<u>Apothecary</u> – Progress is being made on their project with pharmacy students. A grad student with some background in the history of medicine has been hired for their summer intern. Sharon is working on 18th-century dental techniques.

<u>Artificer</u> – In addition to the usual flurry of odd jobs like knife sheaths for the Candlemakers and hemming towels for the Weavers, the shop always has more involved longer-range projects underway. Presently, they are working on a 1756 French dragoon saddle and a pair of course sheepskin breeches. Plans are underway for sorting and packing the shop in preparation for the move to their Summer home at the Armory site.

<u>Basketmaker</u> – They are still working on large baskets for in-house and special orders. They are getting pretty short on material and hope to hear from the supplier soon. They have also begun working on the incubator baskets for Coach & Livestock-- a willow project.

Bindery – They are working on blank ledgers.

<u>Cabinetmaker</u> – They continue to work on several pieces: a coopered mahogany wine cooler, an easy chair (wing chair frame), and a pair of fluted tri-pod music stands. The harpsichord makers are processing mechanical parts for two future spinets.

<u>Candlemaker</u> – They have begun selling candles at Prentis Store. They are developing skill in the processes and have attracted some Media attention. The daily routine is so smooth one would think they were all old hands at the trade. A new daily program, "The Candlemaker's Apprentice," begins on Sunday, April 10th. It is a ticketed, interactive program where guests will be able to dip a candle that they will be able to keep. It begins at 10:00, 10:30, and 11:00, and then 2:30, 3:00, and 3:30. Two tickets will be sold for each time.

Cooper – They continue to work on tubs for Coach and Livestock and buckets for the Printing Office.

<u>Fifes and Drums</u> – The Fife and Drum Senior Corps is currently working on new music for their participation in the Virginia International Tattoo held in Norfolk this month.

<u>Foodways</u> – A special tour will occur on 18th: "A Cook's Walking Tour." Guests visiting our historic sites see lovely, pristine homes in fair order. But, did you ever wonder about the messy parts of life? Kim Costa will lead a tour to explore the often private world of food preparation in an 18th-century city. Guests will visit a variety of original out-buildings and sites, including smoke houses, dairies, kitchens, and bake ovens. Guests will learn what it was like to live and work as a cook and prepare food across the hierarchy of society.

<u>Gunsmith</u> – The lock for the rifle is being inlet into the stock, and Eric has turned three handles for froes for the Blacksmith.

<u>Historic Garden</u> – It was a chilly week at the Garden, and they have been a little worried about the smaller transplants.
