Local Pizza Hut Delivers Bigotry to Gay/Lesbian Bar

Winter Park Pizza Hut branch was found to be exhibiting homophobic behavior against the phoe•nix AT ALOMA in early February.

At that time, it was revealed that for several months employees at Pizza Hut store No. 0106, located at 3748 Howell Branch Road, Winter Park, (phone: [407] 677-7144) had identified the gay and lesbian bar, for its own internal purposes as "FAGS."

Store No. 0106 serves the Eastbrook, Howell Branch and Goldenrod area with delivery/carry out orders. It is one of an estimated 58 to 65 Pizza Hut outlets in the greater Orlando metropolitan area.

For several months in 1991 and extending into early 1992 the bar had placed several pizza orders for both customers and staff with the Howell Branch store. Store No. 0106 had supplied pizzas not only to the phoe•nix, but also to its predecessor, The Flamingo Lounge. Located relatively close to the bar, store No. 0106 was a logical place to order pizzas, and enjoyed a healthy business with the bar.

Business between the two enterprises continued without problem until phoe•nix owners Dennis Garmon and David Hardy discovered one day that

"FAGS" was written on each bill and/or receipt submitted by the Howell Branch outlet. On each invoice there is a section titled "grids" which is a code to let the driver know the location of the customer.

As Garmon and Hardy indicate, it was evident that early on in the business relationship someone at store No. 0106 had pegged the bar as a "queer joint," and that an appropriate symbol for the customer thereafter was "FAGS."

When the youthful manager was confronted with the facts, his solution was to offer a free pizza to the bar. The offer was quickly rejected.

Further discussions occurred with area Pizza Hut management. On each occasion apologies were made, as were acknowledgments that the damage already done would be impossible to be undone. Letters of regret were sent by local representatives of management, and suggestions of improved staff training and customer service were made.

Two remedies were requested by the phoe nix owners: that Pizza Hut make a serious contribution to a gay charity or community organization of Garmon and Hardy's choice, and that Pizza Hut provide some tangible form for support for the gay and lesbian community in this year's Gay Pride Parade.

The latter request was given an immediate and

resounding negative response.

Pizza Hut management did indicate that it would take action on contributing to a local gay organization. Two months, and several futile telephone calls later, however, no response has been made to the first request.

Several thousand gay men and lesbians who have above-average disposable incomes and an array of fast-food restaurants available to them live in Central Florida. It seems only reasonable that they will become increasingly discriminating in selecting pizzas from local chains.

Furthermore, and to be precise, it is plainly evident that Pizza Hut should be scratched from our list of fast food service suppliers.

We share the same rights as they. We should exercise these rights – of identification, selection and freedom of purchase.

For pizza lovers, a multitude of other excellent suppliers are available throughout the area. Let your fingers do the walking through the Yellow Pages, and your eyes do the selecting. Pizza Hut certainly has no corner on either pizza or related cuisine. But the chain does appear to have more than an average share of intolerance.

Someone at Pizza Hut said of the February incident that it was probably just a joke.

No one in the gay and lesbian community is laughing.

Metropolitan Business Assoc. Forms

Orlando has joined the ranks of a number of America's cities that have organized the resources of their gay and lesbian business owners and professionals. On March 12, the Metropolitan Business Association (MBA), was born during the guild's first general meeting.

"We have no history. What we are doing is making history," said Michael Sopoliga, one of the group's founders. "We have laid the foundation ... I don't know what the potential of it is, but I think it's going to be great!"

About 30 business owners and professionals attended that first meeting at Joy MCC, and the room became electric with enthusiasm. No sooner than most people signed in, they were making connections, arranging to exchange services and sharing common problems and solutions.

Businesses and professions represented included printers and graphic artists, real estate agents, bankers, travel agents, hairstylists, mobile home dealers, massage therapists and many more.

