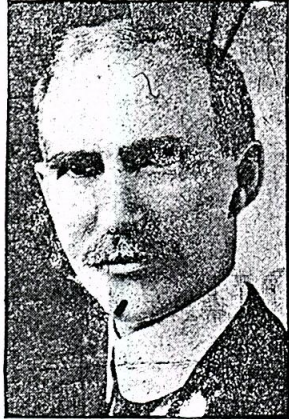
MORGAN TALKS TO DEMOCRATS AT PRESTON

BIG CROWDS HEAR HARRIS AT BRECKENRIDGE

Breckenridge, Okla., Nov. 2.—The whole country turned out here last night to listen to speeches by Z. A. Harris, Democratic candidate for Congress, and Aldrich Blake, of Muskogee, Okla., who appeared for the Democratic National Committee. It was the largest crowd that has come out to a political meeting in Breckenridge for many years.

Mr. Harris won frequent applause by his reference to the great domestic program of reform passed by the last Congress and called attention to the fact that his opponent, Dick Morgan, had voted against the Federal Reserve Act, now generally regarded as the new charter of financial liberty in America. He made a remarkably strong plea for the reelection of the president and stated that it would be unwise to elect Woodrow Wilson and not give him a Democratic congress.

Mr. Blake spoke principally on the foreign affairs of the nation and addressed his remarks directly to the large number of German citizens present. He stated that Roosevelt was trying to line up the pro-British vote for Hughes while Mr. Hughes, himself, although he did not dare to say it directly, was inferentially bidding for the German vote.

"It ought, therefore, be plain," declared the speaker, "that if Mr. Hughes is elected, somebody is going to be double crossed."

Both speakers deplored the attempt of the Republican managers to incite the German voter against the president at the very moment when the governments of the two countries were again on the most cordial terms, and both suggested, that after all, the big fact for the people of all foreign nations to bear in mind was the peace policy of the president.

Congressman Morgan last night at the Christian Tabernacle to the largest crowd that has gathered to hear any speaker with the exception of W. J. Bryan. One thing that stood out prominently was the fact that practically everyone there was a voter.

He was introduced by P. C. Simons, of this city, who made about a twenty minute talk, paying high tribute to the Congressman and what he had been able to accomplish during the time that he has represented this district.

The Congressman talked interestingly on national affairs and what the Republicans had accomplished. He was among the first to recognize the importance of providing better credit facilities for the farmers of the United States. Seeing the great benefit of such legislation he urged Congress to take speedy action. He spent all of his vacation preparing to take an active part in this matter, writing a book entitled "Land Credits: a Plea for the American Farmer." The service which Mr. Morgan rendered to the country at large has been shown by favorable comment by newspapers and magazines throughout the United States.

In federal trade legislation Mr. Morgan was also very active. He initiated the measure in the House which was finally adopted and followed by the Democratic administration.

The records also show that during the 63rd Congress there were but four men who were present at every roll call and Morgan was one of them.

He was frequently applauded during his speech. Speaking later in the evening the Congressman stated that he was greatly pleased at the fine crowd which came out to hear him.

MORGAN MADE GREAT POLITICAL SPEECH.

Congressman Dick T. Morgan delivered a splendid address to a crowded house at the Christian Tabernacle Monday night and the big audience showed it was with the Congressman from first to last by frequent outbursts of prolonged applause. BLAKE HEARD BY INTERESTED AUDI- ENCE AT ENID

SOME STATED IT ONE OF MOST
LOGICAL SPEECHES EVER
GIVEN HERE.

Before a crowd that comfortably filled the District Court room, Aldrich Blake Tuesday night eloquently plead for the re-election of Woodrow Wilson and the election of Z. A. Harris, the Democratic candidate for congress in this district.

"We only ask that you be consistent, declared Mr. Blake, "if you are satisfied with the legislation that Woodrow Wilson has given the country, if you are satisfied with the peace that he has maintained, if you want the work of progressive reform to go forward, then don't take any chance on a Republican house—vote for the Democratic candidate for congress.

