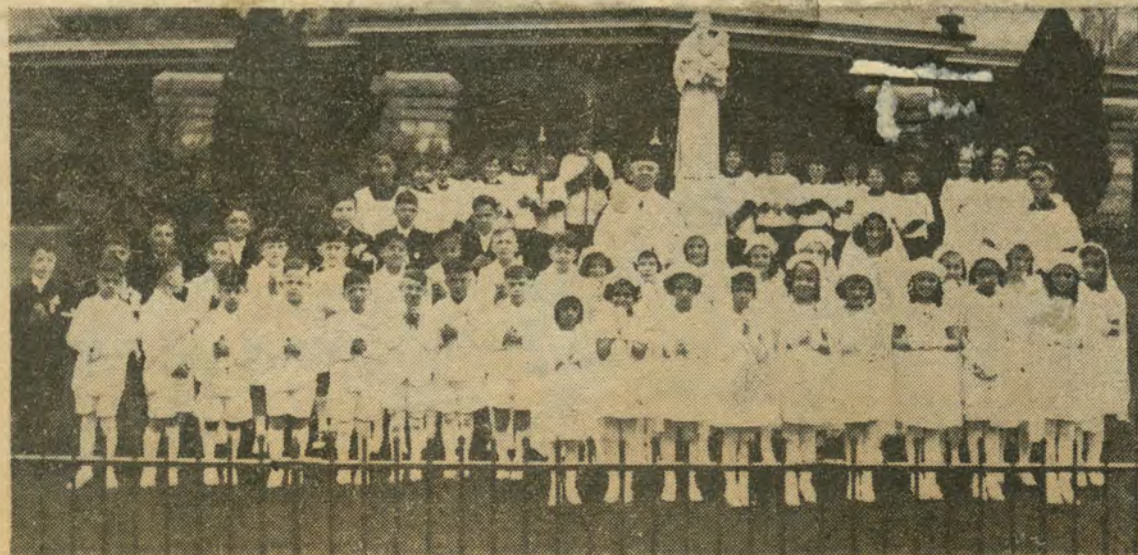

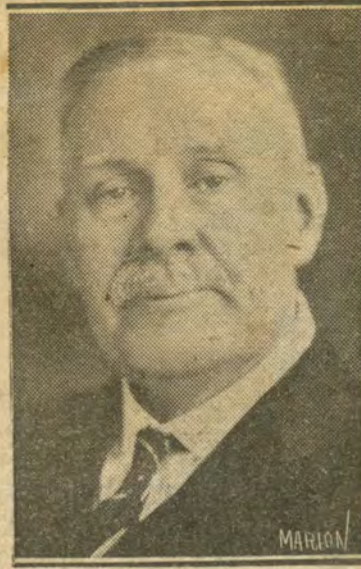

Lowell Soldier's Death Cancels Wedding Plans

By GENE R. CASEY

Behind today's Army list of 30 Massachusetts youths and men killed in action in North Africa, the South Pacific and Europe lies many a heart-rending story.

Probably the most touching is that of the Lowell soldier who was expecting a furlough home from a southern camp and planned to take advantage of the time by marrying his sweetheart. Instead, just when the furlough was due, he was sent overseas and went to his death in the North African invasion.

The soldier was Private Charles Pereira, better known to Lowell friends who admired his athletic prowess as Charles Perry. His heart-broken fiancée is Miss Beatrice Abreau, also of Lowell.

There are stories of men who died in the sky, on land and sea, and, through this new casualty list, the fighting touched intimately for the first time several Bay State communities, whose residents learned of their first neighbors killed in action.

Among these was 25-year-old Lieut. George George, first man from Holbrook to be drafted, first to be commissioned an officer, and first to die in action.

Another was private Thomas F. Lanigan, well-known Maynard High School athlete and the first Maynard man reported killed.

Two Northampton young men on the list, private first class William W. Puchalski and private Francis S. Ansanitis, were inducted on the same day—March 4, 1941—and apparently were killed about the same time . . . possibly on the same day.