Besides networking and getting the word out that these businesses and professionals are more than happy to serve gays and lesbians – or those who are gay-friendly – the group will have an even farther reaching effect.

"When people start to see we have so many gay and lesbian business owners in this city, they will have to deal with us," said Keith Morrison, another group founder. "We can be role models for people coming up behind us, and for people looking to move to our area. The chance and strength it gives our community is amazing."

During the meeting, everyone in attendance was given a couple of minutes to introduce themselves and plug their business or service. The next general meeting will be held at Joy MCC, 2351 S. Ferncreek Ave., (just north of Michigan St.), in Orlando on Thursday, April 2, at 7 p.m. (social begins at 6:30 p.m.) Subsequent meetings will be held at locations provided by participating businesses.

The basic structure of MBA has been established, and meeting attendees selected members to fill the offices of secretary, assistant secretary and assistant treasurer. The offices of president, vice president and treasurer are still open and are temporarily being filled by the

group's founders.

The group is in search of a logo – using the abbreviation MBA – to make up tasteful stickers to put in the windows of member businesses and offices, as well as to be used for group activities and promotions in the future. Suggestions may be sent to the Metropolitan Business Association, c/o GLCS, 750 W. Colonial Drive, Orlando, Fla. 32804, or they may be brought to the next general meeting.

Anyone still wishing to join is more than welcome. The membership fees – \$75 for businesses, \$25 for professionals – will not be collected until the group is through with its three-month organizational period.

The Gulf War: A Year Later, Its Accomplishments Prove to Be Desert Mirages

am guilty. I admit it. When I heard that our country had declared war on Iraq, and was beginning to fight I was right in there cheering for our guys to whip Saddam's butt. I mean after all, from all the media hype prior to the beginning of the war, it seemed that our men, along with the multi-national force were heading into a meat grinder.

Do you remember the vivid pull-out maps in all of the weekly magazines depicting the elaborate defenses Saddam's million-man army had allegedly set in place to greet our men in uniform? I mean, they had lakes of oil

which would incinerate thousands of soldiers. Mine fields, giant trenches for us to

traverse only to be picked off like a shooting gallery. To tell you the truth, I feared for our men who would have to endure this killing field.

And so, like so many other Americans, I watched the Cable News Network from morning to evening, watching in horror the Scud missile attacks upon Israel and Saudi Arabia. Those haunting photos of people huddling deep within shelters, ready to don gas masks in case of chemical warfare. Yes, the hype was certainly effective in conditioning us to the inevitability of war in the Gulf.

It is said that hindsight is always 20/20. But it is also said that we learn from our mistakes. Some say, too, that no one wins in time of war, but everyone loses. Now that we have had time to reflect on the war, we can see the folly of our ways, and our justifications for going to war being snuffed out as readily as the 825 or so burning oil wells in Kuwait were extinguished. First, let me say that the danger presented by a dictator like Saddam Hussein must always be reckoned with and neutralized.

But we didn't get rid of Saddam did we? He's still in power along with his cutthroat gang of generals, who even as you read this article are annihilating all those who supported the allies. The Kurds are being destroyed, and there are many other atrocities being perpetrated unchecked. What's more, though we used more explosives in the short timespan of the war than in Korea, even though we were so impressed with the Star Wars video game-like air war, with "smart" bombs exploding just where they were aimed (I like that: we call bombs smart!), we did not destroy all of Iraq's nuclear bomb-making capability. bombs. Good pay, benefits. Apply in person." In no time, Iraq will be more of a problem than it

was a year ago. No, we may not have to aim our bombs at Russia any more, but maybe a bit further southeast wouldn't you say?

If the Gulf War was anything, it could be likened to the Builder's Show, recently held in Las Vegas. There they had every conceivable vendor showing their stuff. What better way could military manufacturers of hardware suitable for fighting wars show how effective their stuff is, than in a war?

