## COMMERCIAL

Nine hours each day are devoted to teaching Commercial subjects, three classes in Typing I, one in Typing II, one class of Bookkeeping, one of General Business, two of Shorthand I, and one of Shorthand II. The courses are so designed as to give the students a good vocational background in business and the related skills. Many students end their formal education with high school, and a well-planned business education is a great asset when facing the world today.

Miss Katherine Green reaches Bookkeeping,Typing I, and Shorthand II. She attended Bowling Green College of Commerce, University of Kentucky, and Peabody, holding a B.S. degree. Miss Green, has been a bookkeeper for eighteen years, filling many responsible bookkeeping positions; has had fifteen years of teaching experience, ten of which have been in SCHS. She is one of the Senior sponsors and also a co-sponsor of the cheerleaders.

## LANGUAGE

There are 27 hours of Language taught at S. C. H. S. Twelve classes in Junior High, four in English I, three in English II, three in English III, three in English IV, and two in Spanish I are in session every day.


Good grammar is an essential part of education anywhere. The ability to speak and write well are often the determining factors in obtaining a job. Development of appreciation for literature of the past is necessary, so that we may learn facts and principles therein, as well as the ability to appreciate and evaluate literature of today.


Mrs. Hunnicutt, who teaches Sophomore and Junior English here at S.C.H.S., graduated from W.K.S.T.C. holding A.B. and M.A. degrees. She is co-sponsor of the Sophomore Class and also sponsor of the Beta Club. Mrs. Hunni cutt also holds membership in the National Council of Teachers of English.

Mathematics develops the ability to think in an orderly fashion and to exercise reasoning ability in determining the outcome of many problems. Five different courses are offered in Math, consisting of 14 hours each day. Eight hours are spent in Senior High and six in Junior High. In Senior High, there are two classes in Algebra I and Arithmetic taught each day, and one class of Algebra II, Plane and Solid Geometry, and Trigonometry. Each individual's needs are fulfilled with this wide selection of Mathematics courses.