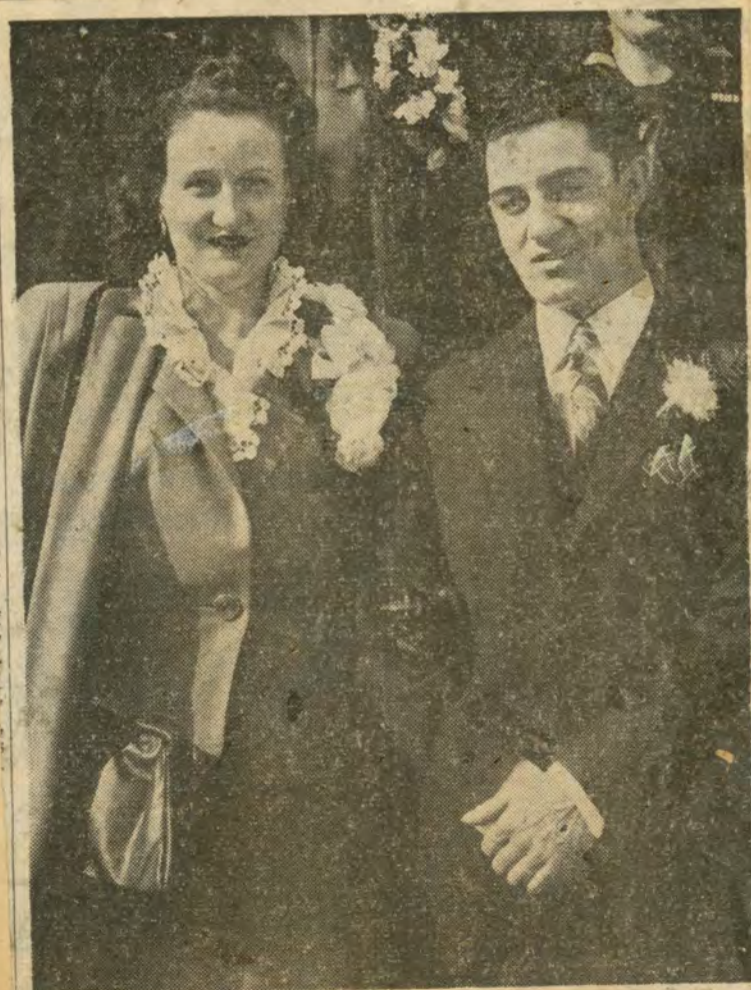

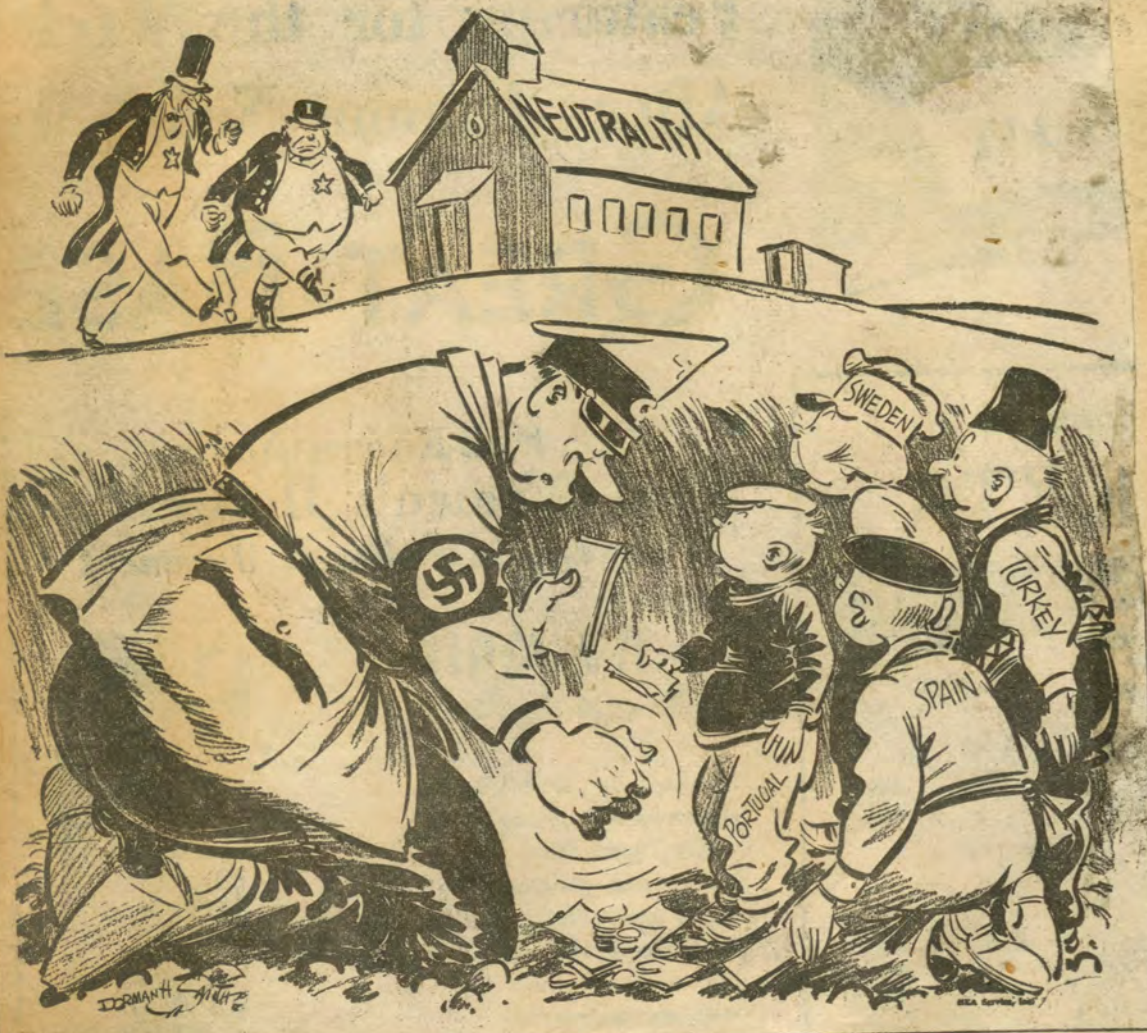


