Gay Pride Week 1983 features 'family' picnic

Planners are busy putting final touches on Central Florida's largest Gay Pride celebration set June 19 through June 26 in Orlando. Included in the festivities are both social and serious events centering on the celebration of Gay and Lesbian liberation through self-esteem.

Gay Community Services of Central Florida, Inc. (GCS) has been the force behind a steering committee planning the week-long festivities. Also represented on the planning panel are Joy Metropolitan Community Church, Orlando Dignity, The Florida Task Force, Gay Organized Sports (GO Sports) and other interested persons. The group has been working two months.

"Silence is no longer enough . . . that's the theme of the 1983 Gay Pride Celebration for Central Florida," said Jim Welch, GCS president. "We are hoping that Gays and Lesbians will join hands and hearts to celebrate our special contribution to society. The picnic and other events planned for June 19-26 will reflect the best of the human spirit that makes us truly unique."

Turkey Lake Park recreation area, a 300-acre facility in southwest Orlando will be the site for Freedom Fest '83, a gigantic "family picnic" set to mark national Gay Pride Sunday June 26. The picnic officially opens at 12 noon. Draft beer and wine will go on sale at 12:30 p.m. in a concession operated by GCS. Other groups and clubs will also be offering a variety of foods, refreshments, and items for sale. The fest will be centered at Pavilion Four, near the park's fishing pier.

Admission to Turkey Lake Park is \$1, collected by the City of Orlando. There is no fee to attend the picnic. GCS officers will be selling tickets to be used as "currency" for beer, food and other items. GCS will receive 10 percent of the gross profits taken in by concessionaires.

In addition to the picnic area, Turkey Lake Park offers a white sand swimming beach, boat rental, hiking trails, bicycling and bike rentals, fishing, and ecology exhibits. The park is open daily from 9 a.m. until 5 p.m. Gay Pride picnickers are urged to come early June 26 to insure table space.

Several special events are planned at the picnic including the finals of the Gay Pride volleyball tournament and the first

Frederick sends mixed signals

Mayor claims 'One Orlando' includes Gay community

Orlando Mayor William "Bill" Frederick has promised to . . . "defend the rights of any citizen to live in this community free from illegal harassment because of a personal preference." The statement came in a letter written in response to 10 questions submitted to the Mayor by NEW DIRECTION.

Frederick also made no direct answer to a request that he proclaim June 19-26 as Gay and Lesbian Citizens' Week in Orlando despite being reminded that as many as 50,000 Gay and Lesbian people (based on national statistics) work, play, and live in the Greater Orlando area.

"We originally asked for a face-to-face interview with the Mayor, in February" said Managing Editor Jay Wesley. "He claimed that he could not find time in his schedule.

We renewed our request in March and were asked to submit questions. Those were sent to City Hall in April."

Mayor Frederick wrote, "In my opinion, there has been no systematic persecution of any group in this community. This will continue under my administration." The statement was in response to questions concerning the Mayor issuing an executive order banning harrassment against employees based on sexual preference.

In reply to questions concerning "gentrification" of downtown and nearby neighborhoods by Gay and Lesbian

businesspersons and homeowners, Frederick said he does "... not support

ethnic conclaves, deliberate bilingual isolation or any recognition groups which

tend to operate against the concept of 'one Orlando' ''. The ''one Orlando'' theme was used by Frederick during his campaign for the city's top post.

In what could be considered a slap at bar and entertainment businesses serving the Gay and Lesbian citizens, and possibly Gay rights activists, Frederick stated he does "not support the deliberate exploitation of a sexual preference for the sake of proving the point that the exploitation is possible. That statement seems to answer a questeion asking the Mayor's opinion if the 1982 "morality vote" in Orange County was a mandate to suppress businesses offering Gay citizens entertainment.

Saying "I believe that sufficient state and federal laws exist at the present time (to prevent persecution of any group)." Frederick said with his ". . . administration's reconfirmed policy of "one Orlando", no further assurances seem essential." That statement apparently came from questions asking the mayor's position on the decriminalization of all sexual acts between consenting adults within the privacy of their living quarters. Currently homosexual and heterosexual sex acts with the exception of "missionary position" sexual intercourse are illegal in Florida, falling under the state's anti-sodomy statutes.

