I didn't know there was another way to live without drinking until I was introduced to Alcoholics Anonymous. Before AA, I felt hopeless, helpless, alone, was filled with remorse and guilt, and honestly didn't think I had anything to live for. My life ran the course of a viscious merry-go-round that I couldn't get off by myself.

AA saved my life and my sanity but I didn't really know about AA or what it was or where it was. It took the intervention of my family and a court order to get me to AA's doors and today, six years later, I am very grateful for that.

I'm passing this information along for anyone who thinks she might have a drinking problem but doesn't know where to go or are just interested in finding out what AA is about.

Alcoholics Anonymous is a fellowship of men and women who share their experience, strength and hope with each other that they may solve their common problem and help others to recover from alcoholism.

The only requirement for membership is a desire to stop drinking. There are no dues for AA membership; we are self-supporting through our own contributions. AA is not allied with any sect, denomination, politics, organization, or institution; does not wish to engage in any controversy; neither endorses nor opposes any causes. Our primary purpose is to stay sober and help other alcoholics to achieve sobriety.

There are gay and lesbian AA meetings right here in Orlando. The name of the group is called *Free To Be*. It meets every night of the week at 8:00pm in the LAMBDA Central Clubhouse at 109 N. Hill Ave. (off Washington, just east of Summerlin) Orlando, FL 32801.

Death by the Riverside by Holly Cutler

Reviewed by WomonKind Books, NYC

J.M. Redmann was born in Mississippi and spent her childhood on the Gulf Coast. She speaks "bayou" fluently and sprinkles this throughout her new book. Death by the Riverside is a fast paced detective novel that keeps you turning the pages.

Set in Southern Louisiana, this novel introduces us to Micky Knight. Micky is a tough Detective Dyke, with a penchant for Scotch and beautiful women. Her detective work barely pays the rent, buys the catfood, and keeps her in Johnny Walker. So when an alluring and wealthy client offers her a respectable sum of money to take some compromising pictures of her brother, Micky jumps at the chance.

However, what appeared to be a simple task becomes complicated and dangerous. An easy photo assignment unexpectedly uncovers a ruthless drug ring, and our heroine sets out to expose them in a wild adventure involving a host of characters.

Sam Spade and Mike Hammer better hang up their trench-coats. Redmann has created a convincing Lesbian detective who is as street-smart and sassy as her predecessors. Somehow Micky survives the bullets, blades, and body-bashings (kind of like RoboCop in a sports bra). However, Redmann includes a love interest for Micky that balances out the mayhem with tenderness that leaves you wishing for more.

If you like a good detective/adventure story read *Death by the Riverside*. It's got a pinch as hard as an indignant old Louisiana crab.

deported as enemies of the state. Often their sexuality was reason for blame. Higher class gays worked to blend in and retain their economic status or stayed or moved abroad to avoid suspicion.

The exodus presented an interesting problem for the U.S. government. The 1952 Naturalization and Immigration Act would have allowed the U.S. to bar "sexual deviant" aliens.

But the need to fuel the cold war an anti-communism movement weighed greater than the need to highlight the sexual preference of the fleeing refugees. Even a Florida investigative committee report on homosexuality in 1964 never mentioned any influx from Cuba.

I personally think South Beach and other south Florida areas are the better for the immigration!




This is evidently high on the Republi-

Halloween -- The Original New Year's Eve

November 1 is the half-way point between Autumn Equinox and Winter Solstice. During pagan times, it was celebrated on the eve before and was called All Hallows Eve. The pagan idea used to be that crucial joints between the seasons opened cracks in the fabric of space-time, allowing contact between the ghost world and the mortal one.

There are many remnants of this festival. Trick-or-Treat: Originally, it was believed that ancestral dead came up from their tombs on Halloween, sometimes bringing gifts to the children of their decendants. Broomsticks: Sacred mid-wives used special broomsticks to sweep the threshold of the house after childbirth, to repel evil influences from mothers and their babies (before men took over birthing and made it an industry). Among gypsies whose marriages are still performed by wise-women, jumping the broomstick is an essential part of the rite.

Bobbing for apples: The tub of water represented the Cauldron of Regeneration and the apples were soul symbols-- a game whose symbols hint at cheating death. At the end of the game, all the players run away to escape the Grim Reaper. This also relates to the Pentagram or Pentacle, because an apple cut transversely

reveals its core (Kore, Inner Soul of Mother Earth) in the shape of a Pentacle. Ah, the apple, Eve's fruit of knowledge!

For me, Halloween has always been a day of self-reckoning, "to try to hold in one steady glance all the parts of my life."* Parts of my personal Hallows Eve ritual are to cast a circle with sound, invoke the spirits, and speak

> "This is a time that is not a time In a place that is not a place On a day that is not a day Between the worlds and beyond..."

I also perform a self blessing with a pentacle as follows: with the right hand touch the left breast, the forehead, the right breast, the left shoulder, the right shoulder, and finally the left breast again. The body of my ritual changes from year to year. Blessed be.


Being barely old enough to personally remember President Kennedy and young enough to have only been fed the U.S. rhetoric about the Cuban revolution, I admittedly know very little about Cuba. I found the short history in *Hidden from History*, *Reclaiming Gay and Lesbian Past* very informative. Below is a glimpse from one if its chapters.

During the Cuban revolution (1959) many homosexuals emigrated to Miami. The required puritism of the new Cuban leadership left little leeway for their lifestyle. Not only because they were homosexual but for two other reasons as well.


First, many working class gays gravitated to Havana for employment. There was a more relaxed attitude towards them in the city (like many U.S. cities) than the rural countryside provided. A major employer was American mob controlled tourism. The revolution expelled the American underworld and the superficial tolerance of lesbian and gays.

Secondly, homosexual that joined the counterrevolution and were found out, were publicly hung to dry and

Vice President Debbie Simmons, the interim president, read a short statement from Morrison to the members.

"The MBA is on very firm ground with not only a strong membership but a very hard-working board of directors as well," stated Morrison, who had headed the group since April. "With that in mind and knowing that the organization will survive and prosper in the future, I am -- for personal reasons -- tendering my resignation effective Aug. 21, 1992."

Nominations for president are now being taken, as well as for the board position of media director. Two new at-large board members were voted into office at the last meeting, and the MBA bylaws were also adopted.

Vikki Brescher of the Travel Group in Tampa gave some choice pointers on travel for gays and lesbians, including being aware of attitudes -- as well as the law -- in foreign countrie you intend to visit. Many places -- such as The Netherlands and a company in Hawaii -- are now offering packages specifically for gay men and women.

"You are a voice that is finally beginning to be heard," she said.

She emphasized the importance of having a copy of your passport in case it is lost, and added that people who are HIV positive shouldn't be afraid to travel -- as long as they make plans for medication and support services.

The group was also visited by Janet Hawkins, a registered nurse who is the Libertarian candidate for state house District 35. Hawkins said she understands the problems of the average person, and said she "supported choices in education, lifestyles and healthcare."