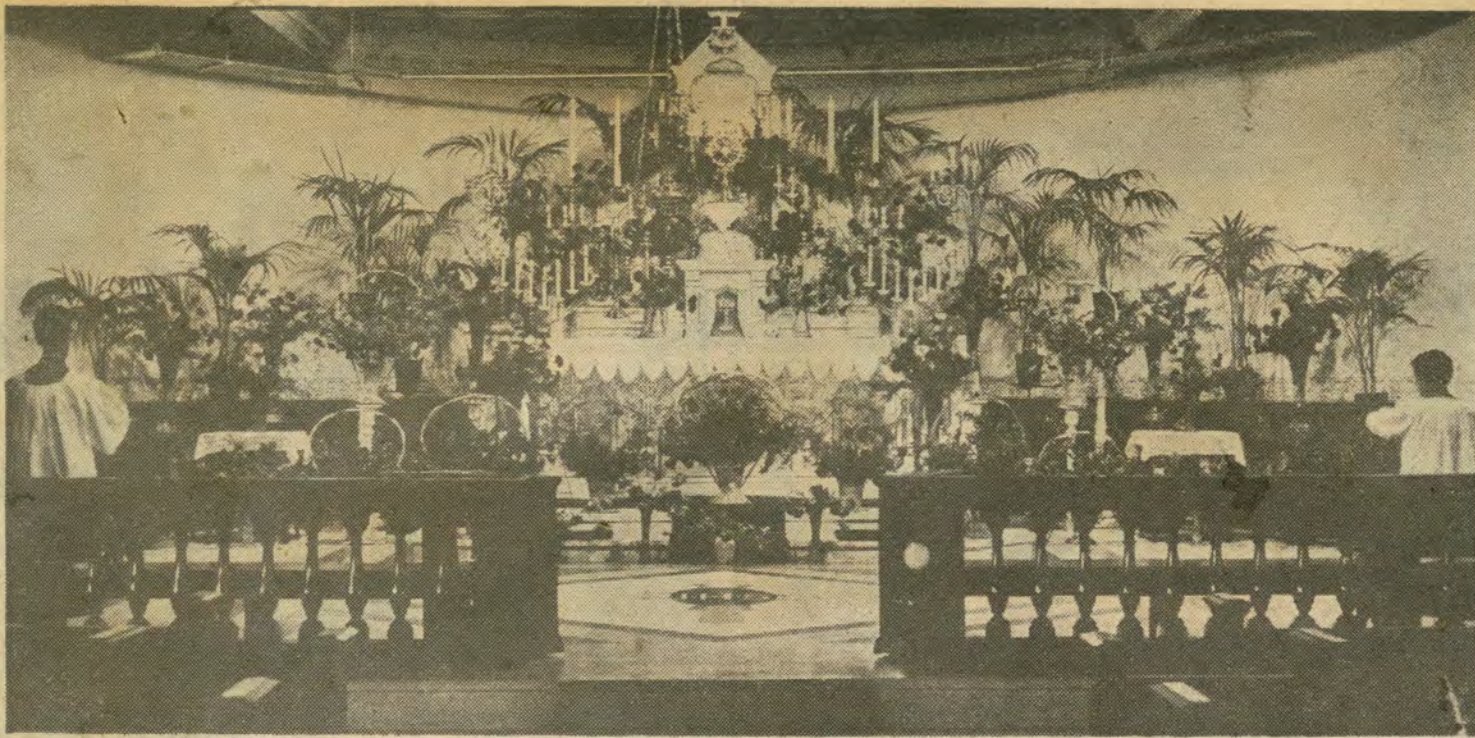

