PAINTINGS OF JOHN S. THOMPSON AT GAINSBORO BRANCH LIBRARY

The Gainsboro Branch Library has on display a large number of oil paintings by the talented local artist, John Thompson. This exhibition marks the initial showing of the unusual interpretations by this newcomer to the field of art. It also affords art lovers an opportunity to view the productions of this highly gifted young Negro, who has expressed himself successfully in a number of mediums.

The 19 paintings in oil by Thompson will most certainly repay the attention of those who take the trouble to view them, and study his breadth and depth of artistic expression. Many of them are reproductions from the Old Masters, and show evidences of his ingenious creative ability, as well as long hours of hard work.

Unlike most artists of note Thompson has had little or no formal training. This has not discouraged his efforts to transform his inner feelings to the world through works of enduring beauty. It has caused many of his fondest ambitions in achieving recognition as a true artist to perish in the process of accomplishment. After assuming his responsibilities at his home, and to his family and four children, little is left for investment in art materials.

After the day ends from his regular employment, Thompson hastens to his home on Rorer Avenue South West, to greet his happy family, enjoy the evening meal, and then happily retire

to his favorite spot, an improvised studio on the second floor of his home.

Often Thompson works until the wee hours of the morning trying to complete a story-telling picture that appeals to him. He never tires of striving to execute technical skill and dexterity in his creations. He spends many hours trying to correct a minute flaw, that to him might prevent his picture from being characterized by realism.

On display at the Gainsboro Branch Library are the following paintings in oil by the young artist: "A Study in Black and White," "At Home in the Kitchen," "Abstract in Black and White," "Portrait of an Indian Girl," "Portrait of a Girl," "Natural Bridge," "Boat Scene," "Two of a Kind," "Portrait of a St. Bernard Dog," "Moses and the Burning Bush," "Street Scenes," "Sir Walter Raleigh's Home in Virginia," "Fruit and Bottle," "Mabry Mill," "The Virgin Mary," "Boat Scene at Dust," "The Virgin with Child and Saint," "A Place of Peace," and "Basket of Fruit."

John was elated to find in the library so many books that could be used in advancing his artistic ideas, and at the same time help him to get the real spirit and meaning of art as he distilled it into his pictures.

This display of John S. Thompson who lives, sleeps, and eats with art, will remain on exhibition at the library throughout the month of October.

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
