Dear Sir:

Under separate cover, I am sending you copies of three of my speeches, on my bill, H. R. 5545, "To Provide Homes for Soldiers." One of these contains a reprint of the bill. Another one shows to what extent it has been indorsed by former service men, through resolutions adopted by the National Convention of the American Legion, State Organizations, and local posts, and by letters from individuals coming from all sections of the United States.

The plan which I have presented has been received by former service men with great enthusiasm. These expressions of approval have given me great encouragement, that the bill may become a law. However, much will depend upon the continued interest manifested by the service men themselves.

If the members of your post are interested, it might be well for them to express their views by adopting a resolution, and transmitting it to your Senators and Representatives in Congress. Individual letters written by members of your post will also have great weight.

I shall be glad to hear what, if any, action is taken, and receive any suggestions which you may have for the improvement of the bill.

My dear Colleague:

I am sending you under separate cover, in a single envelope, three of my speeches, namely: "Homes for Soldiers", "Financing Homes for Soldiers", and "Homes for our Service Men." The first is devoted to a general discussion of H. R. 5545; the second is largely a discussion of the financial problems involved; and the third presents quotations from resolutions adopted by the National Convention, State Conventions and local posts of the American Legion, and including extracts from letters from individual soldiers, seamen, and marines.

The favor with which this bill has been received by the soldiers, the enthusiasm with which they have endorsed it, and the certainty that its passage would meet the approval of an overwhelming majority of their number, should appeal with great force to every Senator and Representative in Congress.

I will appreciate it very much if you will take time to dictate a letter to me offering any suggestions, comment, or criticism you may have in mind.

While this is a circular letter, I sincerely hope you will regard it as sufficiently personal in its nature to give it such attention as the subject demands.
