Dear Father:-

I saw Mr. Severn on the street yesterday and he said that he had not heard from you concerning his claim against the Government for work done at Lawton Oklahoma, he said that he had heard from McGuire, Gore and Ferris concerning the matter, and that they all pledged their support to a bill which you might introduce to reimburse him. He suggested that you confer with the attorney which you will get from the papers which I sent you concerning the matter and he possibly can give you additional information. Mr. Severn seemed rather hurt to think that he had not heard from you. I trust that you will take this matter up shortly.

I saw Mr. John P. Evans of Alfalfa County, at Lee-Huckins last night he said that he was trying to get into the Indian service as a teacher and had written you concerning the matter, and he wanted me to add my

influence to his application and I am glad to do so. He expressed regret at Holcomb having come out against you said that he had a talk with Holcomb and told him that you would beat him in the primary but that it might stir up enough dissatisfaction to beat you at the election, and it would be well to write to Evans pointing out to him the fact that the mis-administration of the democratic party herein Oklahoma, should make it easy to win the election.

I saw old Mr. ~~William~~ Williams at Norman yesterday and he asked to be remembered to you.
