

Hypnotist Wows 'Em In Orlando

Sunday, Nov. 20, found an exceptional show at the Parliament House in Orlando.

Mr. Jack Louchlin, a clinical psychologist with a Ph.D., from Berkeley, Calif. performed in the Playhouse Theatre.

Mr. Louchlin is a hypnotist and showman which, during the course of his show, had the audience in tears from laughing so hard.

He explained that hypnosis comes from the word *Hypnos* which is Greek with the meaning of *sleep*. In 36 languages, the word *Hypnosis* means sleep induced by suggestion.

"There are two main types of people you will see on stage tonight," he said. "First is the 'Hypnambulus' which will not believe that he is hypnotized and will be aware of all going on around him, however he will have no physical control over himself." He continued, "The second is the Somniambulist which resembles a sleepwalker."

Sixteen empty chairs sat on the stage and when Louchlin invited members of the audience to participate, there was a rush to fill the seats.

Eight subjects were finally selected.

Michael, Louchlin's assistant and traveling companion, entered from the wings to keep the various subjects from accidentally getting injured.



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Man Guilty of Slaying Lover in Motel Room

A Pennsylvania man charged with firstdegree murder in the savage killing of a Fort Lauderdale photographer pleaded guilty in Orlando on Monday to second-degree murder.

The death of Paul Carlile was "a case of first-degree murder," prosecutor Ray Sharpe said, but he accepted the second-degree plea.

Orange County Circuit Judge Ted Coleman will sentence Sakosky, 22, on Jan. 30. The recommended sentence under state sentencing guidelines is 20 years in prison, but Sharpe said he would ask Coleman to exceed that because of the atrociousness of the crime. The maximum sentence is life in prison.

Carlile's body was found Nov. 3, 1982, in a bed at the Parliament House Motor Inn.

Sakosky had lived in Scranton, Pa., where he had a long record of non-violent crimes and was on parole for a 1981 conviction for burglary and receiving stolen property.

He was living in Miami last year when he and Carlile, 25, a free-lance photographer, became lovers in August or September.

The last weekend of October, Sakosky told Carlile he wanted to break up. When Carlile objected, Sakosky hit him in the face.

The pair had three purposes for coming to Orlando: trying to make up, visiting Walt Disney World and, in Carlile's case, taking photos for *David* an entertainament guide for gays.

Carlile registered by himself at the Parliament House, the afternoon of Nov. 2. About 8 p.m., he and a man later identified as Sakosky came to the front desk asking for a "do not disturb" sign.

About 30 minutes later, the switchboard operator heard — from a phone off the hook in Carlile's room — groans and what sounded like someone being beaten. Someone got on the phone and said nothing was wrong.

Motel employees went to listen at the door and look inside through the room's curtains. They saw Sakosky in the room but no sign of trouble. Checks later in the evening showed the room to be quiet.

The medical examiner estimated that Carlile was killed at 11 p.m. About midnight

a car fitting the description of Carlile's was seen leaving the hotel's parking lot.

The manager checked the room about 1:30 p.m. the next day and found the walls splattered with blood, apparently from wounds to Carlile's neck and arms, which were cut to the bone

Carlile had been hit in the head with a lamp a dozen times and the lamp cord was tied around his neck. His face and mouth were covered with a bandanna and a towel, all wrapped with masking tape. His body was face down, tied to the bed.

"He was defenseless to resist because there was little or no slack in any of it," Sharpe said

Sakosky was arrested with Carlile's car in Scranton on Nov. 6. In place of the Florida license plate was a stolen Pennsylvania tag.

Sharple said there was no major problem of homosexual witnesses being unwilling to cooperate because of embarrassment or hostility toward police.

"The people that I talked to were concerned with the brutality of the case and not wanting the guy to get away."

"It really troubled me" to accept the second-degree plea, Sharpe said, "but it's the safest and best thing to do under the circumstances."

"A sure thing is better than a roll of the dice."

Defense lawyer Ray Dvorak said, "I feel that the (Sharpe) made a very honest offer to us and beyond that it would be hard to say anything."

William John Sakowsky, 22, on November 14, pleaded guilty to second degree murder in the unfortunate death of Paul Carlile.

Mr. Carlile was found dead at the Parliament House Motor Inn in Orlando on November 2, 1982.

The prosecuting attorney for the state of Florida accepted a plea bargaining offer and stated that he felt the advantage was in saving the gay community the embarrassment of a trial.