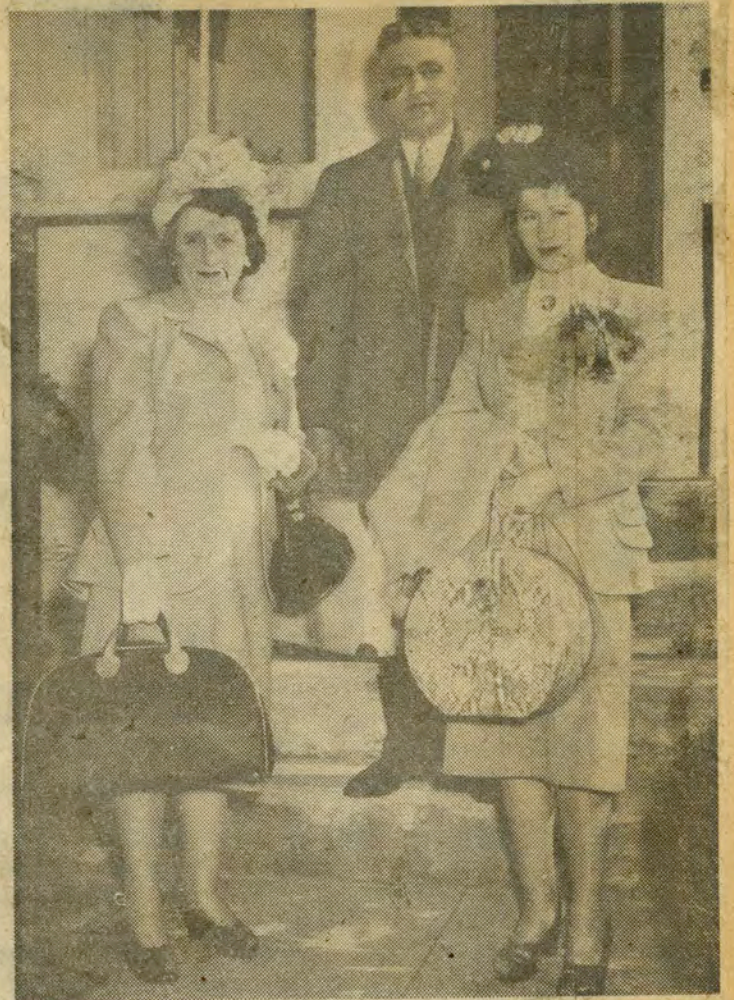

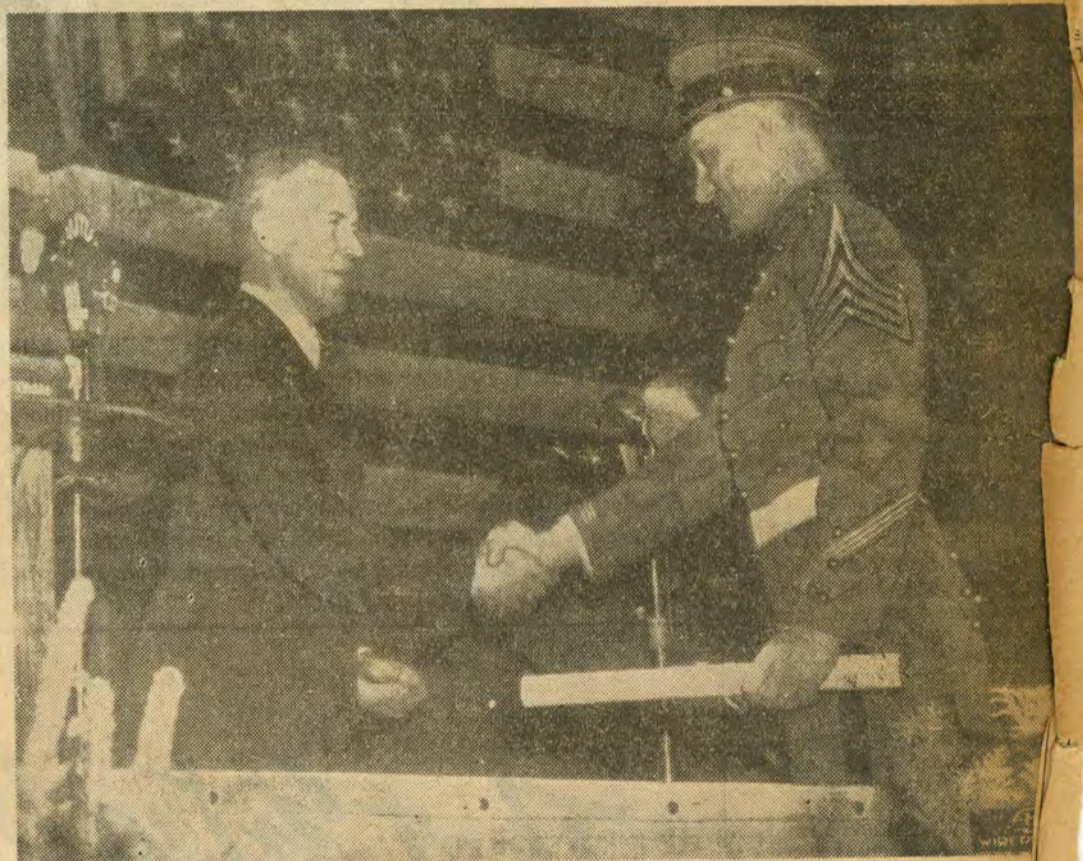

