MRS. JACK PRUETT

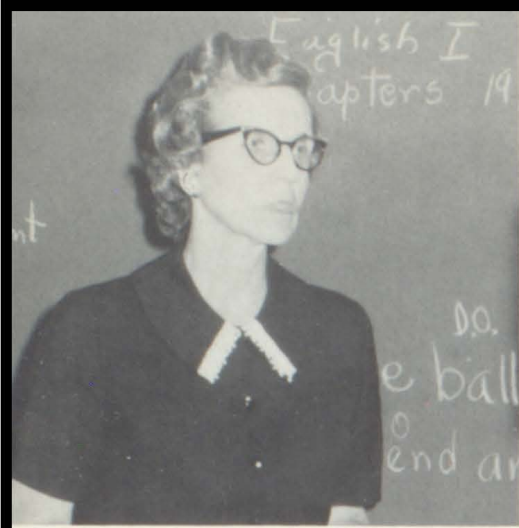

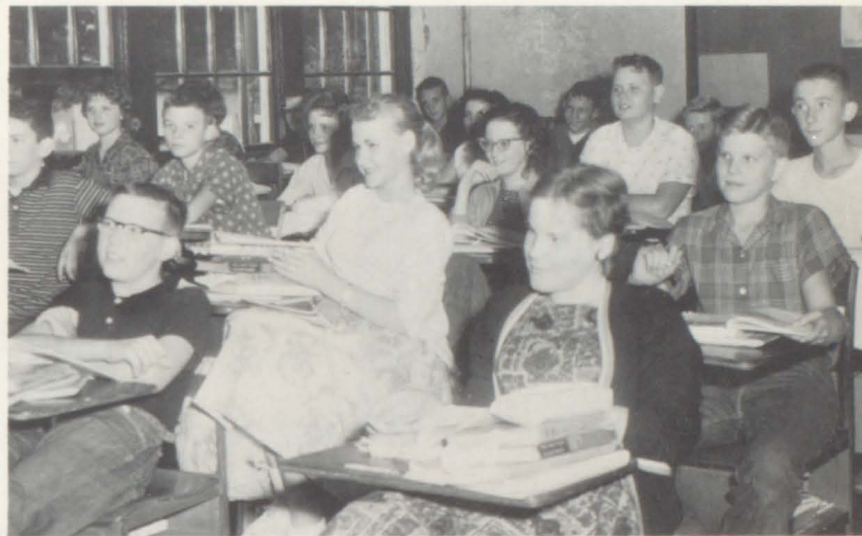
MRS. FLORENCE HUNNICUTT

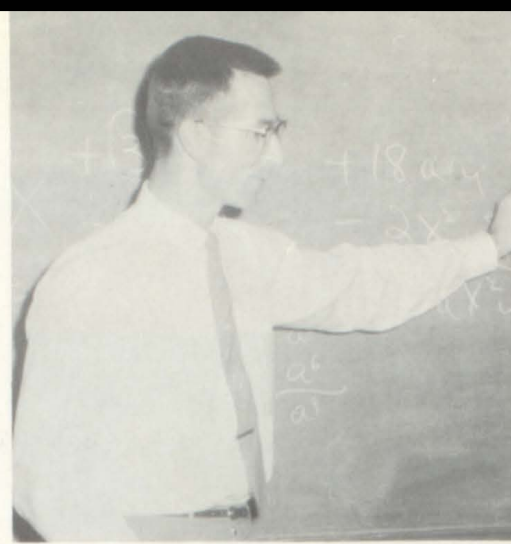
We are very proud of our Library this year. It is one of the most attractive rooms in the building.

