# BIG CROWDS HEAR HAR-. RIS AT BRECKENRIDGE

Breckenridge, Okla., Nov. 2.—
The whole country turned out here last night to listen to speeches by Z. A. Harris, Democratic candidate for Congress, and Aldrich Blake, of Muskogee, Okla., who appeared for the Democratic National Committee. It was the largest crowd that has come out to a political meeting in Breckenridge for many years.

Mr. Harris won frequent applause by his reference to the great domestic program of reform passed by the last Congress and called attention to the fact that his opponent, Dick Morgan, had voted against the Federal Reserve Act, now generally regarded as the new charter of financial liberty in America. He made a remarkably strong plea for the relection of the president and stated that it would be unwise to elect Woodrow Wilson and not give him a Democratic congress.

Mr. Blake spoke principally on the foreign affairs of the nation and addressed his remarks directly to the large number of German citizens present. # BLAKE HEARD INTERESTED AUD-IENCE AT

SOME STATED IT ONE OF MOST LOGICAL SPEECHES EVER GIVEN HERE.

Before a crowd that comfortably filled the District Court room, Aldrich Blake Tuesday night eloquently plead for the re-election of Woodrow Wilson and the election of Z. A. Harris, the Democratic candidate for congress in this district.

"We cnly ask that you be consistent, declared Mr. Blake, "if you are satisfied with the legislation that Woodrow Wilson has given the country, if you are satisfied with the peace that he has maintained, if you want the work of progressive reform to go forward, then don't take any chance on a Republican house-vote for the Democratic candidate for congress.

"The Senate will remain Democratic-that is conceded by everybody--but the house will be close. With a Democratic president, a Democratic senate and a Republican house there would be a stalemate in legislation."

Mr. Blake enumerated the laws that have been passed for the business man, wage earner and farmer, calling attention to the fact that the Democratic program had won support in all parties. He declared that even if 'the Republicans' were successful they would prove impotent to carry out a constructive program.

"Does anyone seriously believe," shouted the speaker, "that the discordant elements in the Republican party, the Roosevelts, Penroses, the Perkinses' and the Smoots and O'Learys can unite on any concrete program for the benefit of the American people? On the other hand, we et last find the Democratic party a unit, ready and willing to serve the people.

"The Republicans have raised three issues in this campaign," he continued "first they denounce the Democratic party as the party of the south. In short they attempt to array section against section and to recall to memory the old antagonisms of war times. Second, they ask the farmers of the country to vote against the president because hevigave the workers in the city the eight hour day. In short, they array class against class. Third, they are making a desperate effort to embitter certain foreign born citizens against the present administration. In short, they appeal to race prejudice and actually sow the seeds of discord at the very moment when there are signs that the American and German governments are again on the most cordial terms."

Mr. Blake declared that he had been disappointed because the president had not been more severe against Great Britain but that it was not fair to condemn an administration because it perchance had been wrong in one particular matter. He said the great fact was that Woodrow Wilson had at least kept the peace with every foreign power.

"I understand that Dick Morgan is taking credit for much of Woodrow Wilson's legislation," continued the speaker. "I am glad that inferentially, at least, he approves the conduct of the Democratic president. But the fact of the matter is, the majority party always shapes the legislation in congress. And besides, Uncle Dick voted against a great many of the progressive Wilson laws. Sure ly the people of this district must realize that it is far better to be represented by a congressman of the same political faith as the president.
