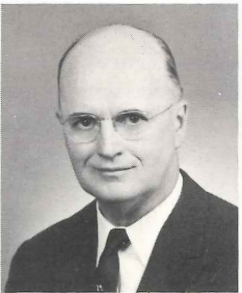
BRYAN MEMORIAL HOSPITAL MEDICAL FACULTY

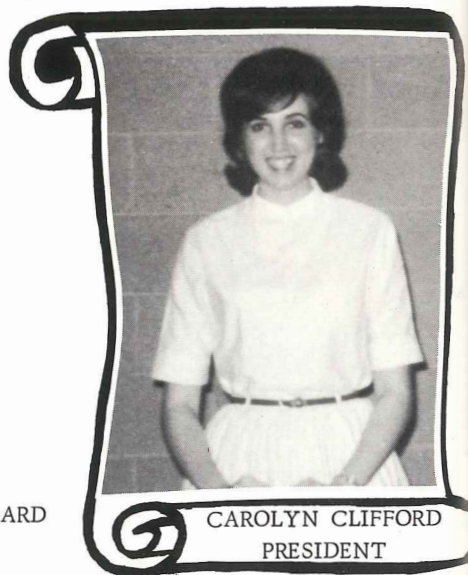

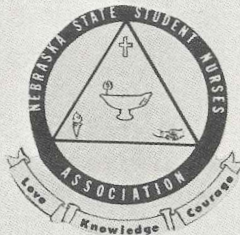
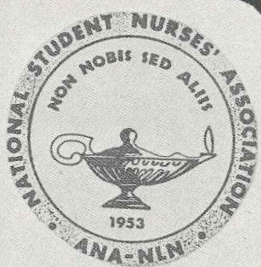
**"TODAY—