Several other questions submitted to Frederick seemingly went unanswered, including his possible support for police department empathy training for handling Gay and Lesbian police matters, the appointment of a member of the mayor's staff to serve as liasion to the Gay community, support for changing the nation's immigration law to allow openly Gay foreign visitors to enter the country (in light of Orlando's growing world popularity for tourists), and explaining how city employees can file complaints concerning job harrassment based on sexual preference.

'Annie' performance to help AIDS research

"ANNIE Against AIDS," a glittering night of theater, is set for June 23 at the popular Theatre-On-Park, a Winter Park dinner-show operation. The benefit is planned as a high point of Gay Pride Week being celebrated June 19-23 in central Florida and is under sponsorship of Gay Community Services (GCS).

Tickets for dinner, presentation of the hit musical "ANNIE", and a donation toward Florida-based research into the causes and cure for AIDS (Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome) are now on sale for \$25. Ticket information is available by calling (305) 645-5757, the theater box office or (305) 843-4297, the GCS hotline. Only 200 seats are available.

Some \$1,200 to \$1,400 is expected to be raised for AIDS research underway by Dr. Mary Ann Fletcher, professor of medicine (immunology) at the University of Miami. Dr. Fletcher and her associate, Dr. Nancy Klimas, are involved in a comparative study of AIDS victims and college students suffering from infectious mononucleosis. Both groups share certain blood particle elements which show signs of immnosuppression, the failing of the body's natural defenses, during stages of the diseases. Their work also involves the study of blood serum irregularities in AIDS patients.

Dr. Fletcher and Dr. Klimas are expected to attend the benefit performance of "ANNIE", according to Jim Welch, GCS president. "It is especially fitting that money raised from central Florida citizens be used by a Florida researcher to battle this deadly disease. Florida is the third-leading state in AIDS with almost 70 reported cases and that number is bound to increase. It is time our Gay community joins forces to help themselves."

"Annie" is a musical based on the adventures of Little Orphan Annie, a popular comic character, her dog Sandy, Daddy Warbucks, Punjab, and a host of other characters. The AIDS benefit comes just two days after the show opens at the Winter Park dinner theater. The production is one of the first in a local theater. "ANNIE" closed successfully last year on Broadway after a long run.

A special "orphan's stew" dinner will be served at the benefit, along with "poorhouse cornbread", "depression salad", and "hard-times sherbert". The "stew" will be made from sirloin tips and served over rice. The menu was developed to allow the maximum contribution to the AIDS research fund. "ANNIE" is set in the 1930's and revolves around the little orphan's trip from orphanage to mansion.

Theatre-On-Park, located at 401 N. Park Avenue, Winter Park will seat benefit-goers for dinner between 6-7 p.m. Curtain is at 8:15 p.m. A cash bar will be in operation during dinner and intermissions.

DAYTONA BEACH — Gay Pride festivities in this oceanside resort town will be celebrated in grand scale June 20-27, according to organizers. They claim this will be the first large scale celebration for the growing Gay and Lesbian community along "the beaches".

The celebration kicks off June 20 with an open house at Blessed Redeemer Metropolitan Community Church (MCC) at 7:30 p.m. The welcome is set at 174 Broadway Ave. with the Rev. Arthur Fleschner as host-coordinator. The second event of the evening will be a special Mr. and Mrs. Gay Pride Pageant at the Zodiac Lounge, 1654 South Ridgewood Ave. Showtime begins at 10:30 p.m. The pageant is open to all area contestants.

The discussion will center on the significant contributions made to society throughout history by Lesbians and Gay men.

"The Bible and the Homosexual" is the discussion topic for the June 22 meeting at MCC. The session will begin at $7:30~p.m_{\odot}$

Equal time request considered

Baptist television message will be closely watched

Gay Community Services of Central Florida, Inc. (GCS) has notified Channel 9 Television (WFTV-TV, Orlando) that it may request equal time to answer a proposed message to be televised by a local Baptist minister. The sermon is planned for Sunday, June, 12 by Rev. Jim Henry, pastor of Orlando's First Baptist Church. The program is scheduled to be aired at 10:30 a.m. as part of the so-called "First Hour," a weekly church sponsored program.