Call it luck, good marketing forecasting, or coincidence, but the Martin Mariettas of the world had their day in the sun, or should I say their laser guided infrared missile in the night. The Patriot worked superbly. The tanks rolled along without a glitch. The airplanes soared, why even the old queen of wars passed, the B-52 Strato-fortress dropped its deadly payload with earth-shuddering accuracy.

The TV military were primetime hits. Norman Schwarzkopf's briefings became better watched than the Weather Channel, and today all bask in the sunlight of popularity.

The military, after 20 years of derision has been vindicated. The shackles of

Vietnam were finally cast aside. Heros returned from the Gulf War, not a lot of pot-headed losers from the jungles. ROTC was not a four-letter word anymore in many students' eyes, in spite of its blatant discrimination against gays and lesbians. All was well with the military, our president and our country. We kicked butt, and were sitting on a cloud of patriotism.

How quickly things change. Our military did not defeat the world-class power called Iraq. It seems that in the final analysis, Saddam Hussein was more of a charlatan than anything else. All the talk in the media about the formidable force at Saddam's disposal was quite overblown given the short duration of the fighting. So what did we actually prove? That the United States and its allies could romp over an over-blown foe, just like the schoolyard bully beating up on some little wimp?

And what about President Bush? Sure he was tough with Iraq, and did what he said he would do if it didn't back down. But what is Bush doing for us here at home? Could it have been that the president was too preoccupied with trying to prove he had guts by beating up on Saddam to take steps to help people in this country keep roofs over their heads and food on their tables?



Of course, who can feel good knowing that we have ruined thousands of lives and killed hundreds of thousands of people, and have wreaked havoc upon the lives of thousands more. Out of sight, out of mind is the way we think in America. Homeless people? What homeless people; as we look the other way. Pain? Suffering? Where? Not in America!

So who cares if it's in some land where those weird people in bedsheets live. Yes, it's sad. It's sad to think that this war in the Gulf was a good thing, especially if it did not complete the mission, getting rid

young man, whom I shall call "Luke," recently moved here from California and telephoned us concerning a matter he considers discriminatory and an invitation to violence against gays.

On the drive to his home in Volusia County one afternoon he was listening to the radio and became aware of the words to a particular tune. It is a song he had heard before when living in California, a song that he feels is demeaning to gays. The words reflect on the disposable income of "faggots," perhaps insinuating that this income is greater than that of Joe Sixpack.

Luke feels this is an ill-disguised invitation to commit violence upon gays. It is important to understand that Luke was the victim of a violent attack at the hands of a gang of skinheads and suffered extreme physical injury and emotional torment. The end result, he has told me, is a fear of people – an extreme claustrophobic condition that prevents him from walking out of his home for fear he will encounter people; not violent

people - just people. It is the trauma of this attack that drove him from California. Luke said he called the radio station and spoke with one of the DJs at the radio station and with the manager. Their reaction was that gays are "too sensitive," reacting to circumstances that are not valid and are making mountains out of molehills. Luke advised them of an alternative verse of the song that is played in California but their response to this was that they play only music as originally written. They further defended this particular selection as a current popular recording stating that many local stations also feature it in their broadcasts.

Not wanting to belittle the concerns that Luke has, but also not wanting to stir up a hornets' nest of conflict and controversy, I spoke with a few gay acquaintances, people whom I know to associate on the edge of some radical groups and am surprised with some of my discoveries: We are certainly a diverse group of people, but some of us are "sleeping" with the enemy.

What surprises and alarms me is the number of our community who associate with these groups, subscribing to their publications and attending some of their From the Editor's Desk

more money for less than sub-standard quality, and we're mad at Japan? Go

Before we start Japan bashing, we should take a look at what we're missing by not being a citizen of the Land of the Rising Sun. Their prices for food are at least 10 times higher than ours. They are ingrained with a work ethic which borders on the maniacal. Many factory workers, for example, live so far from their places of employment that they leave home on Monday and don't return until Friday. In the meantime, they live (or exist really), in dormitory-like structures each with literally their own cubicle, which resemble a train's sleeping car. Pollution is so bad in most Japanese cities that they have opened up "oxygen stores," which literally sell oxygen in small gas mask-like containers.