IN MEMORIAM



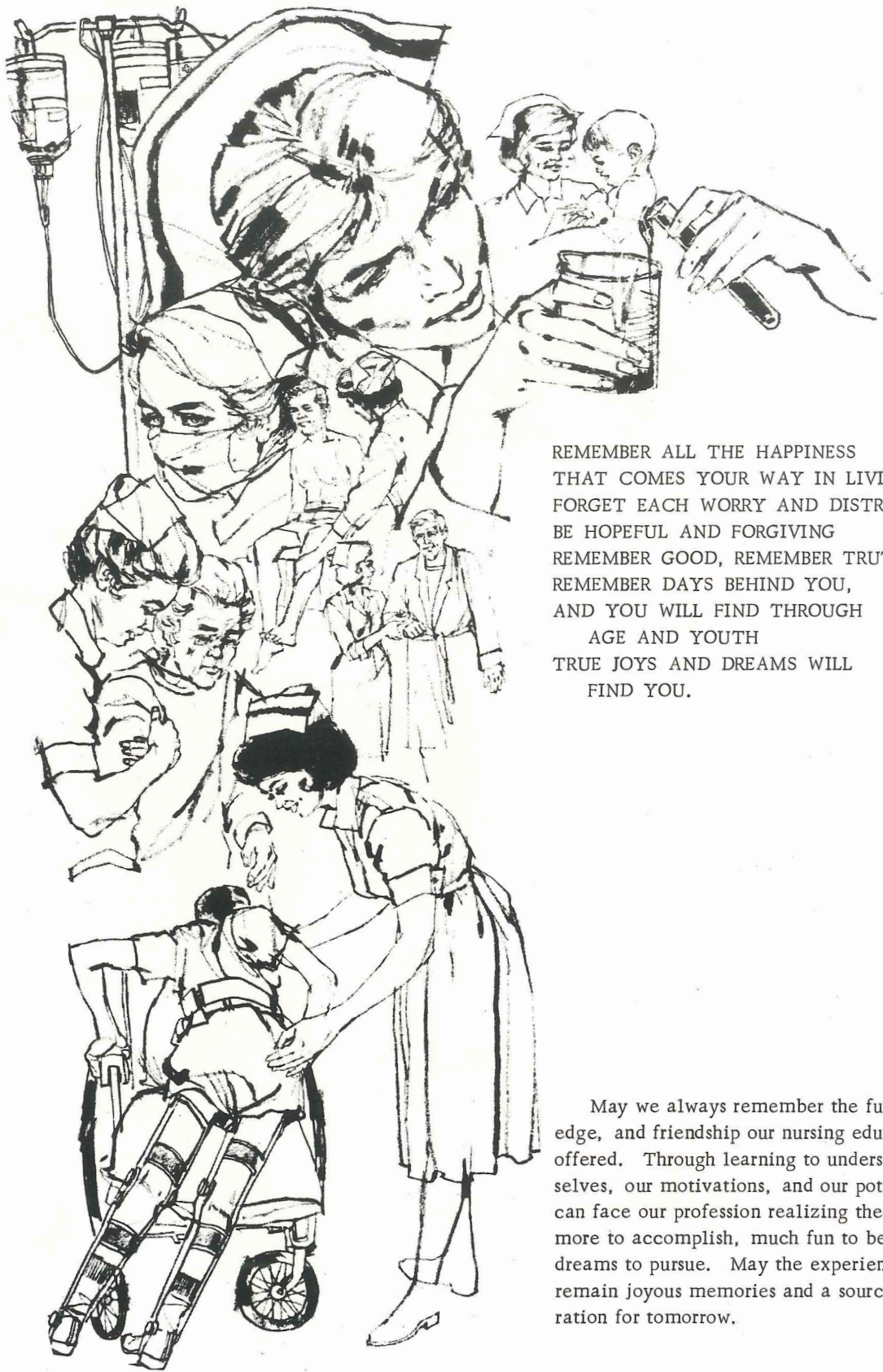

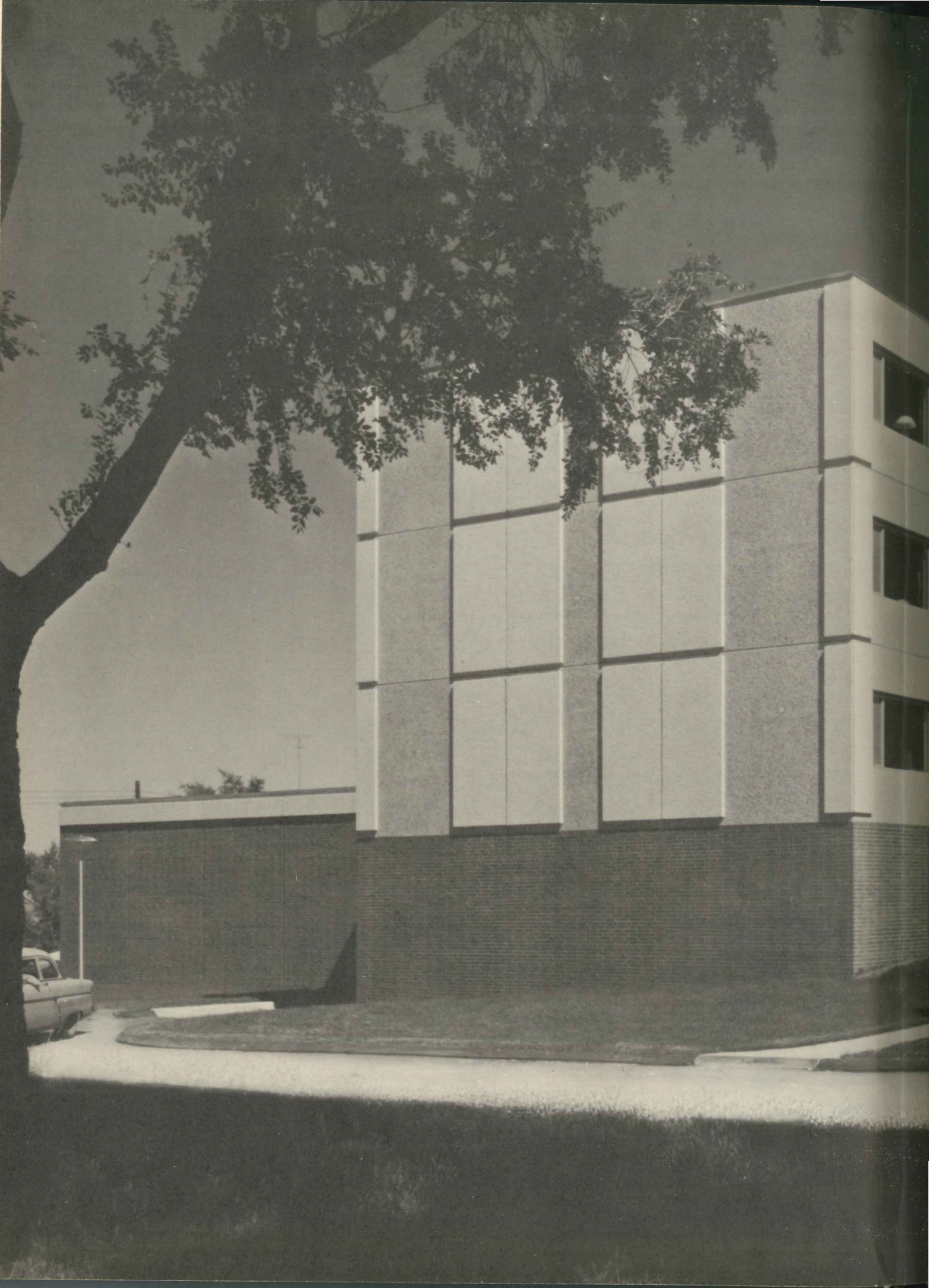
