TAKING CARE by Judy Shaw, M.A.

The idea of running a column on "Health Issues" is an excellent one. When Barb Fallon first approached me, my first questions were: "What do you mean when you say health? Are you referring to mental health, physical health, spiritual health, socio-political health? Would I address issues specific to lesbians or Women in general?"

It seems, after reflection, that the answer is "Yes" to all the above. Health covers a full range of physical, emotional and social issues that affect us ns Lesbians, as Women and as mem-Jers of the homosexual community. Fortunately, we are not alone in our interest. We now have the National Lesbian & Gay Health Conference (NLGHC) meeting annually to raise questions, present research and develop strategies to deal with the major health problems affecting our community. This group of Gay and Lesbian health professionals from all over the country has identified three major crises working to destroy the Gay and Lesbian Community - Aids, Alcohol and Abuse.

We are all increasingly aware of the devastation wrought by AIDS. However, at this past year's conference in Los Angeles more Lesbianspecific research was presented on breast cancer, which, if left untreated, is a major killer of all women. For Lesbians, the statistics are even more frightening.

Strong clinical evidence indicates that Lesbians are three times more kely than other women to develop reast cancer. As Lesbians we have been involved in every political movement. These startling statistics on Lesbians and breast cancer seem to be a "call to arms" for us to organize and politicize for our own survival.

When discussing the alcohol crisis, it is important to include all areas of substance abuse and other addictions. Research suggests that the chemical dependency issue may be three times greater among Gays and Lesbians than the heterosexual population. This is not a result of a genetic predisposition, but rather the result of the additional psychosocial stressors created by living in a homophobic society. At recent NLGHC conferences, presentations have suggested integrating a feminist model into chemical dependency recovery for Gays and Lesbians.

We have not even begun to really deal with the third major crisis, abuse. Many of us first became aware of personal violence in our childhoods. Emphasis continues to be placed on the need and benefits of healing from childhood physical and sexual abuse. However, the crisis that many of the NLGHC presenters have chosen to focus on is domestic violence. We have not even begun to face the issue of domestic violence and acknowledge it as a real threat. Much work still remains to be done.

In addition to the above, there are many other health issues we are all seeking help with. It is my hope that you will respond to this column and tell me which ones you would personally like to receive information about.



Either Is Love by Elisabeth Craigin

A review of this book appearing in a New York paper in 1937 describes it as a "strange little book written by an exceedingly intelligent woman... elegant...cerebral... dignified." This description is true, however the reviewer fails to mention a few things.

It would appear that in order to get her story of a great love between two women published in those homophobic dark ages she had to resort to the fiction of the women "going straight" in the end. Craigin attempts, very successfully, to depict the agonizing struggles of a heart born to quest after spiritual union with another. The protagonist, like Jacob, wrestles for her identity, a secret pariah.

The quality of the writing, and its part in our history, is worth any effort to get the book. It is still in print, like "Well of Loneliness", and can be ordered thru interlibrary loan.

▼ A Woman's Odyssey into Africa by Hanny Lightfoot-Klein. Klein undertook 3 solo, year-long treks thru the Sudan, Kenya, and Egypt to study female genital circumcision. This book chronicles her personal experiences.

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In addition to dropping the paper's former name. The Center Fold, which LCN leadership and others objected to as degrading to women, the GLCS Board of Directors appointed Monique Burns, a professional editor and writer, as the paper's executive director.

The need for a name change was one of several issues Editor Barb Fallon raised at August's GLCS Board Meeting. The Board responded by instituting the name change effective with the January issue. "The whole idea is to bring the community together," explains GLCS vice-president John Rose, "not to continue doing things that foster separatism."

Judy Shaw, one of two lesbians recently re-elected to the GLCS Board and a mental-health therapist who has provided counseling services at he GLCS Center for several years, says, "I think what's important about the name-change issue is the Board's commitment to responding to the les-

bian community. It's clearly a sign of a raising of the Board's awareness of internalized sexism within the gay and lesbian community." Moreover, says Shaw, "It shows the power of lesbians when we come together and ask for what we want."

Beginning with the February issue, a number of editorial changes are planned under Burns' leadership. In addition to adding new columns, The Triangle will increase coverage of community news, events, issues and individuals, as well as state, national and international events and issues.

Burns has also pledged to include greater coverage of lesbian issues. "The GLCS newspaper is meant to serve us all, yet it's widely acknowledged that, in past years, lesbians have gotten short shrift at the paper. As a lesbian, and as a journalist trained to present balanced coverage, I'm totally committed to insuring that we lesbians get equal time."