So why should Americans envy the Japanese? All we have to do is forget about the Milkens of our country, stop wishing to win the lottery, stop relying on government handouts (welfare), stop having babies we can't afford to educate and take pride in whatever we do.

Sure, that's a tall order. I mean, why should some poor person work a minimum wage job when they can make thousands in one drug sale? Why should someone go to work when they can increase their welfare check by having more kids? In some parts of the country, we can't even live together respecting one another's cultural differences. Instead we see walled camps with battlegrounds which were known just a few years ago

"social" activities.

Radical organizations are the most dangerous threats, not only to the gay community, but to the whole community of freedom, and participating in any of their activities tends to diminish our awareness of their intent.

Central Florida has not seen any serious demonstration of radical brutality but the groups that initiate violence and' inflame the emotions, are here in Orlando. The beatings and murders of gays at the hands of skinheads and other radical groups that other areas have witnessed have not yet come here; organizations such as the Klan and neo-Nazi groups are not readily visible here yet. But be assured, these organizations exist locally, when and how they will surface is anyone's guess.

These concerns of Luke and the music that may offend his well being or his sense of security, should be met head on. All of us are in position to discourage broadcasters from publicizing prejudicial, anti-gay attitudes by letting it be known where our money will be spent. We need only notify all advertisers of any offending station that we will boycott any product advertised on that station and send a copy to the broadcaster. The offended person should take it upon himself to influence his friends to do the same thing.

Sure, the truth hurts, and opening up the markets of Japan to our cars won't solve the problem, especially is we send them the same junk we sell here. Maybe

clearly defined or so militant or extreme that they are recognized for what they are; sometimes they don't want the publicity. But we are in the midst of an election year in the nation and there is a rebel in the ranks of one of the recognized political parties campaigning for the nomination. 

one another

Virtually all strangers to me, I was surprised at the number of people and their enthusiasm and their youth. But it is difficult for me to realize that so many of them will not vote to represent themselves and yet most of them complain they feel slighted on the matters of apportioned rights and privileges.

Paradoxically, this is a time when we should be most politically aware. Seeing all of those bright young faces at the Cactus Club and The Phoenix and The Full Moon, a generation of people with their entire future before them, it is impossible for me to realize they really don't care what the future is; many of them really can't be bothered. Yet if legislation were passed prohibiting gays from voting, or even from congregating at these clubs, there would be outrage over cocktails, and laments about lost freedom.

We currently have the right to vote, but to keep this freedom we must exercise it; we have got to care - because there won't be another "Stonewall" for a long time. A storm of anti-gay sentiment is growing fueled by the AIDS crisis, and while it is without justification, we should defend ourselves while we still have a voice.

In the meantime, take a lesson from any socially active minority group. Boycott those who attack, offend or deny you. But take the time to let advertisers and the media know of their offense, and the reason for your protest.

Have a vehicle for spreading the word to those in your community, both locally and nationally. Have the guts to stand up and protest visually so the media will give you equal time. Your individual actions will do more to influence change simply because it translates into dollars and no advertiser wants to feel that every time his ad is run before the public, he may offend potential customers.

Editor's Note: How do you feel about this situation? The Center Fold welcomes differing points of view, as well as similar stories. Should we protest anti-gay music being played on our airwaves? Health Service Says No to Use of Pot for Illness

(AP) Washington – The goverment says Americans suffering from AIDS, cancer and glaucoma can't use marijuana to ease their plight. Officials say the drug might make them sicker.

The public Health Service said Tuesday that only 13 people already smoking marijuana legally for medical purposes will be allowed to continue. Their supplier the federal government.