"The Senate will remain Democratic—that is conceded by everybody—but the house will be close. With a Democratic president, a Democratic senate and a Republican house there would be a stalemate in legislation."

Mr. Blake enumerated the laws that have been passed for the business man, wage earner and farmer, calling attention to the fact that the Democratic program had won support in all parties. He declared that even if the Republicans were successful they would prove impotent to carry out a constructive program.

"Does anyone seriously believe," shouted the speaker, "that the discordant elements in the Republican party, the Roosevelts, Penroses, the Perkinses and the Smoots and O'Learys can unite on any concrete program for the benefit of the American people? On the other hand, we at last find the Democratic party a unit, ready and willing to serve the people."

"The Republicans have raised three issues in this campaign," he continued "first they denounce the Democratic party as the party of the south. In short they attempt to array section against section and to recall to memory the old antagonisms of war times. Second, they ask the farmers of the country to vote against the president because he gave the workers in the city the eight hour day. In short, they array class against class. Third, they are making a desperate effort to embitter certain foreign born citizens against the present administration. In short, they appeal to race prejudice and actually sow the seeds of discord at the very moment when there are signs that the American and German governments are again on the most cordial terms."

Mr. Blake declared that he had been disappointed because the president had not been more severe against Great Britain but that it was not fair to condemn an administration because it perchance had been wrong in one particular matter. He said the great fact was that Woodrow Wilson had at least kept the peace with every foreign power.

"I understand that Dick Morgan is taking credit for much of Woodrow Wilson's legislation," continued the speaker. "I am glad that inferentially, at least, he approves the conduct of the Democratic president. But the fact of the matter is, the majority party always shapes the legislation in congress. And besides, Uncle Dick voted against a great many of the progressive Wilson laws. Surely the people of this district must realize that it is far better to be represented by a congressman of the same political faith as the president.

"If Mr. Morgan stood head and shoulders above his colleagues as a statesman, it might be advisable to send him back, notwithstanding he is in the minority party, but from all I can gather he is just an average congressman—then why not pass the honors around and give Z. A. Harris a chance."

Mr. Blake said that the people of

every state in the union were interested in the election in this district and every other congressional district.

"There might come a time," he said, "when congress would take a vote on a declaration of war. In that event the whole country would be as much interested in the attitude of your congressman as of your own. I do not want to be classed as an intruder, but I do feel that even an outsider has some right in this particular time to voice his opinion in this delicate matter."

Mr. Blake, who is a former Republican, declared that party lines were rapidly melting.

"But why shouldn't they?" he asked, "if a law is good for a Democratic business man or farmer, won't it also benefit a Republican business man and farmer? If peace is good for one isn't it good for the other?"

Mr. Blake ridiculed the tariff plea of the Republicans, declaring that Woodrow Wilson already had solved this problem by the creation of a non-partisan tariff board and by attaching an anti-dumping clause to the revenue bill.