At the sentencing hearing, the state will present a motion that the judge set aside the guidelines usually used in sentencing. The state contends that the brutal nature of the homicide justifies setencing outside the guidelines.

Sakowsky will be sentenced on Jan 30.

The gay community wishes to thank Mr. Ray Sharp for his diligent prosecution in this case. The community is also aware of the tremendous amount of effort made by the Orlando Police Dept. and the Scranton Police Dept. in the investigation of this homicide. As usual, these departments have gone "the extra mile" for the safety of the gay community.

New Mayor of Key West is Openly Gay!

On November 1st the race for mayor of the tiny "Conch Republic" was decided. The nearly 6900 votes, representing a hefty 60 percent in voter turnout, were cast, 54.5 per cent to City Commissioner Richard Heyman over hard-line native Richard "Bubba" Kerr. The race was not entirely a pretty one.

Kerr, a former Monroe County Commissioner, seemed to stress both his pride and his prejudice while waging the political battle. As a member of the old-line "Conch" family, Kerr had an island heritage and was an advocate of the "Bubba" system whereby native families took care of their own — He also portrayed a traditional lifestyle: "Richard Kerr — Family Man" is how the poster read.

Heyman, in contrast, was a northern-

born business man, a 48 year old art dealer who moved to America's most tropical outpost only 10 short years ago. In the years that followed, he withstood the test of being "different" by becoming the first openly gay citizen brazen enough to run for, and be elected, a city father. Heyman's qualifications did not need dwelling upon.

"Bubba" Kerr didn't see it that way, however. His good-guy, bad-guy strategem sighted mainly on Heyman, not on the issues. Never mind the deteriorating streets, the sewage or the water problems. Take no thought that Key West's electric rates are fourth highest in the nation.


Kerr's campaign focused on his opponent as not just an outsider, but as a gay outsider and a "morally insensitive radical". Even lame-duck mayor Dennis Wardlow took up the chant, by claiming that Heyman would turn the town into a "gay resort." As if it weren't one already.

But when it came to funding, guess who had to go out of town for support. Peter Ilchek, Heyman's campaign manager, said that Kerr's fund showed \$8400, more than half coming from non-local sources as far away as Miami. Heyman's fund, said Ilchek, drew over twice as much, 90 percent from Key West citizens, yet only 10 percent overall in gay support.

"Your vote will set the Moral Tone for our Community" declared the Kerr campaign poster. And with the election of gay mayor Richard Heyman, it most certainly did

Santa Cruz Elects Openly Gay Mayor

HOMOSEXUAL MAYOR. Santa Cruz City Council has voted to elect John Laird as the first openly homosexual mayor in the city's 176-year history. Laird, 33, is an administrative service officer for the Santa Cruz County personnel department and has been a member of the city council since 1981. He said he thought it was important to get the fact that he was homosexual "out in the open." He was unanimously nominated and elected by his seven fellow council members. His predecessor: Socialist Mayor Bruce Van Allen.





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



Out of respect for my wife, I allow him to come to our house but I'm very nervous having him around our three children. Can they be harmed by contact with him? - W.O.

Dear W.O.: Of course no. Homosexuality is not catching. There have been many myths about homosexuals but recent studies show how misinformed most people are in their

An investigation by psychologist Alan Bell and sociolgist Martin Weinberg of the In-

stitute for Sex Research at Indiana University demonstrated that few homosexual men and women conformed to the hideous stereotype people have of them as desperately sick, sexually hyperactive people constantly in pursuit of new partners.

Some gays are very well-adjusted and live in long-term relationships built on strong emotional commitment. Many homosexual men and women are deeply committed to the families of their siblings. Usually (perhaps because they often don't have children of their own), they make especially good, caring aunts and uncles.

Children form their sexual identity at a very early age, before age 4. Usually, the child finds his or her role model in the parent of the opposite sex. It is important for your children to have an example of a parent who is capable of mature, loving, understanding behavior toward those who are different.

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



THE LAW OF RETURN By Alice Bloch

Now and then, the first novel by a young riter shows such talent that - instead of being ignored by critics - it receives

widespread critical praise. Alice Bloch's novel The Law of Return has shown itself to be just such à work.

In The Law of Return, Bloch tells the story of Ellen Rogin, a young college graduate from western Pennsylvania who travels to Israel in 1969. She plans to stay for just a summer, but finds herself caught up in the Jewish culture she has so long ignored, and she stays for two years, rediscovering her religious heritage, and changing her name to Elisheva.

