

Yorktown Day Event Features Purple Heart Award Ceremonies

Two artillery crews from CW's colonial militia will be on hand to fire the opening cannon salvos signalling the start of the military parade which will be a major feature of this year's Yorktown Day observance October 19.

The event, which marks the 186th anniversary of the surrender of British General Lord Cornwallis to the allied French and American forces under General Washington at Yorktown, consists of a morning wreathlaying ceremony at the Yorktown Monument and an afternoon patriotic program on the Yorktown Battlefield beginning at 1:00 p.m.

Speaker for the afternoon event will be Brigadier General Bernard W. Rogers, commandant of cadets at the United States Military Academy at West Point. General Rogers, who recently returned from a tour of duty in Vietnam, will be introduced by Air Force Lieutenant General William H. Tunner (Ret.) of Ware Neck, Va.

A special feature of the afternoon exercises will be the presentation of the Order of the Purple Heart to several veterans of the Vietnam War. This ceremony, as well as the rest of the afternoon program, will be held at the site of Redoubt No. 10, where the heroism of Sgt. William Brown earned him one fo the nation's two initial Purple Heart awards made during the Battle of Yorktown.



Mr. Wetherburn's Dairy Gets Restoration Attention

Returned - after 200 years - to its original brick foundations, the dairy behind Mr. Wetherburn's Tavern is now undergoing painstaking restoration.

This fall construction crews moved the small building behind the tavern some 20 feet to its 18th century site. The trip was the third for the structure which, in addition to a dairy, has served as a smoke house and in more recent years as a residence. Previous moves had been made in the 18th century and early in the 20th.

The restored dairy will be part of a complex of outbuildings behind Mr. Wetherburn's Tavern. The white structure shown behind the dairy is the reconstructed kitchen. A smoke house and a privy will also be reconstructed on the Wetherburn lot. Ultimately, the original stable, now a garage on the corner of the lot, will also be restored.

The tavern and its outbuildings will be open to the public next year.

Prime Ministers Of Northern Ireland And Singapore Visit Here

The past few days have been busy ones for the CWers whose responsibility it is to take care of visiting dignitaries. Saturday and Sunday the Prime Minister of Northern Ireland, Terence O'Neill, was in Williamsburg for a visit, and on Monday and Tuesday CW entertained the Prime Minister of Singapore, Lee Kuan Yew.

Prime Minister O'Neill, accompanied by his wife and three other persons, was here on an unofficial visit as a part of his 21-day tour of the United States and Canada.

Prime Minister Lee, en route to an official state visit in Washington, arrived in Williamsburg barely 24 hours after Prime Minister O'Neill's plane had left Patrick Henry Airport. Both dignitaries stayed in the Allen Byrd House.

...by January 1, an NCR 500 computer on the third floor of the Goodwin Building will be writing payroll checks and figuring interdepartmental charges.

......Landscape has placed fall crops - pumpkins, squash, corn, etc. - in strategic spots throughout the Historic Area to add more color to autumn in the colonial city.

.....1,200 teachers and 2,800 school principals across the country have just received the newly revised school visits folder sent out by Group Visits.

....the upcoming recording of a Palace Concert, which will be offered for sale to the public before Christmas, may soon be followed by recordings of music by the Fife and Drum Corps and the Band of Musick.

.....this fall, for the first time, craftsmen harvested flax grown right here in the Historic Area. It will be used for future demonstrations of the craft of flax breaking.

....despite the cool, rainy weather late this fall, Landscape reports that total rainfall for the period from January 11, 1967 to September 12, 1967 was only 30.47 inches or slightly below average for the eight-months period.

......coming off the presses this fall will be three new books, a juvenile by Allen Dwight, a study of Governor Spotswood, and a research report by Jane Carson on cookery in colonial Virginia.