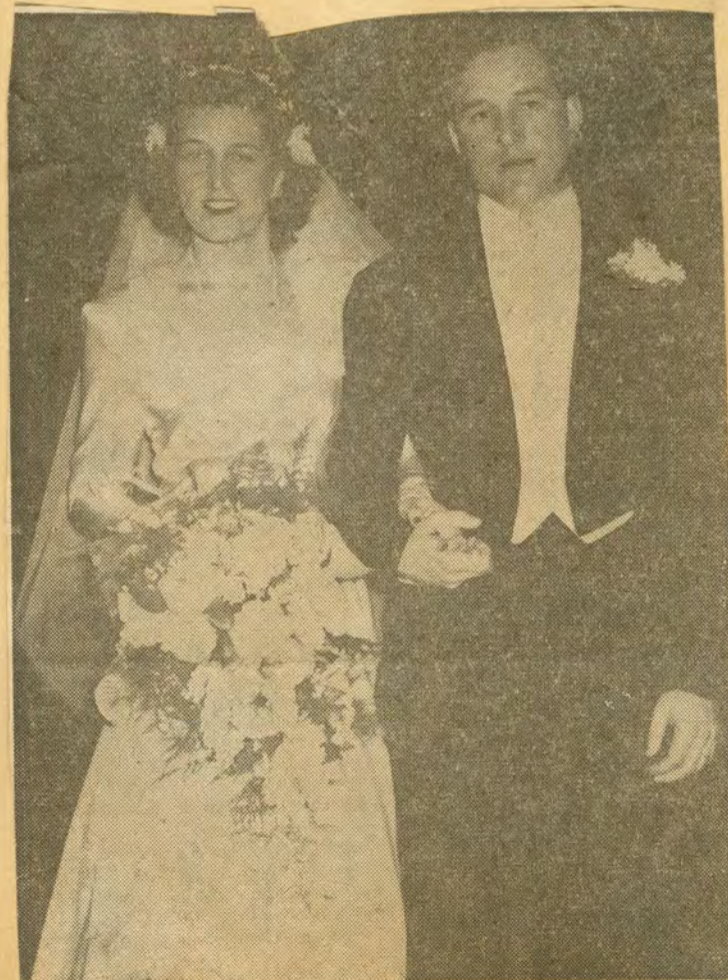

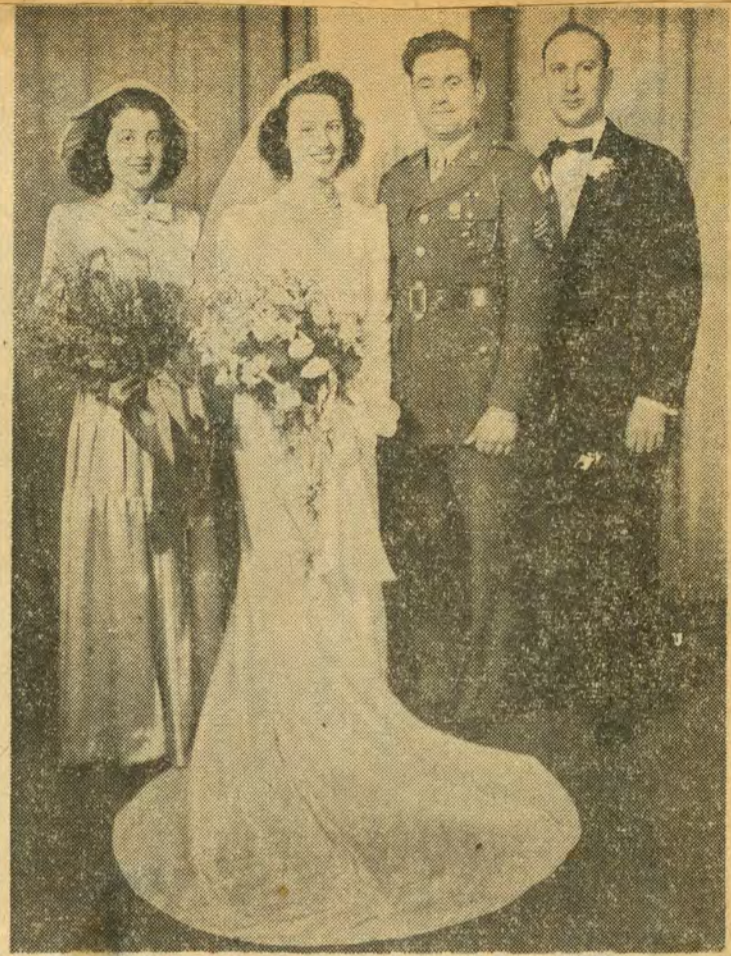