The message is part of a current series planned by Henry under the title of "Your Family: when crisis comes." The June 12 message is entitled "When a family member becomes a Homosexual".

Other messages in the eight-part series included: When you're deciding who cares for the baby if I work?", "When you feel that divorce is the cure for a sick marriage", "When you're wanting to have a happy family," and "When Your mate is a beloved unbeliever".

Jim Welch, president of GCS, writing in a letter to Clifford Pine, Channel 9 program director, said, ". . . while understanding that secular messages within the confines of the church, synagogue, mosque, or meeting hall are indeed "sacred", GCS members question their place on public consumption television. No other social-sexual-political group has been culled out by Rev. Henry despite the acknowledged evils of alcoholism, drug abuse, spouse and child abuse, racial cynicism and hypocrisy and their lasting social effects."

Welch went on to say that "... I would urge you to consider the possible concerns of the estimated 50,000 Gay and Lesbian citizens in the greater Orlando area in broadcast of this message... citizens (who) have been the target of violence and misunderstanding for

many years, some of that violence engendered by secular spokesmen claiming to 'hate the sin of homosexuality' while 'loving the sinner'. Some members of their flocks have trouble making the distinction."

Welch cited the station's recent viewer poll during showing of a violent film, *The Shining*, as example of the station's programming standards concern. He urged Channel 9 to consider the impact on Gay and Lesbians of the June 12 program from First Baptist Church

In the letter, Pine was reminded that "... research indicated that sexual preference determination occurs at a very early age and that no one consciously chooses to become homosexual or heterosexual. It cannot be compared to becoming a Republican or Democrat, a vegetarian, or a member of the Rotary."

GCS members, voting in their May meeteing, moved to also register their complaints with the Federal Communications Commission in Washington, D.C.

In a letter to Pastor Henry, GCS offered a large library of resource materials and professional counselors as assistance in preparing the television message. Reached by telephone by GCS president Welch, Henry turned down offers to consider the materials, saying that "he had a different source of information". He said that he would consider turning over materials from GCS to counselors working at First Baptist.

Henry was also provided a pamphlet prepared for parents of Gays and Lesbians along with a May issue of *NEW DIRECTION*. Welch said the information was to show "... our organization, like yours (First Baptist Church) is active on many fronts to improve the quality of life in central Florida."

Welch said requests for equal television access and air time would be made after careful review of the broadcast by members of the GCS "media watch committee". The program will be taped for study by the committee.

Gay Pride and the longest day

IT IS FITTING THAT THE SUMMER SOLSTICE, the longest and most light-filled day of the year falls within the June 19-26 celebration of Gay Pride Week in central Florida. This week of fun, festivity, and freedom should focus the brigh light of truth and honesty on Gay and Lesbian citizens and their struggle to become not separate, but equal.

Benign neglect from some sectors, teamed with active persecution from secular interests continues causing Gays and Lesbians problems both in the work place and on the homefront. Many are forced to treat their love for another of the same sex as something to be fulfilled in the dark, the shadows of shame. Still others are driven from proper employment or decent housing because society has chosen, in spite of the evidence that homosexuality is just another symptom of the human condition, to feed their fear and lack of understanding with hatred or envy.

There are voices in this community saying Gay Pride is "too political" or "too controversial". They say leave well enough alone. They urge retreat in the face of growing assault on our lifestyle. While some of their pockets grow fat from exploiting Gay and Lesbian citizens, they seem to fear the sense of pride that could finally break down the self-imposed ghetto many of our brothers and sisters have built around themselves.

MAKE NO MISTAKE ABOUT IT. WE DO BUILD OUR OWN GHETTOS. mostly within the walls of our mind. We party with only Gay friends, drink and

cruise in Gay clubs, respond to many of the latest Gay fashion rages and yet call ourselves liberated.

At the same time, many of us, when in our work place or in a non-friendly environment are the first to laugh at "fag jokes." The first to point the finger as someone "really nellie" hoping that the maneuver will divert attention from ourselves. Wearing this self-serving mask is perhaps the cruelest form of self-abuse.

Now comes the AIDS crisis and its terrible connotations of "leprosy" for the Gay community. Never has there been a more serious threat to the health and well-being of the Gay liberation. We must take every opportunity to rebuff those who would label this medical crisis a "Gay plague". This is not a moral disease sent by an avenging God to destroy some of his most perfect works. No forgiving God would do that.

