#### THE GUILD OF GRACE.

This society, composed of the young ladies of the Sunday School, was organized in January, 1907, and up to the present time has an enrollment of forty members.

Upon organizing, our first step was to put out "tapes" for a "mile of pennies" which up to the present time have amounted to \$216. We ask all persons still having these tapes in their possession to kindly hand them in to the treasurer as soon as possible

Since our organization scarcely more than a year ago, we have been able to place into the Sunday School fund \$385—\$185 the proceeds of the bean supper and \$200 to pay for the dormer windows in the church.

#### PALM SUNDAY AND EASTER.