"The decision was made by the Public Health Service primarily because of fear that the smoked marijuana would harmful to people with compromised immune systems," said Bill Grigg, the agency's spokesman.

There was no public announcement of the decison by Dr. James Mason, Public Health Service chief. Grigg revealed it in response to a query by the AP.


Advocates of medical marijuana say it combats nausea, vomiting and weight loss common to cancer patients undergoing chemotherapy and to some AIDS sufferers; reduces eye pressure in the treatment of glaucoma; and helps reduce muscle spasms common to neurological conditions.

Turning Away from That Dead-End Street

There once was a young couple so much in love. These two young men would do anything for each other. One day the truth of their love was tested to the fullest extent. They both received the results of their HIV tests.

The 21-year-old one, the oldest of the two, who had been raped the year before, was the first to receive his results ...

The doctor notified him that he had tested positive!

With tears flowing out of his eyes, he looked at his other half with great sadness and fear.

A look of instant terror seemed to fill his lover's eyes. His lover turned toward the doctor, waiting for his results. But a sense of relief seemed to wash over him when he was told that his test had come back negative.

While going through the emotional fight of anger and denial the HIV-positive lover was destroying himself little by little. While his companion began to take control of both of their lives. He had a dark side to him, the need for money and control became an obsession.

Still going through the emotional battlefield and feeling the sense of loss. Because of his family and friends turning their back on him for being HIV positive. The companion convinced him they would never part, that he would always

love him. Being in the emotional state the HIV-positive one was in, he believed every word— feeling love and security.

Still feeling confused, hurt and angry, the two young lovers moved from their hometown to start a new life in a new area where no one would know them and keep the HIV a secret.

Slowly the insults started, leaving doubtful opinion flowing through the oldest male's mind. As time went on deceitful and disturbing acts occurred, putting his personal needs and desires and sexual activates onto others.

The HIV-positive lover stood back watching all of this happening around him. He started to feel hurt. The one whom he loved was having sex without him!

Feeling left out and alone, with the desire for love and so much more, he started to review his life. He knew that he had some major decisions to make. He reviewed his relationship and saw things that he refused to see before, including that he had forgotten to love himself.

One day, feeling lonely and scared, he approached his lover with these emotions. Letting him know how he really felt.



Spring Proving Busy for OGC

Tollowing an all-too-brief vacation, the Orlando Gay Chorus (OGC) resumed a hectic schedule of auditions, rehearsals and fund-raisers, pretty much in that order. Beginning on Jan. 15 and for the following two weeks, over a dozen new candidates auditioned for Dr. Charles Callahan, director of the OGC, and Bob Smedley, its president.

Give or take a sabbatical or two, the occasional relocation to another town, and the minimal casualties of exhaustion, OGC's latest membership stands at 65.

New members immediately began memorizing two

years worth of repertory, while returning members forged their way through five pieces to be featured in a command performance for visiting members of Lesbian and Gay United Em-

ployees of AT&T (LeAGUE)'s first annual convention in February.

The chorus shared a double-bill with lesbian singersongwriter-comedian Monica Grant, an ideal blend of music and mirth. Surprisingly, the affair gave local chorines a chance to meet members of gay and lesbian choruses from around the nation.

Posters and notes of well-wishes were placed throughout OGC's dressing area; and, afterward, a few brave souls offered official greetings from their hometown organization. OGC will be reunited with these gracious folks in June for GALA Festival IV.

(GALA is an international alliance of over 90 men's, women's and mixed choruses, dedicated to providing leadership and inspiration to the lesbian and gay movement through excellence in choral arts. GALA's fourth festival, a week chocked full of workshops and performances by choruses from around the world, will be held in Denver in June. OGC is scheduled to perform.)

