JADE and QUEENIE: A PAIR OF ORLANDO'S NEWEST EVENING STARS

The world of ventriloquism and puppeteering has produced famous personalities that have pleased generations of television audiences, visitors to Las Vegas, and aficionados of the night club circuit throughout the IIS

Some of these talented entertainers come to mind easily: Burr Tillstrom (of Kukla, Fran and Ollie fame), Edgar Bergen (and 'Charlie McCarthy'), Paul Winchell (and 'Jerry Mahoney') Shari Lewis (and 'Lambchop') and Wayland Flowers (and 'Madame'). We all knew and enjoyed these personalities, and their characters, from afar

Now, we have an opportunity to meet a member of this select entertainment clan up close...a highly talented and sometimes outrageous puppeteer named "Jade", and his trunk-full of "Hollywood Hopefuls".

Behind "Jade's" witty, sophisticated and rollicking public personae can be found the very private Patrick Justian...a shy, charming, determined, sensitive, enthusiastic, earnest, highly creative, versatile, community-oriented, boyish and handsomely mustachioed young man. A performer who has worked in major cities and clubs throughout the nation, Patrick now makes his home in Orlando.

We met up with Patrick following his, and Queenie's, performance at a recent theater benefit. The audience had fallen in love with "Jade and Queenie"...and their hilarious puppeteering antics.

It was evident that the audience was genuinely surprised by "Jade's and Queenie's" professionalism, as well as their side-splitting and, sometimes biting, humor.

Becoming a puppeteer was not Patrick's early career schedule, although he always had a keen interest in entertaining. But, "being a loner, I found the usual theater work too collaborative; I guess I preferred doing solo entertaining".

A native of Grand Haven, MI, Patrick had been given a 'Danny O'Day' puppet as a seven-year-old. "It really captured my imagination; I was enthralled by it. I hooked rods and strings to it to make it more animate, and tried to develop it into a little-boy character with a real 'cheeky' personality. It was a time of real experimentation and creative education for me."

"My 'coming out' began early. As a young boy, I always was attracted to men. I was openly gay all through my high school days...either loved, or made fun of. In the 10th grade I was beaten up and gang-raped; the abuse stopped when I became more open about my sexuality."

Later, Patrick attended Michigan State University, and received a Bachelor of Science degree in Communications from Western Michigan University in Kalamazoo. He moved to Lansing to do publicity writing for a regional equity theater. While there, he began

working with Burr Tillstrom, the originator of children's' television.

Tillstrom living in Saugatuck, (then a great family and tourist Mecca for Midwesterners, but now considered a top summer enclave for gay and lesbian tourists). "He got me interested entertainment as a career. I looked at and his successes; he was all the confirmation I needed to 'make the move."

Patrick began
working with
Tillstrom on
ventriloquist (or
"vent" for short)
figures, eventually
joining him on a

lecture tour. This experience had an obvious influence on his particular choice of entertaining.

"Tillstrom was one of the greatest influences in my life, with Wayland running a very close second. Burr showed me the power that stupid little pieces of wood could produce with nothing more than my bare hands, a versatile voice and a clever monologue. He did minimalist things with his characters that brought them fully alive to his audiences. He was impressive!"

"Incidentally," Patrick interjected, "Burr said 'never refer to puppets or vent figures as dummies, or as inanimate; call them 'little people'. They each have their own distinct personalities'."

"My puppets are called 'hand and rod' puppets,"
Patrick continued. "I don't work with traditional slot
jawed vent figures".

Along the way to becoming a puppeteer, Patrick edited The Oracle, the newsletter for vents. He tried his hand at vent in clubs throughout the Midwest as "a

smart-assed young man". About four years ago he began concentrating on comic puppets, beginning with primitive female characters, ala Wayland Flowers.

"I was introduced to Wayland Flowers by the editor of Gay Chicago in 1986. His ability to manipulate

"Madame", plus the structure of their act, really blew me away. He, and his writer/accompanist, Gary Simmons, had total and thorough knowledge of showmanship."

"That was when I edited The Oracle. I didn't want to bore him with 'shop talk', but he was delighted to talk to me. "Madame" was present, of course, and before long, she snickering, 'Honey, you're a little too young to be so jaded! Madame knows what a 'jade' is; a 'jade is a tired piece, or promiscuous woman...and, honey,

Wavland."

you don't look like no woman to me! So, you're a puppeteer, too? Well, then get out there, and be somebody!"

"Today I use Jade as my stage name."
"'Madame' soon traded Wayland's arm for mine. I had never worked a hand-and-rod puppet before, being used to ventriloquist figures with headstick controls and arms that hung down to the sides. After awhile, I could get 'Madame's' arms to do what I wanted them to do, and Wayland was surprised that I could do her voice. I knew

"Wayland's 'crash course' in 'Madame' was the start of my life as a cabaret puppeteer/comedian. I met Wayland in Miami a few years later; he continued to offer me professional encouragement. He was a generous listener...and intensely upset about a Las Vegas puppeteer, Stu Scott, who had been diagnosed with AIDS. The personal similarities frightened Wayland, and

right then that I wanted to be an adult entertainer like

it was prophetic of what was to come. A few weeks later,

on October 11, 1988, he died in Los Angeles at age 48. <u>Variety's</u> obituary glossed over the fact that he died of AIDS complications. At his family's request, the official cause of death was the euphemism, 'cancer'."

But, back to 'Jade and Queenie' and the other characters in Jade's troupe.

'Queenie' began as a caricature of Ethel Merman. But, she didn't seem to work as Ethel. So I added a crown, fixed up her hair into a wild 'do', and she became 'Queenie. Now, she's evolved into a 'Madame-like' character, but distinctly different in style, look and personality. She even uses her own name...."

"She's quite flamboyant, in some ways a cross between Edith Bunker and Carol Burnet, but less melodramatic, and smart and haughty, like every queen should be!"

