Historic Area Residents Invited To Compete In Decorations Contest

Plans are now underway for the fourth Christmas Doorway Decorations contest, which is open to all residents in the Historic Area.

Visitors to the colonial city will judge the decorations and prizes will be awarded after all ballots have been tallied. The winners will receive a free dinner for two at any Colonial Williamsburg dining room or restaurant, plus a color photograph of the doorway.

All decorations should be in place by Tuesday, December 19, in time for the Grand Illumination of the city. The visitors will judge the decorations and cast their ballots in hotels on December 24 and on Christmas Day. Announcements of the ten best doorways will be made on December 26.

Materials used in the decorations should be those that would have been available in the 18th century. Wax or plastic fruits, plastic ribbon, and Christmas tree ornaments are not acceptable. Help from a florist may be obtained.

CW Film "Time To Begin" Receives "Chris Award"

Colonial Williamsburg has recently received a major non-theatrical film honor for its production, "Time to Begin," a 28-minute color film made originally for the 1966 Governor's Conference on Natural Beauty.

The "Chris Award" was presented by the Columbus Area Chamber of Commerce and the Film Council of Greater Columbus (Ohio) at the 15th Annual Columbus Film Festival. The award, symbolized by a statuette of Christopher Columbus, joins two others for past CW productions.

According to Arthur L. Smith, director of the film and head of CW's Audiovisual Department, "Time to Begin" is a "visual statement of conditions and needs in the area of beautification throughout Virginia."

Arthur, along with CW's Gene Bjerke, cameraman-editor, traveled over 3,000 miles within state boundaries to film the scenes. Peter A.G. Brown, director of AARFAC and Special Projects, wrote the script for the film.

Plans are now underway to make prints of the film available on a rental basis through the Film Distribution Section at CW.

Dual Ticket Program Postponed By CW

The dual ticket system planned for CW's exhibition buildings in 1968 has been postponed for at least another year.

The system was originally designed to present five new exhibition buildings to the public together with the current buildings and shops in two balanced but very different tours. The idea was prompted by rising attendance and the desire to broaden the educational and historic interpretation of Williamsburg.

Since the system was approved in 1965, a number of circumstances and considerations have been under study. Contrary to expectations, exhibition building attendance in 1967 was below that of 1966. In addition, the delayed start in constructing the new Conference Center auditorium, an important component of the dual ticket program, presents the possibility that it may not be ready for use in the 1968 summer season.

According to CW officials the 18th century buildings now being restored and furnished will be opened as scheduled this summer. Together with the current exhibition buildings, they will be presented on a combination ticket offering eleven buildings to the public. The ticket will allow the visitor admittance to the Capitol, the Governor's Palace, and the Christopher Wren Building. The remaining eight buildings will be offered in four groups of two buildings so that the visitor may choose one from each group to visit. In addition, tickets for each of the buildings may be obtained individually.

It is hoped that the ticket program planned for this summer will give CW officials an opportunity to conduct a more comprehensive study of attendance among all the exhibition buildings. Such a study will provide the information needed for final preparation of a dual ticket system for CW.



Hostesses Receive Coat Of Arms At Governor's Palace Ceremony

Five of CW's long-time employees in the Presentation division were on hand at the Palace last week as Elizabeth Callis, hostess training supervisor, presented the newly-framed and painted official coat of arms of the Colonial Williamsburg hostesses to Nancy Bozarth, the CW hostess with the longest record of service.

Nancy and Mrs. Callis, along with hostesses Muriel Spencer, Winifred Mackey and Minnie Pate, were present when the coat of arms was first presented to the group at their tenth anniversary dinner in 1944.

The coat of arms was originally designed for the 1944 occasion by the late T. Rutherfoord Goodwin, then in charge of the hostess corps. It was printed on the cover of a souvenir booklet commemorating that event.

The emblem's design consists of various symbolic objects which relate to the role of the hostess in Colonial Williamsburg. According to Elizabeth Callis, the bananas on the shield and the thermos bottles flanking the shield were necessary items for the hostess working here in the 1940's and before. She explained that the hostesses at that time did not have access to refrigerators so that fresh fruit and thermoses were popular among those hostesses bringing their lunches.

Frank Jacobs Tops Twentieth Year Here

Frank S. Jacobs, maintenance carpenter in the Division of AC&M, marked his twentieth anniversary here on September 29.

Frank worked on several occasions and in several different positions from 1941 to 1947 when he became maintenance carpenter apprentice with AC&M. One year later he achieved his present position of maintenance carpenter.

A native of Virginia, Frank is a member of the Lion's Club and of the Masons. His wife, Betty, also works for CW as receptionist in the Goodwin Building.

The hostess figure shown at the top of the shield holds a book in one hand and a key in the other hand. Mrs. Callis noted that the key symbolizes the hostesses' affiliation with the exhibition buildings while the book calls to mind the amount of studying that each hostess undergoes during her training here. The corssed knitting needles shown in the background represent one of the favorite pastimes of the hostesses.

Beneath the shield is the motto in Latin, "Always the Same," and below that is the identifying word "Hostess."

This coat of arms has been permanently hung in the hostesses' room at the Governor's Palace.


McCaskey Elected To Honorary WWBF Post
