It has been said that the Junior year in nurse's training is by far the most hectic year of all. It involves moving to other cities, switching to entirely different areas of nursing, meetstudents from other schools, and adjusting to any and all situations.

The Junior class was divided into three groups beginning in September of 1966. These blocks rotated through the three areas of psychiatry, obstetrics, and medical-surgical nursing before joining together again in June to travel to Denver for their training in Pediatrics. With the exception of surgery, each rotation lasted three months and involved the basic nursing care and some specialties in each particular area.

The groups traveled to Ingleside, Nebraska for their psychiatric training. They not only studied about the psychotic disorders, but they also studied about the growth and development of personalities and interrelated the two. The girls were able to work quite closely with both men and women patients on the various wards, observing them and their behavior.

The blocks returned to Lincoln for obstetrics and medical-surgical nursing. In obstetrics they were able to spend time in the nursery and both ante and post partum. Each student had a selective experience of caring for a mother and her infant, using it as both a teaching and a learning experience. In medical-surgical nursing, the girls spent three weeks working in the operating room and a week in the recovery room. They learned the principles of sterile technique in surgery, and they also learned to work closely and efficiently with the doctors during surgery. They spent a month on the floors, correlating their knowledge of pre-operative and post-operative care with their knowledge of the pathology, the anesthesia, and the actual surgery.

When the entire class studied pediatrics, they went to Children's Hospital in Denver, Colorado. This training involved the care and treatment of children from infancy to adolescence.

The highlight of the Junior year was their month's vacation during November, December, or May, depending on which block the girls were in. Some girls worked during this time; others were lucky enough to travel. The remainder just took life easy for a change. Regardless of what any of them did, they enjoyed every minute of it.

Ice Cream Social
















June 25, 1967, was a big day for everyone at Lincoln General Hospital.