"Inside, 'Queenie' knows that her glittering crown isn't real, that it's always slipping down and that her mission in life is to be a madcap, lovable, bawdy and lustful entertainer. She can be anything that the viewer in the audience perceives her to be. Beyond that, I don't want to give her a family or personal history."

In addition to 'Queenie" who are the other "Hollywood

"There are 'The Queen-ettes', a cast of dazzling female impersonators with built-in drawing power. They do countless zany impressions, including Carol Channing, 'Madame' and Bette Davis' immortal Baby Jane Hudson. The 'Carol' character is a drag queen who just happens to look like C.C. All of these voices are performed live, and are not lip-synched to recordings."

Another of Patrick's puppet creations is 'Sweet Meat', "a Sesame Street reject and street-wise lamb...'Jade's' answer to children's' programming.

Jade offers a Las Vegas-style act with comedy impressions using the finest and most colorful, near life-size puppets.

"You know, Wayland's 'Madame' started out in life as

a Wicked Witch puppet from the Land of Oz. Under Wayland's expert tutelage, she grew into something that lovers of biting humor will never forget. Also, Edgar Bergen used Charlie McCarthy for years before putting him in to a top hat and tails. Like you and me in our

youthful years, puppets' personalities change as the years of experience and maturity roll on."

Another influence in Patrick's professional was Jim Henson's good friend, Richard Hunt. "He was a rare kind of person, with uncanny intuition and theatrical knowledge. It was he who said that for every line monologue there must be puppet action. He underscored for me the need to have my puppets in action all the

time...that they must be kept moving and saying

meaningful things. They must be the <u>total</u>, sole center of attention to the audience. The puppeteer or vent, must be invisible."

"By the way, there's another difference between a vent and a puppeteer: the former tries to not move the lips, while the latter makes no pretense about lip movement."

At this time, Patrick's "performance arenas" are comedy clubs, gay and lesbian bars and, more and more frequently, gay and lesbian fund-raisers. He is devoting a substantial amount of his time and talent to AIDS educational events

'Queenie' and Jade have done fund-raisers for The NAMES Project, the National Coalition for the Homeless and several AIDS and MCC benefits.

Nationally, 'Jade and Queenie", accompanied by their character friends, have played in "virtually every gay venue and resort in the U.S." These include the Provincetown Inn, the Marlin Beach Resort (Ft. Lauderdale), The Gentry and The Improv (and similar comedy clubs) in Chicago, the Douglas Dunes (Saugatuck), The Copa Key West and the 801 (Key West), Tracks (St. Petersburg), Uncle Charlie's, Don' Tell Mama, Danceteria, The Palladium and Nell's (New York City) and, this past September, The Four Seasons during Southern Decadence in New Orleans

Patrick and his friends' appearances also include numerous heterosexual comedy clubs: The Improvisation, Comedy Womb and Wackos (Chicago), Dangerfield's and Catch A Rising Star (New York) and the Punch Line in Atlanta.

Further, Patrick appeared in the "Evening at La Cage" revue (Las Vegas) as Puppeteer/Impressionist, and on SeaEscape. He has performed on "The New Original Amateur Hour (The Family Channel) and on the "Howard Stern Show" (nationally syndicated).

As 'Jade", Patrick has been a featured puppeteer and consultant in promotional and stage work for Walt Disney World, NBC, The Florida Lottery, Showtime and HBO. He has opened for or appeared with Eartha Kitt, Jennifer Holliday, The Weather Girls, Grace Jones, Divine, Paula Poundstone, Ripp Taylor, Judy Tenuta, Boy George and Liza Minnelli and Joel Grey.

In addition to working clubs throughout Florida, performing at special events, festive holiday and variety shows, 'Jade and Queenie continue their educational efforts. They now have begun booking private parties throughout the state, as well.

Not only does Patrick write all of his material, but also he creates both puppets and ventriloquist figures, as well as restoring was figures.

Patrick's professional philosophy parallels that of Wayland Flowers. In the latter's obituary, Flowers was quoted, "This was an underground act that took root and shot up from nowhere. I'm an illusionist. I'm right out there on stage beside 'Madame", but within two or three minutes, it seems that I disappear."

Patrick continues, "To those who remember them, Wayland and 'Madame' won't disappear. He is one of the reasons I persevere today, personally and professionally. Just as Wayland amused audiences with his 'Madame", so do I try to bring love and laughter to my audiences with my own puppet creation, 'Queenie", and the rest of the 'Hollywood Hopefuls."

"'Queenie's message may seem trite, but true: 'In life you may lose a lot of things...but NEVER lose your SENSE OF HUMOR!'

"Spreading this simple message to anyone who will listen is how I spend my time living out 'Madame's' challenge to 'Go out and be somebody!"

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ACLU HONORS GAY RIGHTS ACTIVIST

Allan H. Terl Receives 16th **Annual Meison Poynter Civil Liberties Award**

In tribute to Nelson Poynter, the late publisher of the St. Petersburg Times who was a strong defender of constitutional rights, and to celebrate the Bill of Rights, the ACLU Foundation of Florida annually presents the Nelson Poynter Civil Liberties Award to a person who has made a major contribution to the cause of civil liberties in Florida. vear's recipient is Fort Lauderdale civil rights attorney Allan H. Teri.

For more than 20 years, he has fought for gay and lesbian rights. He began his work on AIDS issues in 1984 when he spearheaded the landmark ACLU case of Shuttleworth vs. Broward County, which resulted in the seminal decision nationally establishing AIDS as a handicapping condition entitling persons with AIDS to the protections of laws which prohibit discrimination against handicapped persons.

The award presentation took place at the ACLU Foundation of Florida's Nelson Award Dinner on Saturday, October 24 at the Fort Lauderdale Airport Hilton. John R. (Rick) MacArthur, publisher of Harper's Magazine, delivered the keynote address. V

The Reverend Troy D. Perry, founder of the Universal Fellowship of the Metropolitan Community Churches (MCC) has agreed to organize a second nonsectarian ceremony to formalize the union of hundreds, perhaps thousands of lesbian, gay and bisexual relationships. The Wedding is scheduled for Saturday April 24, 1993, the day prior to the March.

