
## Leading Roles for Kokomo Campus Theater Play Cast

Gloria Jean Francis and talent division of "Miss Greek, Charles Franklin Taylor have been cast by director Robert D. Hennon in the leading roles of the Kokomo Campus Theater's production of William Saroyan's one-act drama, "Hello Out There," which will be presented in four performances Wednesday,

Taylor, son of Mr. and Mrs. Horace Taylor of Kokomo, though a budding Thespian, is no stranger to fans of Kokomo High School's wrestling and track teams of last year. He won major letters in both sports, and was a member of the K-Club. In addition to his athletic skills, he played trombone in the high school band.

Taylor graduated from KHS in 1962, and enrolled this fall as a part-time student at the Kokomo Campus, where he is working toward a degree in vocational arts. He has said of "Hello Out There" that it should be a fine play for the community to observe and possibly receive a great deal of insight into racial problems. Hennon feels that Taylor displays surprising sensitivity in the role of an itinerant gambler falsely accused of rape.

Unlike Taylor, Miss Francis, at 18, has already had considerable experience in performing before audiences. She graduated in 1962 from Middleton High School in Tampa, Florida, where she had played the role of the queen in a children's theater production of "Rumplestilkskin" and the part of Gretchen in a production of "Mississippi Melody," a musical based on works of Mark Twain. Miss Francis studied voice while attending school in Florida, and sang with "The Chimes," a local singing group, that has appeared on the Ed Sullivan Television show. She was a finalist in the