Recruiting more volunteer staff members--especially women--is one key to assuring more wide-ranging coverage, says Burns. "In the recent past,

gay men have really been the only group involved at the paper. But to reflect the needs and interests of the entire community, we also need the talents, viewpoints and energies of lesbians. And I don't just mean some lesbians. To represent our community in all its diversity, we need input from as many women as possible."

"If you can't work or submit something on a monthly basis, submit a short essay for our new Viewpoint column or a Letter to the Editor.

A Triangle Staff Recruiting Party is planned for Feb. 9, at 7:30 p.m., at the new GLCS Center, 714 East Colonial Dr. (near Summerlin Ave). Regular editorial meetings will be held on the second Tuesday of each month. Because of the Recruiting Party, the next editorial meeting is February 2.


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Orlando PRIDE Dinner

It felt good to be in church on Sunday and not have to hide a part of me that I have kept hidden for so very long.

I have gotten involved in several of the many activities the church offered at the time: volleyball (of course the women were more aggressive players!), the 91 Christmas Contada, their quarterly women's seminars, facilitating a seminar and helping with planning the Women's Retreat Weekend. This retreat brought together 26 women from as far north as Daytona and south from Bradenton, all of us come together to share our spiritual ity. Lots of tears and cheers were shed by many.

Joy MCC has given my life a purpose and direction. It allowed me the opportunity to find my partner, lover, and friend. It has so many different things going on-on a regular basis such as: Sunday morning Sunday School at the 10:30 AM service and Monthly Grief Support Groups, Choir rehearsal every Sunday at 5 PM, an HIV Support group for those with HIV and HIV caregivers, a weekly Wednesday night dinner at 6:30 PM (call for reservations), a weekly discussion group which sometimes has guest speakers, TLC Training, a food bank and thrift shop. Our church does a lot for not only our members but the community.

We also have a FEMALE Assistant to the pastor. Her name is Carol Hale and her spouse is Linda. Watch for an article on them and other items that might interest you.

Summit County, Colorado may have become the first county in the state to pass resolution in opposition to Amendment 2. Members of the Colorado lodging community are taking steps either to "repeal this stupid thing," or take it to court to fight it.

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Iran Persecutes Gays

Iranian authorities executed one gay man and jailed 92 others in August, according to KAYHAN NEWS-PAPER, a Farsi-language publication in London. Authorities also executed a second gay man in August, according to Sweden's National Federation for Sexual Equality (RSSL).

KAYHAN reported that on Aug. 3, 90 homosexuals were arrested in southern Iran after they appeared at a "wedding" between an 18 year old and 19 year old man. The grooms-to-be were also jailed; under the Iranian Penal Code, they face the death sentence. The 90 guests face flogging or prison.

According to Jack Anderson and the BBC, homosexuals have been tossed off mountains, decapitated, stoned and burned. Non-sodomy homoeroticism is also illegal and can lead to execution. Basically the law reads the same for lesbians. by Becky Acuna A topic near and dear to the lesbian community I'm sure, this article is about your cats and dogs...not those first dates who long to linger past your initial interest. For all you confirmed or potential eco-dykes, there are now many inexpensive products you can buy to control fleas that won't poison your animals, friends and homes.

First, try dusting your house with diatomaceous earth. This is a natural, fossil mineral that is completely nontoxic to anything but insects. (Static electricity causes it to cling to them, removes the wax coating covering their little bodies, and makes them flee or die of dehydration).

Don't however, use the diatomaceous earth marketed for swimming pools. It is chemically treated and **can be harmful** to your pets. Diatom dust, the good kind marketed for flea control, has actually been found to be beneficial to farm animals by killing parasites in their intestines. It should be sprinkled in liberal amounts all over your house-- esp(cially in areas where animals like to hang out or sleep. (Don't forget under sofas, beds, etc.) A flour sifter helps spread the dust evenly. Work it into carpets with feet, broom or rake and wait as long as you can stand it before vacuuming.

Use herbal flea collars, too. You simply apply to a cloth collar an oil comprised of such harmless substances as eucalyptus, pennyroyal and citronella. Popping an appropriate sized clove of garlic down your dog's throat pill-fashion also makes them unpleasant to fleas-though you will smell no odor.

These products can be purchased at the **Eco-Store**, which has moved to College Park. (Chamberlain's sells Diatom Dust for \$9.50 @ 8oz. while the Eco-Store charges \$5 @ lb.) They'll give you great advice and they promote progressive causes...like ours!

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MEET ME AT MOOREFIELD'S: AN EXPERIMENT IN COUP D'ETAT by N.T.



The management sees the support of the Lesbian community and begins catering to us just as eagerly as any gay club (inside sources tell me management would be thrilled to have us...)