"Yes, yes, yes! Most definitely I want

to organize the Wedding at the March on Washington. Our denomination is quite willing to handle this," said Rev. Perry in a letter to the march. "The 1987 Wedding was both a demonstration for equal rights as well as a sacred ceremony formalizing the marriages of many couples in our community. It was their wedding day. We lift ourselves up against the weight of discrimination and bigotry when our unions are celebrated and blessed. Spiritual health and self respect give us the strength to fight on for the legal recognition of our marriages". - Rev. Perry

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


GROUP GROUP

As you know, we too have screened IN THE LIFE and it will be considered for broadcast by WMFE if it is ever fully funded, produced and offered to stations around the country. Currently, there is no such series offer and not even an indication of when stations might expect a decision.

Suffice it to say, public television, historically, has been the place where views and options from the left and right had a home. Diversity has, for decades, been our hallmark. WMFE is where other minorities, too, have exposure and opportunities.

When WMFE broadcasts LONG TIME COMPANIONS or PORTRAIT OF A MARRIAGE, or seventeen other


programs with gay/lesbian themes or references, not a word of support is heard. Then, the absence of one program from the schedule yields a fire-storm of protest from that group....what is the station to take from that experience.

WMFE has pro-actively established several forum

opportunities for members of gay-lesbian organizations to dialogue with the station about many of these issues. I trust that reasoned approach will lead to a more intellectually honest review of that landscape.








Gay & Lesbian Science Fiction Club Premiers with a Blast

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CONVERSATIONS

Alfredo Martinez-Garcia

Alfredo Martinez-Garcia has been in the news for about two years now beginning with the state preparing a charge of distributing drugs (medicines) without a license. In early October, Alfredo was in the headlines because he was acquitted of this charge. Much was said in the media about Alfredo as one of the most dynamic gay activists in Orlando but he disputes this: "I am a health activist," he protests.

Trans-Aid is the organization founded by Alfredo for the purpose of bringing help to PWAs, many of whom are destitute and homeless and often without hope. He has had little support in the way of volunteers so that much of the time this has been a one man operation. With the attention that has been directed upon because of his trial he has been receiving support and encouragement from across the nation. In fact, he has received communications from other parts of the world.

* Since this interview with Alfredo, The Majik foundation has given a cash award to the Trans Aid organization for its work. This is the first such award presented by Majik.

A recent offer that would have moved him to New York in a position that would have personally benefited him but Alfredo declined the opportunity. "All too often," he said, people in our city accomplish their aims here and go on elsewhere because of the work they have done. I want to remain and help this community to grow.

C-FOLD In this capacity of activist don't you often find yourself stepping on tender toes?

ALFREDO Absolutely, plenty of times.

C-FOLD You find this the only

ALFREDO No, no. It's not the only way because before I step on those toes I try the sugar and spice and everything nice way. It's only when nothing else has worked that I become the abrasive bitch and sometimes it shocks the hell out of someone and they

would rather please me or respond to my client's needs than continue an argument.

An example of this: I sent a client with a condition called 'Venus Legs' which is a result of HIV in which the veins of the legs erupt. This man was a Crack addict. He was almost crippled. Florida Hospital accepted him

telling me they would treat his legs but would not treat his addiction problem.

After treatment, he called me to say the hospital was going to release him the next day. I called the hospital infection control and asked why they were releasing him, which they denied. Yet the hospital told the patient they were releasing him because he

was a walking hazard and they feared other patients would become infected. I responded that certainly in the hospital these people were not shooting up drugs but if he were released he could be passing the infection by drug or sexual activities. Passing the buck they told me to check with the floor nurse or doctor who was releasing him.

I called the public relations office and identified myself as a newspaper reporter and had reports of their planning to release this patient. They denied this and retained the patient for further treatment.

Today that man is back on the tax rolls rather than the welfare

rather than the welfare

C-FOLD Over time you have been involved in many activities but isn't this the first time you were putting yourself in the position of jeopardizing your freedom?

ALFREDO Yes. When I was first arrested I contacted


Dr. Werba whose son had died of AIDS and told him I didn't need any money but I needed a good lawyer. He referred me to his next door neighbor who is an attorney, Mr. Ed Leister. Mr. Leister agreed to take the case

From day one, the judge didn't want to go to court with it. The state wanted me to plead guilty to a felony and they would withhold adjudication. Mr. Leister replied maybe we would plead guilty to a misdemeanor withholding of adjudication maybe. The state refused but came at the eleventh hour and offered me just that which is about equivalent to a traffic ticket. I could have been very happy with that, but that by that time there was a point I had to make because if I accepted that plea I was letting down a lot of people. I had to take the risk of going to jail.

By that time the judge had already said he would not sentence me to jail and would not put me on community service because I was already performing a community service. Probation maybe. So I decided to go for the principle of it for all the people who had died. I felt like their spirits were with me during that time. I was very calm. It was an opportunity to tell other agencies and other people with AIDS who exchange medications - this works for me, maybe it will work for you.

There's a defense that can be used called "Medical Necessity." My lawyer and I did research and found out there was case law with HIV people. One case in Panama City in which a couple was busted for growing marijuana taking it to stop the sickness that the toxic medications they had to take. After conviction, they won on appeal. The judge in that case ordered the Food and Drug Administration to provide these people with marijuana for the rest of their lives. We used that. Other cases we used from other states

where groups as Act-Up provided hypodermic needles to prevent drug users from sharing needles.

C-FOLD Is it fair to say that by the state offer of a misdemeanor withholding adjudication, that this could be interpreted as a defense of the purist form of activism? Your refusal to then accept that offer illustrated to all that you had a cause to see it through and clearly adding one more case report in defense of Medical Necessity

ALFREDO. Right. As a group of people, if we are ever going to challenge a bureaucracy such as the Food and Drug Administration and NIH, we must challenge the system. We did the things we had to do. Medical Necessity means I had to break the law because there was nothing else available.

