Minutes of April 11, 1932.

The April meeting of the Garrett Park Chapel Guild was held at one o'clock, April 11, 1932 with Mrs. Ingers, Mrs. Tenney and Mrs. Darling acting as hostesses. After the luncheon, the meeting was opened by the singing of the hymn, "Stand Up for Jesus" and followed by the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting.

The first report called for was that of the nominating committee. The report was given by Mrs. Lee who commended the acting officers and submitted the following nominations for office for the coming year: - president, Mrs. Wells; vice president, Mrs. Beck; treasurer, Mrs. R. A. Chese; sec-

retary, Mrs. Moore. The nominations of the committee were accepted and the officers duly elected. The president then turned over the meeting to the new officers, Mrs. Beck presiding in the absence of Mrs. Wells.

The secretary was asked to write a letter of sympathy in behalf of the guild to Mrs. Wells in her bereavement.

A vote of thanks and appreciation was given to the outgoing officers for their splendid work during the past year.

The report of the Garden committee was then called for and was given by Mrs. Brown and Mrs. Dyer. They reported the Chapel grounds in good shape and stated

that they planned to have the rolling of the grounds and hemlock planting completed before turning over the work to the new committee at the next meeting. A question arose with regard to transplanting shrubs already on the Chapel grounds and Dr. Windiate authorized any transplanting approved by the committee.

A vote of thanks was given the Housekeeping Committee for the cleaning and decoration of the Chapel for Easter and appreciation expressed for the musical program given by the Glee Club at that time.

Dr. Windiate suggested the formation of a Chapel Choir and a musical program to be given once a month and a motion was

made that the new music committee
and Dr. Windeute work together
toward an organized choir.

Due to an increased attendance
at Sunday School, the teachers of
the primary department asked for
the use of the small room
back of the present classroom
and the Housekeeping Committee
stated that they would have the
room in order for the following
Sunday.

Plans for making alterations
in the primary room were dis-
cussed and it was moved that
the executive officers together with
the primary teachers meet with
the Board of Managers for this
purpose.
Mrs. Beck reported a family

in the park greatly in need and plans were made for bringing immediate assistance to the family through members of the guild working with the social service committee of the Woman's Club.

Following this, flowers for the altar for the two remaining Sundays in April and the first in May were promised as follows: Apr. 17, Mrs. DeFendorf; Apr. 24, Mrs. Brown; May 8, Mrs. Reushaw.

Mrs. Rapee and Mrs. Brown asked to be hostesses for the next meeting after which the meeting was adjourned to meet again in May.

Minutes of June 13, 1932.

The Chapel Guild met in regular session at the home of Mrs. Wells at one o'clock, June 13, 1932.

After a most enjoyable luncheon the meeting was opened by a prayer led by Dr. Windiate.

The minutes of the last meeting were read by the secretary and the following report given by the treasurer:

Outstanding bills were reported to the amount of \$15.75 and this together with the \$5 appropriated (appropriated) for garden tools left a balance of \$18.25.

The report on the doorway for the primary room giving an estimate of \$14 for the work was accepted. The committee authorized to proceed with work.

The committee to investigate the moving of the outbuilding on the chapel grounds reported that the moving was not deemed practical.

Water connection for the chapel was discussed in this connection but left for future planning on account of lack of funds.

It was moved that the rake borrowed from Mr. Chism and broken be replaced and \$1.25 was voted to cover the cost.

Dr. Windiate reported that the stone from the road had been

donated and could be used for building
the chapel walk. This was referred
to the Garden Committee (consisting
of Mrs. Dyer, Mrs. Platts and Mrs. King).
A revision of committees was
suggested by Mrs. Roper and a motion
made that a Trays and Means Com-
mittee be formed to be composed of
the heads of the present committees
and that the social and refresh-
ment committees be combined. This
motion was overruled later in
the meeting and the following
committees voted (each committee
to consist of three members): - Garden,
Housekeeping and Trays and Means.
Mrs. Roper, Mrs. Beck and Mrs. Smith
were appointed to serve on the
new Trays and Means Committee.

Dr. Windate agreed to take charge of the music planning for the chapel services, ^(with assistance of Mrs. Singing) and asked that each member submit the names of two hymns they would like sung to assist him in the hymn selection for the services.

It was suggested that a (flower) calendar for flowers for the altar be posted in the chapel by the secretary and those who could give flowers sign for given Sundays in order to help Mrs. Beck in arranging for altar flowers each Sunday. Flowers for the coming month were promised as follows:-
June 19 - Mrs. Wells, June 26
Mrs. Akers and July 3, Mrs. Raper.

A trip to the Cathedral was suggested and Mrs. Pope appointed as a committee gone to arrange for a trip in the near future.

This concluded the business for the year and the meeting was adjourned to meet again in September.

The clothing - especially things for men - was so badly needed by so many people, that the missionary said it called for the "wisdom of Solomon" to make a proper division. It was voted by the Guild that Mrs. Beck should be reimbursed for the money she had spent in postage for the boxes sent, and for boxes to be sent in the future,

and gradually a one-member committee for helping this mission evolved, with Mrs. Beck as chairman. She will receive clothing for another box to be sent as soon as it can be assembled.

Mrs. Ingberg spoke of the continued need of a choir, and better church attendance. It was admitted that she was right on both counts, and no very satisfactory reasons seemed to be found to account for the lack of a better attendance.
