Festival returns for fifth year with rare instruments, period music

Colonial Williamsburg hosts its fifth Early Music Festival, "From England to America: Music, Musicians and Musical Events in Colonial Virginia," Sept. 23-26.

Music played an important role in the cultural history of America. This four-day festival includes performances on rare instruments such as 18th-century violins, a 16th-century viola and an 18th-century violoncello, in addition to the Governor's Palace harpsichord and organ, which also date to the 18th century.

to the 18th century. At 2 p.m. on Sept. 23 at the Art Museums of Colonial Williamsburg, harpsichordist **Michael Monaco** explores the relationship between 18th-century Williamsburg musicians Curthbert Ogle and Peter Pelham. Museum admission ticket is required.

During "From the Collection: The Ogle Inventory" at 7:30 p.m. on Sept. 23, selections will include music from the surviving inventory of music teacher and London concertmaster Cuthbert Ogle, who briefly resided in Williamsburg in 1755. Performers include the members of Colonial Williamsburg's resident ensemble, The Governor's Musick, and guest artists perform in the Governor's Palace. Tickets are \$25.

"Music of Virginia: The First 100 Years" is a lecture/performance documenting the musical life of 17th-century Virginia and will be presented by Sarah Glosson of The Governor's Musick and The College of William & Mary at 2 p.m. on Sept. 24 at the Art Museums of Colonial Williamsburg. Tickets are \$5 in addition to museum admission. At 7:30 p.m. Sept. 24, guests will enjoy

the performance, "Music for Viols in Concert," at the Capitol, featuring music for several violas de gamba played together – a rare treat! Tickets are \$25.

Dr. Sterling Murray will present a lecture/performance introducing Thomas Arnés "Thomas and Sally" within the context of 18th-century theater and explore how it might have been enjoyed and understood by colonial audiences at 2 p.m. Sept. 25 at the Art Museums of Colonial Williamsburg. Admission is \$5 in addition to a museum ticket.

At 7:30 p.m. on Sept. 25 an evening of musical theater will be held at the Kimball Theatre. "Thomas and Sally: or the Sailor's Return," first performed in Williamsburg in 1770, is a fully sung play in which Sally resists the advances of the squire as she waits for her Thomas to return from the sea. Tickets are \$19 for adults and \$9.50 for youth.

P. Coleman, mayor of Williamsburg from 1929-1934. They resided in the St. George Tucker House. The Colemans met Mr. and Mrs. John D. Rockefeller Jr. in 1930. The two couples became close friends, especially Mrs. Rockefeller and Mrs. Coleman. They shared a love for Williamsburg and its early importance.

"Mrs. Coleman and Mrs. Rockefeller were both come heres," Nancy said. "Mrs. Rockefeller was from New York, and Mrs.

Mrs. Rockefeller and Mrs. Coleman were friends until Mrs. Rockefellers' death in 1948.

Child Development Center seeking applicants for new year

The YMCA Child Development Center at Colonial Williamsburg has provided onsite child care services to children of Colonial Williamsburg employees and chil-dren in the Williamsburg community since 1998. Children six weeks to five years of age enjoy a healthy, safe learning environment that promotes fun and fosters development. Licensed by the Commonwealth of Vir-

ginia Department of Social Services, the center is operated by a well-trained staff with degrees in early childhood and elementary education to ensure that participating children receive individual and age-appropriate instruction.

The center's curriculum emphasizes a mixture of play and learning. By daily interaction with their peers and center teaching staff; by engaging in activities such as arts and crafts, singing, storytelling and even cooking, children grasp a process of exploration and discovery. Fundamental concepts, including shapes, numbers, colors and letters, receive careful attention as well.

The center's staff also promotes positive behavior among children through discipline. Adhering to a set of rules helps chil-dren understand the limits of their actions while having fun. Within this specific set of rules, the staff relates the YMCA's core values such as caring, honesty, respect and responsibility to children.

Located on Information Center Drive near the Williamsburg Woodlands Hotel & Suites, the Center is open year-round, Monday through Friday, from 6:30 a.m. to 6 p.m. Children of Colonial Williamsburg employees are offered a discounted tuition rate and staff at the Center work with families who may be eligible for subsidized registration and tuition. The Foundation also offers payroll deduction as a means by which employees can pay their children's tuition.