C-FOLD You must have known since the day you began your Trans Aid activities of gathering drugs from deceased PWA's for the use of others, that the authorities were aware of this. They had to look the other way yet you knew they could change this attitude any day.

ALFREDO But their history has been usually to notify you. In 1988 the Personal Importation Policy began, allowing an individual to bring in a three month supply of an unapproved drug for personal use. I wasn't giving out unapproved drugs but approved drugs such as AZT and DDI. Other defenses which we could have used are Selective Prosecution or Entrapment. I've got the guy on tape, a tape made by FDLE, and five minutes into our conversation he said, "I'm in severe pain - a lot of pain. I offered to

pay for a doctor but he didn't take me up on it. I told him to go the emergency room and he declined. He kept pushing that pain thing. Another call from him revealed that agent Barr was in the background and he said to Barr, "what do I ask for?" Agent Barr told him to ask for morphine and codeine.

Dr. Stanish testified that he knew I was not one who would abuse these medications, and Scot Carter testified and Commissioner Mabel Butler and these were good witnesses. There were many strong witnesses that

testified in my behalf. But nothing that testified to my character was admissible and that pissed me off.

And I've gotten angry with a lot of people in this town and I admit that. But it is only over a specific incident or event but it doesn't mean I'm angry at that person for the rest of my life.

People take things so personally but they really shouldn't; this is the feeling of the moment.

When Mabel Butler's son was dying, her husband was dying at the same time. I would lie on the bed with her son and hug him and reassure him. He was such a card.

C-FOLD I know you were giving drugs to help retard the disease but isn't it equally beneficial to provide the easing of pain and providing comfort?

ALFREDO A lot of doctors don't like using pain medication feeling it disguises symptoms and when Dr. Barbara Beiler

testified said she was also concerned about a patient becoming a drug addict. When she said that I wrote a note to my attorney asking if she was worried about someone who is terminally ill becoming a drug addict? That is the last thing I'd worry about. I would want that person to be as comfortable and pain free as possible. Let them live the rest of their lives with some kind of dignity.

This thing about people being in pain - I cannot understand how people can stand around and do nothing when the pain can be alleviated.

C-FOLD It was not just your compassion but also your awareness that these people have lost their jobs and their incomes and often their homes. They have nowhere to turn. You are basically dealing with destitute people and they need human kindness from some source. Bureaucracy can't give

that.

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ALFREDO No. Bureaucracy is: fill out these forms, don't leave anything out and wait. Right now it stands that you must wait 6 to 7 weeks once you qualify before you see a doctor. In that time, a person with immuno suppression may be symptomatic needs something then and there.

C-FOLD While there are caring people within the bureaucracies, aren't there rules and don't these rules control the situation?

ALFREDO They control the whole situation and, yes there are people in the scientific community who are very caring.


But I want to get in an area of the underground that a lot of people are not aware of. When I traveled north, I would often go to NIH and, with a friend of mine, we would stop in different sections and sit in the waiting room. The young people there were getting drugs that were not approved and I would profess idle curiosity and ask what drugs they were getting.

As they told me I would ask how it helped them, were there any side effects. Sometimes they would say they were told perhaps a given drug might cause some liver damage or something. We made notes on all these comments. Afterwards, my friend and I would sit and compare notes. Once we had the information from the clinical subject, if we had the chance we would ask the doctors how these drugs were working out. Then we would take this information to connections we have, people who are well financed, and they would have these drugs made.

The first drug made by the underground was AZT; the second was DDC, and the third was DDI. We are very resourceful people. One of these, as an example, was gotten by a businessman under the guise of being a doctor saying there was research going on in retroviruses - that he was going to test retroviruses on plants; that he would then inject an anti-retroviral into the plant. Under that guise we got lots of DDI. Actually, that DDI was going all over the world. We had to do this as a Medical Necessity because people were dying without medical care.

Some people simply can't take AZT and they will do anything to get an alternate drug. Consider a man or a woman who really loves life, who is very resourceful and that person

(HEY FOLKS!! This is Rocky - Aunty's gone off to the bathroom and she didn't know I was listening to her dictate this column. I happen to love turkey so here a great recipe from Jeff Smith's "The Frugal Gourmet Cooks American". It beats Dr. Frank-n-Furter's meatloaf any day.

ROAST TURKEY WITH SHERRY BUTTER

9 to 12 pound Turkey Salt & Pepper to taste

Stick butter

Olive or Salad Oil 1/2 Cup 1/2 Cup Dry Cocktail Sherry

Clean the bird and remove the giblets. Save the giblets and neck for soup stock. Remove the wing tips, or first section of the wing, and add to the bits for soup stock. Salt and pepper the bird inside and out, and stuff it if you wish.

After stuffing, secure the opening with string or thread, or simply close the opening by folding the skin over it and securing the legs. Instructions for trussing the bird are usually included with it. Tie the wings to the body and the legs together. Melt the butter and allow to cool for a few minutes (or use oil). Stir in the dry Sherry. Using an injection needle or plastic flavor injector (available in most gourmet shops), inject the butter and sherry mixture into each of the legs, the thighs and finally the breast. Just put a bit in 2 or 3 places in each of the mentioned parts. Rub the bird with a bit more butter or oil and roast in your usual manner.

Roast at 325 degrees, uncovered, about 15 minutes a pound. If you are stuffing the bird, add 1 hour to the roasting time. A 9 to 12 pound bird will take about 3 1/2 to 4 hours. A meat thermometer placed in the thigh should register 180 degrees. Baste the bird with its own juices 2 or 3 times during the roasting).

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MYTH BUSTERS: COMMON MISCONCEPTIONS ABOUT BISEXUALITY

Sexuality runs along a continuum. It is not a static "thing," but rather a process that can flow, changing throughout our lifetime. Bisexuality falls along this continuum. It is the "potential for being sexually and/or romantically involved with members of either gender." - Robyn Ochs

MYTH 1: VERSION A:

Bisexuals are really Gay, but won't accept it yet.