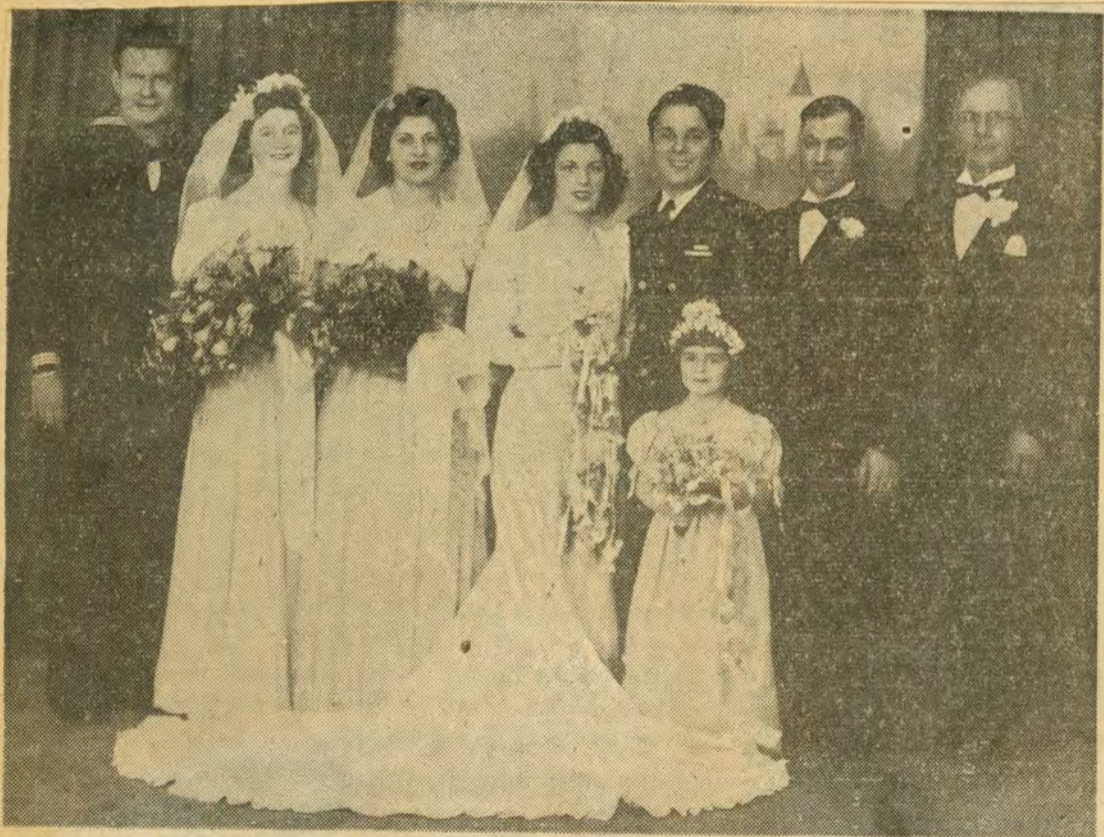

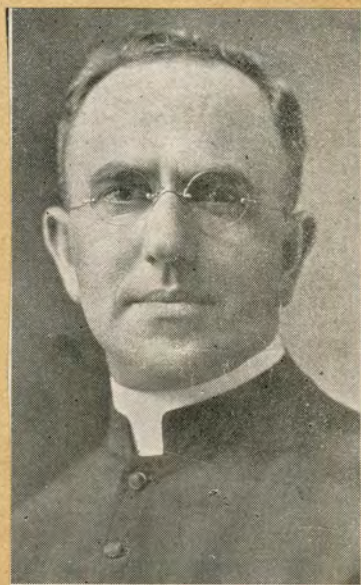

