July 4 offers more ways to celebrate nation's freedom

Colonial Williamsburg continues to enhance the guest experience with an expanded Independence Day Celebration. Here's what to look for on this year's holi-

Independence Day Celebration

On Wednesday, July 4, the Foundation brings more fanfare to this year's celebration with several new events. A special performance of the Virginia Symphony Orchestra (VSO), with music director JoΛnn Falletta, at 8 p.m. at the Governor's Palace will be one of the highlights. A Jumbotron placed in Market Square enhances viewing for guests in the Historic Area.

This year, guest can enjoy a preconcert Palace Picnic, and reserved seating for the special concert with VSO. Guests also receive a commemorative blanket, private access to the Palace and Palace grounds with colonial entertainment from 6 p.m.-7:30 p.m. The evening concludes with a spectacular fireworks display. Independence Day Celebration ticket are available now, at colonialwilliamsburg.com and by calling 1-800-HISTORY.

Guests can enjoy box dinners at 6 p.m. at the Governor's Palace. The dinner for adults includes a Lodge fried half chicken, honey mustard buttered jumbo Virginia ham biscuit, all-American potato salad and Southern cole slaw.

The children's dinner consists of two

pieces of Lodge fried chicken, ham and cheese and peanut butter and jelly sand-wiches. A vegetarian option is available.

For dessert guests can enjoy a patriotic cookie, colonial trifle and watermelon. Two

CW receives support for historic architecture preservation

The Grainger Foundation of Lake For est, Ill., has provided a \$2 million gift to support Colonial Williamsburg's Historic Architectural Resources Department. The gift will provide initial endowment funding for the department and money for a variety of preservation projects.

"We are exceedingly grateful to The Grainger Foundation for this latest gift," said Colin G. Campbell, president and CEO of The Colonial Williamsburg Foundation. "It provides critical funding as we seek to meet our obligation to preserve the restored colonial capital for generations to come."

One million dollars of the gift will be used to partially endow the position of di-rector of Historic Architectural Resources. The position is currently held by Matthew Webster, who is responsible for ensuring careful, ongoing conservation of nearly 600 Historic Area structures — including 88 original 18th-century buildings. The director works with Historic Trades artisans and facilities maintenance staff to develop innovative approaches to making sensitive re-pairs to buildings that range from the early 8th century to the present. Drawing on the talents and insights of the Historic Trades staff, he shares architectural and structural expertise in methods and processes with Colonial Williamsburg's modern maintenance craftsmen.

The gift also includes \$800,000 to endow a departmental fund for projects, equipment and training. When fully endowed, the fund will produce sufficient revenue to address emerging preservation issues and provide additional opportunities to increase the expertise of Colonial Williamsburg craftsmen. Equipment needs reflect recent architectural preservation advances that include sophisticated tools for assessing and analyzing original structures

and materials without causing unnecessary

Training funds will educate maintenance and construction employees in new inves-tigative methods, historic materials and techniques, and provide networking opportunities with other professionals vital to maintaining Colonial Williamsburg's preservation expertise. These funds also will support expanding the skills of the Historic Trades staff, as well as providing internships and workshops to develop the necessary skill sets for the next generation of preservation craftsmen. The gift enables Colonial Williamsburg to assist other historic sites by sharing knowledge and techniques with the worldwide preservation community.

The third element of the gift provides \$200,000 to support Colonial Williamsburg's masonry preservation initiative. With new research and analytical tools, Colonial Williamsburg is developing solutions for preserving its public buildings, trade shops, and homes in non-intrusive vays. This effort will preserve the structural fabric of the Historic Area by addressing brick, stone and mortar needs of 55 structures. Sophisticated analytical tools allow determination of the original masonry formulation, which Colonial Williamsburg produces on-site and uses to replace earlier repairs that have deteriorated over time.