VERSION B:
Bisexuals are
really Straight, but
want to be part of the
Gay Culture.

REALITY: Bisexuality is a legitimate and distinct sexual orientation. Some bisexuals consider themselves Gay and are active in the Lesbian/Gay community, both socially and politically, while others don't. Because Straights lump us together, Bisexuals have suffered the same legal discrimination as other sexual minorities.

MYTH 2: Bisexuals are not happy unless they are having a sexual relationship with both a man and a woman.

REALITY: There is a great diversity of lifestyles within the Bisexual Community. No one arrangement is preferred

by all; each person decides on how best to express his or her sexuality.

MYTH 3: Bisexuals equally attracted to both genders.

REALITY: 50/50 Bisexuals are not the norm. Most Bisexuals tend to favor one gender while recognizing their attraction to the other. Bisexuals may relate differently to either gender at different times.

MYTH 4:
Bisexuals
are promiscuous.

REALITY:

Bisexuals have multiple partners; some have one

partner; some are celibate. Promiscuity is no more prevalent in the Bisexual community than in other groups of people.

MYTH 5: Bisexuals are in "transition".

REALITY: Some people go through a transitional period of Bisexuality on their way to adopting a Lesbian, Gay or Straight identity. For many others Bisexuality remains a long-term orientation. Indeed, we are finding that homosexuality can be a transitional phase in the coming out process for Bisexual people.

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
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



MYTH 6:

Bisexuals can't be monogamous.

REALITY: Bisexuality is independent of the lifestyle of monogamy or non-monogamy. Bisexuals are as capable as any other group of making a long-term monogamous commitment. Bisexuals live a variety of lifestyles as do Gays, Lesbians, and Straights.

MYTH 7: Bisexuals spread AIDS to Heterosexuals and Lesbians.

REALITY: Unsafe sexual practices, the sharing of needles, and transfusions with infected blood spreads

AIDS, not particular groups of people. AIDS can be prevented through education, not bigotry.

MYTH 8: Bisexuals are just confused and don't really know what they want.

REALITY: It is natural for Bisexuals, Lesbians and Gays to go through a period of confusion in the coming out process. This is an appropriate response for an oppressed people who lack role models and are constantly told they don't exist. However, after resolving this initial confusion, most Bisexuals come to a definite understanding that they simply are attracted to both genders.


MYTH 9: Bisexuals can hide in the Heterosexual community when the going gets tough.

REALITY: To pass for Straight and or to deny one's Bisexuality is just as painful and damaging for a Bisexual as it is for a Homosexual. Bisexuals are not Heterosexual and we do not identify as Heterosexuals.

MYTH 10: Bisexuals will "dump" you for someone of the other sex.

REALITY: People who are unable to make commitments, regardless of their sexual orientation, may use another person as an excuse to leave a relationship. ∇

is in terminal condition. These people become resource centers. We know people who can get this drug made up - why shouldn't we do it?

These are people who are stringent, straight law abiding citizens. But the logic is that every man is for himself; whatever I can find to stay alive. But we were pooling our resources because while I knew who was making the drugs up, I didn't have the money to have them made up. So we shared.

C-FOLD With this serious recession reducing state funds, do you find it strange that the state waited until now to come after you. Wouldn't it have more sense to allow you to continue the service you have been providing?

ALFREDO Even stranger is that a crack deal was underway outside at the same time they were arresting me and they ignored it. Even funnier is that Fight for Life in Ft. Lauderdale gave over half a million dollars in medicine and supplies when hurricane

Andrew went through. Buyers Clubs such as this obtain the three month individual purchases allowed by the 1988 law because it doesn't make sense for each individual to travel to obtain these drugs. If you were told today that you were HIV, would you know who to call in Paris - of course not.

We were all networking. The United States was not the only country that was going through this, we were working with people in Paris and in Switzerland. We were making connections everywhere. Two months ago a doctor called me - a member of his family - has AIDS. Very bad pain. There

is a drug that is made in North Carolina but it cannot be bought here. It can be bought in Canada. But for this doctor - we found the drug he needed in Paris and were able to obtain it for him.

In the beginning of the underground we were getting veterinarians to prescribe bovine interferon instead of the human interferon which we knew would probably work a little better. But the bovine interferon worked just fine - it got people's appetites up and was working O.K. Something made from cows that we had to use because we had to make use of all sources made available to us. There are people like us working at veterinarian

research in Washington. I've met some of these people. Fantastic individuals.

It was just trying to keep people alive! We went to Mexico to obtain ribovirin and isoprinosin. We got something from Israel called AL 721 and we took it to a chemist so he could duplicate the formula so we could make this at home.

make this at home. We mixed the ingredients and spread it on bread and it tasted terrible. But it was something that existed before there was anything. People were dying and that's what I knew and something had to be done.

C-FOLD Our national values appear so muddled - a contrast would be a prisoner sitting on death row awaiting execution. Somehow he manages to secret a razor blade into his cell and he slits his throat. He's

bleeding to death but is found by a guard and rushed to emergency procedure. He is retrieved from death's door and at the cost of months of hospitalization and thousands of dollar, he is saved for official execution.

But a PWA will be allowed the suffer the agonies of AIDS by legally denying the means available to relieve the suffering. The PWA is dying from reasons beyond his control and is denied the treatment that the condemned man if forced to receive. It says a lot about our societies values and priorities.

ALFREDO I like the metaphor. I believe our health care system has no values. To let a person suffer in pain because you

want to study what is going on inside that individual's body is ridiculous. Once a person is determined to be in pain and the source of that pain is identified - alleviate it. The test can always be run and find out what is causing the pain. There is no reason the person should have to suffer.

C-FOLD Knowing the pain is there but is

masked with a drug, the lab work could still be pursued because the body still has the same symptoms.

