## Business Association for Gay & Lesbian Professionals, Businesses, and Supporters

Orlando has joined the ranks of a number of America's cities that have rganized the resources of their gay and lesbian business owners and professionals. On March 12, the Metropolitan Business Association (MBA) was born during the guild's first general meeting.

About 30 business owners and professionals attended that first meeting at Joy MCC, and the room became electric with enthusiasm. No sooner than most people signed in, they were making connections, arranging to exchange services, and sharing common problems and solutions. They represented such diverse professions as printing and graphic arts, real estate, banking, travel, hairstyling, massage therapy, and many more.

Besides networking and getting the word out that these businesses and professionals are more than happy to serve gays and lesbians-- or those who are gay friendly-- the group will have an even farther reaching effect.

"When people start to see we have so many gay and lesbian business owners in this city, they will have to deal with us," said Keith Morrison, a group founder. "We can be role models for people coming up behind us, and for people looking to move to our area. The chance and strength it gives our community is amazing."

During the meeting, everyone in attendance was given time to introduce themselves and plug their business or service. The next general meeting will be held at Joy MCC, 2351 S. Ferncreek Ave, just north of Michigan, on Thursday, April 2, at 7pm (social begins at 6:30). Subsequent meetings will be hosted by participating businesses.

The basic structure of the MBA has been established, though the offices of president and vice president have only temporary volunteers. The group is also searching for a logousing the abbreviation MBA-- to make tasteful stickers to put in the windows of member businesses and offices. # **She Speaks Out**

No, I'm not the LCN movie critic. But I've been writing a lot about movies lately. In our culture, movies and videos are easier to digest and less time consuming than books. They are becoming the major vehicle through which a story can be told in detail.

Movies are becoming more serious in dealing with social/personal problems. Movies like *The Prince of Tides*, *Dances With Wolves*, *JFK*, and *The Fisher King* are taking social problems or crime to a personal level. We are no longer looking at statistics, but an individual's life. We feel and understand a character's plight. Finally we can empathize.

No movie has touched me more personally than the movie Thelma and Louise. Even though my social contact with men is limited (by choice), I've been harassed, threatened, and fondled by more men than I'd care to remember. I've been beaten up numerous times, and nearly raped twice. As many times as I've been called a man-hater, I simply see that as a projection. Men hate women. In our society the behavior is condoned and encouraged. Statistics on the violence men perpetrate on women are wellknown, so much so that I do not need to repeat them.

All one has to do is look at a rape trial to see how deeply entrenched misogyny (woman hating) is entrenched in our country. Even when a movie like *Thelma and Louise* comes out, the male critics can't handle the message. A local newspaper's critic moaned about glorifying the senseless violence in the movie. Say what? When was the last time you heard one of these boys cry foul over the violence directed TOWARD women? *Thelma and Louise* challenged the status quo of women as helpless victims, while showing them persecuted even in their show of strength.

Thelma and Louise are modern women's heroes. We don't need the abstract silliness of a desert war to prove our courage. We do it every day in the city streets. We handle assaults on our self esteem at work and at home. We are whistled at, grabbed at, and worse, raped and killed by men; reporting such crimes, the insinuation is "we asked for it." We've probably all fantasized about fighting back the way Thelma and Louise did. But we all know too well the consequences of bucking the patriarchal system.

The only way to stop the violence directed toward us, is unfortunately to use weapons or inflict pain on men. Nowhere have I ever read that a man is exposing sensitive organs when he pulls down his pants to rape a woman. Nowhere have I read that when a man forces oral copulation with a woman that he is placing a sensitive appendage between jaws which can exert enough force to clip it off, or at least render it harmless.

Instead we're told to not fight back, lest we be killed, or disgustingly told to relax and enjoy it. It's time to fight back, and die if necessary. Men won't stop rape. Men ARE the rapists. And the only heroes available to save us from these rapists are ourselves--our strong woman selves.

Just ask Thelma and Louise.

It is indeed exciting to see the growing number of women's presses and organizations and women artists who are creating materials that really speak to us and about us. To say nothing of the network itself... women promoting and supporting women outside (and in spite of) the male-run publishing establishment.

That said, would you volunteer to read one of these books and review it for the *LCN Express*?\* Two or three paragraphs is all it takes, unless you **want** to write more. Nor does it have to be a formal review. I know when I get a book recommendation, I'm listening primarily for a personal account of what was liked or disliked and why, rather than plot/style analysis.



### Book Review: A FLIGHT OF ANGELS Sarah Aldridge, Naiad Press

Art...romance...intrigue...politics... all favorites on my list of passions-which help to make this a Naiad novel I really like. Set in the 1950's, one protagonist works for the National Gallery of Art in DC, the other for a Congressman. This means they are living and loving under the spying, lying eyes of McCarthyites-- ready and able to punish anyone/anything deemed "morally corrupt"-- be it art or homosexuals. This was particularly interesting as both of the aforementioned women are first-time lesbians, making their discoveries and fears about loving other women all the more dramatic.