While in Israel, several unsatisfying relationships with men lead her to also reexamine her identity and feelings as a woman. When the one man she feels she could marry turns out to be gay, Elisheva begins also to slowly acknowledge her own sexual feelings for women.

This book is easy to read and keeps your interest so as not to set it aside. It is the story of a woman who, like a rose, grows, starting small, then blooming as she accepts herself and her feelings. An excellent

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Dear Fred

Dear Fred,

I have several "problems" that I would like to get some outside views on. First, I recently moved to Orlando to live with my mother and sister. Upon "Coming out" to them my mother, while not really supportive, has not had anything negative to say about my sexuality. My sisters however are fairly supportive. The problem lies with my homophobic brother and my mom's boyfriend. My brother and I were at one time good friends, but my departure from college and home to Orlando caught him by total surprise. My brother and I lived with my deceased father's parents. When I wrote and told them that I was gay, they refused to believe it or let my brother read the letter I had written him. I would like to be friends again but don't know if it is possible to be the "brothers" we were and come out; as I said he is very homophobic. The problem with my mother's boyfriend is that my mother doesn't want him to know (I'm gay) and I must be very careful about what I say or do when he's around — which is a lot. How can I handle

My second "problem" is that after several months of short relationships and one night stands, I've become totally bored with the bars and the life of bar-hopping.

I've always been a fairly religious person, but find it hard to accept the "old" rules of the Bible that can't seem to find acceptable for my newly admitted "gayness". The two just don't seem to mix — but I'm not sure. Can you tell me a little more about MCC? Finally I have been very politically active in the past — how can I become involved with the GCS here in Orlando? I know that MCC & GCS maybe two ways for me to find another kind of Gay life outside the bars — any others that you might suggest?

Restless and a Bit Confused

Dear Restless,

Let's take things one step at a time.

First, three cheers for your sisters and a big pat on the back for your mother.

Grandparents, in general, find it difficult to accept someone admitting being gay as in their time of youth and throughout their upbringing, things of this nature were not discussed and were thought to be extremely immoral.

More and more grandparents are beginning to slowly accept persons as being gay, living together though unmarried and other things that were very unacceptable while they were growing

You don't say in your letter if your brother is younger than yourself or not. I suspect that he is. You wrote that your brother is very homophobic. You will need, in your own time and as you feel you must, to tell your brother. It is better coming from you than someone else. Also stress that you are still the same person as you have always been, that you haven't changed.

When you tell your brother, there is always the possibility that your brother will place a "wall" between himself and you for a while. Time will help to tear it down and bring you and your brother

Next, your mother is trying to make a life for herself and her wishes should be respected as to your making your gayness known to her boyfriend. You can become involved in Gay Community Services by calling "THE-GAYS" on your phone

and asking when the next meeting is. The Joy Metropolitan Church meets each Sunday night at the New Age Center which is located

on Curry-Ford Road about one block east of S. Bumby Ave. The services start at 7:15 P.M. sharp. Check each issue of New Direction for special events such as the monthly Gay Skate.

It's difficult during holidays to be alone. I've been there.



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




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
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Key West — Good to visit all year long . . .

National Council of Churches Take Up Gay Issue

WASHINGTON — The National Council of Churches is ready to take up the most divisive issue that has confronted the ecumenical agency in its three-decade existence — the eligibility for membership of a tiny denomination given over almost wholly to ministry with and among homosexuals.

Church officials acknowledge that a positive vote by the council's governing board representatives of the council's - 31member Protestant and Orthodox denominations meeting Wednesday through Nov. 11 in Hartford, Conn. - could result in several churches quitting the interfaith agency and seriously harm efforts to provide a common Christian witness in the nation.

At issue is the membership application of the Universal Fellowship of Metropolitan Community Churches, a group of 175 congregations with 27,000 members begun in 1968 to minister, as one member put it, "in a loving and caring way to a despised and rejected minority - homosexuals.'

MCC officials acknowledge that its congregations are predominantly homosexual but they reject the suggestion that they are a "homosexual church."

"We are a Christian church, open to all people, called into being initially and primarily for an outreach into the gay and lesbian community," the denomination's board of elders said. "Our churches are predominantly homosexual in membership due to the great need we address. However, our outreach and concern frequently move us out of exclusively gay ministry and into a variety of ministries and concerns.'

The dispute comes at a critical time in the council's history: It is under fire from liberals who believe it has strayed to far to the left on social justice and political issues and its justpublished "inclusive language" lectionary non-sexist Bible readings for public worship - has raised the hackles of many who accuse the council of "tampering" with the Bible.

Several council members fear that a positive response to MCC membership under study and consideration since 1981 could be the last straw that shatters the fragile unity of the council.

At the same time, many of these members feel that the Metropolitan Community Churches — at least technically — meet the rather loose membership qualifications of the council. They feel that to reject the Metropolitan Community Churches simply on the question of homosexuality would be hypocritical.

Others, however, feel that the basic issue is homosexuality and at least one denomination the Eastern Orthodox Church threatened to quit the council if the Metropolitan Community Churches are allowed to join.

The Lutheran Church in America and some black denominations have also expressed concern about the MCC's stance on homosexuality and whether it is compatible with Christian doctrine.

"If the Metropolitan Church were somehow shifted overnight so that it was 85 percent heterosexual and 15 percent homosexual, there'd be no question about its membership," the Rev. Paul Fries of the Reformed Church in America and a professor at New Brunswick Theological Seminary, aid earlier this year.

A study prepared for the council by the Lutherans earlier this year said it most bluntly, arguing the Metropolitan Community Churches' understanding of human nature its approval of homosexuality as God-given - "is at fundamental variance with that held by the vast majority of Christians."

Other council members, however, such as the United Church of Christ, the Philadelphia Yearly Meeting of Friends (Quakers) and the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) have been experiencing a sharp change in their attitudes toward homosexuality and are less reluctant to recognize the MCC.


The Hartford vote will be on the technical issue of whether the Metropolitan Community Churches are eligible for membership and not on membership itself. But for Archbishop lakovos, head of the Eastern Orthodox Church, and other opponents, it is the critical

Some other church bodies have been declared eligible for membership but have not joined the council, notably the Southern Baptist Convention, the nation's largest Protestant body, and the Roman Catholic Church. Others, like the Rev. Sun Myung Moon's Unification Church, have been declared ineligible for membership.

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
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



The address on the match box reads simply Park Avenue South. The name of the restaurant is Two Flights Up and is logically appropriate. One must climb two flights of stairs to reach their destination. Opinions on the worthwhileness of that climb are varied.

Some people will argue that the only reason behind TFU's survival on competitive Park Avenue is it's appeal to students, "artsy" patrons, and the elite. But it takes more than the patronage of these lively folk to carry a restaurant. Survival relies on the quality of the food served. Location, atmosphere, and clientele, although important to a restaurant's success, are secondary. The public is too demanding to be snowballed into allowing any establishment to prosper unless it serves nothing below quality food.

Quite frankly, I've eaten at TFU many times over the years and I've experienced both tasty and taste-shocking dishes. Remember this is an Italian-based restaurant and spices are an integral part of Italian cooking. However, on occasion, one may think a "dash" was read as a "heaping teaspoon."

Let's start with the appetizers. Two Flight's escargot is served in the shell, which is nice for presentation. But let's face it, it's a bother to grip the shell in a forcep-like device and dig the delicacy out. The seasoning (bland in this case) of the snails further warrants this appetizer stay in the kitchen. Porky Prawns are another story. Jumbo shrimp are wrapped in bacon, lightly battered and deep fried. Truly a nice treat.

The soups. Now these are winners. Nantucket Natural and White Lightning sound tempting, don't they? The former is a thinned cream filled with clams, bacon, Maine potatoes and herbs. A great and different chowder. The latter is gazpacho; pure white, crisp, creamy, and refreshing. Also on the list are onion soup and chili.

The entrees. Here's where the controversy really begins. Meals are raved about by some, guffawed by others. The decision lies in your





own tastebuds. Clamguini sounds like a cross between disgust and romance, which is exactly how it's viewed. It's a mound of linguini interspersed with lots of clams, parsley, garlic, spices and parmesan bordered by clams in the shell. The latter were dry and tough, a sauce might have been basted on them as they cooked. I hope they weren't there solely for decoration! The mound was plentiful and heavily spiced. Too much clam, but I loved it. Garlic does keep vamps away, doesn't it?

The Purple Passion just doesn't do justice to the eggplant. Boring and disappointingly untasty. Whoever loves this dish needs his buds transplanted. Lotsa legs on the other hand are frog legs worth trying. Sauteed Japanese frog legs are savory and tender. Not too much garlic either.

