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Why We Are Called Lutherans.

Our church is generally known by the name of "The Lutheran Church." It is no part of our original and proper designation. Our church is simply "The Evangelical Church" or "The Church of the Augsburg Confession." In a sectarian sense, we quite oppose the use of the name of Luther, or of any mere man, not only as objectionable, but sinful. Luther, himself, has spoken very distinctly, and strongly, on this point.

"I am bound," he says, "to admonish those who scandalize the holy Gospel. I wish people to be silent as regards my name, and to let themselves be called, not Lutherans, but Christians. The doctrine is not mine. St. Paul would not permit Christians to say, I am of Paul, or of Peter, but of Christ. Let us put away party names, and bear the name of Christ, whose doctrine we hold."

The name was first applied in derision by the Romanists.

We are Lutherans in the sense that we profess the doctrines which God restored to light by the instrumentality of his blessed servant, Dr. Luther. We accept, hold and teach the doctrine he taught, as the pure doctrine of Christ. We believe the articles of faith which Luther taught and defended, and receive them as the pure Gospel of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. Let those disown him who disown his doctrine; we hold the Gospel as he held and preached it, and, therefore, we cannot hesitate to take the name Lutheran.—Ecclesia Lutherana by Dr. Seiss.

THE LIBRARY

DR. HAUPT'S RECENT JOURNEY.

During the beautiful October days Rev. Dr. and Mrs. Haupt, in fulfilment of a pleasant duty, were absent from the city. Their tour led them to the pretty town of Lancaster, New Hampshire, in the heart of the remarkable White Mountain region. Starting on October 5, the course led through Philadelphia during the historic Founders' Week, and thence via New York, and Long Island Sound to Fall River and Boston. From the Massachusetts capital the cities of Lowell, Nashua, Manchester and Concord were traversed. Then the pretty lake country of New Hampshire's midland region was seen; and after touching the valley of the Connecticut at Wells River, the journey northward terminated in the pretty town of Lancaster with its neat frame houses of white.

The time of the year was most opportune for the journey, as the changing tints on the majestic mountains and forests that encircle Lancaster were marvellously fine. The rivers are nearly all clear mountain streams, and the sight of the lofty peaks of Mount Washington, Mounts Adams, Jefferson, etc., was not more familiar

than inspiring.

The return homeward was through the world-famous Crawford Notch at the base of snowy Mount Washington, past groves of white birches young pines onward toward Portland, Maine, by way of Sebago Lake. From Portland the way led into Boston, past old Bunker Hill monument, and crossing that city onward to New York and Philadelphia, and, at length, Lancaster, Pa.

It is hoped on November 20 to have ar evening of travel with the pastor, when he will describe, to all who may attend, his journey into this wonderland of Nature.
