Horse Thieves Numerous.—Horse

thieves have carried on their depredations in all parts of Oklahoma recently to an extent not equalled since the frontier days, according to a statement issued by R. B. Ramsey, sheriff of Muskogee county. Sheriff Ramsey says that within the past two weeks he has received reports of 208 horses stolen in different parts of the state. "It is evident," said he, "that organized gangs of thieves, tempted by the prevailing high prices of horses, are committing the depredations, but so far we have been unable to run the thieves down."

Football Player Killed.—J. J. Dick, 25 years old, a student in the Southwestern State Normal at Weatherford, was killed in a football game. He was struck on the head in a tussel and died within 20 minutes. Regaining his feet after the fall he asked to be taken to his room. He then staggered for about 15 steps and fell. Dick resided in the southern part of Washita county, 25 miles south of Weatherford, and was entering the last year of his college course. This was the first football game of the season at the normal.

Just a Few Figures.—According to figures from the state treasurer's office, the amount of state funds held by national banks has fallen off since December 15, 1907, \$285,990.73. This includes both secured and unsecured national banks. The figures show that on December 15, last, about one month after statehood, the amount of state funds deposited in national banks was \$781,252.09, and in state banks \$146,407.07. The amounts of

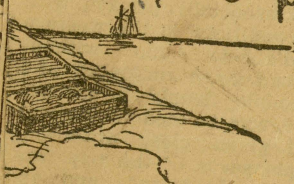

Candidate for Congress in Second District Has Been Making Speeches for a Month—Enroute to Woods County.

Hon. Dick T. Morgan, Republican candidate for congress in the Second Congressional District of Oklahoma, was in the city yesterday on his way from Texas and Cimarron counties, to Woods county where he starts tomorrow. When Mr. Morgan was asked about his prospects for election, he said:
