Lesbian Invisibility Plagues Award Ceremony

We went to the Spectrum Awards full of expectation. There had been 300 nominees, 140 finalists, 20 categories. These awards were to have represented the lesbian, gay and bi-sexual activists who have helped shape and motivate this community. Or so we thought. There were some gay-friendly straight women honored, providing their focus was in predominately male-oriented issues. Otherwise, Lesbians were noticably absent from the winner's circle, except as members of "lesbigay" groups.

Even the "Lesbian Activism" award was defined as "promoting lesbian-gay-bisexual" Read "if it doesn't involve or support men directly, it isn't worthy of our attention." Doesn't this sound just like the patriarchy? (To our surprise, a Lesbian did, in fact, win the Lesbian Activism award. Congratulations to LeJune Perrin, whose achievements and long-time activism deserve recognition.)

Just in case you might think this is all about sour grapes, I wasn't up for any of

these awards. I was, however, excited at the possibility of standing and honoring other Lesbians, and their achievements for Lesbians, publicly. It was an idea long overdue. It still is.

I realize that I may be perceived as attacking the winners of this well-deserved recognition event. This is not my intention. The problem, as I see it, is not with the people who won... they all deserve recognition for their commitment; as do all the finalists, nominees, producers, volunteers and behind-the-scenes people. The problem is that out of all these fine choices, the winners did not include ONE Lesbian whose work focused on Lesbian issues, not ONE organization that focused on Lesbian issues.

Coalition? I don't need a condom, thank you, I need a breast exam. And that, my friends, is where the concept of "coalition" fails the Lesbians in our Community. When Lesbian issues are treated with the same intensity as Gay issues, we'll be a lot closer to unity.

Get the Love You Want!!!

You deserve it, don't you? We all do. But establishing and maintaining healthy, long-term, loving and committed relationships is difficult at best. When we add in the particular challenge is living in the gay and lesbian community the task may fell overwhelming. We have not had an established social structure that recognizes and supports our relationships. For years the straight community has had classes, workshops and retreats available to them that support and honor their intimate relationships. And now finally, so do we!

The weekend of April 22-24, 1994 "Getting the Love You Want," a workshop for Lesbian and Gay couples will be presented in our community. This is an intensive workshop for couples to discover or rediscover the joy and spiritual potential of being together while utilizing their relationship for personal growth.

- ▼ You are near break-up and want to decide if the relationship can be saved



Camp Sister Spirit Update:

Last month's front page article was about the nightmare that is occurring to the lesbians in Ovett, ssissippi. You may have seen the article in Saturday, Feb. 19th's Orlando Sentinel about the Attorney leral's intervention into the terrorist behavior on the part of some of the local people, led by their "spiritual leaders." Following are some excerpts from the letter written by the Attorney General, Janet Reno to the Executive Director of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force, dated February 17th:

Dear Ms. Radecic: Thank you for your letter concerning the situation in Ovett, Mississippi. As are you, I am deeply troubled by the harassment and intimidation of Brenda and Wanda Henson, the lesbian owners of Camp Sister Spirit. The intolerance and bigotry demonstrated by some to the people of Ovett has no place in

this country.

In addition to initiating (an) FBI investigation, I have signed a tasking order... asking the Community Relations Service (CRS) to intervene in the matter and to help mediate the dispute. While CRS is statutorily limited to assist only in conflicts arising from race, color and national origin issues, I consider the threat of violence in Ovett to be real and believe CRS's involvement is both appropriate and necessary to restore calm to the community.

I intend to keep fully apprised of the situation and ask that you continue to provide information to the Department. ... Together we can and will fight the discrimination faced by the Hensons and others like them.







Linda Beekman Returns to Sarajevo

Thanks to everyone who is supporting the effort to evacuate Renata Zbanic and baby Haris from Sarajevo. Unfortunately it takes tremendous pressure on those in control to create a change in policy. It is most important to continue to write letters to Senator Bob Graham, Congressman Bill Young and to Perfect and Hillary Clinton asking them to help Renata and Haris and others evacuate Sarajevo.

I will be returning to Sarajevo the first week of February. My goals for this trip are: 1) to continue to be a witness for peace, 2) to take supplies, basic first aid, strings for musical instruments for the music school and answers from U.S. pen pals to the letters that we brought back home in September (a former teacher of my son Matthew has taken on this project), and 3) to gather information for future articles so as to continue to be a voice for the people in rajevo. As with my previous trip, I depend on your emotional, spiritual and financial support to help me make this project possible. While I can't solve the problems of the former Yugosalvia, I do have the possibility of making a difference for some of the 30 to 40 people that I know in Sarajevo who are suffering great ships. When I was there last mer, Renata said "Since you're here is the first time since the war began 18 months ago that I haven't

been hungry."

By making several trips in and out of Sarajevo, I hope to provide several hundred pounds of food; much of this will be purchased in Italy (where prices are similar to those here). The World Health Organization found that in Sarajevo mothers have the most weight loss, because many times they give their food to their children. 

