LIEBERS FUND



THROUGH THE YEARS

It was brought to the attention of the editors at the 1970 Alumni banquet that many of our alums were astounded by the growth of Bryan. Therefore, we dedicate this edition of the Bryan notes to the hospital's growth through the years.

In 1968, further expansion was begun to complete the 5th and 6th floors and to add a new diagnostic wing. This

project was completed by 1969.

Take something like \$2,500,000 worth of remodeling and expansion projects and what do you have? Bryan Memorial Hospital; one of the most modern hospitals for the State of Nebraska and

largest hospital in Lincoln.

Bed capacity for the new Bryan will be 350, including extended-rehabilitation care area, intensive-coronary care center, and 18 private rooms. The completion of the (first floor) new south wing has provided larger quarters for the clinical labs. The addition also houses seven patient examining rooms, cardio-pulmonary inhalation therapy laboratory, physicians and nurses lounge, and space for additional surgical suites. General remodeling in the lower level and first floor areas has enabled nursing services and medical records offices to move to spaces vacated by the two laboratories.

Other projects included in the expansion program are additional conference and classroom space for hospital and school of nursing personnel and relocation of the administrative offices from

first floor to the lower level north (old laundry) enabling the business office to occupy the old administrative offices.

The opening of 5th and 6th floors led the way for more specialized nursing care. Sixth floor is designated to be a medical care area with 9 private rooms, 17 semi-private rooms, and two four bed wards. Fifth floor, caring for surgical patients, has an equal number of beds. Four west then became an orthopedic wing with four east specializing in urological care.

Second north continues to provide for psychiatric care and second center has recently been developed as a rehabilitative and occupational therapy center. The remodeling second west has provided 17 beds for an extended self

care area.

Intensive and coronary care areas are presently developing a coronary mobile unit program to begin January 1971.

In addition to our patient services expansion program, Bryan has increased its educational facilities by developing a School of Anesthesia, Medical technologist training program, and an Electrocardiography technician program.

Our story of growth and service through the years has definitely been a dramatic one since 1922 when William Jennings Bryan gave his home "Fairview" and surrounding land to the Nebraska conference of the Methodist Church for the purpose of establishing a new 60 bed

hospital in Lincoln.

The trustees, administration, and staff of Bryan Hospital are dedicated to continuous improvement of the institution. The ultimate objectives are to provide quality service to the patient and to offer sound programs of education for those seeking a career in medicine, nursing, and the associated health care services.
