



Women's Clinics Need Our Help

Excerpts from Ruth Arick's IMPACT UPDATE

Aware Woman Clinics and reminist Majority's Clinic Defense Project need your help! IMPACT (Institute of Mobilized Prophetic Activated Christian Training) will be attacking until April 10th. Help is needed to make it through the Easter weekend, with the Saturday before Easter expected to the grand finale. Every clinic in Central Florida is at risk!

Aware Woman Center for Choice in Melbourne has trained nearly 100 escorts to date and will need many, many more. The Feminist Majority has sent a Clinic Defense Project staff person to help with the coordination and organization.

The teenage son of a clinic counselor was questioned by an

IMPACT'er, "what's is like to live in your apartment complex? We're thinking about moving here." The friendly visit soon deteriorated into a sermon, complete with Bible. The teenager was told that his mother would be the cause of their eternal damnation. After four warnings, the most recent home picketing resulted in an arrest for trespassing. The telephone lines at AWCC have been jammed by callers saying, "murderer" and quickly hanging up. This continues for hours and is very stressful and interferes with the clinic's ability to maintain communication with its patients.

Anti-Gay Petition Filed

A petition filed with the Secretary of State's office seeks to put on the state ballot an ordinance barring gay rights.

Anthony Martin of Palm Beach needs to gather 429,428 signatures by August 9, 1994, to put the proposal on the 1994 general election ballot.

Meanwhile, those opposed to an Anti-Gay amendment announced formation of a group called Floridians Respect Everyone's Equality, or FREE.

"It's pathetic to try to remove basic rights and dignity froma group of people based on their sexual orientation." Roblyn Blummer, director of Florida's American Civil Liberties Union, stated last month. "If he and others like him would just get over their homophobia, we could live in a substantially better world".

NAACP Support Gay Rights

In what is notably a first for the NAACP, Dr. William Gibson, chair of the board for the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, has publicly endorsed the 1993 March on Washington. While Gibson's stand is technically official policy for the NAACP at the moment, full ratification by the board will be required at a later date.

The Reverend Donald Wildmon, head of the American Family Association is on a crusade to stop Waldenbooks from selling gay literature. Calling Waldenbooks 'the largest pornographer in the country" the AFA is massing a large letter writing and phone calling scheme to stop the recent decision of Waldenbooks to sell gay magazines such as Frontiers, Genre, Advocate and Out. "We have received a lot of negative calls, but almost none in support of our decision [to carry Gay literature]" said Bruce Fryer,

Director of Magazine Sales.

Groups such as the AFA have targeted and succeeded in censoring gay-positive material in school curricula, school libraries, and public libraries in the past, but now they are going after the public sector with a new vengeance. 800 Waldenbooks locations across the country are currently carrying gay titles.



NGLTF LAUNCHES "FIGHT THE RIGHT" CAMPAIGN

The National Gay and Lesbian Task Force Policy Institute this month hired Oregon activist Scot Nakagawa to coordinate its "Fight the Right" campaign against an onslaught of Colorado- style antigay initiatives. "Family values" groups in at least a dozen states are gearing up to put anti-gay ballot measures before voters this year

States targeted by the Right Wing are Idaho, Michigan, Ohio, Washington, Montana, Iowa, Missouri, Minnesota, California, Main, Georgia, Oregon and yes...Florida. Gay and Lesbian activists around the country are preparing for battles similar to those waged last year in Colorado and Oregon. Lon Mabon, head of the Oregon Citizens Alliance that sponsored the unsuccessful Oregon anti-gay initiative in November, is serving as advisor to many of the right wing groups. Rather than using the Oregon initiative language which called

homosexuality "unnatural, abnor-

mal, wrong and perverse," right

wing activists are using the less inflammatory Colorado language as a model. Mabon and right wing activists in Idaho this week announced the formation of the Idaho Citizens Alliance and the beginning of a drive to place a Colorado style initiative on the ballot this November.

Through hiring Nakagawa, NGLTF will expand its civil rights organizing work and coordinate efforts to oppose statewide initiatives. Nakagawa will strategize with activists regarding right wing anti-gay organizing and ballot work, advocate to the media about Far Right attacks and travel to and work in communities facing anti-gay measures. He willupdate the NGLTF "Fight the Right Action Kit", an organizing manual for activists. Nakagawa will also identify and produceother publications needed by activists battling the Right.

When Alix Dobkin was in town last month she raised an issue which has spurred captivating conversation in our lesbian coffee clatches. Alix said, and I'm paraphrasing, that she hates men, she hates them as a class of people, she hates them in groups, and she hates their violence, but she loves individual men. This is in direct opposition to the way straight women feel about men; they love men as a group but hate individual men, e.g. their husband, father, etc.

Raise this issue in any group of people, gay, straight, men, women, etc., and there will be a diversity of opinions. Some believe we should not "hate" anyone, a harkening back to our judeo-christian upbringing.

Others believe that by hating men we are practicing that which we so strenuously abhor: discrimination. The premise upon which this is based is that discrimination and "unfairness" are the same. I will admit that there is plenty of unfairness in discrimination but to make these two concepts equivalent is too simplistic an explanation of discrimination.

nation; it fails to recognize the imbalance of power, the dominant/ subordinate dichotomy which fuels and gives force to discriminatory acts. When "discrimination" is practiced by the subordinate group we call this "reverse discrimination," a concept which I fail to grasp.

Personally, I subscribe to the belief that the only way to understand "feminism" and the relationship between men and women is by recognizing the imbalance of power; the fact that men are dominant in this society and women are subordinate. This is the only explanation that makes sense to me: to say that we are the same as men fails to recognize our inherent differences and permits companies to deny us maternity leave. To state that we are "different" from men permits men to use those differences to support the maintenance of the present power structure.

I have no problem agreeing with Alix; like she, I hate, as a group, those who oppress me, those who practice violence against me, and those who demean me, i.e., I hate men.
