### **Public hanging at Publick Times**

Moses Terry, a Halifax County resident convicted of counterfeiting in 1773 and sentenced to hang, mounts the gallows again during Publick Times Friday, August 30 to Monday, September 2.

Publick Times recreates the atmosphere of Williamsburg when the General Court was in session and citizens from across the colony came to the capital to attend court, transact business and socialize.

Moses' execution will be reenacted at 10:45 a.m.
Saturday near the Public Gaol on Nicholson Street. From the gaol, the prisoner will be paraded through the Historic Area to the gibbet in a horse-drawn cart, accompanied by a minister, sheriff, drummer and executioner.

Just before the hanging, the sheriff will read a pardon from the Royal Governor. In the 18th century, news of a pardon sometimes was not announced to the prisoner until moments before the execution. The idea was to teach the prisoner a lesson, in the hope the offender would not repeat the crime.

Military re-enactors will set up camp along Nicholson Street, and meats will be barbecued throughout Saturday. Between 10 a.m. and noon members of the 18th-century military units will demonstrate domestic and housewifery skills behind the Brush-Everard House.

There will be parades featuring the Junior and Senior Fife and Drum Corps as well as field music, artillery firing demonstrations and military reviews.

The Mary Stith Shop will present programs on 18th-century domestic skills Saturday, to include dyeing cloth, fitting clothing for men and women, knitting, wigs and hair styles.

Religious life in the colony will be represented by the following three events Sunday: a service on Market Square at 10 a.m., a

religion tour at 2 p.m. and a sermon in the Capitol yard at 3 and 3:30 p.m.

Booths will offer wares, foods, beverages, and diversions. There will games for children, dancing and fencing lessons, a magician, harp music, theatrical performances, African-American music and story telling, auctions, fire-engine demonstrations, an itinerant preacher, livestock demonstrations and a horserace.

Activities continue in the evenings. Friday, re-enactors in costume may purchase discounted tickets to any of the three performances of "A Capitol Evening." Saturday at 7:30, there will be a dance on the Market Square Green, hosted by the musicians of the 6th North Carolina, and at 8:30 participants in costume may purchase discounted tickets to see *The Irish Widow*. Sunday evening, re-enactors are invited to a Pleasure Garden at the Governor's Palace.

Publick Times is presented by Historic Area Programs and Operations and Historic Area Stores, with the assistance of more than 550 historic re-enactors from militia companies in Maryland, Virginia and North Carolina

The weekly BBC program presents recorded music of the world's top military bands. In the middle of the program, along with some kind comments, was a cut from the Corps' latest CD release, Marching out of Time.

"This program has a wide listening audience and our inclusion is one of the best compliments the we have ever received," John said.

He also received copies of the latest release from the Tactical Air Command, entitled *Patriots*. On both CD and cassette, it features the Tattoo program presented annually at Langley Air Force Base, which the Corps supports.

The recording contains about ten minutes of our music, and notes on the CD cover (or cassette liner) are both numerous and kind in acknowledging Fife and Drum Corps' participation.

"The Fifes and Drums make an important contribution to international military music, both in performance and in standards," John said. "It is gratifying to realize that the Corps has gained a reputation for excellence throughout the world."