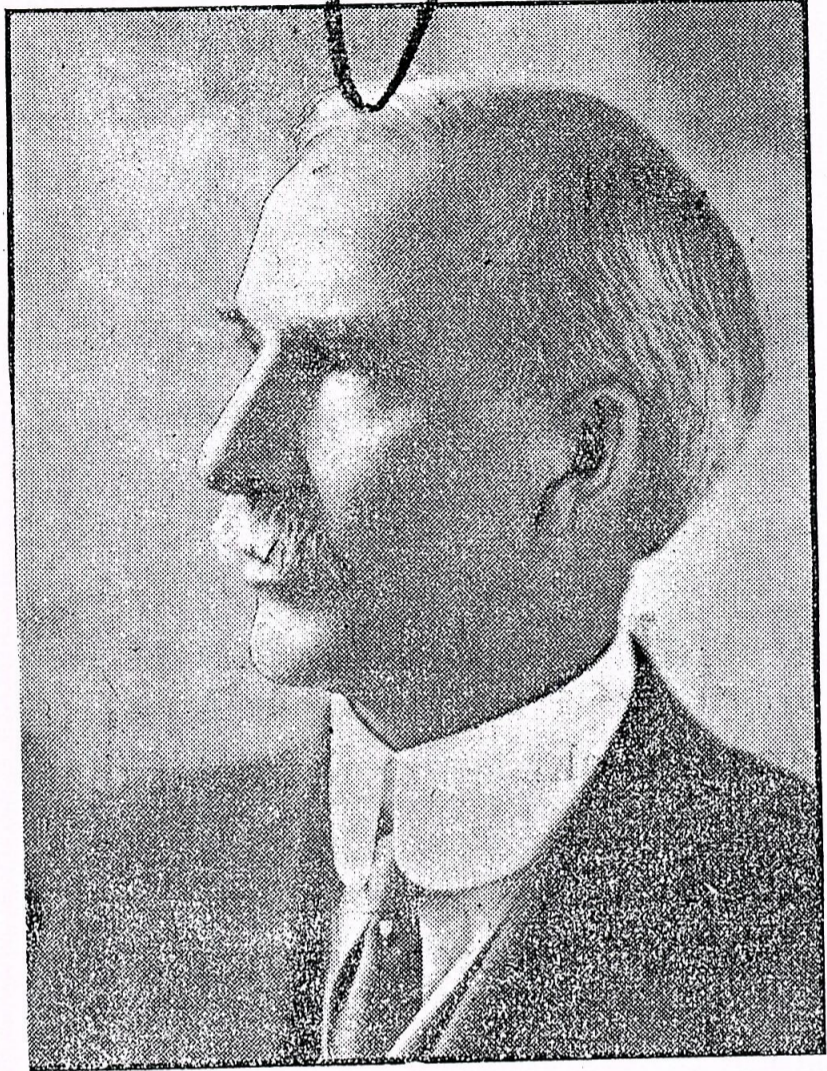

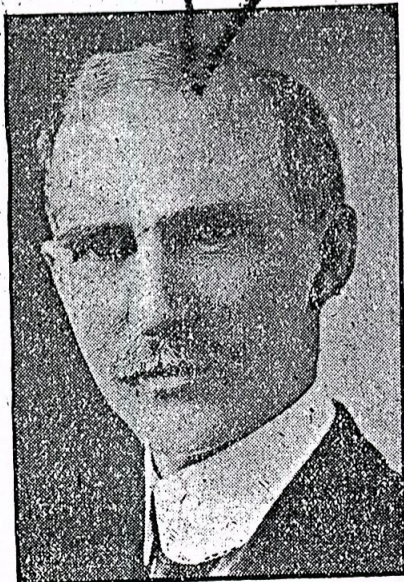

MORGAN AT MOORELAND

Good Crowd Grets Congressman's Appearance Last Friday

Congressman Dick T. Morgan was at Mooreland last Friday and addressed an afternoon audience of 75 at Dugger's Hall.

The meeting was called to order by M. B. Keagy, who introduced J. W. Kendall, candidate for assessor, who spoke for a few minutes, paying tribute to the service Mr. Morgan has rendered to the people of the 8th District during his eight years of service.

Mr. Morgan opened his speech by endorsing the Republican candidates and declared that he believed the entire ticket in Woodward County would be elected because of the personal worth of the candidates.

He said that he confidently expected that Hughes would be elected President and that he was the best man for that high office.

In his address, which was more in the nature of a talk of a friend with friends, Mr. Morgan told of the incidents attending the inauguration of a president, he having witnessed the administration of the oath of office to two, William Howard Taft and Woodrow Wilson since he has been our representative. He said that the pledge of allegiance was very impressive because of the great responsibility to the people which it carried. In the same manner, members of Congress felt a responsibility, not alone to their constituents but to the whole people, because the laws which they were instrumental in enacting had to do with the vital welfare of the nation; good measures working to promote happiness and prosperity and bad ones retarding the development the people of right should expect.

He made reference to his personal efforts to prove true to the trust reposed in him by being constantly at his post and voting on all measures before Congress. In this his record is second to none.

Mr. Morgan referred to the three great measures passed by the last Congress as of great importance to the people. These were: The Federal Reserve Act; Federal Trade Commission and Rural Credit Bill.