The OGC joined Joy MCC in celebration of its 13th anniversary on March 28. A trio of chorines joined Bryce Ward, a local performer, in a touching rendition of "First You Have a Dream." The event allowed the chorus to perform its own sacred music, so often unceremoniously interjected among showtunes and standards during its biannual concerts, including its Holiday celebration. "Joyous" is the only word befitting such an event.

Deserving of equal but much briefer mention is OGC's second annual rummage sale at Joy MCC on Saturday, April 4. The sale begins at 8 a.m., so come early before

> all those blue light specials end. And, on Wednesday, April 8, the chorus is offering an open house rehearsal.

Refreshments will be served, and the public will have an

opportunity to see and hear the chorus rehearsing its latest and destined-to-be greatest numbers. At last, the community-at-large will get to see exactly what Dr. Callahan does with his baton to get chorines to reach those top notes! Rehearsal begins at 7 p.m.

Dorothy Dish, OGC's in-house gossip queen (which one? They have so many!) has placed a flea in my ear concerning a potential songfest featuring members of the chorus at a local establishment I cannot disclose as of yet, but it begins with a "P" and ends with an "H." Rumored hostesses have ranged from Miss Jacquelyn Jones to the divine Miss P, perhaps even both. (Wouldn't that be worth the price of admission alone?!) Updates will be given.

In the meantime, keep your eyes peeled for a fairy or two in the garden at City Hall handing out flyers. One of them just may be me!

Act Out Theater Presents Fierstein's 'The International Stud'

Act Out Theater, Central Florida's only non-profit corporation organized to produce plays with gay and/or lesbian themes, announces its production of Harvey Fierstein's one-act comedy, The International Stud.

This is a play that everyone knows. It appeared on Broadway for months, and subsequently was made into a highly successful, and somewhat controversial,

The International Stud is the first act of Fierstein's Torch Song Trilogy, and according to Lewis Routh, director, is an incredible piece of theater.

Fierstein's The International Stud gives us Arnold, a flamboyant drag queen with a poignantly quick wit, and Ed, a shy, straight-looking bisexual school teacher. Their stories are presented in monologue form against a background of jazz standards sung (a la Helen Morgan) by the Torch Singer.

Through the play, we are treated to gay bar scenes of the '60s (complete with their backrooms), and are introduced to the complex world of gay relationships.

Yet, for all it vivid accounts of the gay experience, the play compelled Newsweek to write that it is the most conservative play to be presented in years ... that it is a play committed to the classic values of fidelity, family, loving ... all the while being a play about homosexuality.

The magazine refers to it as being funny, poignant and an unabashedly entertaining work that actually is a play for the whole family.

Act Out's production of The International Stud will feature a cast of regulars familiar to Act Out Theater audiences.

Doc Winters is the musical director/arranger and pianist. The production will be directed by Lewis Routh, Act Out's founder.



Medicine and Mockingbirds

Editor's Note: The following essay is the third contribution to The Center Fold by one of its most unique writers. The author is a modern-day storyteller (akin to a folklorist), and a victim of our community's modern-day disease. His stories are true; his words are simple; his messages are heartwarming. couple of things happened to me lately that boosted my physical strength and gave my attitude a terrific lift. I got a needed blood transfusion, and I heard my first mockingbird song of the year.

My HIV disease had been dragging me down for a couple of weeks, and I was in pretty bad shape physically because of it. My hemoglobin level had tapered off to a dangerously low level, and my strength and endurance were almost gone.

I had slipped so far that I could barely make it from my recliner chair to the kitchen and back without having to lean on other furniture to steady myself. I drove myself on a few errands one day, and found that I had to be extremely careful because I just about couldn't reach my brakes fast enough to avoid hitting the car ahead of me. My reaction time was off.

I made it to my nursing office OK, and gave a blood sample which was tested

right away. The nurse cam eback and said that my hemoglobin level was 7.0, which is dangerously low. Ten days before, it had been 8.3, so the decline I had felt had been real. My low level made the nurses become borderline freaky. They were worried that I couldn't drive safely, which was true, but I promised to only go straight home. The nursing company made arrangements with my doctor to get blood for me, brought it out to my house, and filled me up with fresh blood to build my strength.