WE SHOULD HAVE PRIDE THAT MANY GAY AND LESBIAN CITIZENS are taking up the fight for AIDS research and funding. Across the United States and yes, even here in Central Florida, all types of benefits and special programs are being undertaken and successfully completed by our friends "ANNIE" Against AIDS June 23, at Winter Park's Theatre-On-Park is such an event that deserves the widest possible support.

The month is here, Gay Pride week is almost upon us. National Gay Pride Sunday is June 26. The time for anticipation, reflection, celebration, self-realization and prideful actualization is now. Become one with other Gay and Lesbian Pride celebrants... They are your friends, your supporters, and lovers... in love with the clear, bright, white light of liberation.

AIDS impact increasing, media coverage blasted

Orange County health department officials have told NEW DIRECTION recently that a sixth suspected case of Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) has been discovered in the Orlando area. Dr. Betty Vaughn, assistant director of the agency said June 4, that the newest victim was a man in "his 40's." She refused to give additional information concerning the man's illness and treatment.

Another man, a 52-year-old Australian citizen, lost his life to an AIDS-related illness May 2, while visiting in Orange County. Other AIDS patients are undergoing treatment either in area hospitals or nursing homes. At least one man is taking part in radical treatment programs being conducted by federal researchers.

THE ORLANDO SENTINEL, in its May 27 editorial, called on the Reagan ad-

"It is the worst kind of journalism, full of half truths, innuendos, and false facts. The Sentinel should be ashamed of its coverage of this serious health issue. This is not a lifestyle disease," said Jim Welch, GCS president and editor and publisher of New Direction, a Gay community monthly tabloid. "Not only are we now the victims of the disease, we have become the purpetrators of what The Sentinel calls "Gay

"Operation with Orlando Regional seminar is free of ice. Gay Community Services, in cooperation with Orlando Regional Medical Center will present a seminar on Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) as part of Gay Pride Week activities. The seminar will begin at 7:30 p.m. in the center's Gold Auditorium Wednesday, June 22.

The purpose of the session, according to planners, is to discuss the latest news and opinions surrounding the mysterious disease. About 70 percent of AIDS victims have been homosexual. More than 1,500 cases of the often-fatal disease have been identified in the United States. At least 600 people have died.

Included in the discussion will be information on the social and psychological impact of the disorder on both victims, close friends of victims, and the at-large Gay community. The seminar is free of charge and offered as a public service.

Chronology of events in discovery of AIDS

Here is a chronology of events in the discovery and tracking of AIDS.

Doctors in New York and California begin seeing young homosexual men with Kaposi's sarcoma, a rare cancer usually found only in men over 50, and a rare form of pneumonia caused by a parasite called Pneumocystis carinii. The cases are believed to be unrelated.

April - A few more cases appear. Doctors realize for the first time they are dealing with an emerging epidemic. They alert the Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta. Epidemic is believed to be limited to homosexual men.

The CDC reports five cases of Pneumocystis pneumonia have been found in homosexual men. Two have died.

July — The CDC reports that 20 homosexual men in New York and six in

California have been found to have Kaposi's sarcoma. Eight have died August - Seventy more homosexual men have been struck by either Kaposi's sarcoma or Pneumocystis pneumonia. Half have died.

December — A report in the New England Journal of Medicine traces the diseases to a mysterious breakdown of the immune system in the patients. The disease has spread to 180 people in 15 states. Thirteen victims are heterosexual men, two are heterosexual women. New York and California

March - Doctors in San Francisco report outbreaks in homosexuals of two other rare cancers — Burkitt's lymphoma and squamous carcinoma of

June - The CDC warns the disease is near epidemic proportions in heterosexuals and homosexuals.

Immune breakdowns reported in Haitian immigrants and hemophiliacs. Disease is officially named acquired immune deficiency syndrome. By now, 450 cases of the immune disorder have been reported, and three more are being found each day. Thirty-nine percent of the victims have died within one year of diagnosis.

September - Immune disorders found in many otherwise healthy homosexuals. Tally of AIDS victims rises to 593. Spread called "alarming"

October - Dr. James Curran, head of CDC's AIDS task force, said researchers suspect AIDS is caused by a virus.