The latter came closer to the agricultural interests of the country and especially of Oklahoma. It was designed to give the same opportunity to obtain money on long time and at as low rate of interest as the great mercantile and industrial business now have.

Congressman Morgan said that credit was due the present administration because it had enacted this measure into law but that it should be remembered that before Woodrow Wilson was first nominated, both the Republicans and Progressives had placed in their platforms a plank declaring in favor of suitable rural credit legislation. That he, himself had introduced a bill in Congress looking toward this important matter. President Taft had been the first to declare in favor of such a measure.

A committee was appointed to investigate the methods used in foreign countries where rural credits, in one form or another, have been in successful operation for many years.

Recognizing the great importance of this subject, Mr. Morgan devoted his entire vacation last year to making a study of the principles of land credits and embodied the result of his research in a book.

This book was reviewed by the leading magazines and critics of the country and was pronounced to be the

standard authority on the subject. As a result of the essential principles advocated and the frank criticisms offered on the bill when pending in Congress, a number of changes were made in the bill, among the most important of which was that which removed the clause making the capitalization individual and thus removing the possibility of private gain by investors.

Mr. Morgan said that, while he was not entirely pleased with the bill as passed, it was worthy of a fair trial and would, he believed, result in great good to the farmers of the country.

The working of the system was explained. Borrowers who must reside on their land, organize groups or local associations and each one must pay to the government 5 percent of the amount of his loan in the form of stock in the land bank. This amount is credited on the loan at payment and constitutes the only fees that the borrower pays. The mortgage is sold to provide further loan funds. The government funds which are provided, make it possible to get money promptly and the fact that the resources of the government are back of the loans is what makes it possible to secure a low rate of interest.

At the close of the meeting Mr. Morgan was given warm assurances of support in the coming election and he will receive a larger majority at Mooreland than ever before.

