New report details economic impact of CW on communities

Four out of every five dollars earned in the City of Williamsburg are directly or indirectly the result of CW's presence in the city, according to a new study. In addition, CW provides a substantial positive economic impact on James City County, the Bruton District of York County and Commonwealth of Virginia as a whole.

These are some of the highlights of a recently-completed economic impact study. Commissioned by CW, the study details the economic affect on the area as a result of wages and salaries paid to CW employees; the impact of CW purchases of goods and services from other businesses; and the impact of expenditures by visitors drawn here primarily by CW exhibitions and programs.

The last such study was completed in 1983. Since then, total spending and income created by CW rose 54.7%, from \$169.4 million to \$262 million. This spending created \$68.6 million in personal income for city residents, \$242.4 million for those in the greater Williamsburg area and \$459.8 million for the Commonwealth, not including the impact of state taxes paid by tourist-related businesses or spending by visitors elsewhere in the state while in transit to or from Williamsburg.

On a per dollar basis, each dollar of total spending attributable to CW resulted in the creation of 26 cents each in personal income for City of Williamsburg residents; 93 cents each for Williamsburg area residents; and \$1.75 in personal income for residents of the Commonwealth.

These figures were estimated using formulas which took into account the "multiplier" effect which happens as each dollar is repeatedly spent within the three geographic areas studied. Visitor expenditure figures in the report are calculated only for those visitors who come to the area with the primary purpose of seeing CW.

In 1988, the study estimates that total spending in the Williamsburg area by visitors to CW was \$152 million dollars, up 82% from 1983. In the City, an estimated \$42.8 million in personal income was generated by this spending, up 35% since 1983. In the greater Williamsburg area visitor spending generated \$142 million in resident income, up 101.6%

since 1983. Visitor spending statewide during 1988 was \$205.2 million, up 65.6% since 1983.

"The 1988 economic impact study is clear statistical evidence that the interdependence of the community and Colonial Williamsburg grows in importance each year," said Chuck Longsworth, president. "The Foundation relies on the community surrounding it for employees, a host of public and private services, and goodwill. The report demonstrates how much Colonial Williamsburg returns to its neighbors in the form of family and business income."

Colonial Cricket begins Wednesday, May 17, at 5:30 p.m. The more employees who participate the better--usual team make-up is 16 people. Cricket is similar to baseball in that a bat and ball are used. The "batsman" defends a "wicket"--a set of two wooden stumps fixed in the ground several inches apart with a "bail", a piece of wood, laid across the top. A "bowler" on the opposite team pitches a ball underhand with the intention of hitting the defended wicket and dislodging the bail. The batsman hits the ball and runs (as long as he/she does not make a foul hit or the ball doesn't get caught). The team with the most runs wins.