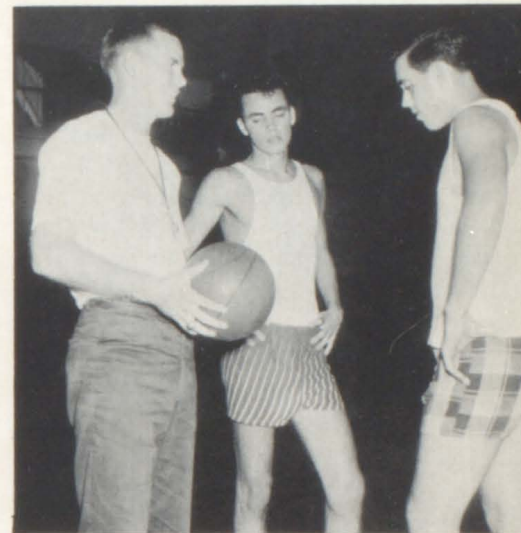
PHYSICAL

STUDENT COUNCIL

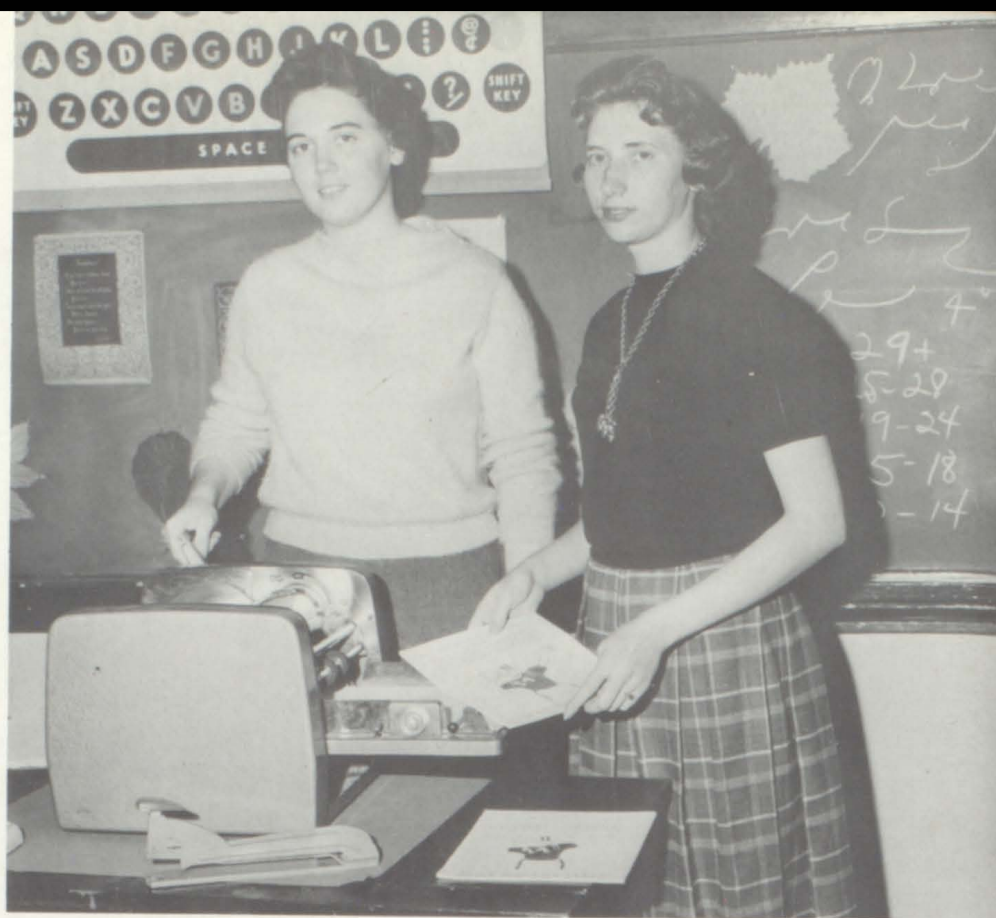

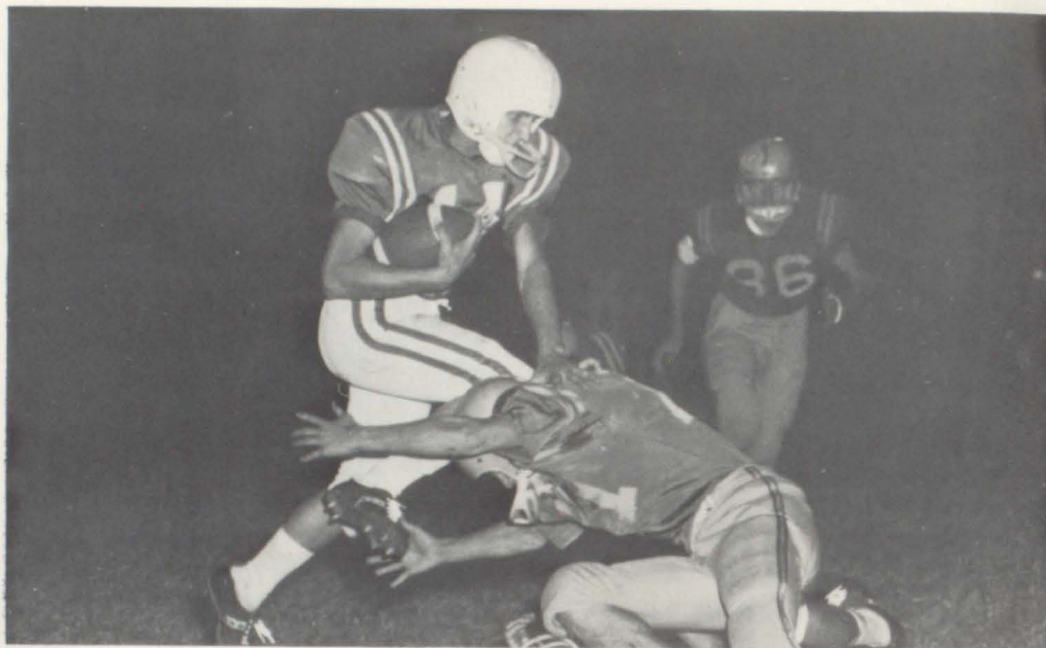


Roy Hendrick was selected by the vote of his teammates, as the most valuable