ALFREDO That's right. The pain is still there, the body still has the pain but it is disguised. The message of pain is not reaching the brain. There is no true, honest to goodness reason that a person with HIV disease and in pain should not be able to get the drugs needed to live their life in comfort.

It's not an intentional attitude of "let the bastard suffer." It's the way they are taught: "Disguise the pain, how are you going to know where the pain is coming from." What I am saying is, The person with HIV disease today, even though that person may have insurance or Medicaid and a very good doctor, that person is still a 'clinical subject,' and that person and his or her pain is being studied.


I have a letter from my friend Patrick. When his flesh was falling off, they would not give him pain medication. His ears were falling off and he couldn't get pain medication. Let's see what happens to him."

C-FOLD Yet we are told we cannot use untested drugs because we can't use humans a guinea pigs. What are they doing? They are using them as guinea pigs for pain.

ALFREDO Patrick worked at The Center on Mills Avenue, which was the predecessor to GLCS. Patrick had worked there with his ears covered and people would stand away and out and out stare at him and made him feel as a leper. Even his lover was in pain from seeing Patrick suffer.

I called Hospice at but at that time, a person had to have at least six months to live; Patrick was closer to death. And his pain could have been eased with just a little morphine. So I laid in bed with him and stroked his head and hugged him and kissed him, rotten flesh and all. And I said, "Patrick, if there is a way for letting go, then let go because all you're doing is suffering. There's nothing for you at this point. Nothing."

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WHY WAS ACT DUT THEATRE EVICTED FROM ITS NEW WINTER PARK HOME?

"It's all in the past."

"Now, we're living with a devastating decision...and frankly, we're using all logical strategies and energies to find a home for good theater...the kind of theater that is not only welcomed in major urban areas of our country...but also theater that has become a vital part of gay and lesbian social and cultural life throughout the U.S."

This is Lew Routh speaking off-the-cuff about AOT's recent closure. Routh founded and has directed numerous plays

that pleased Central Florida gay and lesbian theater-goers throughout 1991 and 1992. Under the aegis of ACT OUT THEATRE, Routh's mission has been to present quality gay- and lesbian-themed plays to Central Florida audiences...something that had not been done previously.

ACT OUT THEATRE was forced to close its doors recently by the City of Winter Park. The closing came shortly after the company had moved from its former home, the PHOENIX AT ALOMA, to quarters that formerly housed the Scott Laurent Galleries.

"The problem arose when ACT OUT THEATRE came under more-than-usual scrutiny following the flattering story Elizabeth Maupin wrote about us in the Orlando Sentinel. Elizabeth has been a great supporter of ACT OUT THEATRE, and of our mission. The appearance of her story, therefore, should have had highly positive results. It was accurate, newsworthy, and, we thought, would be just the right kind of publicity "kick off" that AOT needed to re-establish itself in its new Winter Park location. We were ecstatic with her story."

Soon thereafter, however, everything turned to ashes for

AOT.

"We had been visited by inspectors from the City of Winter Park prior to our opening (the first play to be presented was the poignant "Fog".) All of the City's criteria for a community meeting place were met to their satisfaction...at that time. They seemed to be satisfied with our space... for no more than 80 persons, with the existing condition of the firewalls, with our bathroom facilities and with our mission to present alternative lifestyle theater."

"We never misrepresented anything to the authorities about our mission. We were totally up front about our role as a theater group that would present top-quality gay and lesbian plays by nationally-known playwrights."

This occurred during the pre-opening inspection, held six days before the Sentinel story appeared. There seemed to be nothing amiss at AOT; all indications The City of Winter Park at that time pointed acceptance of all physical facilities professional and

"However, the City of Winter Park's reaction to us took a 180 degree turn soon after the <u>Sentinel</u> story appeared. Their inspector(s) called us soon thereafter, but did not revisit the premises."

"Their follow-up verdict was that we did not comply with City codes in several areas. Among them: four-hour firewalls did not exist between our building and our neighbors' habitats

Whether or not you have ever read gay fiction, The Price of Salt, written by Patricia Highsmith, is definitely worth checking out. During a time where most homosexual characters are depicted as murderers and psychopaths this book is a refreshing diversion from killer queens and ice picking dykes.

Before you reach the beginning of the third chapter boredom may have set in and you might be ready to give it all up, but read on! The moment Therese and Carol's eyes meet across a crowded department store you won't be able to put this book down. As you read on you will see a beautiful relationship grow between these two women despite all the obstacles they fight along the way.

The Price of Salt is an inspiring novel that leaves the reader feeling hopeful about successful homosexual relationships. There is the realistic view, frequently absent in the straight world, that healthy relationships can indeed flourish between two women or two men.

Initially published in 1952, The Price of Salt was said to be the first homosexual novel to have a happy ending. The story itself is very good and lends to the reader an idea of what gay life was like forty years ago when homosexuals were less than open about their sexuality in a society that hardly knew of their existence and considered it a serious defect of character, if not an illness. How we've progressed in forty years....

If you enjoy good literature, make it a point to pick up a copy of The Price of Salt. It is well worth your time. ∇

As the result of ACT OUT THEATRE'S (AOT) recent closure (see accompanying story on page __), performances of two well-known lesbian plays have had delayed presentations. The one-act, one-actor plays by Vicki Baum, "One Fool" and "Immediate Family", originally were scheduled for presentation in early October at the now-closed AOT location in Winter Park.

According to Lew Routh, founder and director of AOT, performances have been re-scheduled for October 18 and 25, and November 1 at "FACES" Cocktail and Discotheque, 4910 Edgewater Drive, Orlando (phone: 291-7571). Performances are scheduled for 8 p.m.

Meanwhile, a permanent home for ACT OUT THEATRE still is being sought.

Negotiations for the current performances were handled by Catherine Goodison, the actor in "One Fool". Debbie Dean, a seasoned performer with AOT, will be the solo performer in "Immediate Family".