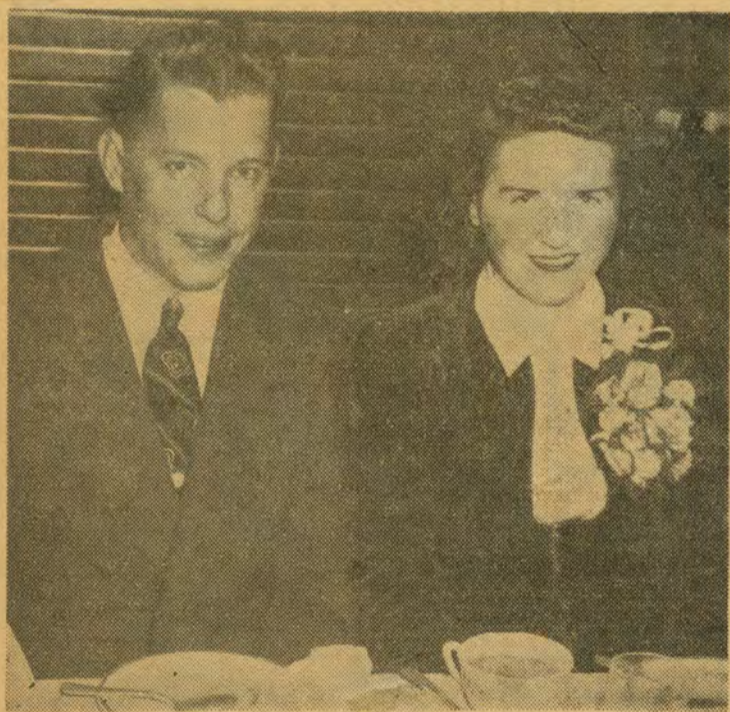