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
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Well-built art shows design school training

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




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


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
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





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Life as a had a steady girlfriend for about five

Barbara is tall for a woman, Howard is about average height for a man . . . they would make a great couple if they weren't the same person.

Barbara is the name Howard uses when he cross dresses . . . part of the ritual of transvestism he has been enjoying for more than four decades. Married for almost 25 years and the father of three children. B/H owns and operates a successful business selling a product that almost everyone uses. He believes that there are many more men in the central Florida area that enjoy wearing the smooth, silky clothing that often fills the pages of Vogue, Cosmopolitan, and the undergarmet advertising from Frederick's of Hollywood.

"I think that a lot of men experience an interest in the clothing worn by their mother or sister. I know that I can remember at about age 6 or 7 sneaking

into my mother's room. It was all in secret.", B/H claimed. "As a teenager, the feeling of the clothes seemed to give me a sense of heightened sexuality. It game me increased sexual release, especially during masturbation."

"I did wear the clothes as often as possible till I was about 16 years old. I years at the time I really didn't feel any guilt about my feelings at the time," B/H said. "Heck, I was into sports and all the other things a normal high school kid is interested in . . . girls and such."

"I liked women, but it wasn't a real sexual attraction, but the sexual appeal of their clothing, their sense of style and fashion. By the end of high school I was engaged to be married," B/H

"I had one homosexual experience in the Navy," B/H recalled. "I really got trapped into it by another sailor on the base. I just was never in the (Gay) life again while I was in the service."

B/H was married at age 25 and set about building a career and family.

"I started getting the itch again when I was about 32 or 33 years old. I found myself trying on my wife's garments when she was away from the house."

"I had to do business in Chicago once, I can remember I was about 40 then. The whole thing was very exciting. It was a downtown hotel that I stayed in and after getting dressed in women's clothing I went down to the bar. I waited for a drink and finally someone from the staff came over and told me that "I would have to leave the bar. He kept referring to me as sir."

"Later that night," B/H recalls, "I got a mysterious call to go to the bar Changing channels in the 80's

next to the hotel. I met several men that night. Later, one came to my room. I remember that I was dressed in a nightgown."

"I played the passive role . . . to this day I can still remember the feeling of exhileration from that night. I visited Chicago many times after that."

"After moving to Orlando, I started to go out more often. I hared an apartment with a girlfriend. I was able to keep my growing wardrobe there, away from home. I have been picked up several times here, although mostly in straight bars," B/H said.

"I can recall telling my wife about my interest in cross dressing. It was really a bitch. She suggested therapy. I can recall telling the therapist that I had no interest in having my balls cut off."

"When I took my wife to some of the Gay clubs, especially the Palace, she said that the place really disgusted her . . . she said it was full of evil. All this was taking place in a period of adjustment after I told her about my cross dressing."

B/H also remembers the hard time she got at the door of the Orlando's Parliament House, the doorman saying that "her kind was not appreciated there", despite the fact that female impersonators were performing in the show bar.

"I have never really had a bad experience, however," B/H stated. "I've never been thrown out of a club. I usually go to straight clubs though . . . it is easier to pass as a less pretty woman than a beautiful man."

B/H claims that his growing wardrobe and the loss of his girlfriends apartment has forced him to store his female clothing in a rental storage bay in Orlando. When he spends time dressed as a woman, he usually rents a motel room for a three or four day stint as Barbara.

"It's really wild, sitting around the pool getting your nails ready for a night on the town and having this salesman from Des Moines trying to pick you up. You ought to see their faces when you tell them you are a man. Most just can't believe it," B/H laughed.

Trips to local beauty parlors also leaves some unsuspecting patrons buzzing under the dryers. "Most of the operators are real good about the whole thing . . . and I guess men are being more accepted in the salon with curlers, and so forth . . . at least no one has dropped dead yet," B/H claimed.

B/H dresses conservatively, appearing recently at an Orlando ballet performance in a simple black dress and pearls. While more than several heads turned as he entered the auditorium, persons around him made a special effort for courtesy.