"'One Fool', in particular, is one of the funniest plays I've ever seen," says Routh. "It appeals to anyone who has ever been in love. It is not only hilarious, but also it touches the heartstrings of men and women alike."

"AOT has not been buried," Routh went on to say. "It is only on a temporary sabbatical."

"Gay and lesbian theater groups are alive, well and

thriving in the leading metropolitan areas of our country. I am confident..and I know that many Orlando theater-goers agree...that Central Florida has the interest, and can provide the needed financial assistance to support specialized theater such as AOT."



The music, by Pedro Aznar, is perfectly complementary to this film. This is a Must See Video - MSV! ∇



(the firewalls needed to be sufficiently effective to restrain flames from moving to our neighbor's locations for four hours); our bathroom facilities (two separate areas for men and women) were insufficient to handle 80 people; we did not have a liquor license (liquor was not dispensed commercially, but for contributions).'

All of these situations had existed when the property housed the Gallery...where substantial crowds frequently attended art auctions. Nothing was amiss then; nothing had changed after AOT took over the facility.

"It could have been be easy for us become paranoid, and to believe that we were suspect (by the City) for other

reasons...that we were being singled out to meet building codes that perhaps were not being enforced concurrently or as rigidly on other commercial establishments.'

"It is natural that fundamental safety and convenience policies and procedures should be enforced in areas where the public gathers. This is only right...and, as a commercial, not for profit business, we would expect to comply with all normal, stated standards."

AOT's confusion resulted from the diametric change of position that the City of

Winter Park took during the six-day interim, between their first investigation (of acceptance), and the subsequent telephone call that followed the printing of the Sentinel story (of failure to comply)

"While we realize that city officials have the right to change their minds, we remain puzzled by the sudden switch from positive to negative by the authorities when it came to acceptance of ACT OUT THEATRE. It left many wondering if the decision had other motivations."

"Even more shocking was the fact that I was threatened with arrest, and of being jailed, if the theater had opened the weekend following the appearance of the Sentinel story."

Although Routh was explicit emphasizing that he is "throwing not brickbats" at the City of Winter Park, he feels the encounter have could been handled

different. with, perhaps, happier results.

"The City of Winter Park should not be held totally accountable for the closure. We had visited with them to find out what was completely open with them about our theater and its mission. I just wish they had given us proper guidance on their needs at that time...applying for an occupational license and filing the proper legal papers, example...during our visit to their offices. They did not make it clear what we needed to submit in the line of documents

Sentinel story appeared to give us these details...and then they did so by telephone, not

Routh feels personally responsible for the closure. He believes that his lack of knowledge of how municipalities operate and of commercial and legal procedures, plus his lack of business acumen, contributed greatly to the

he result of these encounters was the immediate closure of ACT OUT THEATRE. The costs and the timing of complying with the second-go-around standards were prohibitive to AOT's management, particularly given the financial support available.

AOT functions as a non-profit organization with a mature and sophisticated purpose. The move to a new location, and the immediate closure of the theater gave no time for AOT's loyal clientele to follow the theater to its new location. Most of Central Florida's alternative lifestyle community (estimated to be 10% of the population of Seminole, Orange, Osceola, Volusia and Brevard counties) has no idea of the circumstances surrounding AOT's

The area's gay lesbian community has necessary to open a theater. We were many substantial contributions to offer the 90% of our population that characterizes itself as heterosexual. Among these are considerable buying power, purchasing selectivity, maturity, creativity and business diversity.


ACT OUT THEATRE is just one example of the mature power, vision and contribution of gays and lesbians within our rapidly expanding county borders.

JON REICH, ARTIST, DIES AT AGE 39

Jon Reich, Chicago artist whose flashy outfits were as well known as his amazingly true-to-life anatomical artwork, died at his Chicago home on Sunday, September 6, from complications due to AIDS. He had celebrated his 39th

birthday five days earlier, on

August 31.

Jon's demise was not unexpected. His health had deteriorated over a period of six years, still, he continued to draw, paint and sculpt with enthusiasm, joy and a contagious fervor, propelled by a wonderfully positive attitude that totally defied his diagnosis.

In 1991, his publisher, Predictable Press, published <u>The Nudes of Jon Reich</u>, an autobiographical look at Jon's life and illness as reflected through

his pencil nudes. The book is among the catalogued works at The Smithsonian Institute in Washington, DC. His well-known "Transparencies I through IV: A Salute to Escher", became his benchmark works...classic masterpieces that are widely recognized and admired throughout the United States and Europe.

Collectors of Jon's work include people of all ages, genders, social and educational background and orientation. His unusually realistic and detailed drawings of nude males and females always have been particularly popular among his clientele. In many circles, Jon's technical skill in representing

the human body so accurately has been compared to the inimitable anatomical drawings of Middle Age artists.

Jon grew up in rural Mississippi and began painting at age six. Although his realistic pencil nude drawings became his signature works, much of his art mirrors the pastoral scenes and rural simplicity of his boyhood environment. He studied art in Jacksonville, FL, as well as at the School of the Art Institute of Chicago. His versatility was evident in the wide variety of mediums he used with ease and skill, including

watercolor, acrylic, pencil, serigraphy and

In 1983, Jon opened his own gallery on Chicago's Northside. It was from there that he ventured forth to entertain his growing clientele of Chicagoland Reich collectors...not only with his unique art, but also with his rich, earthy and self-effacing humor.

Jon dazzled patrons with his elaborate self-designed sequined and multi-jeweled tuxedos, which earned him the moniker, "Liberace of the Arts." His penchant for successful self-promotion gained for him a loyal and supportive following of collectors and friends throughout the

Midwest, as well as in Florida, California and Texas. He participated in both the New York and Los Angeles International Art Expositions in 1985 and 1986.

Having lived, worked and studied Florida, Jon felt particularly close to the state. Key West was one of his favorite hideaway spots. His visits there provided him with abundant images and memories that were transformed into his at.