I like the sex between these women, too. Aldridge focused on the emotional dimensions of their relationship-- as portrayed by their physical closeness and need for each other. It was nice to read allusions to lesbian sex without reference to wetness, moisture, waves, caves, and pulpy fruits or flowers' was disappointed that too much of the story was explained in lengthy dialogue, but I still liked it well enough to get in trouble at work for reading it on the sly. I bet you'll like it too.






### PRO-CHOICE MARCH ON WASHINGTON!

# In Good Health

Urinary tract infections (UTI's) may involve any part of the urinary system, from the kidneys to the bladder to the urethra, the opening where urine leaves the body. Cystitis is another word sometimes used as a catch-all term for bladder conditions, including bladder infections.

UTI's are much more common in women than in men because the urethra is much shorter and bacteria can pass more easily up into the bladder. They may occur less frequently in lesbians than in straight women because they are more often related to the friction and irritation of heterosexual intercourse. Almost all women, however, will experience UTI's at some time in their lives.

The common symptoms of a UTI may include: increased frequency of urination, urgency (feeling that you have to urinate immediately), pain or burning during urination, cloudy or foul-smelling urine, feeling that the bladder is not completely emptied after urinating, blood in the urine, backache, chills or fever.

UTI's are generally not too serious initially, but if they are not treated they can spread up to the kidneys, causing a severe infection. Women are advised to get treatment quickly when blood is present in the urine because blood may indicate kidney damage.

Antibiotics are usually needed to cure a UTI. Health care providers will send a clean-catch midstream urine specimen to the lab for a culture and sensitivity, to find out the type and number of bacteria present as well as which antibiotic will be most effective for treatment.

It is important to finish the whole course of antibiotics prescribed, even though symptoms may improve after a few days, in order to be sure the infection is completely cured and to avoid producing strains of bacteria that are resistant to antibiotics.

Some ways to prevent UTI's are: • wearing clean cotton underwear and avoiding pantyhose or tights (nylon may trap moisture and provide an environment where bacteria can thrive);

• wiping only from front to back after using the bathroom to avoid bringing bacteria from the rectum or vagina to the urethra;

 rinsing soap thoroughly after washing the vulva; • making sure hands and finge. nails are clean (your own and your partner's);

• urinating after sexual activity to help wash away bacteria that may have been pushed into the urethra;

 cleaning sex toys between partners;

 using only water-based lubricants such as K-Y jelly;

• avoiding perfumed soaps, powders, bubble bath and toilet paper;

changing tampons or sanitary pads frequently;

• drinking lots of fluids, especially water and cranberry juice (helps make the urine more acidic so it is harder for bacteria to grow); and

• urinating more frequently to prevent urine form sitting in the bladder for long periods.

Hopefully, by following these guidelines, UTI's can be avoided.

# Trapped

New Groups Starting in Orlando to treat Gay and Lesbian Batterers submitted by Sandra Pollack

The battering of one's partner is NOT a heterosexual problem; it is a societal problem that is also greatly seen in the lesbian and gay community. Sadly, it is something that many lesbians and gays rarely admit and often keep hidden whether they are the victims or the perpetrators.

Earlier this year the Florida law changed to start protecting lesbians and gays who suffer physical abuse at their partner's hands. Obviously this indicates our law enforcement agencies are responding to the growing emergence of this problem.

Violent and coercive tactics used in lesbian and gay battering include: physical assault OF ANY KIND, sexual abuse, destruction of property, threats against one's partner or a significant third party, control of economics, emotional abuse (humiliation, degradation, mind games, bursts of fury, etc.) and controlling one's partner through homophobic behaviors (threatening to "out" the person against their will).

NO ABUSE INC., (a non-profit counseling program for perpetrators of domestic violence), is responding to this devastating and dangerous secret in the gay and lesbian community. NO ABUSE INC. will be offering 26 week open groups for lesbian and gay batterers.

The purpose of these groups will be to educate the batterer about what abuse is, why it occurs and how to establish an equal, intimate relationship. The person who takes this courageous step in starting to heal themselves will be challenged to examine their belief systems and behavior patterns. The groups will be facilitated by Joyce Pastorek and Sandra Pollock.

The group for lesbians will be Tuesdays 11:30am - 1:00pm beginning April 21. A separate group for gay males will be Thursdays 11:30 am - 1:00pm beginning April 23. The fee will be \$25 per group.

# Swazi Custom: Women May Marry

*Exit*, South Africa's only gay new paper, reports a traditional tribal authority has ruled that a Swazi woman can marry another woman, and the woman who pays "lobola" (a dowerylike payment) can delegate a man to sire her children. The ruling came during a civil hearing in which Thalitha Mngomezula accused a man of cheating her out of four cattle.

Ms. Mngomezula told the court that she wanted the cattle to be handed in as lobola for a woman she wanted to marry. She had arranged for her brother to father children with her fiancee, but that she would be responsible for their financial well-being and he would have no claim on them. The court president told shocked spectators at the hearing that this was nothing new in Swazi law and custom, and it was acceptable if the parents of both women agreed.

# Bar Dykes Auditions