Hemoglobin is the substance which carries oxygen from the lungs to the muscles of the body. Without enough hemoglobin, the muscles will run out of oxygen, and out of strength very quickly. The patient will start walking, and feel good for the first good feet. After the first few feet, his legs will deplete their oxygen and become tired. A few more feet, and the legs will become so fatigued that the patient cannot stand without help. In a healthy adult, the hemoglobin level will be around 13 or 14. Most doctors will order transfusions when the level drops to 8.0. No wonder I felt bad, with a reading of 7.0!

So, to strengthen me, a home care nurse brought three units of good, rich blood. I settled in my recliner, and the nurse took care of the rest. Three units took a few hours to flow in but I didn't mind the wait, because I could literally feel the strength returning to my body, and the color back to my face. When the transfusion was over, I felt like a new man. It almost seemed like the lights had



New Groups to Treat Gay, Lesbian Batterers Forming

The battering of one's partner is not just a heterosexual problem; it is a societal problem that is also greatly seen in the gay and lesbian community. Sadly, it is something that many gays and lesbians rarely admit and often keep hidden whether they are the victims or the perpetrators.

Earlier this year, the Florida law was changed to start protecting lesbians and gays who suffer physical abuse at their partner's hands. Obviously, this indicates our law enforcement agencies response to the growing emergence of this problem.

Violent and coercive tactics used in gay and lesbian battering include: physical assault of any kind, sexual abuse, destruction of property, threats against one's partner or a significant third party, control of economics, emotional abuse (humiliation, degradation, mind games, bursts of fury, etc.) and controlling one's partner through homophobic behaviors (threatening to "out" the person against their will).

No Abuse Inc., a non-profit counseling

program for perpetrators of domestic violence, is responding to this devastating and dangerous secret in the gay and lesbian community. No Abuse Inc. will be offering 26-week open groups for lesbian and gay batterers. The purpose of these groups will be to educate the batterer about what abuse is, why it occurs and how to establish an equal, intimate relationship. Person who take this courageous step in starting to heal themselves will be challenged to examine their belief systems and behavior patterns. The groups will be facilitated by Joyce Pastorek and Sandra Pollock.

The group for lesbians will be on Tuesdays from 11:30 a.m.-1 p.m. beginning April 21. A separate group for gay males will be on Thursdays from 11:30 a.m.-1 p.m. beginning April 23. The fee will be \$25 per group. If you find yourself to be abusive at times or know someone who would benefit from this program, please get some help. greatest, and thought my parents didn't love me. It was my space where I could go and feel safe when my parents would fight with each other. It was my escape from everything that scared me while I was growing up.

Of course, I searched other parts of the house for my fortress of solitude. I thought a place in the finished basement would do, but thought differently. After all, that was the place where my parents would threaten they would send me if I misbehaved.

Besides that, it had the "oil burner." That blasted thing would scare the pants off any young kid. If you saw the movie *Home Alone*, you would know what I'm talking about. I can remember my parents saying, "Michael, if you don't behave, we'll put you in the basement so the bogey man will get you!" Of course, they meant that big cast-iron monster that would glow in the dark, smell funny and growl all night. No way would I want to escape to my fortress of solitude down there!

There's one big problem that I'm sure many of us who have had our places of escape have encountered today. I still, have times in my life when I wish I could seek refuge in that special place that I made for myself so that I could feel safe. But that one's too far away, and I have yet to find another so suitable. A bar maybe?

No, I could never feel fully safe and at peace there. My own home? Perhaps, but they don't make them with attics down here too often. Thank goodness they don't make them with too many basements either.

Psychologists, psychiatrists and others all suggest that it's good to have a place where we can go to be alone with ourselves. They say it's very therapeutic.
