The report of the Building Committee was read and the committee was authorized to issue bonds to the amount of \$40,000 in denominations as they deemed nec-The financial secretary has essary. given us the following: Total member. ship, 926; number using envelopes, 583; contributing but not using envelopes, 29; total contributing, 612; do not contribute at all 314.

If each member would contribute weekly 10 cents it would amount to \$4.815.20. Then if the weekly plate offerings would amount to \$13.09 the combined amount would be \$5,500the amount needed for current expenses.