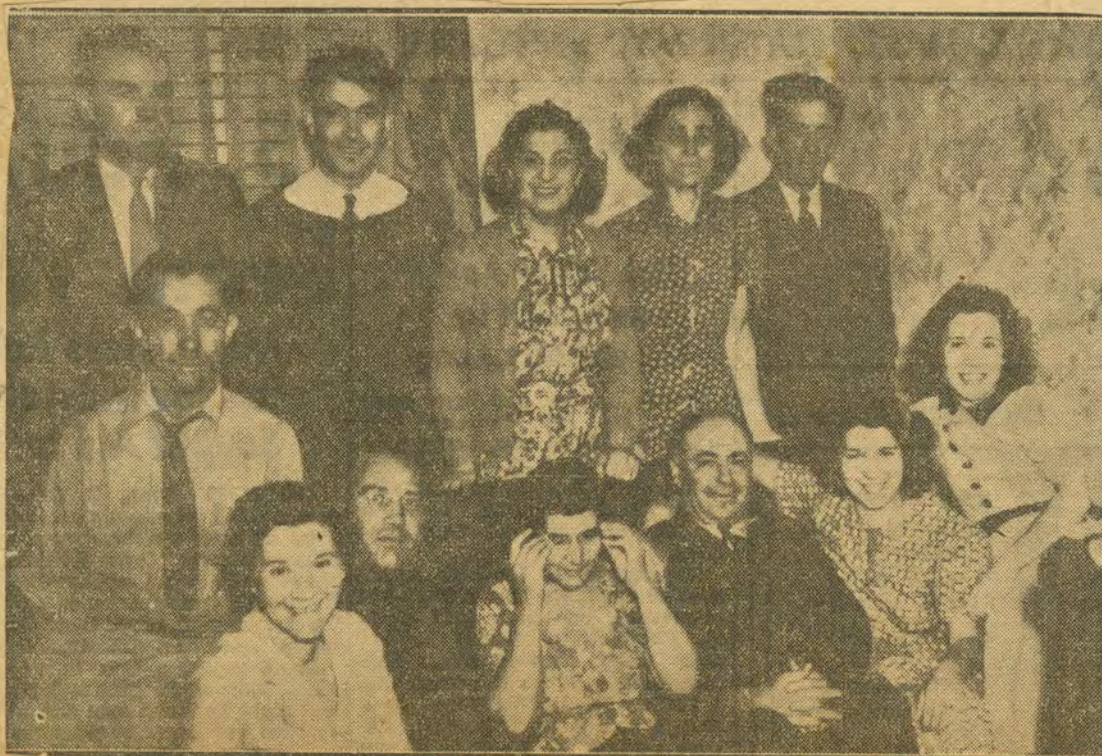

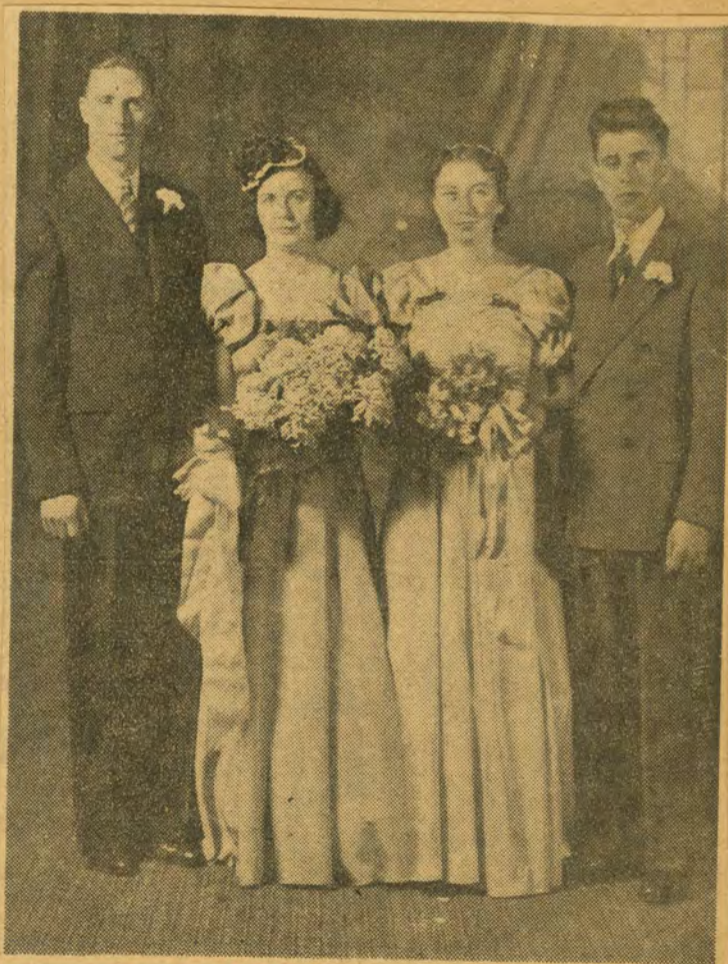