player of the year. Melvin Briley, President of the Lions Club, presented the trophy to him.

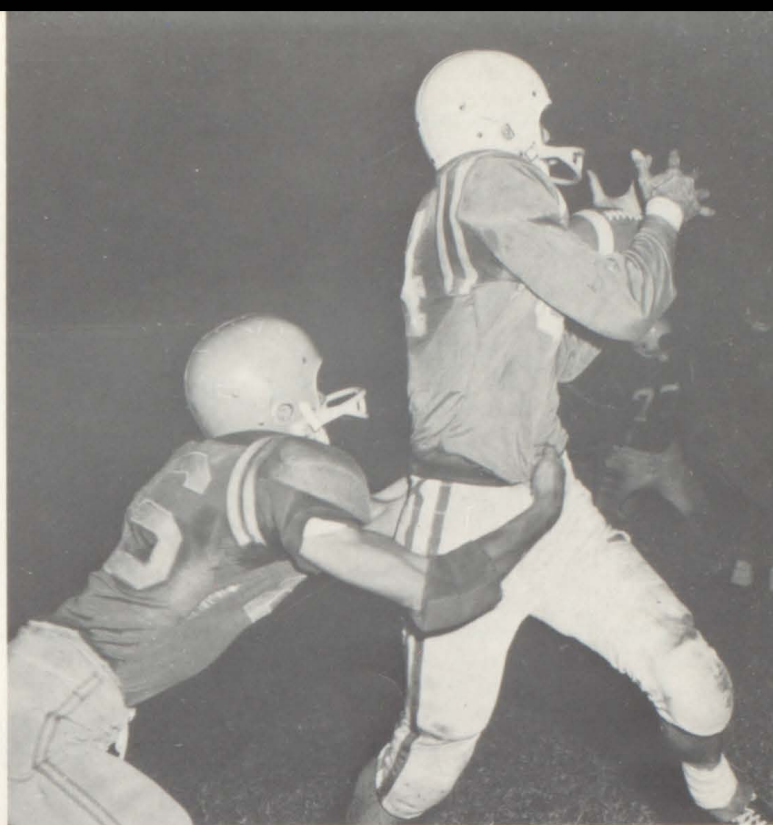
Roy Hendrick runs around right end for a short gain, as Kenneth McDonald blocks for him.
