

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










Bryan's Jean Johnson was rather glad to see the convention close. As First Vice-President, she was Program Chairman of the convention.







C. DeBolt gave a reading relating to the parting of the Seniors and how "this time will never come again". This brought many solemn expressions and a few tears.



Dr. H. Hilton awarded the R.N. pins to the graduates as they followed the processional across the platform.


