

When the State Police arrived, approximately 60 black students were still in the parking lot between the two buildings. This group was broken up and 12 arrests were made at 2:45 a.m. with those arrested being charged with unlawful assembly. Shortly after this time, the disturbance ended, as students returned to their dorms for the night.

Estimates on damages to college property are in excess of \$5,000, mostly to furniture within the lounge of Pickell Hall and broken windows in both dorms. Estimates on damages to automobiles was not available, though this will add considerably to the final figure.

Fifteen students were reportedly injured, with 14 being taken to the Health Center at the college. Twelve of these were admitted and then released with minor injuries, while two others are still being held at the center. One student was taken to Community Hospital and treated and released.

Last night's confrontation appeared to be tied in with an incident last Thursday, according to

disorders, given by the Board of Control at FSC after disturbances two months ago, to the test. In this statement of policy, the board said that "affected students will be subject to suspension or expulsion for becoming involved in further disturbances, inciting such disruptions, violating college regulations or not making a reasonable effort in their academic

studies." This statement was intended to establish a special category of strict disciplinary probation after the campus disturbances early in March.

Law enforcement agents have stated that further investigations of this recent outbreak are presently being made. Arrested at the scene last night were Willie Stone, William White, Edward Johnson, Jackie Estes, Timothy Baker, William Kilgore, William Zett, William Howell, John Mil-

ler, Benjamin McQueen, Michael Gibson and Gregory Granger. They were to be arraigned today in District Court.

Until the atmosphere surrounding the campus returns to normal, present plans call for the State Police to remain in the area.
