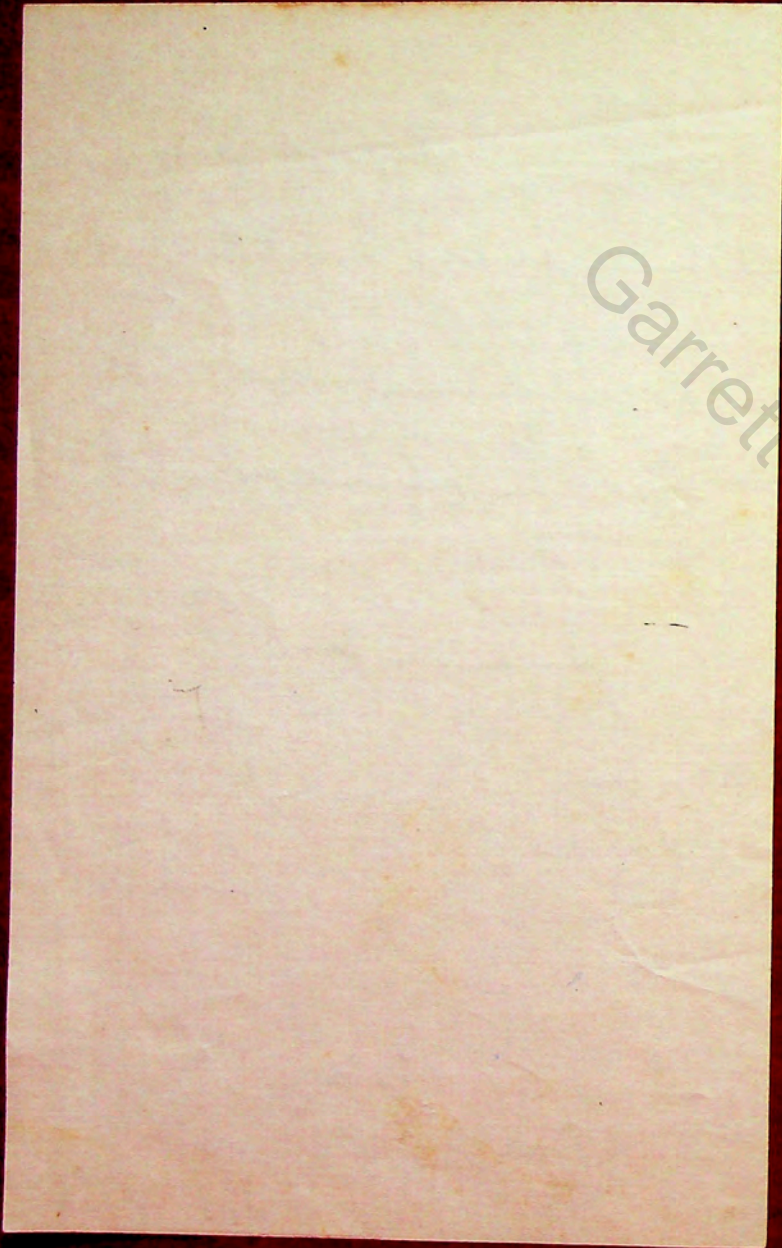

Minutes for May, 1941 meeting. Chapel Guild.

The Chapel Guild met on May 12th in the home of Mrs. W^m Mac Nulty with Mrs. Thompson assisting hostess. Eight members were present. The treasurer reported a balance of \$148.12; \$85.91 of which is the organ fund. It was voted that the dues of 15¢ per month (\$1.80 per year) be continued. It was decided to defer the tea and exhibit, as suggested by Mrs. Coelius, until in the Fall. Mrs. Fingering offered to have a card party on May 23 for the benefit of the organ fund.

Mr. Safford reported that Sunday, June 8 was the 50th anniversary of the Chapel and the 5th anniversary of his own ordination. The secretary was requested to notify those who had moved away.

Everyone was asked to pay their dues and their plate money by the June meeting.

Minutes of the June meeting of the Chapel Guild ¹⁹⁴¹

The June meeting of the Chapel Guild was held at the home of Larry Penchance, 711 No. Triett and Mabel Kizer, assisting hostesses. There were sixteen present.

The treasurer reported a balance of \$153.⁰⁰, \$102 in the organ fund. We decided to buy desiccated and more vanilla.

Mrs. Akers asked to be removed from chairmanship of housekeeping committee. Mrs. Weaver volunteered to entertain at luncheon and bridge for the benefit of the organ fund. As their contribution, Mrs. Weaver + Mrs. DeFandoy donated all the food. (Incidentally it was a delightful lunch) Mrs. Stevens, ^{Mrs.} Richard Akers + Larry Penchance offered to assist.

Mr. Safford asked us to call on Mrs. Buck and Mrs. Alorah, newcomers to the park.

After a motion the meeting adjourned for the summer to meet again Oct. 13, 1941

Minutes of the Oct. meeting of Chapel Guild.

The Chapel Guild met on Oct. 13, 1941 at the home of Mrs. Thompson with Mrs. MacPalty assisting hostess. There were 12 present.

The Club accepted, with regret, the resignations of Mrs. Beck, Mrs. Hill and Larry Renshaw, ~~Mrs. Beck and~~ who find it impossible to be present at meetings. Mrs. Beck's resignation was accompanied by a generous contribution to be used as the club deems wise. The secretary was instructed to write a note of thanks.

Mrs. Ingeburg was persuaded to accept the ~~position~~^{office} of treasurer, vacated by the resignation of Larry.

The Gross income from sale of dishcloths was \$2.00. Mrs. Stevens reported \$6⁸⁵ from sale of magazines.

Mrs. Brown asked the pleasure of the

club about buying altar cloth lace at \$1²⁵ yd. The club voted to have Mrs. Brown buy such lace as is needed.

Mrs. Collins asked that she be permitted to have the brass vases, given by Dr. Windiate in memory of Mrs. Collins, re-engraved. This permission was granted by unanimous vote. Mrs. Brown offered to polish and lacquer them.

Mrs. Collins offered to make hand lotion for sale in the club (as by the club members). The price of this lotion will be 40¢ for the first bottle and 35¢ for re-fills. There were 14 orders.

Mrs. Weaver reported on Grace House on the mountain - It seems, with cold weather coming on, they could use all the clothing we could send. (St. Paul, Va. R.F.D. #1)

The Self-Keep^(Pony) Farm could use bacon fat. Anything, in fact, would be welcome.

The meeting adjourned to meet with Miss Rucker + Mrs. Richard Akers. over.

do more to cheer Mary Libbie.

It was also moved to take 70¢ from the treasury for a present for Ruth Bruce's expected baby. Mrs. Weener said she would appreciate ^{women} articles of clothing in good condition and offered to see that she received any that were donated.

The Guild desired to let the etching of the brass vases go for a while.

Mrs. Weaver suggested the music committee have Mr. Noaling give an estimate as to cost of conditioning a piano to be used in place of the organ; and the sum of \$2500 was voted for this.

Mrs. Weaver reported Ruth Bruce had written a very nice letter of thanks and appreciation for all sent her, and that progress was being made in getting her in a sanatorium.

Mrs. Rucker and Mrs. Triett had made squares for the Red Cross and they were joined by Miss Robinette making an exceptionally pretty afghan.

Thanks for what was given Uncle Bob at Christmas was conveyed by Mrs. Wells who purchased the necessary garments for him for the Gifted.