"I'd really like to help others deal with their feelings about cross dressing and transvestism. I really think there are a lot more people than society would believe that like to do it. Like me, most of them do not want to be a woman physically, just to enjoy being surrounded by womanly things and perhaps finding a partner who can share our excitement both sexually and socially."

Mayor's letter recounts campaign views

Thank you for taking the time to submit the list of questions to me for an interview in New Direction. I congratulate you and your staff on your first anniversary issue

Several questions have been put to me concerning gay rights in the City of Orlando, particularly in reference to a higher gay "profile". I believe these questions can best be answered by me in the general context of my feelings toward the City in general. That answer was first given during my campaign for Mayor when I initiated the theme, "One Orlan-

At that time, my opposition was seeking to divide the community along racial lines to benefit his assumed advantage among Black voters. That advantage, by the way, was never realized, nor was he able to capitalize on that devisive theme.

Additionally, divisions among economic groups were also sought to be exploited on conventional, social and economic levels.

"One Orlando" implied, and still implies, that we in this City are one community, and that our strength and genius as a City lies in the recognition and application of this theme. I do not support ethnic conclaves, deliberate bilingual isolation, or any recognition groups which tend to operate against the concept of "One Orlando"

I would, of course, defend the rights of any citizen to live in this community free from illegal harrassment because of a personal preference. I do not support the deliberate exploitation of a sexual preference for the sake of proving the point that the exploitation is

In a free society such as we have in this community, law-abiding citizens will be given equal and just treatment. I promise you that. I retain the right, however, to express my



personal opinion on social and moral issues. But in terms of my official capacity as Mayor of this City, I recognize that different political, philosophical and other viewpoints exist, and should exist in a pluralistic society.

In my opinion, there has been no history of systematic persecution of any group of this community. This will continue to be the case under my administration. I believe that sufficient state and federal laws exist at the present time to ensure the continuation of this attitude; and with this administration's reconfirmed policy of "One Orlando", no further assurance seem essential.

I hope this has helped you and your readers with an overview of my feelings. Again, good luck with the newspaper.

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LORENZO'S PIZZERIA

Lorenzo's Pizzeria bills itself as a restaurant for "fine food and wine," a motto adopted by far too many eateries. Lorenzo's, though, has earned a rightful claim to the title. I've been munching on their takeout pizza and dining in the latticed adorned green interior for years.

Not that I'm an expert at pizza. I've never had a New York deep dish, which is, by word of mouth, the best. But the chewey yet crispy homemade crust, topped by your choice of up to twelve items, is

My mouth is watering just for the thought of some future endeavor at devouring a Lorenzo Special. Pepperoni, sausage, mushroom, green peppers, onions, and anchovies, plus the cheese and tomato sauce spread across the pie insure a filling meal. A medium sized pizza is usually plenty for two. Personally, I skip the anchovies and order extra cheese (for 75¢). It eliminates the heartburn.

Of course, one is not limited to pizza at Lorenzo's. There are the more classic Italian dishes, such as lasagna and spaghetti, with seven choices of sauces. You can also choose from their cheese delights or the veal parmagiania.

The name "stuffed shells" intrigued me so last time I ventured to try the dinner item. Simply enough, it is shell shaped pasta stuffed with ricotta cheese, covered with tomato sauce and a layer of mozzarella cheese. The manicotti is equally just as cheesey. Why I have a fetish for the solidified milk, I'll never know. But one can't go wrong by trying either the manicotti or stuffed shells.

The salads which accompany each dinner are nothing more than simple rabbit feed. But the breadsticks served with them are a morsel to behold. If you're lucky your serving will be a batch just pulled from the oven. Hot and buttery, these almost too garlicky morsels compliment any meal, including a prelude to a pizza.

Meatball, sausage, ham and steak subs and their variations are served if your hunger dictates a sandwich. Honestly, I haven't one. But if one can follow precedents, they'd be great palate pleasers.

Lorenzo's is open seven days a week from 11:00 a.m. to 2:00 a.m. There are two locations: 1912 S. Orange Avenue and 2413 Colonial Dr. Take-out service is available by calling 425-4346 and 298-7400 respectively.

Next time you feel like a great Italian lover, put some Italian fuel in your system and go to town. Lorenzo's is small and cozy, serves great food and is a friendly establishment that will bring you back for