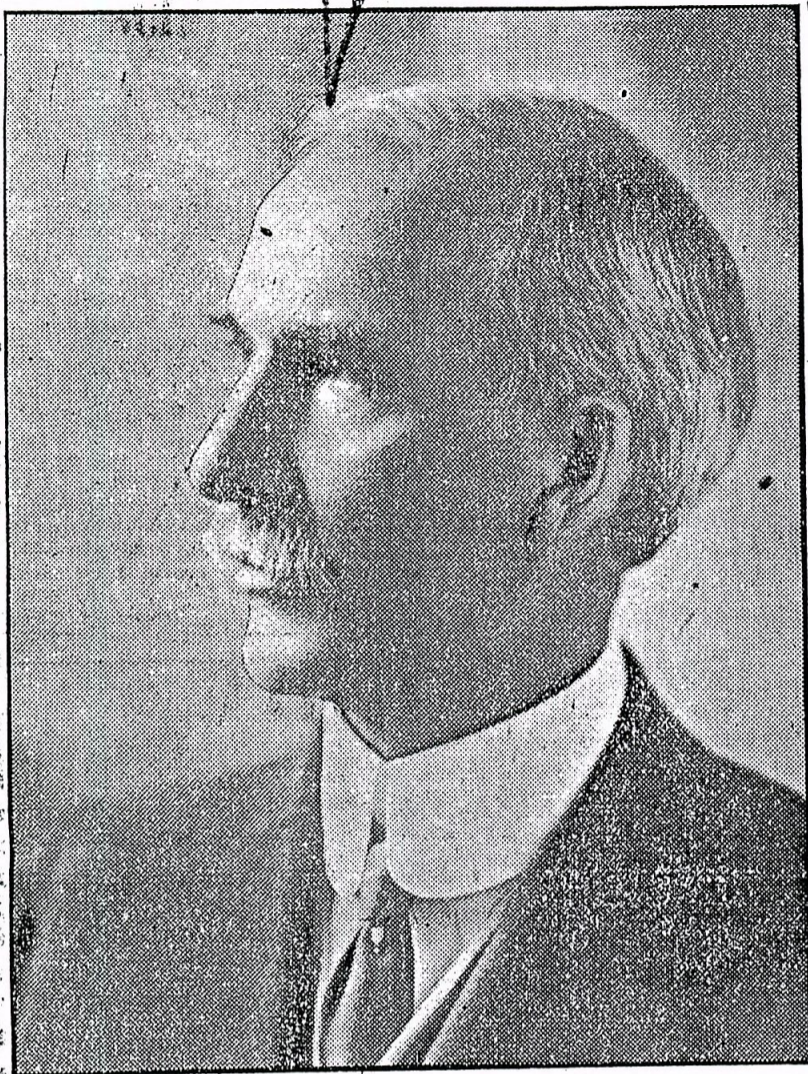

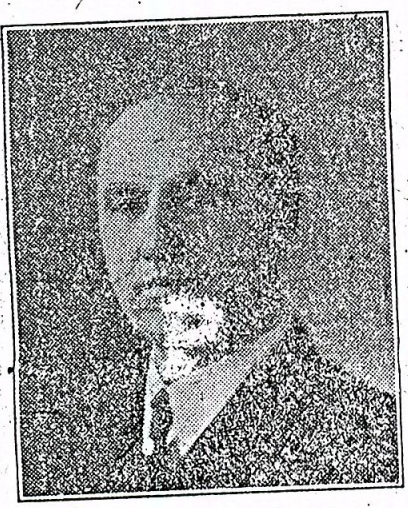

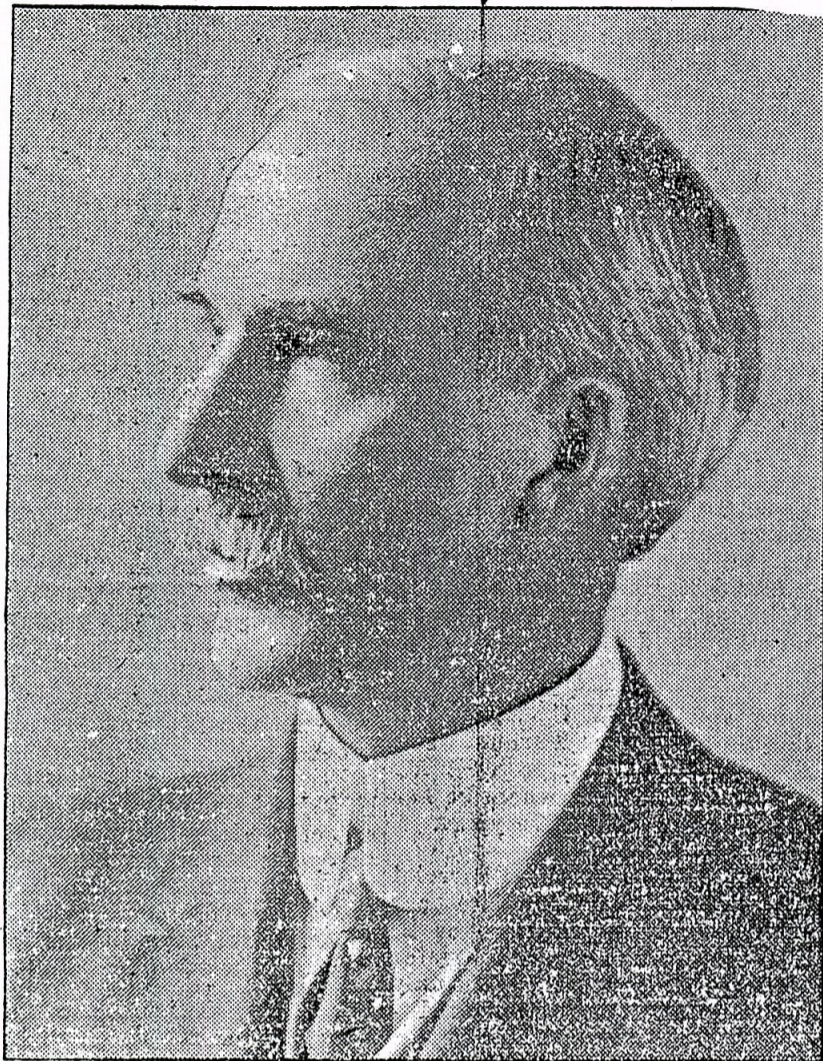
