Lebanon Upset By Portland

PORTLAND, Tenn. — Portland's Panthers hung up a 13 to 12 victory over rival Lebanon here last night before a crowd of 4000 fans.

The bitter rivals had fought to deadlocks for the past two seasons, and the margin of victory last night was a place kick following Portland's first touchdown by Carl Pike.

After a scoreless first period, highlighted by a punting duel, Lebanon took the lead in the final minute of action in the second quarter. The Blue Devils had marched 80 yards for their touchdown, Paul Lanlus going nine yards around end for the touchdown. Charles Hallum's attempt to run the ball across for the extra was short of the goal.

Following the kickoff, Lebanon took the ball at the 45 yard line and with 14 seconds of play remaining in the half, the Panthers called time out.

When play resumed, Pike took direct snap from center and fired a 40-yard pass to Ernest McReynolds back of the Lebanon secondary. McReynolds galloped the rest of the way untouched for tying score. Pike then booted it extra to break the deadlock.

Early in the third quarter, Pike broke through the middle of the line to cap a 60-yard Portland march and put the Panthers on the 13-7. His attempt from placement was wide.

Portland kicked off and on the next play, Uell Sanders slipped through the line on a quick open and sped 78 yards for the touchdown. Hallum's attempt to run across, again was stopped.

Portland made one more threat, driving to the Lebanon 17 in the last quarter.

The Tigers had rolled to two scores in the opening period as Halfback Terry Black rambled for touchdowns on runs of 72 and 65 yards. Black took the first play

from scrimmage and went all the way. W. B. Smith converted after the first TD.

Portland came roaring back in the second period and racked up all its points. Carl Pike grabbed a Springfield fumble on the 28 and went over for the first touchdown.