The Grainger Foundation, an independent, private foundation based in Lake Forest, Ill., was established in 1949 by William W. Grainger, founder of W.W. Grainger, Inc. The Foundation is one of Colonial Williamsburg's most generous benefactors with several previous gifts and grants for Historic Area and museum initiatives, including Historic Trades apprenticeships, endowment of a curatorial position and support for museum exhibitions and publications.

Skills of early settlers explored at Historic Jamestowne

Through the new program "Forge, Fire, Stitch and Shave – The Technologies That Built James Fort," guests explore the technologies and military tactics that sustained the early settlers of James Fort. The program takes place from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m.

on June 23 at Historic Jamestowne.

Members of Colonial Williamsburg's Historic Trades department will demonstrate and discuss the skills and techniques that were used for making iron, barrels, shoes — and even the walls of houses. Younger settlers are invited to join Captain Brewster and several soldiers from 1612 as they recruit and drill the new arrivals, learning the technology of defense and the military discipline necessary to defend the fort from expected Spanish encroachments.

Since the rediscovery of James Fort in 1996, archaeologists have been uncovering clues that reveal how the early settlers lived, worked and survived at this frontier outpost. In this special program, guests will have the opportunity to see some of the trades practiced inside the area where the original 1607 fort stood.

The program is free with paid admission to Historic Jamestowne. Admission is \$10 per adult (which includes both Historic Jamestowne and Yorktown Battlefield). Children under age 16 are admitted free. America the Beautiful National Park passes are accepted. Preservation Virginia members are also admitted free. Accessories craftsperson enjoys diverse experiences job brings

EMPLOYEE NAME: Melissa Mead POSITION: Accessories craftsperson for the Costume Design Center YEARS OF SERVICE: Nine years

WHAT I DO: "My co-worker Jean Hogge and I are the accessories craftspeople. I do clothing accessories that are related to the head, hands and feet. I am very busy all the time. Some days I may help with shoe fittings or repair damaged items such as hats and shoes. I also create felt hats, caps, kerchiefs and decorate hats. Colonial Williamsburg's costumes go through a lot of wear and tear. Hats mildew, ribbons on women's hats get dirty and the straw on hats separates often. I'm responsible for keeping items clean and in good repair. Jean and I also receive help from volunteers. Volunteers help with time consuming tasks such as embroidery. We really value their time and effort.

"We created accessories for 18th century plays, which are very theatrical and feature bigger than average, lavish costumes. Recently, we learned how to make 18th-century moccasins by doing quill work, which Jean and I taught ourselves by looking at research online and in books. Quill work involves stitching porcupine quills onto mocca-sins and leggings. The costumes were used in 'So Far from Scioto,' a part of the Revolutionary City programming. I enjoy working on these challenging and diverse projects.

JOB: "The people see most are costumed employees who come to us when they need their hats cleaned or shoes repaired. When we receive

Mead guests, I enjoy explaining how costumes and accessories were worn. We get a lot of questions about shoes, which are not as comfortable as guests think. Λ lot of people also believe that anyone in any period wore a mob cap, which is not true. We correct a lot of misconceptions guests have about accessories and their histories. "Another one of my favorite parts is that I get to problem solve. For example, we get one-offs, in which a designer brings a painting or a sketch of a costume and says, 'Build this.' Then we figure out how it should be put together. I'm still amazed that seamstresses from that period used what they had to make everything by hand. Overall, I love that my job allows me to use my love for sewing to do so many different things.

Colonial Williamsburg and Yale University Press have released a paperback edition of "What Clothes Reveal: The Language of Clothing in Colonial and Federal America." Originally published in 2002, this stunning book features clothing from Colonial Williamsburg's collection of 18th- and early 19th-century clothing

Author Linda Baumgarten, curator textiles and costumes for Colonial Williamsburg, illuminates the featured period clothing through 355 color photographs and 36 black-and-white illustrations as beautiful art objects, documents

of social history, studies in technology and avenues to understand people of the past. Her full examination of period clothing ranges from the utilitarian garments of slaves to the elegant, high-style attire of the gentry, while engagingly discussing the social context of apparel and what people wore

during significant life passages.