Radical Right Goes to New Extremes to Attack Families of Lesbian and Gay Parents

On Monday, January 10th, two anti-gay initiatives were files with the Washington secretary of state, setting off petition drives to get the measures on the November 1994 ballot. One of these two measures, filed by the Citizens Alliance of Washington, targets lesbian and gay parents and their families with unprecedented vigor - prohibiting gays and lesbians from becoming foster parents, adopting children, or gaining child custody in a divorce. This measure also bars "minority status based on homosexuality," prohibits schools from presenting homosexuality as positive behavior, and bans same-gender marriage.

The Citizens Alliance of Washington is forcing parents and children apart, and going to new extremes in pursuit of its anti-gay political agenda, say gay and lesbian parents. "The Radical Right has tried before to deny lesbians and gays from becoming foster parents and adopting children who need good homes," says Tim Fisher, Executive Director of the Gay and Lesbian Parents Coalition International.* "But this is their first attempt to enact legislation which prohibits lesbians and gays from retaining custody of their own children in a divorce.

"They would deny us the right to raise our own children. How is that a 'Special Right'?" continues Fisher, referring to the Right's claim that gays want "special rights."

"The best interests of children" are clearly irrelevant in the Religious Right's anti-gay crusade. Buried in the fine print, where it has been missed by most news stories, the

initiative states that upon dissolution of a marriage where one of the parents is gay or lesbian, the other parent will receive custody. Where both parents are gay, custody will be awarded to the nearest non-gay relative. If no such person exists, children will be taken from their parents and put in foster care or put up for adoption.

Children of lesbian and gay parents around the country are reacting to the news from Washington state with disbelief.

"If I was ever taken away from my dad," says Kate Ranson-Walsh, a 13-year-old whose parents split up five years ago, "I don't know what I would do. It's not fair. He didn't do anything to me or anyone else. And he's the best dad in the world."

If this initiative passes, thousands of families in Washington state would be placed in jeopardy.

"Parents here are scared," says Gloria Stancich of the South Puget Sound Lesbian and Gay Parents Support Group in Tacoma, Washington, "particularly those dealing with custody issues. Washington state is a state that's been very fair to its gay and lesbian citizens, but we cannot afford to be complacent." "Listening to the news on the radio, I was nauseated," says Pat Justis of Olympia, Washington, mother of a toddler and active in Out on a L.I.M.B. (Lesbians in Maternity and Beyond). "I was expecting it, but I am still shell-shocked."

"The Radical Right perpetuates the myths that lesbians and gays are unfit to be parents - unfit to be near children," says Tim Fisher. "The truth is there are over three dozen reputable, scientific studies showing that our kids are no different from

kids raised in non-gay households except ours are a little more tolerant of human differences."

"The Right needs a scapegoat to coalesce its power base - and we're it," explains psychologist April Martin, author of The Lesbian and Gay Parenting Handbook. "We're the basis upon which they get people to fork over their money."

As the Radical Right increasingly targets lesbians and gays in general, and moms and dads in particular parents have increased their acti ism. "Having a child puts a fire in your belly," says Pat Justis. "This is not a battle where I can sit back, there's too much at stake for my son. I'm writing a letter about this initiative and mailing it to every straight person in my address book."

Public opinion polls show that "coming out" is the most effective and persuasive tactic for lesbians and gays. "The more out we are," agrees Stancich, "the more they know us as human beings - as normal everyday people and parents."

* Currently in the United States, only Florida and New Hampshire outlaw adoption by gays and lesbians; New Hampshire also prohibits foster parenting. In Florida, two counties (Sarasota and Munroe) have declared the gay adoption ban "unconstitutional."

When the meeting was over, I asked the principal if I could speak to him privately. I offered to make an appointment but he said now was fine. Then I gave my speech which consists of a few lines of "I am a lesbian" and a few lines of I don't want my son discriminated against.

The principal responded in the same way the staff and teachers there have always responded - that they are there for the children, that the parent's situation makes no difference, and that there is no specific lesson teaching that homosexuality is a sin (even though that is the belief of their church and spool.)

Here's the thing: Doing my speech is not an easy thing for me. It's not my nature to be a public

person. I've always been a behind-the-scenes person, a no-name member of the committee, a worker-bee type (for instance, I've been writing this column for 3 years and I bet I've had fewer than 10 people in that whole time mention it to me. The best thanks I ever got, by the way, was the recognition in Jo Wiggins' column - a pat on the back when I needed it more than usual.) Doing

my speech is scary - but I do it. I tell myself that I have to do it. I accept no excuses.

Then in 1992-93 I took on some highly visible leadership roles (March on Washington, GLPCI conference, local GLPCI president, 'Other Mothers' demonstration, appearances in all the local media) and spent some time out-front and out-loud.

Now back to the ideas I've been

wrestling with. I've come to the conclusion that even though the committee work was important and the leader work was important, the most important work that I do for the gay and lesbian community is the missionary work that I do every day. Yes, missionary. I am a missionary to my son's school. I have a mission to make sure every adult there knows a lesbian. I'm not in their face about it. I'm simply there every day being a parent just like they are, talking to teachers and staff, volunteering to help with school projects, working on the fundraisers, cheering at the basketball games. My hope is that every adult associated with that school pauses and pictures me and my son every time the "sin of homosexuality" is brought up.