Orlando also became a friendly port-of-call for Jon. Most recently, he hosted a showing of his works at a private Orlando home in the Fall of 1991. Earlier, just after Thanksgiving, 1990, he and his works were prominently

displayed at Furniture and More, in Lake Mary. Memories of that evening include a vision of Jon dressed in sparkling sequined evening wear and sitting in his wheelchair, surrounded by admirers and a profusion of his versatile art...and tossing out one liners in his soft Mississippi accent. That evening, like all of his visits here, helped to widen his circle of friend and clients.

Jon's art currently is displayed in several Orlando-area galleries. The largest collection of his art can be seen at the Scott Laurent Gallery, 348 Park Avenue North, Winter Park (phone 629-1488). Copies of Jon's book also are available at the Gallery. Hosts Scott Alles and Larry Nicastro have scheduled a retrospective of Jon's work during Pride Week, in mid- to late-June, 1993.

His pieces, especially "The Transparencies I through IV", have become increasingly popular among serious Orlando collectors. As with all quality art, Jon's works appeal to a wide variety of people, heterosexual as well as to the alternative lifestyle community. His clientele included both national and international collectors.

Jon's most popular pieces are those which were designed for local Chicago community organizations. Among these are "Drifting Into Summer (1982)" for the Lakeview Association Broadway Art Fair and "Horizons (1987)" for Chicago's Horizons Community Services. In January, 1991, Jon's artwork highlighted the Test Positive Aware national monthly newsletter on "AIDS Basics".

Jon was elected to Chicago's Gay and Lesbian Hall of Fame in 1991 for his continued and dedicated contributions to Chicago's alternate lifestyle community.

Survivors include Robert Lutz, his companion of 11 years; gallery manager, Ken Voss; his mother, Lois Reich of Fulton, MS; five sisters; three brothers and a host of close friends throughout the nation.

Funeral services were held in Fulton, followed by an October memorial service at Chicago's Metropolitan Community Church.

ALFREDO Patrick wrote a letter to The Center, this is dated December 5th, 1987: An open letter to GCS. Discrimination is a terrible thing, especially when it is amongst your peers. I am an HIV positive person and I feel the fear when I walk into The Center. Members are far from friendly or welcoming. I feel I should wear or am wearing the Scarlet Letter. I am not contagious to you unless some accident occurs and I do need support from my brothers and sisters.....it is time to wake up. We have a crisis happening. How many of you have lost friends to this disease? How many of you are afraid that you are infected? How many of you refuse to believe there is a crisis? That's the worst problem of all.

GCS seems to be a very clandestine group with almost everyone saying, 'Yes I'm gay, but don't tell anyone."......My name is not Patrick L., it is Patrick loprofido......I still have to worry about the Skinheads when I walk out the door; my fears are as strong as yours. GCS has got to become more than a social club.

Hate mail will arrive, threats will be spoken but good things will also come.

I, along with many others, need your support - not a dance card. And please, don't stare when I walk into the room."

At that time I was trying to invoke the Hardship Clause to obtain membership into GCS for people with HIV disease - to get them active within the whole community. At that time, Patrick sat at home all day, all night. The only time he left his house was

when his lover or I would take him to the doctor. Just because a person is exposed, he shouldn't have to sit at home to vegetate. Get out - do things. Take your mind off of it. So many organizations take in volunteers. Just sitting at home thinking of AIDS, AIDS,

AIDS is only going to make you sick, sick. It's counterproductive. Patrick tried it at GCS but he felt unwelcome. But

that was 1987 and this is 1992.

For the people who will be reading this, I ask, "Have things changed very much?"

For the people who read this: There are laws that may justify certain actions. There were three defenses we could have used -selective persecution or entrapment, which is a valid defense.

The thing I want to say to the community is: Don't be afraid to challenge the system. What I did is basic civil disobedience. Perhaps it is not something that I should have done and I'll be very careful about doing that in the future. The more people that challenge the system makes the system responsive to us as a people; that's how laws get changed.

While I say not to be afraid to challenge the system, I will say it has been two years of absolute hell. The two complainants were Chuck Hummer, executive director of Hope and Health, and John Valdez, a vice president of the same organization. The person who initiated the entire investigation was Bill Calvert, a neighbor and friend of Michael Carmack whom contacted his neighbor and friend Michael Carmack, the

former AIDS coordinator to entrap me into giving him this medication.

Challenge the system and if you go to trial, become an active participant in your defense with your attorney. At least you can do the research for your attorney. Our

defense was Medical Necessity, the jury heard that and believed that.

C-FOLD The people who challenged you, those

who initiated the complaint, are pursuing the same end that you are - helping PWAs. The irony being that those who were most hurt are those who suffer with HIV disease.

ALFREDO That's right. And How many people have died? How many have committed suicide because they couldn't get medications from me any more? We're talking about people who were in pain not only physically but emotional pain; many were closeted people and no one knew they were gay, and the last thing they wanted was for people to know that they had what many heterosexuals consider to be the "gay plague." There have been suicides and how many I can say but I'll find out when I start calling people.

I know I turn some people because of my mannerisms, my actions and I am working on this. I still have some growing to do and I'm trying. ∇



HEALTH COSTS

A recent visit with a PWA by the name of Dale presented an eyebrow raising about the cost of medical treatment.

Dale must have medication administered monthly because of his disease. He is able to obtain the drug by prescription from a local pharmacy. Until late last year it was costing him \$112.00 each prescription. Then surprisingly the cost went down to only \$98.75

The medication must be administered, he cannot do this himself so he goes to ORMC for this. On a recent visit the billing included the cost of the drug which he had provided. When he called to inquire about this, he was advised the billing was in error and it would be removed.

Actually, what roused Dale's curiosity was the amount of the charge. The billing for the drug alone was \$452.90 which seems out of proportion to his price of \$98.75. Inquiring about this, Dale was told that the higher price was to offset some of the non income producing services such as parking and laundry.

It would seem that ORMC should have a better explanation for this or should be reviewing their policies of medical applications. ∇



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