Dinners range in price from \$8.95 to \$14.50 for the Veal Charlie, which is sauteed veal and layered with artichoke hearts, mushrooms, crabmeat and topped with Hollandaise sauce. Sounds rich, doesn't it? There's also Veal Rochaella and Veal Chianti, Layered 'n layered (lasagna), Tunnels of Love (manicotti) and Pilgrims Progress — French bread is topped with slices of turkey breast, bacon, artichoke hearts and muenster cheese. On the side is a Monte Cristo sauce, similar to thousand island but spicier. It's an appealing open-face sandwich and makes for a light meal.

You can also choose from various types of burgers or try the Eggs en Frisco, TFU's version of eggs benedict served on San Francisco style sour dough.

Whether you want a snack, drink or full meal, Two Flights Up has it. Your experience may delight you or it may leave you with a dim impression. Either way, it's worth at least one visit.

PLANT FUNGUS NEWEST AIDS CAUSE SUSPECT

BOSTON — AIDS may be caused by a plant fungus that mimics a drug used to lower immunity in organ transplant patients, federal scientists say.

"We are working around the clock on it," said Dr. Thomas Folks, one of the researchers. "We are very excited about it."

But a report by the research group emphasized, "These results are extremely preliminary."

The fungus, which has never been known to cause disease in human beings, has been found in the blood of victims of AIDS, or acquired immune deficiency syndrome. It produces a substance that is chemically similar to cyclosporin, a new drug used to temporarily lower natural resistance in transplant patients.

Usual forms of the fungus, called Thermoascus crustaceus, were found in the blood of three AIDS patients by researchers from the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases in Bethesda, Md. The work was described in a letter in Thursday's edition of the New England Journal of Medicine.

The fungus makes a chemical — dubbed CyAIDS — that causes mild suppression of immunity in the test tube. But so far, the scientists are not sure what effect it has in the body.

AIDS destroys the body's ability to fight off disease. No one knows its cause, and the fungus is the latest suspect to be identified. Many other scientists think a virus the most likely culprit.

Homosexuals, Haitians, abusers of injectable drugs and hemophiliacs are most likely to get AIDS. It apparently is spread by sexual contact, contaminated needles and blood transfusions, not casual contact.

Since AIDS appeared in 1979, it has struck more than 2,500 people and claimed more than 1,000 lives, according to the Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta.

"Our main interest is to get this to the scientific community and let them take a shot at it," Folks said in an interview.

"We have some information that's very encouraging but not solid. We want to see if other scientists can find the fungus. We need a lot of people to be looking for it."

Five of the male subjects went through "labor pains" and "childbirth" then preceded to "breastfeed" their imagined babies.


The audience was left, mouths opened, breathless as Louchlin induced a deep sleep and led a subject into becoming extremely rigid.

Holiday Rum Cake

The up and coming holiday season gives rise to thoughts of special "goodies" and later, of course, of the dieting to get rid of them. Traditionally, I have always made my own Christmas cookies and frosted them. That happens to be one of the things that gets me into the Christmas spirit.

If, however, you're feeling adventurous in the kitchen, try this recipe for rum cake that I found last year.

You need:

1 cup chopped pecans or walnuts

1 pkg. yellow cake mix

1 3¾ oz. pkg. Jell-o Vanilla Instant Pudding mix

4 eggs

1/2 cup cold water 1/2 cup Wesson oil

1/2 cup (no cheating) dark rum (80 proof)

Glaze:

1/4 lb. butter 1/4 cup water

1 cup granulated sugar ½ cup dark rum

Preheat oven to 325° F. Grease and flour 10" tube (or 12 cup Bundt) pan. Sprinkle nuts on bottom. Mix all the cake ingredients together and pour over nuts. Bake 1 hour. Cool and invert onto a serving plate. Prick the top a bit and evenly add the glaze on top and sides.

Glaze: Melt butter in sauce pan. Stir in water and sugar. Boil 5 minutes stirring constantly. Remove from heat and stir in rum.

A couple of notes to this - if you're using a cake mix that already has pudding in it, scratch the pudding mix, use only *three* eggs and only a ½ cup oil. Also, for an easier topping, sprinkling the cake with powdered sugar is fine.

It sounds easy, and it is. And it's a nice addition to any Christmas or New Year's offering. Happy Holidays!



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

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
